

# Training Camp Receive No More

To the great disappointment of several young men of Canyon the applications for entrance to the officers training camp at Leon Springs was closed this morning in Amarillo, nearly a hundred men being at the office at the time wishing to go to the camp.

C. F. Hunt and C. W. Warwick were among the first from Canyon to arrive at the offices this morning in Amarillo, and were soon joined by several young men from the Normal. Half a dozen men from Canyon had intended going to Amarillo today to enlist for service, had not this order been received to close the office. In the telegram it was stated that the camp was full and that no more could be carried for.

The officer arrived only last night in Amarillo to take up the work as started by Captain Fitzhugh Lee. He was greatly surprised in receiving the telegram just as he stepped from the train instructing him to receive no more applications.

He could not venture a guess at the sudden change in the plans, as Captain Lee informed men Monday that as many as 10,000 would be taken care of in the Leon Springs camp, and urged all to enlist even as late as Saturday of this week.

Amarillo men have taken up the question of compensation during the three months training period, and a telegram from General Pershing's staff states that no compensation is provided now.

Quite a number of men are anxious to go from Canyon to the camp who delayed a little too long.

It is stated that another camp will probably follow this one in August.

Canyon is furnishing more young men for the army and navy than any town on the plains, outside of Amarillo.

Thirty two young men who were students in the Normal have responded. The reader will find their names in the Normal Notes of this edition.

More than a dozen young men are now in the service from the town.

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR ALL PUPILS

The Normal School offers its Training School facilities, the full nine grades, to the public for the summer of 1917, free to all who may wish to enter—until the rooms are full. The state is financing the summer schools in the Normal Colleges of Texas for 1917, and we hope this is to become a fixed policy. The summer work in the Normal and in the Training School will be the full equivalent of any other quarter. If the policy now adopted by the State should become fixed, it will enable pupils to finish the nine grades of the Training School in seven years instead of nine.

The Summers Usually Wasted. The U. S. Commissioner of Education at Washington, and other great school authorities are insisting that it is a great educational and economic waste to close the schools in the summer time for three or four months. Healthy children in modern schools do not need this vacation, and the school plants, with all their investments should not lie idle for one-fourth of the time, as is now the custom.

War Time Pressure. If this argument was valid in times of peace, it is doubly forceful in the fateful times now on us. No one knows how long this war will last, and how soon the age limits may be extended to take in high school boys. Therefore it is extremely necessary that boys in the high schools and girls as well, should employ all their time, all the year around in getting their education while the opportunity lasts.

Credits May be Transferred. The Training School work will be counted on the credit basis so that a Training School student's course may be declared to be finished when he has the requisite number of credits. The summer work will therefore be preserved and the time saved, should the students from the city schools of Canyon or elsewhere, their records and credits may be transferred from the Training School to the school to which they may return in the fall.

Desire to Render Service. The West Texas State Normal College desires to render all the service possible to the people around it, and therefore we urge patrons to use our Training School facilities to the full capacity.

Notify the President. Those patrons who wish to enter children for the summer quarter should notify us promptly. Our capacity has its limits. When the grades are full no more can be accommodated.

