## HEAVY RAINS FALL DURING SIX DAYS

Four and one-eighth inches of rain fell in Randall county from last Wednesday night until Monday afternoon. The fall continued every day and the sun was hardly seen until Monday morning. Since then the weather has been warm and the vegetation is fairly shooting out of the ground.

- Monday 1-8

### Building New Picture Show.

## Iowa Newspaper Slanders Panhandle Country

The Washington (Iowa) County Press got very much excited last week and gave utterance to one of the biggest lies a newspaper ever dared to print on its front page. Or was it ignorance? Perhaps the editor of that sheet should not be charged as a liar if he was so ignorant as to print without investigation the statement that in the Texas Panhandle "the farms are abandoned and the widows and orphans are weeping."

We don't give a rap about the Invisible Government scrap Brookhart and Alex Miller are carrying on, nor what becomes of the money, but if Brookhart wants any dough he ought to come to Randall county. Representatives from seven of the leading banks of Wichita, Oklahoma City, Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago representing over \$50,000,000 were in Randall and adjoining counties last week trying to loan money to these "abandoned" farmers at the lowest rate of interest ever offered in the southwest, but the people of Randall county are so busy trying to spend their surplus cash in buying automobiles at the rate of twenty five per week, that these gentlemen found no one wishing any of the filthy lucre. Wonder if Brook has seen any of these gentlemen in Washington county trying to loan money to the farmers.

Evidently Mr. Brookhart does not know, or care to find out, that the population of the Texas Panhandle has increased something like 20,000 during the past six years.

Evidently Mr. Brookhart is too much interested in writing "slush" for that Bull Moose sheet of his to read the agricultural papers and learn that it was Randall county in the Texas Panhandle that shipped to the Kansas City market the highest priced baby beef ever sold on that market from the great state of Texas. And all the feed given these calves was grown in Randall county.

He has overlooked the fact that in 1911 a car load of Hereford heifer calves from Randall county broke the world's record for range stuff on the Kansas City market.

A little later Randall county Herefords won the sweep stakes at the Royal show in Kansas City.

Does that sound like the Texas Panhandle had gone to the dogs when the Hereford cattle from this section cleans up the whole bunch whenever they go into the competitive show ring?

Mr. Brookhart may try to construe from the above that this is

only a cattle county—and even if it were none other, do these records sound like abandoned farms and weeping widows and orphans? If he tries to put up such an argument as this, he must take the first lesson in the agriculture primer and learn that the cattle county is the richest county on earth. The Panhandle country is furnishing pure bred stuff to all the eastern states at fancy prices. And if Mr. Brookhart knows anything about cattle he must admit that pure breeds are not furnished on the big ranches of the "wild and woolly west" as he no doubt thinks this is.

Cattle is not the only thing the Texas Panhandle can boast of. Do hogs look good to Brookhart? Well, all he has to do is investigate the records at the Ft. Worth stock yards and see that during the past three years Panhandle hogs have topped the market more often than hogs from any other section of Texas, Oklahoma or Kansas. One of the big packing houses has put out a special brand of bacon, derived exclusively from Panhandle hogs and which sells at a fancy price owing to the excellent flavor given the meat by the maize and kafir grain which is used exclusively in fattening these hogs.

If Mr. Brookhart will write the Kansas agricultural college for its bulletin on maize and kafir and read where they have tested the feed values of these grains to be practically identical with that of Indian corn, and when he figures that these crops will make as much as Indian corn to the acre, he can readily see that the Panhandle is no slouch when it comes to raising grain. Notwithstanding the high price of grain there are more than 50,000 bushels stored in Canyon and vicinity which was raised on these "abandoned farms."

Furthermore, how does 25 bushels to the acre wheat crop sound to Mr. Brookhart? That is what Randall county made last year.

What does he think about four cuttings of alfalfa in one season and what does he think of alfalfa which netted the owner \$125 per acre one season? Randall county produces these and can produce the proof.

What about three tons of millet hay to the acre in one year? But what's the use to go on and enumerate figures to a man who hasn't more regard for the truth than to print on the first page of his paper that the Panhandle is a land of abandoned farms and weeping widows and orphans?

