





Herds Increasing on the Plains

(By H. M. Bainer, of the Santa Fe System)

There is no "one" system of farming better adapted to western Oklahoma, the Panhandle of Texas South Plains of Texas or Eastern New Mexico than a combination of live stock along with the growing of the adapted crops. For the past fifty years or more this country has been known as a "cattle country." It has only been during the past few years that the raising of cultivated crops has been considered at all.

With the incoming of the homeseeker; greater crops had to be produced. that crop can be produced throughout the Southwest every year, with the right kind of farming. But these crops, aside from thes mall grains and cotton, are natural livestock feeds and must be fed for best returns. As cash crops, kafir, milo, feterita, sudan, sweet sorghums, etc., do not bring the money returns that are insured by handling them in the form of beef. pork, mutton, dairy products, and poultry products. Along with the settlemnt of the Southwest, breaking up of the large cattle ranges into small farms many have expressed the opinion that the "cattle business" would suffer, and that there would be less and less attention given to it with a correspondingly decreased number of autmals, as the agricultural developments continue There really is no reason foruneasiness along this line, for with the settling of the ranges there is an opporturity for handling more cattle than ever. While it is true that the grazing area is becoming less yearly, at the same time the feed available for raising and finishing is increasing rapidly



Chewing Gum and The War

For a great many years American hewing gum manufacturers have endeavored to teach foreign countines to appreciate their product, says the Cleveland Plain Dealer. The stuff that wags the American jaw has been advirtised assiduously in France, England and Germany, but with small success. The non-American couldn't understand it. He tried to swallow it, and when he couldn't he gave it up as incomprehensible nonsense. Over in London, where it was called "Amer ican Chewing Candy," many shops called attention to it, but the Britishers passed it by and went on buying toffee and lollipops and Turkish Delight.

Suddenly and without warning the situation has changed. Remarkable figures recently published appear to indicate that England has incontinent ly become a nation of gum chewers. Manufacturers report that within six monthly sales from 3,000 000 to 20,-000,000 sticks. And the English newspapers can not understand it.

The explanation seems simple. It is said that the largest amount of chawing gum is used in the army, and the next largest amount in the navy. During the last great advance, it was issued as an army ration. It is more than probable that the Canadian soldiers imparted this information to the English Tommies and experience did the rest.

The Aviator was chewing gum at the time, and he promptly removed his wad from his mouth and plugged up the hole with it. Of course, that was not among the contemplated uses of the confection, but it's an interesting yarn.
