

SEEK CLOTHES FOR BELGIUM SUFFERERS

An urgent call has been issued by the Red Cross in America for clothing for the suffering people of Belgium and Northern France under the occupation of the enemy.

These Allies of our behind the German lines—the rich as well as the poor—with their native stocks of raw materials long since exhausted and no commercial imports since the first devastation of their country—need—and need promptly—this relief in their destitution. The well-to-do are short of necessities; the poor are in dire need.

The world is so short of clothing and raw materials, that the Red Cross cannot furnish them with new clothing, and must call upon the people for their spare garments.

One-third of every shipment will go to the people of the north of France, down close behind the German lines, two-thirds will go to Belgium.

It is useless to send a garment which is not made of the strongest and most durable materials, as the clothes are subjected to the hardest kind of use. But this does not mean that all garments must be in perfect repair.

To meet the situation and the opportunity, the week of March 18-25 should see not less than 5,000 tons of clothing collected and on its way to France.

Mrs. R. A. Stewart has charge of the work in Randall county and will announce her plans of operation at once.

Double Kafir Production.

One of the most important movements that has ever come to this country is the launching of the Panhandle Food and Feed Production Campaign that will have its origin, in tangible form, in Amarillo next Monday, March 18th.

Messrs. Landerger, Masterson and Avery of Amarillo, Thos. P. Moody and Thos. V. Ellzey of Canadian, the last named gentlemen being president and secretary of the committee.

Forty-four counties of the Panhandle are called upon to meet, by a representative, in Amarillo next Monday to lay the plans for greater intensity in the cultivation of milo maize, kafir corn, feterita and sorghum. You can scarcely buy wheat flour today. Suppose we develop the natural products of this country into a commodity that is as essential as wheat? Say, wouldn't the Panhandle blossom like the rose then? But there is a greater reason than that: Our boys at the front must be fed and clothed and outfitted and our allied armies must be sustained.

Food will win the war. Let every county in the Panhandle send her representative to the meeting at the City Hall in Amarillo next Monday at two o'clock. Some interesting revelations will be made. Kill the Kaiser with Kafir Corn.

C. O. Keiser writes from California the following regarding a new invention he recently saw work out there:

While I was at Venice day before yesterday I saw a stunt pulled off that I had never heard of before. I was talking to Miller, who used to teach at the Normal in Canyon. We were at the Aviation School where several machines were in the air most of the time when a young fellow named Unger, a balloonist, and a moving picture man and aviator named Prest came along and got to kidding one another about some invention this man Unger had made to use in place of a parachute. He said it was about the size of a knapsack that he would strap on his back and said if they would give one of the aviators \$10.00 to take him up 3,000 feet he would jump off and show them that it would work. They asked the aviator who happened to be there whether he would take him up and he said he would if he would give him \$10.00. The boys raised the money in a few minutes, and this man Unger went and soon returned with his little knapsack, climbed on the aeroplane and away they went and told the man driving the machine to get just as high as he could. He jumped off of that thing while it was going 75 miles an hour and this thing that he had on his back opened up like a big umbrella and he landed on the ground all right. I have seen a good many stunts, but never saw one like this before, and I don't see why it could not be used by the men who are fighting.

This outfit was about the size of an ordinary knapsack when it was rolled up on his back, probably about 12x 14 inches square and 3 or 4 inches thick.

At the meeting of the Swine Breeders last week down at Clarendon, they desired to give away two registered pigs next fall of the very best breeding as prizes at the State Fair to be held at Childress the 10th of September. The winning pigs from all the Panhandle counties to compete for same. That is the boys and girls pig clubs in every county were to show in their county and the winning pig to go to the State Fair at Childress for the final show. Those entering this contest must have registered pigs of any breed they chose, and there are two classes. One for pigs farrowed after September 1, 1917 and the other for pigs farrowed after March 1st, 1918. The first class is known as Junior Yearlings and the 2nd as Junior Pigs. The pens at the State Fair at Childress will be furnished free of charge and the pigs will be met at the train and carried for by the Association free.

You may also state that I will give a registered gilt as a prize for Randall County, the pigs to be judged at Canyon, and will sell any worthy boy or girl that is recommended by the Demonstration Agent and not able to buy a pig, one on time, taking their personal note, and in case the pig should die, will cancel the note.

Loses Fine Bull and Hogs.