We just want to call Brookhart's attention to the fact that two years ago land two miles of Canyon sold at \$100 per acre, last year a section adjoining the city at \$125 per acre and that during the past winter a German farmer who has lived here for thirteen years, making all of his money out of this "abandoned" Panhandle land, added another section to his holdings 13 miles from Canyon at \$80 per acre. Included in last week's sales was a section adjoining Henry Eicher's land to a prosperous Sioux City farmer who will improve the same with fine barn, house, silo, etc., and will move here in the fall. Does this sound like a starvation country? Furthermore, investigation will prove that more than seventy five new families have moved to Randall county during the past year; that there is not a single improved farm in the county for rent, and that scores and scores

of improved farms could have been rented this spring. A number of the best farmers from the northern states and from central Texas have recently moved here to improve their places and more are coming this fall.

But why go further to show the wonderful possibilities of the Texas Panhandle to a man like Brookhart. We don't blame him for being a little sore at Texas. Any man who would induce people to move to the swamp lands on the coast down by the Mexican border where the battle rages royal year in and year out between man and mosquito, and then have all of the settlers leave him—no, we don't blame Brookhart for being a little sore at Texas. But when he brands this glorious Panhandle country with its 3000 feet elevation insuring a mild summer climate but far enough south to escape the cold winter snows; this country with its gently rolling prairies, deep rich loam soil sprayed with the gentle rains of Heaven sufficiently every year to raise a good crop; this country with the most intelligent and growing population on the earth; this county, our home and our country, God's own country—when he branded this as the place "where the farms are abandoned and the widows and orphans are weeping," we charge him as being the most unscrupulous liar or the most ignorant chunk of human clay God ever let live.

**Kafir, Maize, Feterita, Broom Corn**

The Agricultural Demonstration Department of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway recommends that its farm co-operators observe, as nearly as possible, the following suggestions in preparing the seed bed, seeding, cultivation and general handling of Kafir, Milo Maize Feterita and Broom Corn:

**Preparation of Seed Bed.**—The ground should be thoroughly and deeply prepared either by plowing or listing. Fall preparation by either plowing or listing is always preferable to spring preparation. No better methods are known in preparation for planting Kafir, Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn than early deep fall listing or plowing. Good results have been shown from running a subsoiler in the deep fall lister furrow, immediately following the lister. The loosened subsoil proves an excellent place for the storing of moisture between the time of land preparation and seeding. Following rains or snows, and as soon as the ridges are sufficiently dry to work between preparation by listing in the fall and planting time, they should be harrowed to break break crusts and also to kill any weeds that may come through as the season advances. This harrowing will also be found to conserve the moisture, and is especially to be commended for "tight" lands. It is usually better to cultivate than to harrow the ridges made by the lister, in sandy land, and especially if there is danger of blowing.

When early deep plowing or listing in the fall is impossible, shallow spring listing is preferable to shallow spring plowing.

Early spring listing is better than later spring listing for Kafir, Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn. When possible, always double-list. List early; work ridges, when necessary to break crusts for the conservation of moisture and to keep down weeds, until planting time, and then re-list and plant immediately in the lister furrow.

**Contouring.**—All lister furrows, and especially those for planting, should be run on the contour—directly across the slope and not up and down it. This plan tends to prevent water from running off the field, even during or following a heavy rain. The fact that contouring may make rows necessarily crooked or winding in some fields is of minor importance when compared to the conservation of moisture and even of the soil itself, in some instances.

**Seeds and Quantities to Plant.**—

Seeds of Kafir, Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn should be selected in the head direct from the field and stored during the winter in some dry place, secure from depredations of birds, rats or mice. Just before planting time the seeds should be threshed by hand and carefully cleaned. From one to two pounds of the seeds from crops named will be found sufficient to plant an acre. Most farmers plant too much seed, rather than not enough, and then fail to properly thin the crops. Kafir under Southwestern conditions should be thinned to from 24 to 30 inches apart in the row, and Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn should be thinned from 18 to 24 inches apart in the row. It pays to plant only the best and the purest, regardless of the fact that such seeds may be a trifle higher in price. If these crops are grown for seed, it should be remembered that they all belong to the sorghum (non-saccharine) family, and hence mix readily, and should be as far apart as possible to prevent this undesirable mixing.

Time to plant.—Kafir under Southwestern conditions should

be planted from April 20 to June 15 for dwarf varieties, while the planting season for other strains would be somewhat shorter. Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn should be planted from May 1 to June 20.