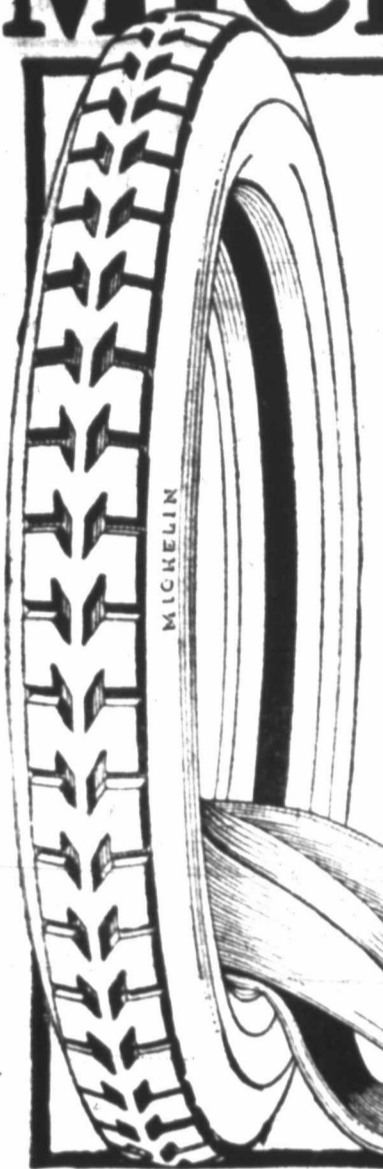

**WHY CRY "WOLF"?**

(From Southwest Plainsman)  
The artenuous campaign of the Government to increase the food supply of the country seems to have given rise to a pessimistic howl of "hard times" in some quarters. So far as we have observed not an official has even hinted at a stringency in the money market and yet in some places, the people are being urged to make no investments and to curtail expenses to the utmost limit.

Economy is something that may, very appropriately, be pressed upon the attention of the American people but when there is such a demand for everything we can produce, prices cannot fail to be good and there seems no sensible reason for "calamity howling."

Admittedly, war is a calamity, but hysterical rantings about hard times will not make it any better and if indulged in largely, will be very apt to bring about that very condition. One has but to look around him, here on the Plains, to see that this section is enjoying such prosperity as it has never seen before, despite the fact that last year was a very dry year and the cost of living has advanced materially. Anyone who is idle in Amarillo, at least, and we believe the same will apply to any of the towns in the Panhandle, is idle because he does not want to work. Never in the history of the country, have there been so many men employed in erecting buildings, paving, laying mains for water-works extensions working roads and the various other forms of industry incident to the growth and development of the country.

It is true that in spite of all this there may be a scarcity of food but if there is, money will not get it. If Secretary Houston's plan is carried out, there will if necessary, be a maximum as well as a minimum price put on food stuff and it is even possible, if the war lasts several years that we will all be limited as to the amounts we may purchase. The only remedy needed is to get busy and raise some beans, corn and potatoes of our own. To refrain from buying clothing, implements or supplies that are really needed is to work a hardship on the merchants which will react on the country and make times really hard.

The business world of the nation apparently awaits the coming of war entirely undisturbed, and with the utmost confidence in the strength of the domestic situation and the ability of our democratic form of government and the patriotism of the people, to meet any emergency. Why cry "wolf"?

### TO LET GERMANS LEAVE U. S.

Application Blanks Distributed to Several Hundred Subjects.

New York, April 25.—The Federal authorities today distributed application blanks to several hundred German subjects who wished permission to leave the country. Most of the Germans, it is understood, intend to go to South America, although a considerable number have asked permission to return to Germany.

After the application blanks are

filled out they will be sent to the Department of Justice in Washington. Applicants submit three photographs and give the names of five reputable American citizens who know them and will vouch for them. They must swear that they are not seeking to leave the United States with any intent to interfere with this country in the prosecution of the war or to aid its enemies.

The conscription bill passed Saturday in both houses of Congress by a very large majority. The opponents were cornered and forced to vote for the administration. The bill was objectionable to many when it was first presented, and the News questioned its advisability. But given more and careful thought, in the light of the experience of the nations at war across the ocean, the bill provides the only way of raising an army which will do the best work for the country.

Shall this nation send troops across the waters? It seems as if this step will be taken within a very short time. It does not seem practical to keep a large force on the European battle field, but to show that this country is really in the fight against the German ruler. Roosevelt should be allowed to take his volunteers across. It will greatly encourage our allies—as much perhaps as the huge loans which are being made by this government to the allies.

The man who openly insults the good German people of this nation who have always been true to the flag and had no choice about having German parantage, ought to be placed in the front trench. There are a few men—posing as accomplished gentlemen who have done this. What true patriots think of them would not look well in print. Those kind of men will do nothing for their country in time of need—except talk, and boast what this nation ought to do. Let's use a little sense with our patriotism.

The News man was greatly disappointed in now getting into the Leon Springs camp for military training. All necessary arrangements had been made, but enlistment stopped this morning, after assurance had been given that all who applied would be taken. We are ready to go and fight for this country in any way that Uncle Sam proposes, but would have preferred the training course at Leon Springs.

