The amber, an early maturing strain, and the sumac or red-top, coming in later, are both good sod crops, having been known to produce seed in a single year to pay for the land on which they grew

> Rather extensive experiments are being made on the plains in the growing of alfalfa. On the syndicate demonstration farm at Plainview is to be found one of the finest fields of alfalfa to be seen anywhere. It is a picture in landscape and a mint in producing income. Alfalfa does well in all this sub-irrigation section, but the greatest surprise that I found in the growing of alfalfa is in Hansford county. It is in the broad breaks along the Canadian river. Mr. W. T. Coble has a big ranch of fine high-grade Herefords. These 5,000 cattle are fattened on the ranch with alfalfa. There are 300 acres in alfalfa which yields a good harvest of several cuttings ev-

> ery year. The remarkable thing is that much of it has not been replanted for years and some of it in 30 years. The Panhandle enjoyed rare seasons last year and the result is an enormous harvest of every kind. Prospects could hardly be better than at present for next year's crop.

> > Farmer's Exchange Bureau.

In connection with the Santa Fe Agricultural Department, in Amarillo, Texas, we have a "Farmers' Exchange Bureau", which has been in successful operation for some time. The service of this bureau is free to those farmers and producers who desire to use it.

In this bureau we list the names of the farmers having something to sell as well as those who desire to buy. For example, if a farmer writes that he has choice seed for sale, or a Holstein cow or some other animal, we immediately look over our list and possibly find that some other man is looking for this very seed or animal. We get these people in communication, usually by letter and the result is that

But time slips by and soon the tree planting season for this year will be over. It is yet time to order trees and get them started this year. It need not cost much money either.

Tree planting needs no long argument in its favor. Trees are ornamen4 tal and useful. They soon furnish shade and break the winds. In a few years the farm groves will change the appearance of the plains. The spring winds will sease to be full of sting.

Tree planting has in a few years' time changed the appearance of the northern prairies. What was the lonely forsaken home of he new settler, now sits snugly in a clump of trees. Back around the barn and the feed lot. trees form a windbreak for the stock.

A Message to the Senior Classes in the High Schools

By R. B. Cousins President of the West Texas State Normal College

Those natural instincts and interests that announce the approach of manhood and manhood combine with economic pressure to prevent 86 per cent of the boys and girls in the grades from entering the high schools. You are to be congratulated upon your progress, which places you so far above the average of men and women' in educational attainment. Why not determine now to put yourself into that still more fortunate class, -that one or two per cent of high school graduates-which enters college and reaches the highest levels of attainment?

The Work of the Educated Man.

You should know that educated men, college men, have contributed more than their prorata share to that civilization which we all so much enjoy. College trained men control and direct the labors of the great law making bodies of the world; they render the decisions of the supreme courts, they represent governments in foreign countries; they sit in the cabinets of presidents of republics, and in the councils of kaisers and kings. Where ignorance rules, "the people mourn" because "the times are out of joint."

Practical

We hear much of "practical" men, as if educated men were impractical. College trained men have discovered the latent and latest diseases of plants, animals, and men, and have pointed out remedies. In fact, progress in every department of material development can be traced, not to the so called "practical man," but, rather, to the trained specialist in his laboratory-to the theorist! Dreamers? Witness electric lights, motors, serums for rabbies, for hog cholera, for blackleg among cattle, and the whole list of antitoxins for the prevention and cure of germ diseases. Not in a single case were these inventors and discoverers what the man on the street calls the "practical man." Most of them were what he calls the "educated fool"-the dreamer! the theorist!!

calculation of chances can explain how some men have become rich, or how they have lost or may lose their fortune. Genius and speculation know no law. The following figures are in common use, and they contain a truth for the thoughtful boy or girl: Every day that a boy spends in the grades, in passing through them, is worth four dollars to him in after life; every day he spends in the high school is worth fifteen dollars; and every day he spends in college is worth thirty five dollars. The calculation is easy. and the results contain a truth. The boy without an education has a sorry chance for making a distinguished man. His training in the high school and in college increases his chances four hundred fold.

The Profession of Teaching and Its Appeal.

It should be understood that teaching is a great profession, but that it is a sorry trade. It is a fine art to the artist, but it is drudgery to the drudge. President Emeritus, Eliot of Harvard University said: "Forty years of service have been given me in a Doubtless President Eliot is a partial judge. The teaching profession has not all that is good, and is not free from limitations. But it has a liberal share of the elements of a worthy, useful and honorable calling. Salaries of teachers are not large, but they are increasing; they are not positively bad now, in view of the preparation required, and in comparison with other callings that deal with things spiritual. But the teaching profession is not a money making business. He who regards it as such tears down its altars, and obscures its nobler purposes.

The Teacher's Service Has Other Values.

that is coming to himself. He is a miracl worker. He unstops deaf ears, and opens blind eyes. He is a revealer of vistas of manhood-the high priest at the altar of truth. What is his pay? Heads and hearts! Men and women! Salvation!

He Has a Larger Freedom.

The teacher has no place among gossip ers, scandal mongers, sectarian bigots or disputers, nor dark lantern politicians of any size. Instead of spending his time on themes of neighborhood gossip and scandal, he should discuss with his neighbors the newspaper, and the magazine article; instead of petty politics, he should discuss the policies of statesmen; in the place of local sectarian bigotry, he should put that true religion which requires one to "deal justly, love mercy, and walk humbly before Almighty God;" instead of sharing the hatred and bitterness which is the result of the sectarian quarrel, let him "lure to brighter worlds and lead the way."

He Renders a Larger Service.

Teachers are writing books to be studied by prospective young bankers, farmers, stockmen, merchants, railroad managers, manufacturers, journalists, jurists, physicians, theologians, engineers, and scientists. They are constantly readjusting the school program to the changing views and growing needs of the people. Even in "practical" statesmanship, school men are receiving due recognition and are rendering notable service. Looking to the higher forms of political service, we find professional school men in conspicuous places: Webb of Tennessee, in the senate; Abercrumbie of Alabama and Aswell of Louisiana, and many others, each went from the school master's desk to the Congress of the United States. Ex-superintendent Brumbaugh of the city schools of Philadelphia is now the Governor of Pennsylvania. Ex-president Taft is a professor in Yale. Ex-president Houston of the University of Texas is in the cabinet of the President of the United States. Woodrow Wilson, the greatest scholar among the presidents of great republics went from his office in Princeton University to the Governor's office of New Jersey, and thence to the first place in all the world that may be achieved by a man.

There is, therefore, no place of service or of honor that is closed to a worthy and efficient man, just because he happens to


