

Mrs. Caldwell suggested that you buy only the number one quality of roses, preferably without the wax dip on the stems. A number one quality Held At Eula rose for planting will have four strong canes or more, any less is not a number one. The last week in February and the first week in March are the ideal times to plant your bare-rooted roses. Now is the time to thoroughly clean around your rose bushes, making sure that you remove all the leaves, and other plant material on the soil under the bushes, because black spot and mildew spores live on the dead leaves all winter and will contaminate new growth, making your efforts twice as difficult. Mrs. Caldwell suggested that you spray a fungicide such as Benolate and a systemis poisoning such as Cygone on and around the bushes and soil after cleaning. Remove all last green), prune in late February early March, making sure to cover the wound with tree paint or Elmer's glue to keep the borers out. Prune so that the sun can reach the center of the bush.