R. L. Harlan of north of town had the misfortune to lose a fine \$1000 Hereford bull last Saturday, in a rather peculiar manner. The animal was sick for a day or two, and Mr. Harlan was unable to determine what was wrong.
 He skinned the bull and left the carcass in the lot for the hogs to eat, which is a custom commonly practiced among stockmen. There were 19 head of fat porkers in the lot, and by Sunday every one of them was sick. They began to die on Monday, and by Tuesday night they were all dead. The loss is rather heavy, for the hogs were worth \$600 on the local market, and the bull was a blooded animal of considerable value.
 It has been suggested by some that this was the result of poisoning by some German spy, but Mr. Harlan does not seem to think so, as the poisoning of one animal seems to be too small a scale for such operations.—McLean News.

Cowpeas for Dry Farmers.

The cowpea should hold an important place in the dry-farm agriculture of New Mexico, because of its drouth resisting qualities, its large yield of roughage and its superior feeding value. On account of the fact that the seed pods ripen unevenly, the crop is more suitable for roughage than for seed, and should be harvested, for best results, when about half the pods are mature. At this stage of growth it makes excellent grazing for pigs or sheep. When cut for hay, it is essential to preserve all the leaves possible, and in order to do this, it should be raked up as soon as cut and cured in the shock. The seed is very much like the field pea, and is practically equal to it in feeding value. It will grow on all kinds of soil, increasing its fertility and leaving it in excellent condition for the succeeding crop. At the Tucumcari Field Station, the average yield for the past three years has been slightly more than one and one-half tons per acre, more than any other forage crop, excepting the Amber sorghums. For dairy cows or fattening steers, it takes the place of alfalfa hay, and a very much smaller grain allowance is necessary than with Sudan or sorghum roughage. During the past three winters, steer feeding experiments have been conducted at the Tucumcari Field Station, in which cowpea hay was compared with kafir and milo fodder, supplemented with cottonseed meal; the rest of the ration for both lots being identical, and consisting of kafir silage and ground milo heads. While the gains made by both were very satisfactory, in every instance the lots receiving the cowpea hay made decidedly the better gains. If grown for hay, the Whippoorwill variety is recommended, but if for seed, the Early Buff or the New Era. Farmers who desire to try this crop should secure a copy of Bulletin No. 104, on Dry Farming, from the New Mexico Experiment Station, which is now ready for distribution; and also a copy of Bulletin No. 108, on the Utilization of Dry-Farm Crops for Beef Production, which will be ready to send out in July.—Luther Foster in New Mexico Farm Courier.

FOR YOUR WAR COOK BOOK.

Scalloped Potatoes and Cheese.
Arrange a layer of sliced raw-boiled potatoes in greased baking dish and sprinkle with grated cheese and a little flour. Repeat until dish is nearly full. Pour milk over the whole, about one-half cup to every three potatoes. Skim milk is good. Bake in a moderate oven until done. The length of time required depends upon whether the potatoes are raw or boiled and whether the baking dish used is deep or shallow. Boiled potatoes baked in a shallow dish will take only 20 minutes. Raw potatoes in a deep dish may take as much as 1½ hours.

Boiled Rice No. 1.
"Black Man's" recipe to prepare rice is "Wash him well, much wash in cold water, the rice flour make him stick. Water boil already very fast. Throw him in, rice can't burn, water shake him too much. Boil quarter of an hour or little more; rub one rice in thumb and finger, if all rub away him quite done. Put rice in colander, hot water run away; pour cup of cold water on him, put back rice in saucepan; keep him covered near the fire, then rice all ready. Eat him up!"

Oatmeal Muffins.
Stir 1 cup of rolled oats and 1 tablespoon of fat into 1 cup of hot milk. Boil 1 minute, then allow to stand until luke warm. Soften 1 yeast cake in 1-4 cup of luke warm water and add 1 tablespoon of sugar. Combine the two mixtures. Add 1 cup of flour and 1 teaspoon of salt and beat thoroughly. The batter should be stiff as for drop biscuit. Cover and set to rise until light—about an hour. Fill well-greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Let rise until light, then bake twenty-five minutes in a moderately hot oven.

Honey-Grape Sauce.
Boil together until thick one cup of honey and one cup of grape juice. Apple sauce, prune juice, or the juice from canned fruit can be used in this recipe. Another variation can be made by using a cup of cooked apricots that have been run through the food chopper.