**Cultivation.**—Crusts forming in the bottom of furrows following dashing rains after planting and before the seed come up frequently prevent the plants from breaking through. A trough through which large spikes have been driven from the inside will prove an excellent instrument for the breaking of these crusts. These spiked troughs may be so arranged as to drag three or four rows at one and the same time, and may be used in connection with the harrow for the first two or three cultivations with good results. The lister-cultivator or "go-devil" will do excellent work when run once or twice following the harrow, where crop is planted with the lister. All later cultivations should be done with sweeps or small shovels. In cultivating Kafir, Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn, care must be exercised to prevent throwing too much dirt to the row. The row if possible should be kept lower than the surrounding ground throughout the growing season, as this causes the water to accumulate around the plants instead of between the rows. No cultivation shallower than 3 to 3 1/2 inches is advised at any time. The crops named should be cultivated at intervals of every ten days, or more often if necessary. It pays to use a one-horse cultivator between the rows after the crop is too large to straddle with a common cultivator.

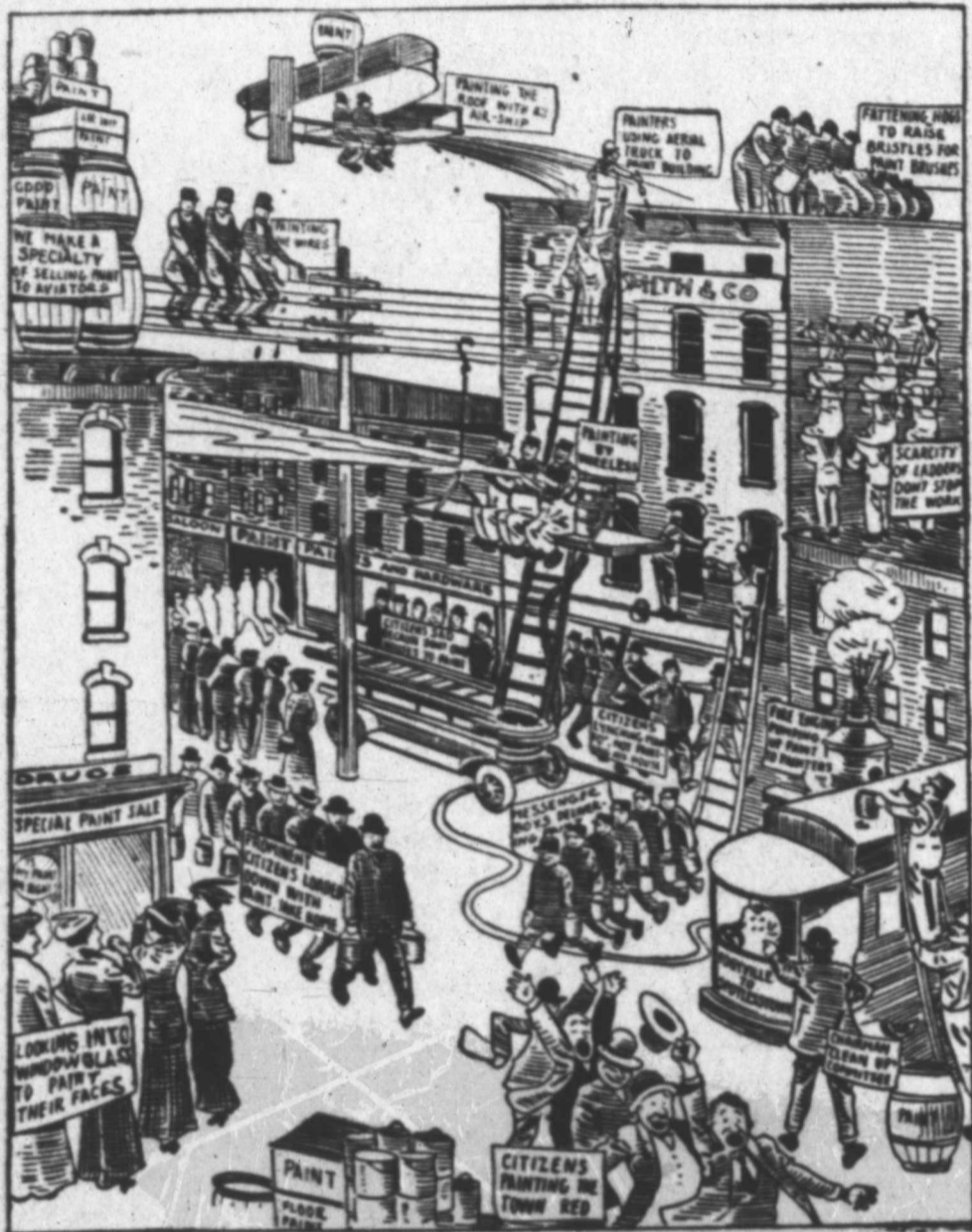

**West Texas State Normal College**

The following is a short review of the work of the Normal since the old building burned:

**The Spirit of the West Texas State Normal College.**

On March 25th, 1914 the main building of the West Texas State Normal College was destroyed by fire. While the house was on fire, beyond control the faculty began arrangements for temporary quarters about town. By ten o'clock next day all arrangements had been made, and recitations began as usual, losing only a part of two days, but not all of either. Not a student went home because of the burn, but every one remained at his post and finished his year's work.