It is expected that a number of English and French army officers will visit the training camps of the United States during the coming three months to give practical lessons in the European method of warfare. This will be highly valuable to the men of our army.

The war may close within a few months, but those who know nations and conditions guess two or three more years, rather than a few more months.

"Our allies" does not sit well with some Americans. But we do not seem to be fighting the war alone.

**ROAD TO TRUTH.**

Men's views are as numerous as the sands of the seashore, and there are no two alike, and the unlikeliness in every case is made of some little physical circumstance or experience. Take a company of, say, 25 people, and it will soon be found that they all hold divergent views upon almost any topic that is suggested. It is a most humiliating thing for a company, a community, a nation to be torn up by controversy, for it is absolutely known that the whole fight is over temperaments and glimpses of things. The divine spirit is outside of every controversy in forum, in court, in pulpit, in society. The more animated the argument the more earnest the contestant, the farther away he is from the truth. This supreme fact mankind has been ignoring from the beginning. It doesn't try to find out what God tells the soul is the truth about the matter.

The charming station of B. In Savoy gives assurance that its waters are particularly efficacious against obesity. **The Crop Outlook.**

(From Southwest Plainsman)  
Good rains were reported last week from many different localities on the Plains but none of them reached Amarillo. The early wheat which began to grow so vigorously after the first rains and the accompanying rise in temperature, has begun to need rain again and many predict that it will die shortly unless it gets the moisture. County Agent Benton explains that the more leaf surface the wheat has, the more moisture it requires and that is the reason that it begins to suffer after the first spring rains unless they continue to come with some regularity. However, a cold wave reached us the latter part of the week, and will, possibly, help somewhat by retarding the growth.

The fruit, which was quite generally proclaimed as killed a few weeks ago, has come out nicely and now promises a very good crop.

Some Oklahoma farmers have had to replant parts of their corn fields on account of the heavy rain washing the corn out. Plowing and planting is going on rapidly and land that was ready to be seeded immediately after the rains or had already been planted is now showing a good stand.

Prices for farm products continue to rise, a late report stating that a Wichita dealer had just sold a ton of broom corn for \$420. At that rate, the crop promises to be a very profitable one for our farmers to grow and it might be a good proposition for all who can to put in a small acreage. However, we can manage to exist without brooms but we cannot survive very long without food and since we are warned that we are likely to have to go on short rations unless we raise food, perhaps it would be well to dispense with brooms.

Right now is one time, at least, when the advice of our agricultural experts and the farmers agree. They are urging the greatest possible number of acres and that has been the farmers' besetting sin since time immemorial. There are few farmers who can resist the temptation to plant a few more acres when they have already reached the limit of acreage that they can cultivate properly. This year will be just as other years, only possibly more so, in that regard but it will now be reckoned a virtue instead of a sin.

**Got A Bad Cut.**  
Thad Parmley was taken to the sanitarium at Dalhart on Friday. In an encounter with J. A. Wiseman he received a cut in the back that looked bad but he was back home again by the first of the week.

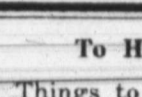

**To Help Your Reading.**

Things to remember when using a military vocabulary:

A "rookie" is a recruit.

An officer never "enlists." He is commissioned by the President of the United States. Only private soldiers, including corporals and sergeants, can "enlist".

To be "drafted" means to be forced into the military or naval service.

To "volunteer" means to go into the service willingly.

"Rank and file" do not mean officers and enlisted men. "Rank" is a row of soldiers and "file" represents a man in the front rank with the man or men directly behind him.

"Squad" is part of a company.

A captain commands a company and he has under him a first lieutenant and a second lieutenant.

A major commands a battalion which is made of four companies. A regiment is commanded by a colonel and it comprises three battalions or that a regiment is made up of 12 companies.

The new army law abolishes the grade of brigadier general. Hereafter if that law passes, a colonel will jump directly to major general.

A general of the army corresponds to an admiral of the navy. Lieutenant general ranks with a vice admiral and a major general with a rear admiral.

Since Dewey's death there is no American admiral and we have no vice admirals. Neither is there a general or lieutenant general. Our chief of staff is a major general.

