A young man with him was cut in two when he fell across a barbed wire fence. Lieut. Johnson has been in the Flying Corps since June. \$16,200 FROM STATE IF BOND ISSUE CARRIES

The engineer for the Commission visited Randall county and went over the road situation. He stated that the county would get about \$20,000, but this amount was reduced by the Commission to \$16,200. 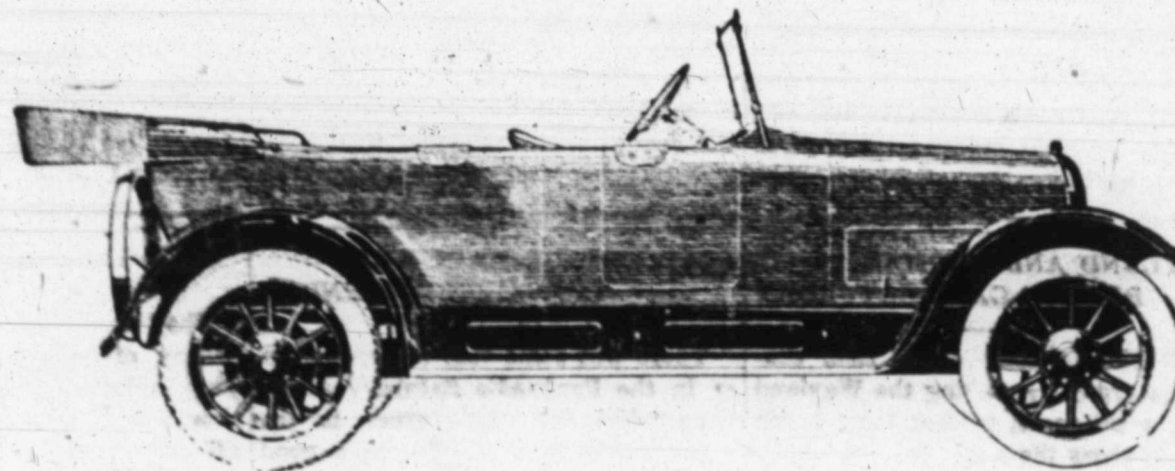

Letter from Sherrill Williams.
The following is a letter from Sherrill Williams to his sister, Mrs. C. H. Abbott:

Mare Island, California.
I am in Frisco now at the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. I think maybe I'll go over to Oakland after a while and bum around. I have a 24 hour shore leave. I will catch the 7 o'clock boat in the morning; it is about 30 miles from here to the island.

You wanted me to tell you about our drilling. Well, I'll start at 6 o'clock. At six reveille is sounded and everybody gets up. We have 10 minutes to dress and lash our hammocks, and then general assembly blows, and we all fall in. We run for about 20 minutes, and then we scrub down the deck and clean up around the barracks, and next we have chow at 7.30.

At 9:15 we fall in and muster and drill. Sometimes we get physical drill under arms and other times we get marching or boats under oars. We drill until 11 and then we come in and lay around until noon.

At 1:15 we fall in again and muster and then drill until 4 o'clock. At 5 we have supper, and at 7:30 hammocks are sounded and we can go to bed if we want to. At 5 minutes of nine everybody is silent, and 9:05 tattoo.

Our hammocks are made of heavy canvas and at the ends eyes are fastened and these are swung from beams across the building and are about six feet high. We don't have hammock ladders, either so you see it is some job getting into the things before we learn to get into them we get several hard falls. There was one boy who fell out of his and knocked out four teeth.

Our uniforms of the day are white with leggins, and you see they are easy to get dirty, so we have to wash them about every other day. We have inspection on Wednesdays and Saturdays. The uniform changes the 15th to undress blues. That will be a little better.

I don't like this country very much. It is too foggy and cold.

