Two Propositions Endorsed by the Canyon Business Men at the Meeting Thursday

R. L. Marquis, representing the city council, met with the business men and stated that both propositions had been before the city council and that the council sought the advice of the business men on the matters.

Manager H. Prichard was present and stated that he would report the action of the meeting to the telephone authorities and that probably the district manager would come to Canyon at the next meeting of the association to discuss the matter with the business men.

The other important proposition as submitted by Mr. Marquis was the question of all night service. When this question was mentioned, those present who were thoroughly acquainted with the lighting question in the city pointed out the fact that under the franchise the Canyon Power Company must give all night service as soon as the city would install 37 street lights.

The business men will hold another meeting at the News office on the night of the 24th of this month when it is desired that all of the members of the city council be present in order to go further into detail regarding these two propositions.

**Hard Work to Secure Good Horses**

Some of the so-called experts in horseflesh claim that the United States has available more horses fit for army service than any other country or all other countries combined. If this were so, why would the agents of the French and English governments have to go over the country with a fine-tooth comb to discover them? Surely the owners of horses that are fit for army purposes are willing to dispose of them if they get their price, and there has been no complaint that the foreign agents are not ready to pay what is asked.

The fact is that while the census of the agricultural department gives the number of horses in this country at many millions, there are very few thousands that would be passed by any horseman for service in the army. Draft animals are useful only for the artillery, and for cavalry service the horses must be sufficiently well built to carry at least 150 pounds and speedy enough to keep up.

There is not one horse in ten that will meet the requirements. On the race tracks of the country are hundreds of thoroughbreds that could be bought for small sums, but they are not good enough for remounts because they are not up to carrying weight.

The thoroughbred of the right type makes the best kind of a cavalry animal, but some are not fit for the work.

**Sidereal Monarch of Summer Nights**

Like some huge sidereal dipper, spectacular and shining, hangs the famous seven-starred sky figure in the constellation Ursa Major, or the Greater Bear against the bespangled background of the dome of night. This huge sidereal dipper has been given different names, as the Plow in England, Charles' Wain, and so on; and it possesses in common with other suns and constellations an apparent revolving movement around a pivotal sort of sun—the sun Alpha in Ursa Minor (the Lesser Bear), or Polaris, the North star, "friend of the mariner."

Each of the seven conspicuous stars constituting this Great Dipper has an individual name, as, beginning with the end sun in the "handle," Benetnash (a white sun), Mizar (white and emerald), Alioth (very bright), Megrez (yellow), Phecda (yellow), Merak (greenish-white), and Dubhe (yellow). Of these seven sky gems, Merak and Dubhe are well known as the "pointers," pointing out the sidereal situation of Polaris, the North star.

In addition to Merak and Dubhe, Alioth, Mizar and Benetnash may also be called "pointers," for the curved line of these three stars points accurately toward the gigantic and glittering sun Arcturus, harbinger of spring, and the sidereal monarch of evening's summer skies.

**Beautiful Geysers of Yellowstone Park**

It has been asserted that there are geysers in other parts of the North American continent than Yellowstone park, but after diligent search and inquiry, I have never been able to locate a single gusher. Nowhere in the world are there geysers to compare either in grandeur or number, with those of the Yellowstone. The terraces and beautiful pools of Mammoth surpass even those of New Zealand. The Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone is unsurpassed in beauty and coloring, and the Great Falls, at its head, is 360 feet in height.

Hundreds of foreigners have remarked, upon visiting the park, that the people of this country are so little appreciative of the splendid scenery they have at home, that they prefer to go abroad, and upon returning go into ecstasies over what they have seen, when at their very doors they have far more magnificent sights.

The altitude of the park at its gates is about 6,700 feet, but a stage will take one up to an elevation of 8,300.

Of course, hunting is not permitted in the park, but one may enjoy trout fishing in mountain streams and Yellowstone lake, where it is exceptionally good.

Some time in the future, perhaps, the American people will awaken to a realization that this country is not only a country of wealth and unsurpassed natural resources, but the most wonderful scenic nation in the world.

ON THE AMERICANISM OF WASHINGTON



In these days when men earnestly inquire what true Americanism is, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States afford a convenient touchstone for the citizenship. These documents promise the citizens the rights endowed upon them by their Creator and among these rights are mentioned life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. It is God-made and not man-made liberty that our government proposes to give its citizens. Our government denies man the right to create liberty or grant special freedom. We can only define and equally distribute them. Thomas Jefferson in writing the Declaration of Independence was so confident of the unity and patriotism of the people that he uses less than ten per cent of space in laying down principles of government and the remainder is devoted to complaints against King George. Our forefathers in framing government spent almost their entire time in constructing machinery for preserving and distributing liberty to the people and spent very little time in defining it, although we have since added fifteen amendments to the Constitution, each specifically defining human rights.

