### St. Nicholas And Christmas

HE origin of the idea that presents are presented at Christmas time by St. Nicholas, or Santa Claus, probably originated from the following circumstances: St. Nicholas is said to have been bishop of Myra and to have died in the year 326. He was noted for his fondness for children, and he became their patron saint, and the young were universally taught to revere him. He is said to have supplied three destitute families with martiage portions by secretly leaving money at their windows, and as this occurred just before Christmas be thus became purveyor of the gifts of the season to all children in Flanders and Holland, who hung up their shoes and stockings in the confidence that Knecht Clobes, as they called him, would put in a prize for good conduct.

Formerly, and still in some parts of Germany, the practice is made of all the parents in a small village sending the presents to some one person, who in huge buskins, a white robe, a mask and an enormous flax wig, goes from house to house on Christmas eve and, being received with great pump and reverence by the parents, calls for the children and bestows the intended rifts upon them, after first severely questioning the father and mother as to the character and conduct of the child;

As this custom became less frequent the custom of children hanging up their stocking was substituted, and, as the purveyor no longer visited the houses, it was necessary to explain by telling the children that he came into the house at night, coming down the chimney and leaving their presents and departing. The custom of decking the houses and churches at Christmas with e ergreens is derived from ancient druidical practices.

It was an old belief that sylvan spirits flock to the evergreen and remain unnipped by frost until a milder season, and it was probably on account of the good omen attached to the evergreen that Christmas trees came into



It is expected that some of the rails to be sent to France will be obtained from the Transcontinental Railway and the Hudson Bay Company. It is stated that twenty miles of rails will load one steamer. One cargo is already on the way to the seaboard, it is said.

In sending a call to Canada last week for rails, it is said British Government authorities represented that prompt acction would save thousands of lives. It was impossible to obtain new rails, owing to the great demand for steel to manufacture shells.



From the hunter, the fisherman and the rude agriculturist, man has evolved a complicated civilization. There are thousands of occupations today in place of the few primitive ones, but still the majority of these center about the fulfilling of the primary necessities, feeding and clothing

It has become impossible for the laborer to work under the conditions which originally obtained. Besides the fields and forests, we have mine, mill and mart.



### Popular Idea Called Myth.

The popular notion that stars can be seen in daylight from the bottom of a deep well, mine shaft or chimney, believed to have been first held by Aristotle, is declared to be a myth by a writer in the Journal of the British Astronomical Association. The glare of the atmosphere Illuminated by the sun's rays renders the stars invisible in the daytime and there is no reason why this glare should be sensibly diminished by a well, mine shaft or chimney, he says. Stars and planets can be seen to some extent through a telescope in the daylight. In general the latter are much less visible then than the former. Venus and Mercury, however, are better observed in daylight than in darkness, Red and yellow stars are seen much more easily in daylight than white ones.

North Star, Which Is Really All the Astronomy Necessary to Know.

There is a very simple way by means of which the novice, untrained in astronomical observation, can determine his latitude, without the aid of complicated and expensive appa If you were situated on the equator


the North star would be directly north of you. This star must be learned and identified, so that it can be picked out CLASSIFIED anywhere at a moment's notice. This is all the astronomy you need know -as the location of this star will give the latitude. When half way to the North pole

the North star is midway between the zenith and the northern horizon. At the pole it is directly overhead. In all other places its "angle" varies, being, for example, 30 degrees at New Orleans, 40 degrees at Philadelphia. the equator.