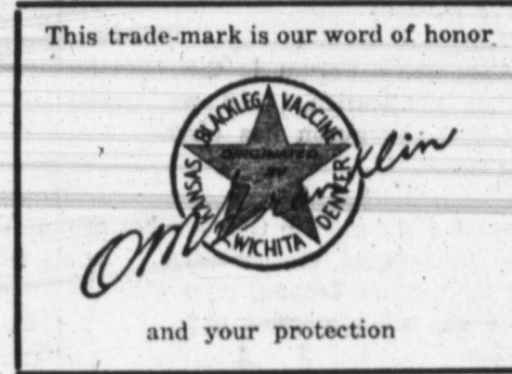

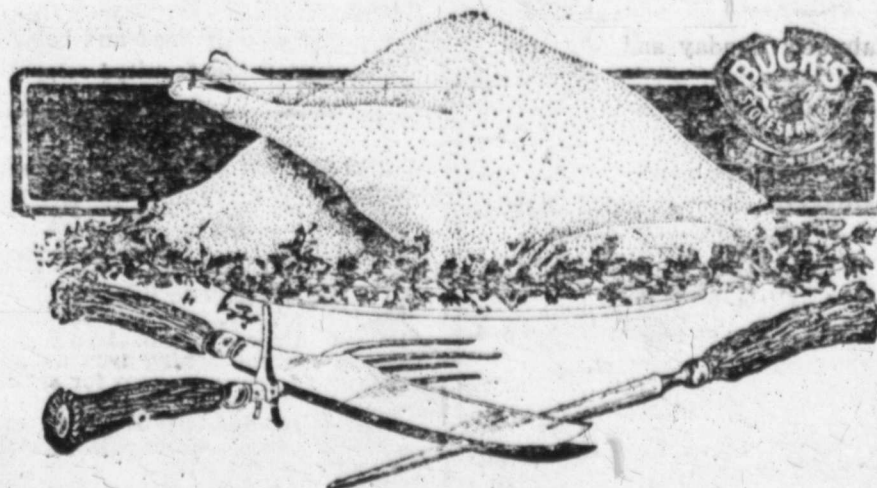

Randall county needs a method of listing our people whereby we may demand from them according to their ability to maintain the organizations necessary for war times. Under our present methods many people are entirely overlooked, and still a vast greater number are not giving according to their ability. If there was ever a time when a man should be hung up by the toes, who refuses to give, it is now when our people must maintain the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. or our armies will suffer therefrom. God pity the man's soul which is so dwarfed and shrank that he refuses to give and give liberally when our boys are standing between us who are at home and the hords of Germans who would treat our land as they did Belgium and our women as they have the Belgium and French women! Public opinion will soon make it very unhealthy for the man who refuses to give according to his means. Call after call will be made upon the American people. Our citizens had as well organize and made the fellows who have been hording their money pay in proportion as the American flag has protected them.

The women of Randall county were greatly touched by the appeal in the News of last week and many have gone to work to aid our boys in the trenches. There are many more women in Canyon who are expected to be in the Red Cross work, who have so far failed to assist in saving the life of some American boy who is fighting for them in the awful trenches of Europe.

Kerensky is on the run, having fled in disguise. Russia needs an iron man to save here. She needs a battery of machine guns turned on the German secret agents who have honycombed her government.

Next Thursday is Thanksgiving Day in the United States. Our people will observe it, not in the spirit of feasting, but in meditation and prayer. All of the holiness of a Sabbath day should be the aim of every one of our hundred million people in these United States.

Affairs look better on the Italian front. The Italians are making a great stand, while the English and French have rushed troops to their assistance. Germany has been able to pull most of her troops from the Russian front and concentrate on a great drive toward Italy.

The government sees only two classes of individuals in this country— patriots and traitors. To be a traitor is extremely unhealthy. The Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. are governmental agencies, indirectly. Are you for them?

A man complained about giving to the Red Cross because he couldn't see how so much money could be spent— surely someone was getting a rake off. He is the same type who would steal from the church collection plate as it goes by.

Ferguson's Forum is the newest Texas publication. As we understand it, Ferguson has already said too much.

Behind the men in the trenches are the workers of this country. Are we as workers keeping pace with the men who are protecting us?

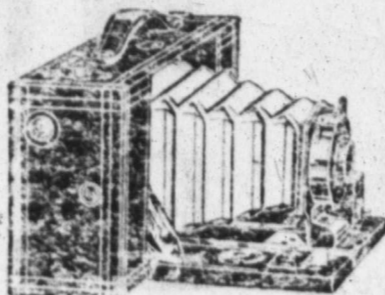
Record Market in October.