The Declaration of Independence was signed and the Constitution of the United States adopted by men who had dedicated their lives and their property to their country. Patriotism ruled the day and indifference to the public welfare was an unthinkable crime. But in this age, we have become so absorbed in business affairs that we have little time to kiss the bible, salute the flag, read the Declaration of Independence or study the Constitution of the United States. The question uppermost in the minds of the patriots who founded the government was "what can I give to my countrymen?" But the predominating question of this commercial age is "what can I get from my countrymen?" These instruments of government have been compelled to do duty under both regimes. It is true we have had to re-write the Constitution, fought a war interpreting it and have placed fifteen patches upon it and have filled libraries with laws expounding it, but it has stood the test.

The Americanism of Washington places unbounded confidence in the people and trusts them and them alone with government and we elect men to serve, not rule, us. The citizen is made the sovereign and we have now almost twenty million kings—and a large number of queens—sitting upon the American throne and the responsibilities of government rest heavily upon their royal shoulders. The conditions now confronting the citizenship of this nation require that the traditions of Washington and Jefferson be fulfilled and that every citizen render allegiance to government, for when rulers abandon the scepter, tools hold court, and when a citizen of this nation neglects his duty to government, he abdicates a throne, surrenders his rights to the blessings of citizenship, mocks the patriots who followed Washington to victory and tramples upon the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States.

Coal for 5,400 Years.

The British Royal Commission on coal supplies, says Engineering, reported in 1915 that the contents of the proved coal-fields of the United Kingdom were 1,000,000,000 tons, and of the still unproved coal fields 4,000,000,000 tons.

Taking the latter at 2,500,000,000 tons, then at the present rate of consumption, we have still 500 years' supply.

The calculation, however, turns entirely on the assumption that our present rate of consumption will not be increased. Forty years ago our coal production was 132,000,000 tons of which 14,500,000 tons were exported. In 1903 it was 230,000,000 tons, and in 1911 it was 217,000,000 tons, or more than twice what it was in 1875. If this rate of increase is maintained the estimate of 500 years will dwindle to two figures before the present century has expired.

There is, however, a great deal of coal in the world outside of these islands, and already there is known to be in existence 7,397,553,000 tons, equal to the world's requirements for 5,400 years at the present rate of consumption.

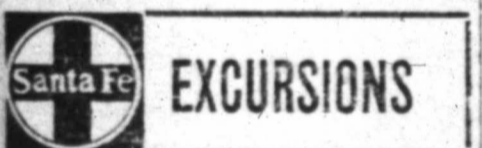

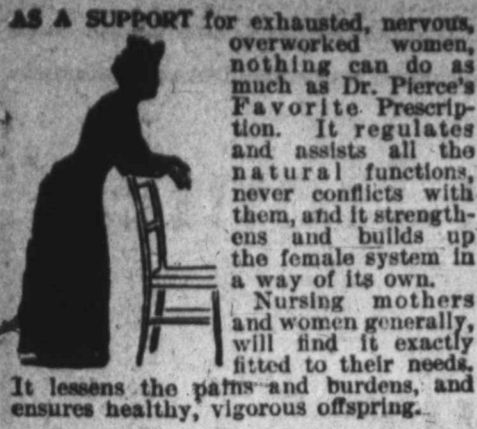

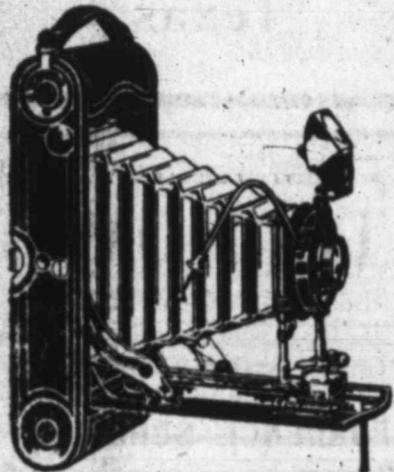

ADVANTAGES OFFERED DURING THE SUMMER SESSION

- FACULTY—A faculty composed of men and women of scholarly attainments, teaching ability, and progressive spirit.
CLIMATE—A climate unexcelled anywhere in Texas. Canyon is on the caprock of the plains, 3300 feet above sea-level, and is as "cool as Colorado."
THE NEW BUILDING—The new home of the West Texas State Normal College is a massive structure of steel, concrete, and brick.
THE GYMNASIUM—The Gymnasium is a large room 100 feet long, 40 feet wide (inside dimensions), and 25 feet to the ceiling.



**Old Age Annuities.**

In 1908 the Canadian Government inaugurated a system of annuities which at first was under the management of the Department of Trade and Commerce, but is now a part of the Postoffice Department. The object sought was to provide old age pensions for Canadians on a voluntary instead of a compulsory basis.

Under the system now in operation no one can begin to receive a Government annuity until 55 years of age, although the purchase of such annuity is absolutely the property of the person for whose benefit was bought. It can not be mortgaged, sold traded or in any other way endangered.