The titles of lieutenant general and general, vice admiral and admiral must especially created by act of congress.

President Wilson is commander-in-chief of both army and navy, and has the right to take direct command of the fleet or the army of a million men. Every president during his term of office stands at the top of both the army and the navy—stands there as the supreme commander.

He can ismiss any officer, however high or low the rank. He appoints all officers.—From "Girard's Topics of the Town" in the Philadelphia Public Ledger.

A simple test to determine when garden soil is ready for plowing or working is to take a handful of earth from the surface and close the fingers tightly on it. If the earth compacted in this way is dry enough for cultivation it will fall apart when the hand is opened. This test is applicable only to comparatively heavy soils, but it is these which receive the most injury if they are worked when wet. On such soils over-zealous gardeners not only waste their time, but frequently do actual damage by attempting to work them too early.

Factory-made butter in the United States increased from 627,145,865 pounds in 1909 to 786,013,489 pounds in 1914, and factory-made cheese from 311,175,730 pounds in 1909 to 377,506,109 pounds in 1914.

The United States leads all countries in the consumption of sugar, with an annual average of 3,492,000 tons during the 10 years 1904-1913. The annual consumption in this country is nearly one-fourth of the world's production.

The South is informed very plainly by the assistant secretary of agriculture at Washington, that it must release from \$700,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 worth of foodstuffs, which it takes annually from the North, by raising them itself. To do this it must greatly reduce the acreage given to cotton. It would help considerably, too, if the South should use a large part of the acreage now given to tobacco for the production of more necessary crops. And while we are on this subject, it is only right to say that some of the Northern tobacco growing states, not excepting one or two in New England, might do much worse, along the line of patriotic sacrifice, than to set the South an example in this respect.

In the American Magazine a writer gives some interesting figures as to the saving habit of the different nations, in which we certainly make a

poor showing. France has been called the banker of the world; but French capital does not come from large natural resources but from the combined small savings of her people, who have been taught thrift from childhood up. This is true of most European peoples. Here are a few figures: United States has 108 savers in 1,000. Italy has 228 savers in 1,000. England has 302 savers in 1,000. Germany has 317 savers in 1,000. Sweden has 386 savers in 1,000. Belgium has 397 savers in 1,000. Switzerland has 544 savers in 1,000. The war has had a curious effect on the economic life of America. From being a borrower we have become a lender. We shall have need of our savings when the war is over, for the devastated nations will have need to borrow of us all the more, and we must still carry on our own affairs.

When the price of eggs in the United States goes up or down one cent it means \$18,000,000 gain or loss to somebody — the producer, the cold storage man, the consumer. The value of poultry products in the United States is nearly equal to the value of the wheat crop and half that of the cotton crop.

**Marines as Marksmen.**

Declarations that since the days of frontier life have passed, Americans are no longer entitled to their former fame as riflemen, are completely refuted by statistics, say officers of the United States marines. These officers recently compiled data showing that splendid shooting qualities are still characteristic of American troops. More than 73 per cent of the 6,141 members of the United States Marine Corps who fired during 1916, on the 14 marine corps rifle ranges are qualified skilled riflemen, according to the table just compiled. Of these sea soldiers, 921, or 15 per cent, are expert riflemen; 1,944, or 31 per cent, are sharpshooters, and 2,518, or 41 per cent are marksmen. It is doubtful if Leatherstocking himself could outshoot them, say the marines.

**How to Lard.**

Larding, although very easy, requires to be seen to be properly understood. Very hard bacon is necessary, as soft bacon breaks on being passed through the fowl or meat. The bacon should be cut into small blocks, and then again cut into even strips, called lardons. In larding, put a strip of bacon into a larding needle, and then pass it through the meat, leaving the bacon in the meat, with the ends showing; this should be done in even rows, taking care to do the work as neatly as possible.

Larding improves the flavor of birds and meat not having much fat, which would have a tendency to get dry when cooked.—Modern Priscilla.

