Street Lights Installed In Front of Schools

The street lights on West 7th Street, in front of the Baird schools, will be turned on as soon as the globes arrive, which should be within the next few days. This will make this section of our community, which has long needed additional lighting facilities, a well lighted area to be proud of.

These lights were installed at an expense of some \$600.00, not including labor, which was done by regular employees of the city. This was a saving of at least \$800.00, in lieu of contracting the job.

While this project involved an additional expenditure not normally anticipated, these lights and standards are fully paid for. Several projects carried out by the city have taken a little longer to accomplish, but a "pay-as-you-go" policy has saved many dollars by keeping within the limits of funds available.

STOCK SHOW SETS ENTRY RECORD

The Callahan County Junior Livestock Show, held Saturday in Baird, was the largest in the history of the county. Supt. and director of the show, James Snyder, reported that more exhibitors entered this show than any previous one and quality of the stock was excellent.

A good crowd thronged the rodeo grounds where some 200 of the county's junior livestock raisers had their animals on exhibit.

Prize money, exceeding one thousand dollars, was paid to the entrants, whose stock was judged according to the national rules which regulate livestock shows, with special emphasis placed on the accomplishment of the feeder, his ability with stock, and the effort given his particular project. Prize money for the contestants came principally from individuals and groups who took this means to encourage the youngsters.

Success of the show was due, in great part, to the efforts of the show's superintendent and board of directors: James Snyder, Bruce Williams, Blanton Scott, Deel Edington, Mel Green, Fred Goble, Tommy Harris, and Hilton Tarrant. Assuredly credit goes in great part to County Agent Glen Green, the county VA teachers, Norman McCoy, Claude Rock, E. H. Barron and O. B. Edmondson, who direct and supervise the 4-H and FFA work in this community. Most of all should be acknowledged the work of the young people who show such enthusiasm in the show.

Cash prizes of \$10, \$8, \$7, \$6 and \$5 were awarded in the beef cattle classes; \$6, \$5, \$4, \$3, and \$2 in the sheep and goat and swine divisions. Poultry and rabbits brought \$3, \$2.50, \$2, \$1.50 and \$1 for winners.

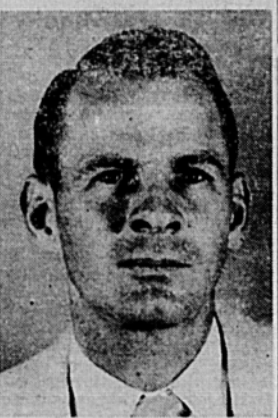

Highlights of the State Capitol

AUSTIN, TEX. -- Texas' 57th Legislature began on a note that is likely to continue for some time difficulty over money.

Many House members felt their colleagues had made an awkward start in an awkward situation when they voted themselves salary raises as the first item of business. House voted 97-to-45 to put into effect the \$4,800 a year legislative salaries made possible when the people approved a constitutional amendment last November.

Objectors were quick to point out that (1) the state general fund was at that moment \$85,249,951 in the red and (2) many lawmakers campaigned on an "economy in government" platform.

Rep. Raymond Bartram of New Braunfels said he felt the people would rather legislators take care of teachers salary raises and medical assistance for the aged before spending extra money on themselves.

H. B. 1, the legislative salary and expense bill, would divert some \$2,600,000 from the cigarette tax and drivers license funds. Money had to be "found," since the general revenue fund, as fast as it comes in, has to be used to pay the state's "hot checks."

Down the road are even more fireworks as the legislature searches for \$200,000,000-plus to take care of the wants of other state agencies and services.

TURMAN SPEAKER -- Farmers and teachers have one of their own in one of the most important of state offices.

Rep. James Turman of Gober was elected Speaker of the House by a vote of 83 to-66. Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen, whose support was largely from conservative House members, was the losing candidate.

Turman and his family operate a 103-acre farm in Fannin County. He is a former grade school teacher and worked his way to a doctor of philosophy degree in education. For a time he was assistant to the president of Texas Women's University at Denton.

As Speaker, Turman's first big job is appointing House committees, due to go into action about January 23. By his selections, he can influence to a considerable degree how certain legislation will be handled.

SENATOR ROBERTS HONORED -- Sen. Ray Roberts of McKinney is president of the Senate for the present session.

His job, largely honorary, is to preside over the Senate in the absence of the lieutenant governor. Also, he is second in line of succession to the governorship. By tradition, during each president pro tem's, the governor and lieutenant governor leave the state so the senate president can serve as a "governor for a day." Senator Roberts, a World War

Commission on Higher Education does not favor making Del Mar College in Corpus Christi a senior college.

Commission has agreed to study requests for senior college status and state support for Pan American College at Edinburg and San Angelo College.

On Del Mar, the Commission will make its negative recommendation to the Legislature which will have the final say. In the past, the Legislature has approved more such requests than the Commission.

NEW STATE BUILDING -- Contracts have been awarded for construction of a second new State Office Building just north of the Capitol.

It will be a four-story granite building with 147,205 square feet. Cost is to be \$2,076,102. It will be known as a State Board of Plumbing Examiners and some other agencies now scattered over Austin.

This is one of six buildings in the current program to create a unified government center, clustered around the State Capitol. Already in use are State Office Building No. 1, the State Courts Building and the Texas Employment Commission Building. Architects Building is to be finished soon, and a new Insurance Building is due to start this year.

DECENTRALIZATION SET -- State Game and Fish Commission has voted to set up a system of five regional and 20 district offices to improve operation of its field service.

Reorganization plan was recommended by the Texas Research League, a privately financed organization to study operation of governmental agencies.