Cheese Custard.
1½ cups cottage cheese
½ cup maple syrup or honey
2 tablespoons milk
3 eggs.
1 teaspoon melted fat.
Press the cheese through a colander; beat the eggs until light; add them with all the other ingredients

Rev. B. F. Fronabarger has tried hard, worked untiringly in his efforts to line up the shareholders in the Canyon City Club to buy the grounds for a really big enterprise. A few have responded by offering their club stock at market value. Others have flatly refused to sell at any discount from the par value, which is above the price at which any stock has recently sold. People often wonder what makes a big town big, and what makes a little town always remain small. The big town grows big because it is eternally and everlastingly after the things which make for a big town. The little town stays small because it fails or refuses to grasp its opportunities. Is Canyon always going to remain small because it costs a little money to grow big, and thus let slip the worthy while enterprises? Another town has offered grounds to the Encampment. Simply because Canyon has fallen down on her opportunities is no sign that the Encampment enterprise will fail. Some other town will get it while some of our people sleep.

BRIEF WAR NEWS.
On the eve of the gathering at Moscow of the Russian congress of Soviets, which is to pass judgment on the German-made peace accepted by the Bolsheviks at Brest-Litovsk, President Wilson has sent a message of sympathy to the Russian people through the congress, with a plea that the United States will avail itself of every opportunity to aid them in driving out autocracy and restoring Russia to her place in the world with complete sovereignty and independence. The United States now recognizes no government in Russia, but the president has sent this message to the American consul at Moscow for delivery tomorrow to the congress, which is made of soldiers' and workmen's representatives and speaks for at least a considerable part of the Russian people. The message made public tonight by the state department, was as follows:

"May I not take advantage of the meeting of the congress of the Soviets to express the sincere sympathy which the people of the United States feel for the Russian people at this moment when the German power has been thrust in to interrupt and turn back the whole struggle for freedom, and substitute the wishes of Germany for the purpose of the people of Russia. Although the government of the United States is, unhappily, not now in a position to render the direct and effective aid it would wish to render, I beg to assure the people of Russia through the congress that it will avail itself of every opportunity to secure for Russia—once more complete sovereignty and independence in her own affairs;—and full restoration to her great role in the life of Europe and the modern world. The whole heart of the people of the United States is with the people of Russia in the attempt to free themselves forever from autocratic government and become the masters of their own life."

Are you making plans for the war garden Uncle Sam expects you to raise.

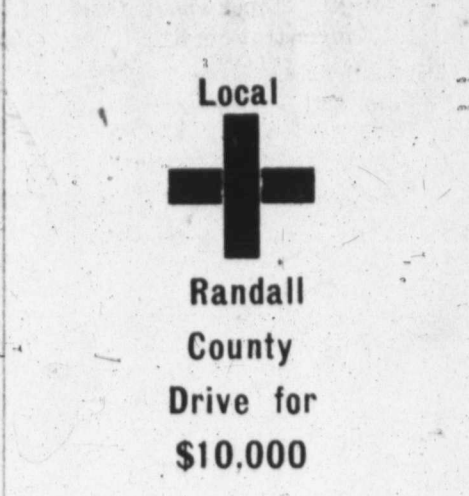

Holsteins for Beef.

The large size of Holstein cows not only enables them to yield in such enormous quantities as to give them all records for milk and butterfat production, but in its itself a decided advantage in these days of high beef prices. The ultimate destination of all cows is the butcher's block, and the heavy Holstein is winning laurels here over the smaller cows as she does at the pail.

A purebred registered Holstein heifer, 2 years, 10 months of age, which had been found worthless for breeding purposes, was recently sold at the Buffalo (N. Y.) Stock Yards for \$201.45. She weighed 1580 pounds and brought 12 3/4 cents a pound. She had been bred to freshen last May and was being fitted for a test, but as the time of her parturition approached she did not make up any udder. Upon examination by veterinarian it was found she was carrying a mummified calf. She was kept until fall and then disposed of for beef.

In these days when every scrap of food is worth its weight in gold the several hundred pounds more weight of the Holstein cow is a factor to be reckoned with in selecting dairy stock. In many instances the difference in weight will make a difference in price by the butcher sufficiently large to pay the difference between the initial cost of a purebred Holstein and a "scrub."

Transplanting Frames.