**Compote of Apples.**

Six ripe apples, one lemon, half-pound loaf sugar, one and a half pints of water. Select the apples of a moderate size, and cut in halves, remove the cores and rub each piece over with a little lemon. Put the water and sugar together into a lined saucepan and let them boil until they form a thick sirup; then put in the apples with the rind of the lemon, cut thin, with the juice of the same. Let the apples simmer until tender, then take out carefully and drain on a sieve. Reduce the sirup by boiling it quickly for a few minutes. When both are cold arrange apples neatly on a glass dish, pour over the sirup and garnish with strips of candied citron.

**Lemon Sandwiches.**

Take smooth thin-skin lemons, peel carefully, taking off all fiber adhering, then with a keen knife cut them crosswise into thin equal slices; cut rounds of bread a little larger than the slice of lemon, butter ever so lightly, place a lemon slice between two pieces, being careful to remove all seeds; place on plate one overlapping the other.

The secret is one that the huge traction monsters that the British are using in France are merely metamorphosed "caterpillar tractors" made in America for field work. Naturally, the tractors as they leave America present the aspect of engines of peace, with no more serious intent than crawling over fields and bogs and copses. But their investment in Great Britain with armored mail and weapons of offense and defense does not change the essential object of their construction, which is their ability to lay their own track and travel on it in the uncanny manner of centipedes, says Philadelphia Ledger. And, as with the tractor, so with many other inventions that are being used in the war, they are all entitled to the "Made-in-America" sign; though, doubtless, the war-distracted peoples of Europe the best war device that America sent over has been the committees that have organized relief in Belgium and the Americans that have performed such acts of bravery in maintaining the ambulance services and the hospitals in France. All these various made-in-America ingenuities of men, as well as mechanism, certainly must give the home country that reassured feeling that if peril came to us our own "made-in-America" resources would stand us in good stead.

Prevalence of vice among the youth points unfailingly to the victim of a sex story. It would seem as though the United States government might with great advantage to the morals of the youth establish a much more rigid censorship through the postal requirements, to protect the youth from the dissemination of the kind of literature that is devoured by the young girls on the street cars on their way to and from work and at their dinner hours. For it is to the young girl that these morbid recitals of experience, bogus, of course; confessions, bogus also; stories professedly realistic, but actually out of accord with real life and wholly disgusting, first appeal. Morals are vitiated at their source by this class of literature, and it fairly abounds, says Baltimore American. The news stands reek with it. The sex-story victims are the most distressing, toll imaginable, and yet society looks stolidly on while the process of debauchery and debasement goes on. The girls themselves often do not know the pruriency of the literature they buy until they get the flavor of it, and then they keep on with it. The alarming growth in numbers of the young girl sex victims is the shame of America.

The United States army is to have a horseless regiment of heavy field artillery, the guns to be drawn and operated by the "land dreadnaughts" which have caused such a sensation in Europe. The elimination by these powerful tractors of the horse from the field of battle will remove much of the picturesque sentiment attached to the warhorse, but it will cause real rejoicing among the friends of humanity in its application to the "best friend of man."

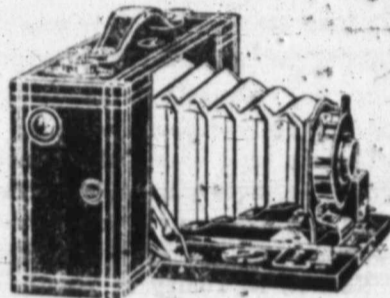

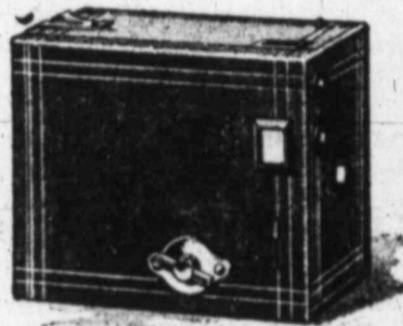

**Cooky Drawer**

Having hit upon such an excellent place for keeping drop cooking (or any others) I thought perhaps someone else might welcome the idea. It is a shallow box, three inches deep, three feet long, and as wide as the pantry shelf. I made it from a smooth wooden grocery box and painted it inside and out with white enamel paint. The cookies can be laid flat on sheets of waxed paper in the bottom. As the drawer is entirely concealed by the shelf paper it would be a good idea where it is thought necessary to conceal cookies from the small members of the household.—Aunt Jo.