Every resident of Canadian is free to contribute to and enjoy the advantages of the system. There is no exclusion on account of sex, no age limit, no medical qualifications as to health or strength. The annuitant pays what he can, when he can; but the officers in charge do all that their official duties will allow to insure the regular payment of premiums as agreed. If for any reason the annuitant has not been able at 55 years to pay the cost of the smallest annuity allowed, his money is not forfeited, but is returned to him with interest. The calculations for this system are based on 4 per cent interest com-

pounded annually, and no charge whatever for expense or management. The salaries of officers and other outlays being voted by the Canadian Parliament. Every postmaster has been made an agent of the annuity system, and is paid a small commission on the business done through his office.

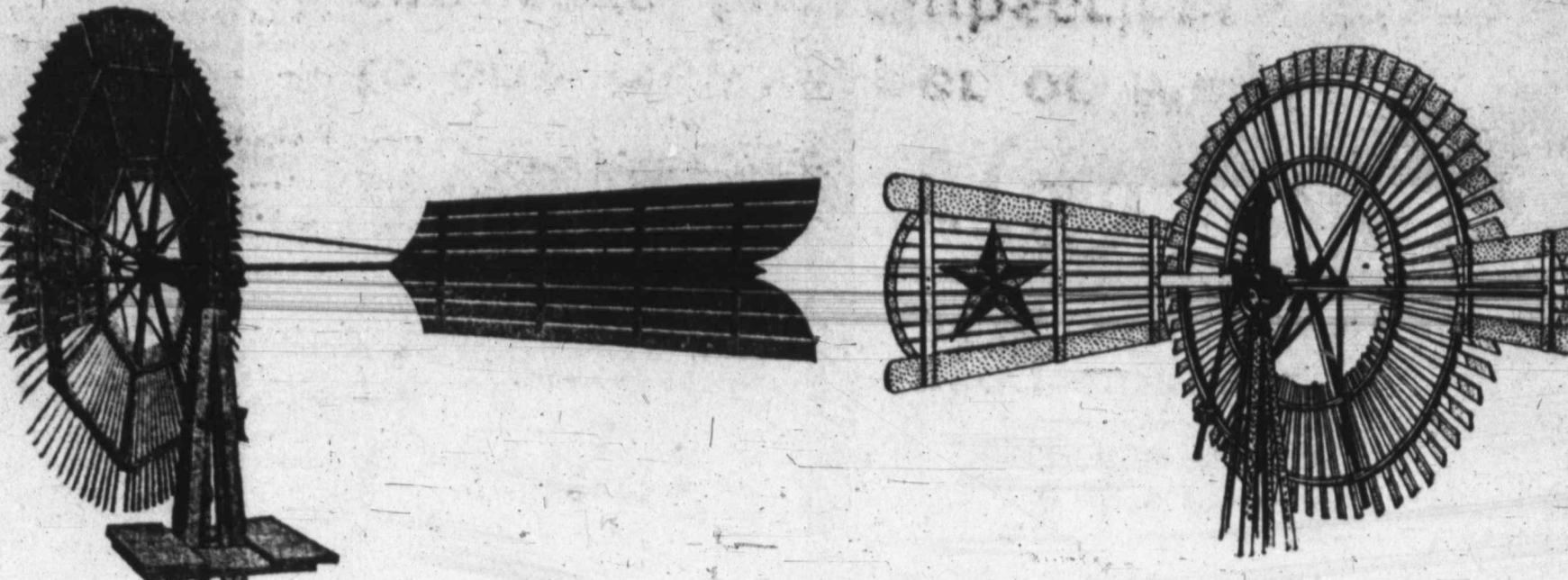

Peniel, Texas, Feb. 10.—To the Randall County News.—  
As it has been sometime since I left home and have not sent in a report I thought it might be of some interest to the many readers of the News to know something of my whereabouts and what I am doing.  
My wife came ahead of me and was taken sick on the way, so I came at once. She is able to be up again and we are with our children at Prosper, Texas, Collin county, and within five miles of our old home that we left fourteen years ago today.  
We are having a delightful visit here with our old neighbors and friends who are coming most every day to see us and we are talking over the incidents of the early settling of this county, and the noble, courageous characters that drove back the enemies of civilization and while aside from corn meal made on a hand gritter their sustenance of life was obtained from the natural resources of the country. But best of all they put their trust in God and erected family altars, set up their on dirt floors and today their posterity who have not moved on west to be a breast work for the less courageous are found here among the best and the leading citizens of the country.  
I don't suppose this country is its

virgin state could be surpassed for its fertility. It is a deep black waxy soil with a clay subsoil and it has been tilled from twenty to sixty years.

Many of the people of this country are dissatisfied. The crops have been light the last two years and the price of cotton has been low and the price of land high. The renter sees but little chance to get a home hence the dissatisfaction, so I am speaking to the people about the better things that await them in Canyon and Randall county. I have also visited old friends in Dallas, Ft. Worth, McKinney, Denton, Sanger. I find that the minds of the people in general are turned toward the west.

Wife and I have an invitation to attend the midwinter revival to be held at Peniel, Texas. For the Nazarene university and surrounding vicinity at which place our son, J. E. Bates is pastor and of course we have accepted and while there I will not be negligent