A modern idea in hotbed operations is to do the seeding in flats, made from goods boxes, 17x12x3 inches deep on the inside. According to Professor Dorst of the Illinois station the young plants should be shifted to other beds, flats, or pots so that they will have more room for development and should take place when the first pair of rudimentary leaves or cotyledons is well developed, and when the first pair of true leaves is showing well. The plants will begin to crowd and stretch about this time. Pry the plants up in small bunches with a knife or a flat stick and gently crumble the soil with the fingers so as to leave as many of the fine roots on the plants as possible. Do not pull the plants. The seedlings should always be handled by the cotyledons, for these are later cast off by the plant anyway, and no great harm results if they are injured. A round stick about the size of the little finger will be found useful in setting the plants. The plants should be set about 2 inches apart. Cabbage, cauliflower, kohlrabi, tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant should be set a little deeper than they grew in the seed flat. Head lettuce should be set so that the crown, which is at

Cabbage cauliflower, kohlrabi, tomatoes, peppers and celery are very conveniently handled in flats. Head lettuce and eggplant do not transplant easily, and give better results when shifted to pots. Sweet potatoes, beets, and onion seedlings are not shifted but are transplanted direct.—Field and Farm.

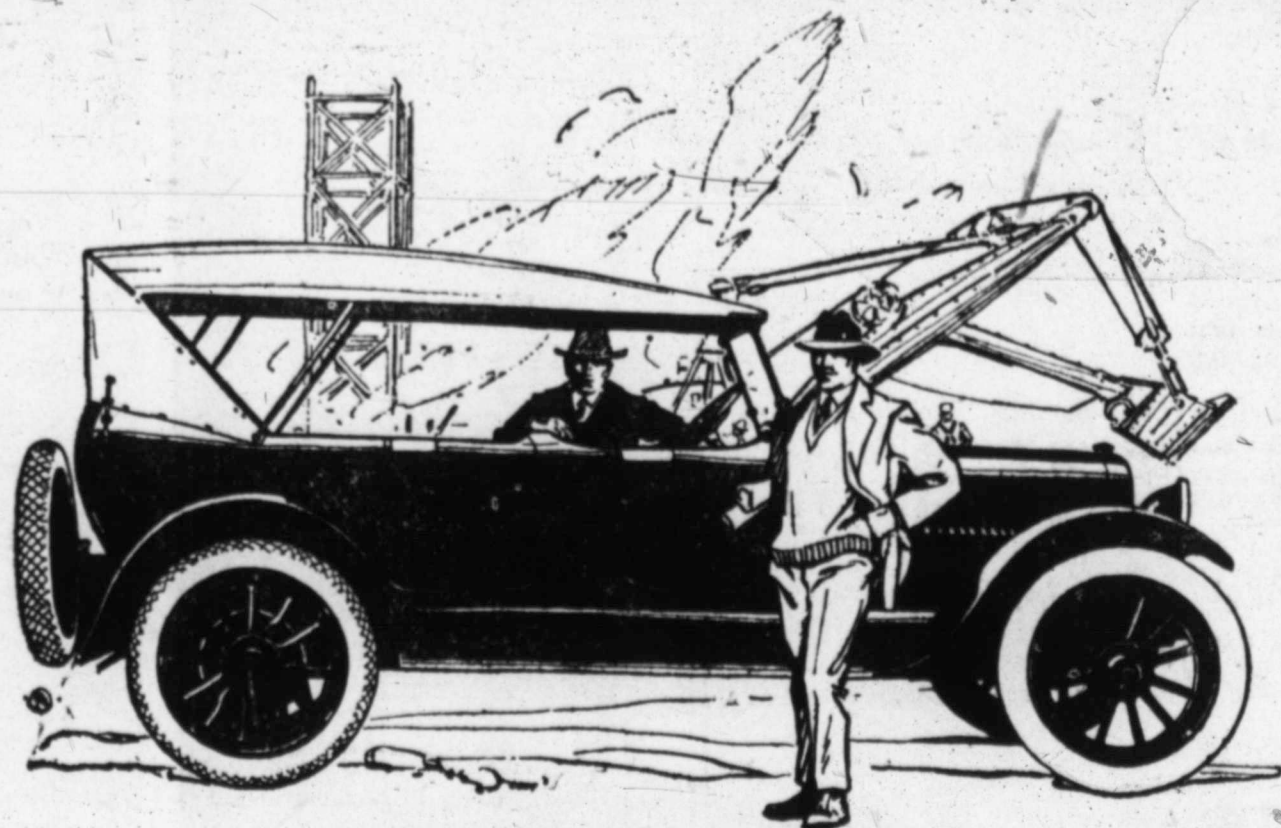

BRIEF WAR NEWS.