**Ragout of Mutton With Rice**

Put into a stew pan a tablespoonful of oleomargarine and when melted add a tablespoonful flour and let slowly brown; add an onion cut into small pieces, a diced carrot, two cupfuls hot water, teaspoonful salt, fourth teaspoonful pepper, a bit of bay leaf, six whole cloves and a sprig of parsley. Cook slowly for two hours. Just before serving, add half a can of peas. This is fine cooked in a casserole. Serve with hot boiled rice.

Bake a yellow sponge cake mixture, and when cold place it on a lace paper dolly. Heap sliced peaches in the center and circle the edge with whipped cream put through a star tube if possible. If a star tube is not obtainable, shape with a teaspoon. Pass a pitcher of plain, thick cream with the cake.

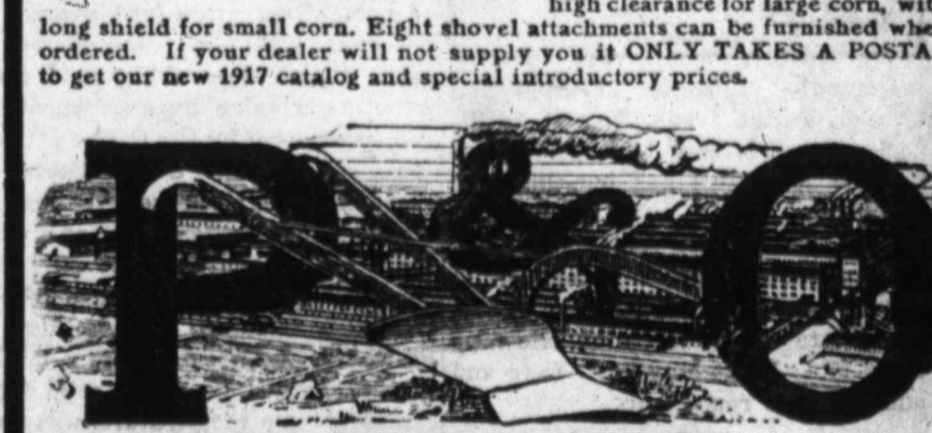

## Santa Fe Increases Wage.

The vegetable fats most commonly used as food in the United States, namely, olive, cotton seed, peanut, and coconut oils, have been shown to have a high digestibility and consequent food value by experiments recently reported by the Office of Home Economics of the United States department of agriculture. Sesame oil, which is used extensively as food in some other countries, but only in a limited way in the United States, was also found to have a high digestibility. Cocoa butter, a product of the cacao bean, and a solid fat at ordinary room temperature, was found however, to be a little less thoroughly digested than the other oils mentioned. The cocoa butter was about 95 per cent digested, while the other oils were approximately 98 per cent digested. The experiments indicate that for the most part the vegetable oils studied, especially the five with the higher digestibility ratings, have about the same food value and digestibility as the animal fats in general use. No ill effects from the consumption of fairly large quantities of vegetable oils were noted and the experimental evidence in general confirmed experience in ranking them as desirable foods for man.

Need of More Food.  
(A. M. HOVE)

"I do not believe it possible for the United States to increase its food supply more than 10 per cent", says Clarence Ousley, Director of Extension of the Texas A. & M. College.

Mr. Ousley is one of the best informed men on the crop situation and withal conservative.

"It will be practically impossible for the Dakotas, Minnesota, and other states to increase their food supply at all, because they are already up to the limit on wheat. It will be impossible for them to increase the acreage because of the scarcity of labor to plant and reap."

"The South can and will increase its annual food production by from 25 to 40 per cent. But the South's increacement, taken in consideration with that of the remainder of the nation, will only bring the total up to about 10 per cent. The country will need an increase of 25 per cent. Where is this additional per cent to come from?"

"If the war should end today, it would take six months to demobilize the armies of Europe, and it would be impossible to increase the food supply in these countries this year."

"This war is not the only cause of high prices; the war only precipitated them. The situation has been coming for twenty-five years. The urban population at present is 65 per cent as compared with 35 per cent at the time of the Civil war. Some one has got to move back to the farm."