**Summer Quarters—**  
It soon became apparent that it was not best to keep a body of students in store houses about the public square. One member of the faculty submitted general plans for new temporary houses, and another, having training in architecture wrote the specifications, and in two weeks from the time the Regents of the State Normal schools decided to build temporary structures, two houses each 180 ft. by 60 ft. were ready for use. The false roof or second roof protects these houses from excessive heat and the rubberoid with which they are wrapped makes it possible to heat them comfortably in the coldest weather. The spirit of loyalty, pluck and efficiency may be seen and felt, everywhere about the campus of the West Texas State Normal College.

**Rebuilding and Equipping The West Texas State Normal College at Canyon.**

The Board of Regents of the State Normal schools of Texas decided to rebuild the destroyed house at Canyon in a style worthy of Texas, and that would in some manner do justice to the Panhandle.

The new house is to have three stories and a basement to be built of steel and brick trimmed in gray stone. It will have all modern departments.

The contract price for the building complete is \$223,880.00. However, the legislature, at

its regular session appropriated only \$154,754.00 which will only build the house omitting the wings which are to contain the cloak rooms, toilets, and fourteen recitation rooms and laboratories. The building will be greatly reduced in convenience and the work will be crippled if the amount necessary to finish the house can not be obtained from the special session of the legislature to convene the latter part of the current month.

Further, the house should be heated, lighted, ventilated and otherwise equipped so that the highest quality of school work may be done in it. The architect estimates the heating and ventilating plant at a cost of \$43,000.00; the plumbing and lighting at \$12,500.00; total \$55,500. this added to the cost of the naked house will be \$279,380.00. It will require \$25,000.00 to equip the laboratories and library.

**By Comparison.**

From the \$279,380.00 sought for the plant in Canyon the gift of \$100,000.00 given by the local people should be subtracted because this amount never came from the State. The Panhandle is entitled to a State school of the first rank. The people have paid for it over and over again.

The Panhandle has the right to insist that the legislature deal generously with the State school at Canyon which is to meet the educational needs of the people of this section of the State.

