

Continental Telephone Company Merges With Three Subsidiaries

BAIRD — Continental Telephone Co. of Texas became a reality on January 1, 1974. West Texas Telephone Company, Texas Telephone & Telegraph Company and Nassau Bay Telephone Company were subsidiaries of the Continental Telephone Corp., with each company maintaining its own operating headquarters. The merger results in a single company with operating and staff headquarters located in Dallas.

Through the years, both suburban and rural America have been served, in the main, by thousands of independent telephone companies. This number has been decreased from 5100 in 1955 to today's total of less than 1800. Continental Telephone Company of Texas represents the mergers and acquisitions of approximately 37 companies in the past 10 years in Texas alone.

Mr. Aniel T. LaFavers, President and General Manager of Continental Telephone Co. of Texas, began his telephone career in June 1950, in Altamont, Ill., with an independent company, National Trail Telephone Co., which later merged with the Continental System in 1961. Mr. LaFaver's duties began as a lineman, installer, plant manager and became President of that company. He transferred to Dallas in 1971 and has headed up the operation of the Southwest Division since then.

Mr. LaFaver has outlined the benefits and objectives of the recent merger. Polling resources will make the company financially sound for capital improvements, aid in more and competent manpower and to place greater emphasis on our primary mission - the best customer service at the lowest rates.

Although the change will necessitate some personnel relocations, moves will be kept to an absolute minimum. The company's six districts will basically remain the same and will have headquarter offices located at Andrews, Burnet, Dumas, Fairfield, Newton and White-wright. Each district will be staffed in such a manner that they will have resources, personnel and equipment to solve most service problems.

The Division headquarter staff at Dallas includes: Mr. Jack Keen, General Facilities Manager (former President & General Manager of West Texas Telephone Co.); Mrs. Bruce McClelland, General Service Manager; Mrs. C. L. Hagan, General Traffic Manager; Mrs. J. R. Wisbauer, General Engineering Manager; Mr. R. G. Hughes, Community Relations Manager (former Vice President & General Manager of Texas Telephone & Telegraph Co.), and Mr. G. G. Linnabery, Inter-Company Relations Manager.

Continental Telephone Co. of Texas encompasses 175 exchanges throughout the state, has approximately 750 employees with some \$85 million worth of equipment and facilities. The Continental Tel. System has properties in 41 states, Canada and the Caribbean Islands and is the third largest independent telephone company in the United States.

CISCO — Billy Seelig, a 1965 graduate of Baird High School has been named to the Technical-Vocational President's List at Cisco Junior College.

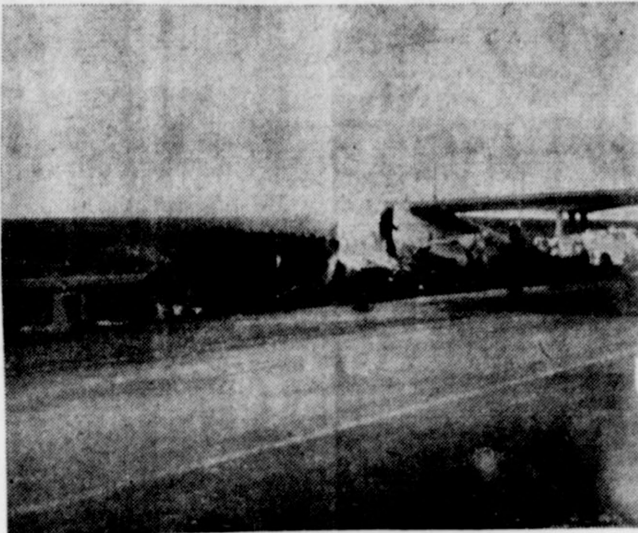
The President's List consists of students who maintain a straight A record, or 3.0 average.

Callahan County Qualifies For Rural Industrial Loans

Callahan County is among 29 counties qualifying for rural industrial loans under the Rural Industrial Development Act. The Texas Industrial Commission is scheduled to discuss actions they can take in recruiting new industry to Texas despite the energy crisis. Counties now eligible for industrial loans can obtain capital for plant locations by participating in about 40 percent of the cost. Counties approved are: Andrews, Bandera, Callahan, Castro, Comal, Concho, Crane, Crockett, Deaf Smith, Glasscock, Hood, Irion, Jeff Davis, Kendall, King, Mason, Menard, Midland,

Mills, Rockwall, San Saba, Scurry, Shackelford, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Terry, Yoakum and Van Zandt. Director of the Texas Office of Minority Business Enterprises, J. S. Martinez, told the industrial commission that an estimated 1,200 new jobs were created for minority Texans by this office. Martinez said his office dispersed 628 contract opportunities to minority businessmen, representing a potential value of more than \$450 million. The agency was created in August, 1972 by a grant from the Commerce Department to develop and implement programs to stimulate increased minority business.

Substitute Mail Carriers Needed For Rural Routes Out of Clyde

CLYDE — Postmaster Dan South announced that applications for substitute Rural Mail Carrier will be accepted at the Clyde Post Office until Feb. 1.

A substitute rural mail carrier carries the route when the regular carrier is absent for annual leave, sick leave or any other reason. Those selected must furnish their own vehicles and have a valid state drivers license.

Salary for substitute rural carriers depends upon the

length of the rural route and the number of boxes served. Starting salary for the Clyde routes will range from \$26.00 to \$40.00 per day worked plus 14c per mile driven.

Anyone interested in applying for the positions may receive application form 2497A at the Clyde Post Office or most other post offices, South said.

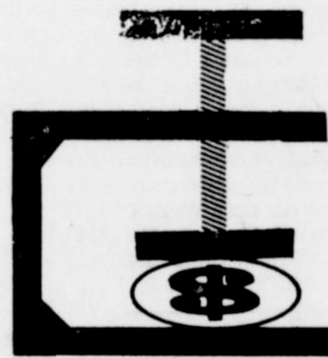

Tuesday Tillers Hear Guest Speaker

CLYDE — Mrs. Guy Caldwell of Abilene presented the program on growing roses successfully. Mrs. Caldwell is a National Flower Show Judge and a Certified Rose Society Judge.

Mrs. Caldwell suggested that you buy only the number one quality of roses, preferably without the wax dip on the stems. A number one quality rose for planting will have four strong canes or more, any less is not a number one. The last week in February and the first week in March are the ideal times to plant your bare-rooted roses. Now is the time to thoroughly clean around your rose bushes, making sure that you remove all the leaves, and other plant material on the soil under the bushes, because black spot and mildew spores live on the dead leaves all winter and will contaminate new growth, making your efforts twice as difficult.

Mrs. Caldwell suggested that you spray a fungicide such as Benolate and a systemic poison such as Cygoner on and around the bushes and soil after cleaning. Remove all last year's foliage, (even if it is green), prune in late February early March, making sure to cover the wound with tree paint or Elmer's glue to keep the borers out. Prune so that the sun can reach the center of the bush.