Regional offices will be at Seabrook, Rockport, Tyler, San Angelo and Waco.

District offices will be at Amarillo, Bryan, Houston, Victoria, San Antonio, Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Lubbock, El Paso, Wichita Falls, Midland, Fort Worth, Temple, Brownwood, Kerrville, Dallas, Texarkana, Palestine, and Lufkin.

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We think you will be interested in the commentary of Editor & Publisher W. E. Barnes of the SLEEPY EYE (Minn.) HERALD-DISPATCH on the ingenious (and quite legal) idea of his fellow Journalist, D. R. Peterson, Editor and Publisher of the TRUMAN (also Minn.) TRIBUNE:

"The Truman Tribune," writes Mr. Barnes, "says that starting January 1 he is going to pay his employees their full salaries each week except the last week of the month, then deduct the entire month's withholding tax. He thinks it will shock the employees into interest realizing just how much Government is forcing them to pay in taxes. He thinks they will raise such a fuss that Federal spending will be cut."

"The editor is only half right. They WILL RAISE QUITE A FUSS. It won't do any good. Most employes and employers alike, clap their hands every time the Government promises more security, more unemployment compensation, more sick benefits for the old and those not so old, more public works to boost employment, more public housing, more aid to schools, more subsidies, more of everything for everybody. The more we demand, the more it costs, and the more taxes we must pay. Seems like most any ten-year-old could understand the problem. Most of us have long since observed that tenth birthday either don't - or close our eyes to where we are going."

Even though we must agree with Publisher Barnes' general philosophy on the obtuseness and/or heedlessness of the genus homo (not sapiens), we are still of the opinion that Mr. Peterson's stratagem WILL open a few eyes, and that wide adoption of his idea could hardly fail to spur effective tax reform.

For easy figuring, suppose a man is making (nominally) \$100 a week and the month of February 1961 happened to be composed of four equal weeks. Publisher Peterson would pay him his \$100 intact, in folding money, at the end of the first, second and third weeks.

By that time he will be pretty well adjusted to spending \$100 a week and the fourth week pay envelope would look pretty thin with only \$23.60 in it (if the man had a wife) or \$14 flat if he were unattached tramp printer!

We shall wait with considerable interest a further report on what we consider a truly noble experiment.

P. S. Figure it out for yourself: With one dependent, the employer withholds \$16.10 a week; with none, \$18.50 a week. And don't forget to add to this that \$3.00 a week for Social Security.

Without all these experiences his youth is incomplete!

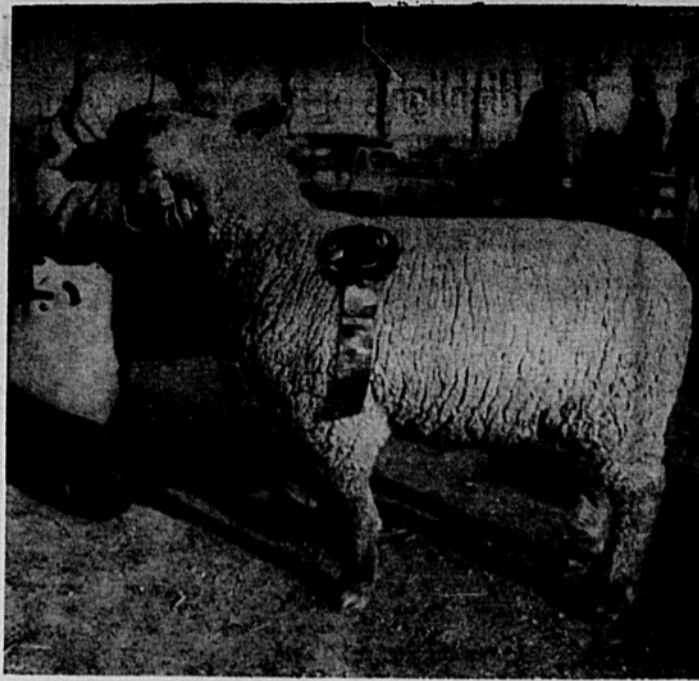

A COPY OF MINUTES OF THE CALLAHAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S POSSE

Call Meeting of the Board of Directors December 8, 1960

WHEREAS, in response to a meeting duly called by the President of the Board of Directors, the following men were present: Homer McIntosh, President; J. Rupert Jackson Jr., Secretary; Blain Odom, Jerry Loper, J. O. Warren, Lee Ivey, Burrus Miller and Ace Hickman, Directors.

The following resolution was passed, on motion made by J. O. Warren, and seconded by Burrus Miller.

WHEREAS, the Committee for the erection of a Callahan County Live Stock Show Barn anticipate that an election for the issuance of bonds to construct such a building, and to purchase land for such building will be called by the Callahan County Commissioners Court, in the year 1961, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this organization to further promote the building of such stock show barn, and further that it is believed that the location of such show barn should be in Baird, the County Seat, and the town most near the central part of the population of the County, and the use of such barn could be used by the entire county easier than at some other location, and that the erection of such a show barn would be advantageous to this organization, and would further the purposes of this organization,

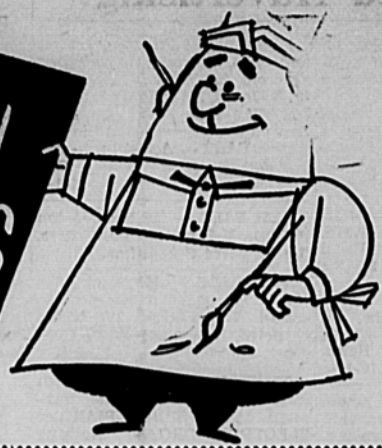