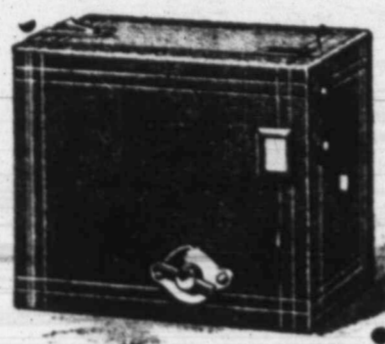

Special Bond Election.

Shall the Commissioners Court of Randall County, Texas be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, payable in forty years after date with option to redeem same at any time after Ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of Five and one-half cent (5½) per annum payable semi-annually on the 10th day of April and the 10th day of October respectively and to levy a tax to pay the interest on the said bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity for the purpose of construction of bridges and the improvement and maintenance of public roads within the county.

Voting Precinct No. Nine at Edmonds School House, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election.

C. P. Hileman, Precinct No. Two.

R. W. Bruce, Precinct No. Three.

H. E. Wesley, Precinct No. Four.

John Boulware, Precinct No. Five.

Andy Costley, Precinct No. Six.

D. R. Burns, Precinct No. Seven.

A. P. Baird, Precinct No. Eight.

W. L. Deeke, Precinct No. Nine.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149 Act of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of 1899, and only qualified voters, who are tax payers of said County shall be allowed to vote and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS" and those opposed shall have printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing general elections. A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said County shall serve as proper notice of said election and the County Judge is directed to cause said notices to be posted up at the places designed for holding said election at least thirty days prior to the date of said election.

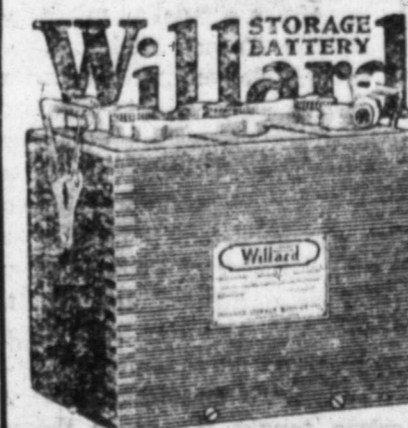

German Boats Exploded.

(By Townes R. Leigh, LL. D., Ph. D., F. S. Sc., in the Cincinnati Enquirer.)

During the last few months I have heard the Germans arraigned as blatant, bloodthirsty, barbaric, yet in nearly every case the speakers sufficed to their invectives such an expression as: "But when it comes to brains you will have to hand to them; they have made science."

Why hand it to them? What epoch-making invention or discovery is of German origin—except a stamp on which is inscribed "Made in Germany"? Their scientists have kicked up a fair amount of spray as they gumbled in their pool, but the world has yet to hear a mighty Teutonic splash. Time and again French, English, American, Spanish and Italian inventors and discoverers have sent tidal waves around the globe. Let us now be specific.

The steam engine has been called the greatest of all inventions. It broke the shackles from slaves; it mingled the parts of the world; it made neighbors of the antipodes. Newcomen, a native of Devonshire, obtained the patent for the first partially successful steam engine; Watt, a Scotchman, perfected it; Cuyne Murdock and Trevithick brought forward the locomotive, not on German soil; Stephenson, an Englishman, was the first to apply the locomotive steam engine to railways for passenger traffic; France, England and America applied it to navigation. When all had been completed Germany pulled the whistle cord, shouted "Hoch der Kaiser!" and tagged it "Made in Germany."

The telegraph, which brings us the daily history of the world, was invented by an American, Prof. Morse, who also suggested the Atlantic cable, which was subsequently laid by that American merchant-scientist, Cyrus Field, assisted in "mooring the new world alongside of the old" by Lord Kelvin, the prince of physicists, a British subject. Graham Bell, the chief inventor of the telephone, was born in Scotland and grew to fame in America. A young Italian, Marconi, gave wireless telegraphy to the world. The house of Hohenzollern has made great use of these inven-

tions in telling Great Britain, America and Italy in arrogant verbiage what the vaterland has done for the benighted peoples of the earth.

