PARIOTIC WOMEN OF SOUTH WEST ARE URGED TO VOL-UNTEER THEIR SERVICES.

RARE CHANCE FOR PATRIOTS

Those Between the Ages of 21 and 40 Who Can Pass Physical Examination Are Qualified for Enlistment.

Women of the Southwest have a chance to show their patriotism now as never before since the beginning of the war. They have been bravely giving up their sons, fathers, brothers, sweethearts and husbands to fight in the great war; they have knitted thousands of sweaters, helmets, wristlets and mufflers; they have practiceofood conservation, bought Liberty bonds, Red Cross memberships, thrift stamps and certificates; they have marched in dozens of parades, attended hundreds of meetings and made hundreds of patriotic talks.

But in few instances have they been given an opportunity to go into the field of the world struggle. This is the path they now have a chance to take.

The Department of Nursing of the American Red Cross, the mobilizing agency for nurses in military service, still is in urgent need of recruits. The Red Cross wants the strong, brave, competent women of the Southwest to step forward and prepare to go to France and help nurse the brave sons of the United States when they fall on manitarian way the reports of the Stathe battlefield.

Thousands of Nurses Needed.

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This appeal to the Southwest is issued by Miss Lyda Anderson, head of the Nursing Department, Southwestern Division American Red Cross, and should be heard by every woman in this district. The need for more nurses is so acute that the surgeon-general of the United States estimates that within a short time the Red Cross will need 40,000 nurses for the army alone. Besides that, he points out that the Allies also are depending upon the United States to supplement their nursing service.

It is estimated that there are between 80,000 and 90,000 registered nurses in the United States at the

"We will help you fill the necessary number." There are 75 accredited schools of nursing in this district that will prepare volunteers for service. Two years' duty is required.

Nursing education not only prepares for a large variety of professional fields, but it is an excellent preparation for home and family life and for public service in many ways. Almost upon enrollment the student begins and timely remarks occur. They her service to the community in helping to care for the sick, as part of her Holder: instruction and training. This service







Publicity Department Office of the Texas Federal Food Administration. Houston, Texas, Jan. 22, 1918.—"We have a number of LESS DAYS

"And a good many LESS MEALS

"So I am going to follow out the idea of a 'More' Day and place the potato on the bill of fare for Friday hereafter, as the honor food for three meals and in such abundance as the family may care to consume.

"Furthermore, I do hereby decree that Friday shall in the province of the Federal Food Administration of Texas be henceforth known as Potato Day;

"And that Friend Housewife will be encouraged by Friend Retailer to buy potatoes on Fridays; and, further, that Friend Housewife serve the said potato in place of bread as frequently upon Friday and all other days as she can so convert the wayward appetite of the members of her household.

"I dislike burdening the good people with any more days and cause them to become aged trying to remember if it is a Less Day of a More Day, but Potato Day has been recommended by the United States Food Administration, and inasmuch as there is a diversity of views as to a proper day for the observance, and one city says this day and another city says this day-I therefore deem it well and fitting to choose Friday as a most excellent day for honoring the potato." And therefore,

Henceforth FRIDAY BECOMES PO-TATO DAY. A MORE DAY IF YOU PLEASE.

In place of a slice of bread, eat one more potato a meal. Potato Day or the use of the Irish potato one day a week is a day upon which the grocers are urged to make a specialty of potatoes and to sell them at the lowest price. The administration wishes to place the Irish potato, every day in the year, on every table in America. The potato today is plentiful, cheap and the best substitute for food staples. It furnishes nourishment, bulk, mineral salts and a corrective alkalinity in the diet. Germany plants more than twice as many potatoes as the United States. : Germany gets more than twice as many bushels per acre and she eats three times as many potatoes. Germany's wise use of potatoes helps her to hold out against the allies.

If we are going to win this war we will have to fight Germany-potato with potato.
