#### POTASH TEST WELL IN RANDALL COUNTY

Will A. Miller Makes Lease Proposition to the Landers Owners in Vicinity of Well.

You are aware of the fact that the U. S. Government is not beginning on a test well five miles northwest from Amarillo in search for Potash, and such other minerals as may likely be found in the Permian strata underlying this country. This work will necessarily be very slow, and it will be some time before we know if there is anything of value under the surface of the Plains Country, if only the one well is depended upon.

We have two propositions from responsible parties, are all practical in the development work, who wish to get a Mineral Lease-on our ranch of seven sections where the deep well was put down, but they want a large territory to prospect upon, and we cannot get them to accept a lease on ours, unless we get some 25,000 acres in that vicinity additional.





Regarding Hog Chorela.

Until the past year hog cholera has been practically unknown in the Panhandle country. During the past year a number of shipments of hogs were brought into this territory, which became diseased within a very few days after their arrival. Consequently there have been quite a number of cases in this community, all of which is tracable to the imported hogs. The following is hog chorela advice given by Harmon Benton, government inspector of Amarillo:

Harmon Benton, United States demonstration agent with offices in Amarillo, is sending out a warning to farmers and stock raisers of the Panhandle country against hog cholera.

"Dear Sir: "Several carloads of hogs bearing hog cholera germs have been shipped into the Panhandle country. Until quite recently cholera has been confined to widely separated herds. Within the past fifteen days many out-breaks have occured which are traceable to earlier shipments. In at least two communities cholera exists in almost every herd of hogs, and is spreading.

"HOW TO KEEP CHOLERA FROM REACHING YOUR HERD: "Locate hog lots and pastures away

from streams and public highways, and do not allow hogs to run free "Do not buy or exchange hogs un-

less you know that cholera does not exist in the herd of the one with whom you exchange, and even then it is safer to keep exchanges quarantined from your herd for at least two weeks. "Do not visit your neighbor or al-

low him to visit you, if either of you have hog cholera on your premises.' "Do not loan or borrow wagons," farm implements or farm animals of your neighbor, if either of you have

"Do not drive into hog lots when returning from market or after driving on public highways. "Do not use hog lots for yarding