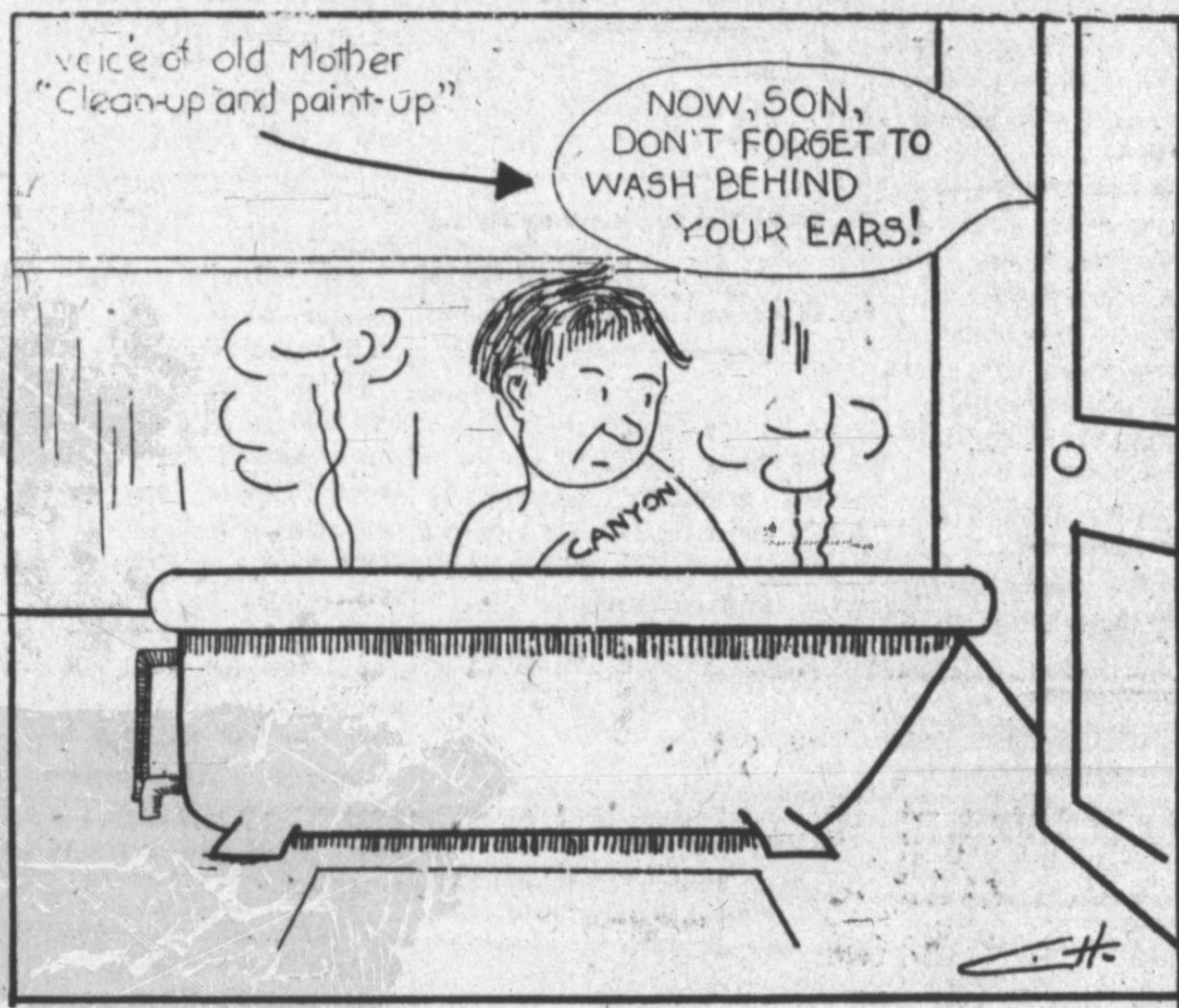

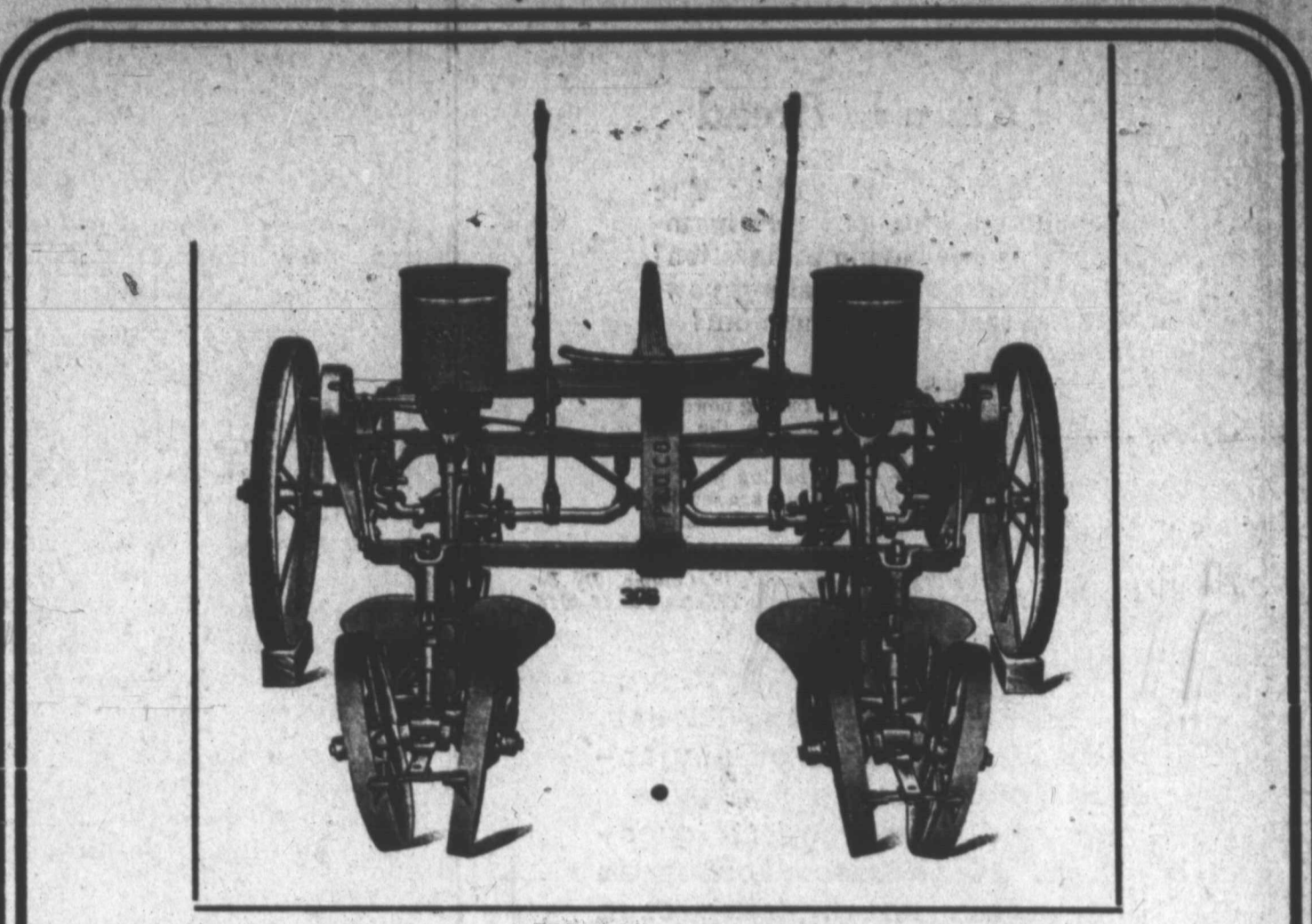

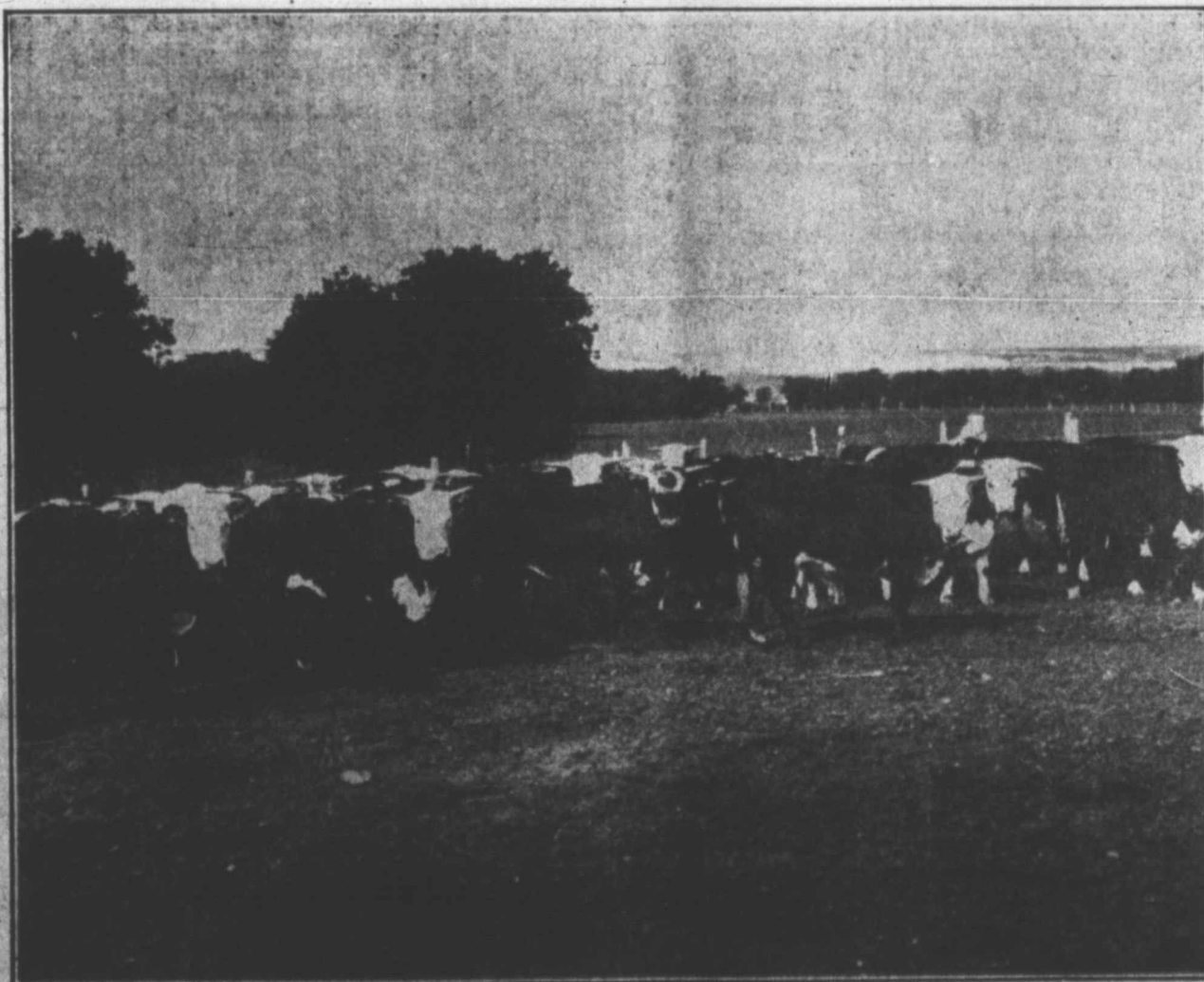

### Ideal Hog Raising Country.

Chas. B. Moore, Canyon, Texas.

I find this to be an ideal hog raising country. It is free from cholera and the various diseases that so often prove detrimental in other states to the hog industry.

My stay in the Plains Country of Texas is of but two years' duration, but my experience in that time has thoroughly convinced me that, under proper preparation and handling, the lands will make returns profitable to the farmer. My wheat this year averaged 22 bushels per acre and was shown under the supervision of the Santa Fe agricultural demonstrators. Oats, millet, katir and milo maize also did well.

I am well pleased with the country. Under diversification, and an exact application of the methods advocated by the Santa Fe's farm demonstrators, Northwest Texas is sure to become a land peopled by contented farmers, stockmen and dairymen within a short time.

### Always Has Something to Sell.

Henry Gerdson, Canyon, Texas.

I had enough money when I came here six years ago to put up a small house and make a partial payment on 160 acres of land. I have now paid for this land entirely with the products from the farm. We keep a few good dairy cows, plenty of chickens and a few hogs for our own meat, with always a surplus for sale.

It is seldom that I go to town without taking something from the farm to sell, bringing home the cash. Surplus feed produced on the farm was sold at a good price, finding ready market, and this paid for my land. This year I bought the 160 acres of land next adjoining my farm, the row crop on the land making me \$20 per acre.

Every man who comes here and farms right will succeed.