Cyrus McCormick, a native of West Virginia, produced the reaping machine, which harvests the food of the world; Meikle, of England brought forth the threshing machine; thus was famine banished. Ely Whitney, of Massachusetts parentage, invented the cotton gin; Margraves, an Englishman, made the spinning jenny; Arkwright, also English, supplied its deficiency with his famous spinning frame; the Englishman Kay introduced the fly shuttle in weaving; Bruney, who devised the knitting machine, and Cartwright, inventor of the power loom, were British subjects. Thus was the world clothed.

Although Germany is militaristic and worships at the shrine of Mars, what votive offering has she made to the good of war? It was not she who contributed gunpowder, smokeless powder, percussion cap, nitroglycerin, guncotton, dynamite, torpedo, shrapnel, automatic cannon, magazine rifle, breech-loading gun, Gatling gun, revolver, Maxim silencer, hammerless gun, gunboat, ironclad batteries or ship armor plate, revolving turret, submarine or airplane.

Since Germany borrowed her military appliances from other nations, we are not surprised that she obtained her devices of prosperity from the same source. She did not produce the first aniline dye, vulcanized rubber, liquid gasses, gas engine, water gas, thermometer, barometer, piano forte, barbed wire, cut nails, plate glass, circular saw, electric car, sleeping car, air brake, bicycle, automobile, pneumatic tire, sewing machine, typewriter, calculating machine, cash register, steel writing pen, etc., ad infinitum.

The greatest thing that Germany has done is to falsely advertise herself as the light of the world. No son of hers invented the electric light, the gas light, the acetylene light, the kerosene light, the searchlight, the flashlight, the safety lamp, the candle dip or the friction match. America, France, England and other "untutored" nations performed these tasks. The sun, moon and stars are the only lights left for Germany's contention, and according to the Mosaic account, the Lord and not the kaiser made and placed them in the firmament.

Daguerre, a Frenchman, presented us with photography. Our own Edison brought forth the motion picture to delight and instruct the eye and the phonograph to please and teach the ear. The Germans enjoy our reels and records, and lifting high their steins, drink a prolonged toast to the achievements of the Vaterland, "Deutschland uber Alles."

Gallileo, who first saw the heavens with a telescope, was an Italian. The man who first saw the earth and its teeming life with a microscope were not of German origin. Yet many telescopes and microscopes in our colleges, being marked "Made in Germany," have led students to believe that these wonderful instruments were devised by German brain. The Germans are merchants, not inventors.

By use of the compound microscope Pasteur, the French biologist, as early as 1857 demonstrated a connection between microscopic organisms and disease. This was nine years before Dr. Koch, the German bacteriologist, had graduated. In this connection the important antiseptic surgery of Dr. Lister of England should be recorded. Edward Jenner, the discoverer of vaccination, and Harvey the discoverer of the circulation of the blood, were Englishmen. An American taught the world the use of anaesthetics. Our dentists excel all others. They are employed by many crowned heads—even the kaiser has his.

The Teutons have not shown the engineering skill of the French, who cut the Suez Canal, or of the Americans who joined the Atlantic and the Pacific at Panama. The decimal or

metric system by which the Germans make their measurements is a gift from France. The method by which they make their steel is that of Sir Henry Bessemer of England. Many of the fruits and vegetables of which they eat an enormous quantity were brought forth by our own peerless Burbank. No wonder that the Germans can "goose-step" so highly, for what else have they practiced?

Lavoisier, the father of modern chemistry; Linnacus, the founder of botany, was of Swedish origin. To Hutton of England we are indebted for geology; to Maury of Virginia for the physiography of the sea; to Descartes, of French parentage, for analytical geometry; to Comte of France for sociology; to Germany for sauerkraut and pretzels. Germany has not contributed her quota toward the world's advancement. How she struts in her foreign plumage! She is neither inventive, resourceful nor original.

She has made no geographical discoveries of importance. Her neighbors have. What role did she play in discovering various portions of the new world? Did she establish any colonies? I thank God she did not. Her sons did not compose the crew of Magellan's fleet, the first to circumnavigate the globe. A German did not discover the North Pole nor lead the way toward the South Pole. It is high time to cease talking of Germany's achievements unless one wishes to indulge in satire.

History and study will reveal that the world's greatest teacher, scientist, inventor, discoverer, statesman, general, philosopher, preacher, painter, poet, architect, novelist or singer was not "Made in Germany."