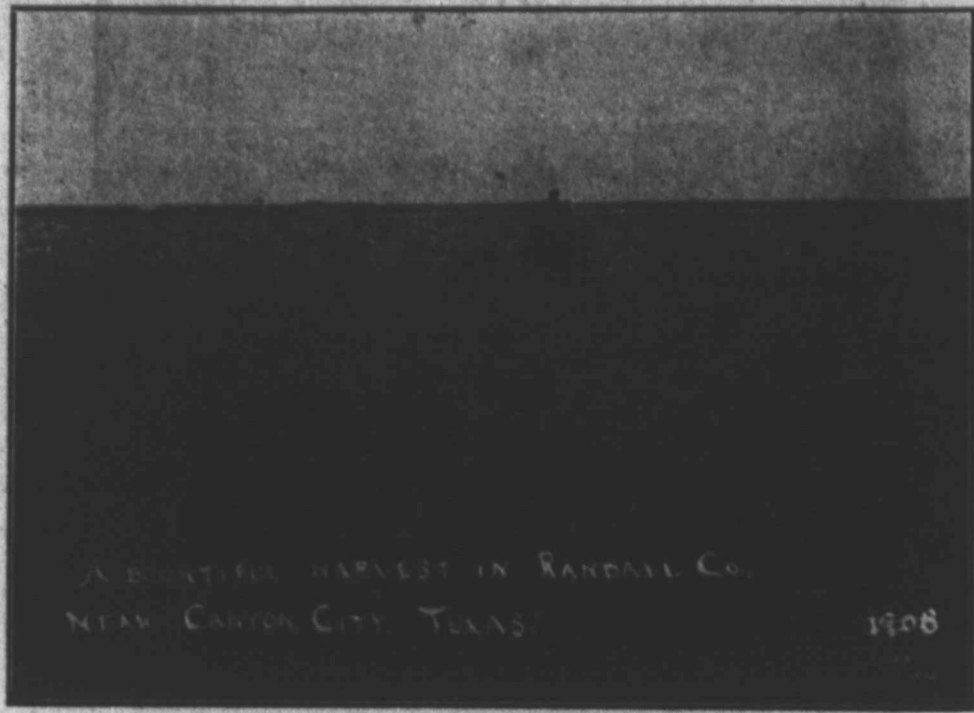

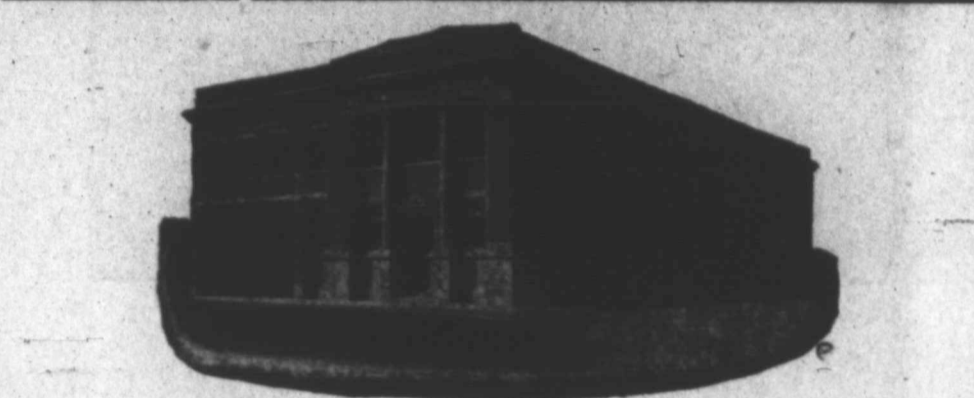

My family and I like this country and would not go back to Ill. under any circumstances. I accumulated a small herd of cattle consisting of 35 head, and 12 head of hogs, all doing fine.

My wife has 50 turkeys for Thanksgiving. We raised plenty of garden stuffs for our own use, with a surplus sold in Canyon.

I have been here only three years and am not to be classed with the big farmers, but am pleased with the progress we are making.

### Renter Farmer Saving Money.

Paul Fluegel, Canyon, Texas.

I came here in 1907 and we only had \$160 in cash at that time. I rented and worked during the first year, and at the harvest sold \$2,300 worth of produce, receiving \$1,600 as my share. I have kept steadily at it and am laying by the money to buy us a farm. I would have bought before, but do not like the idea of paying interest. I want to pay cash for the land when I buy it.

I have raised my own meat, and my wife keeps plenty of chickens and we have all of the eggs and poultry meat needed, with some to sell.

### Makes Money Off Farm Every Year.

P. Friemel, Umbarger, Texas.

I came here thirteen years ago and bought 3 sections of land, paying for the 1,920 acres \$7,500 cash. I put \$2,000 into improvements and had \$1,000 for my expenses and buying livestock. I have cleared about \$1,000 annually since coming here.

We have always raised all the meat needed by the family, along with plenty of chickens, eggs, milk and butter. Ten years ago I bought another 320 acres of land, and still another equal tract six years ago, and all of it has been paid for. When the boys married I gave them 320 acres each, and this year they have bought for themselves another 320 acres each.

This showing is a good one, and there is no reason why any farmer should fail who will farm right and have livestock to eat his feed stuff.

The orchard is another source of income, and I seldom go to town without taking something from the farm to sell.

B. Hollandsworth says there will have to be more threshing machines imported to take care of the bumper wheat crop this year.

### Calves, Colts And Feed Crops.

Rav Hershey, Umbarger, Texas.

I have no special hobby other than to raise all the calves, colts and feed crops that I can, but have always been careful not to put too much dependence upon any one branch of farming. Katir, milo maize, feterita and sweet sorghum are my main feed crops, but I have also grown speltz and millet with profit here.

With a little special effort we have raised plenty of garden vegetables each year, and I am sure that what we have done may be accomplished by all who are willing to devote the necessary time and attention to the work.

It is my experience and observation that the man who diversifies his crops, keeping livestock on the farm, will be a successful and prosperous man here.

Anton Beckman, of Umbarger, was in to see us last week and told us that his entire crop of row stuff averaged better than a ton and a half of heads to the acre. He has already sold part of his crop to Mr. Brodie for \$17.00 a ton, so that it brought him within a few cents of \$25.00 an acre. Tony also had a splendid crop of wheat and oats, and says he is much better satisfied than are his old neighbors near Elgin, Ill., who have been too busy fighting the foot and mouth disease to think of much else. He has also furnished our local butchers with a fine quality of beef during the past winter.

Fred Rogge, who came here from Germany something over two years ago, a novice at farming, reports that his crop last year amounted to more than three thousand dollars. Fred's marriage was noted in a recent issue of the News and he is well satisfied that he chose Randall county in which to locate and acquire a home.

Our local nimrods have made several fine catches of black bass this spring, and anticipate an unusually good season. Ducks are also plentiful.