On the eve of the gathering at Moscow of the Russian congress of Soviets, which is to pass judgment on the German-made peace accepted by the Bolsheviks at Brest-Litovsk, President Wilson has sent a message of sympathy to the Russian people through the congress, with a plea that the United States will avail itself of every opportunity to aid them in driving out autocracy and restoring Russia to her place in the world with complete sovereignty and independence. The United States now recognizes no government in Russia, but the president cabled his message to the American consul at Moscow for delivery tomorrow to the congress, which is made of soldiers' and workmen's representatives and speaks for at least a considerable part of the Russian people.

The message made public tonight by the state department, was as follows: "May I not take advantage of the meeting of the congress of the Soviets to express the sincere sympathy which the people of the United States feel for the Russian people at this moment when the German power has been thrust in to interrupt and turn back the whole struggle for freedom, and substitute the wishes of Germany for the purpose of the people of Russia. Although the government of the United States is, unhappily, not now in a position to render the direct and effective aid it would wish to render, I beg to assure the people of Russia through the congress that it will avail itself of every opportunity to secure for Russia once more complete sovereignty and independence in her own affairs, and full restoration to her great role in the life of Europe and the modern world. The whole heart of the people of the United States is with the people of Russia in the attempt to free themselves forever from autocratic government and become the masters of their own life.

Holsteins for Beef.

The large size of Holstein cows not only enables them to yield in such enormous quantities as to give them all records for milk and butterfat production, but is in itself a decided advantage in these days of high beef prices. The ultimate destination of all cows is the butcher's block, and the heavy Holstein is winning laurels here over the smaller cows as she does at the pail.

A purebred registered Holstein heifer, 2 years, 10 months of age, which had been found worthless for breeding purposes, was recently sold at the Buffalo (N. Y.) Stock Yards for \$201.45. She weighed 1580 pounds and brought 12 3-4 cents a pound. She had been bred to freshen last May and was being fitted for a test, but as the time of her parturition approached she did not make up any udder. Upon examination by veterinarian it was found she was carrying a mummified calf. She was kept until fall and then disposed of for beef.

In these days when every scrap of food is worth its weight in gold the several hundred pounds more weight of the Holstein cow is a factor to be reckoned with in selecting dairy stock. In many instances the difference in weight will make a difference in price by the butcher sufficiently large to pay the difference between the initial cost of a purebred Holstein and a "scrub."

Transplanting Frames.

A modern idea in hotbed operations is to do the seeding in flats, made from goods boxes, 17x12x3 inches deep on the inside. According to Professor Dorst of the Illinois station the young plants should be shifted to other beds, flats, or pots so that they will have more room for development and should take place when the first pair of rudimentary leaves or cotyledons is well developed, and when the first pair of true leaves is showing well. The plants will begin to crowd and stretch about this time. Pry the plants up in small bunches with a knife or a flat stick and gently crumble the soil with the fingers so as to leave as many of the fine roots on the plants as possible. Do not pull the plants. The seedlings should always be handled by the cotyledons, for these are later cast off by the plant anyway, and no great harm results if they are injured. A round stick about the size of the little finger will be found useful in setting the plants. The plants should be set about 2 inches apart. Cabbage, cauliflower, kohlrabi, tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant should be set a little deeper than they grew in the seed flat. Head lettuce should be set so that the crown, which is at

Butter, Grape Jelly.
Victory Pie—Cranberry and Raisin Coffee.
This menu emphasized the use of vegetables and fruits as conservers of other foods. Bean Souffle is a meat substitute. Potatoes were used because the Food Administration has

asked us to use them freely. The vegetables were canned and the jelly made last fall. Oatmeal, cornmeal, and kafir meal are all substitutes for wheat. "Victory" pie crust was made by using 1-3 buckwheat flour. The food administration has granted restaurants and hotels the privilege of serving "Victory" pies and doughnuts on wheatless days, provided they are served on all other days.
No sugar was used in cooking. Sugar is permissible in jelly, preserves and canned fruit. Raisins contain sugar. No butter was used in cooking.

NINE PAIRS SHOES FOR PERSHING MEN

GENERAL ASKS FOR LARGE FOOTGEAR SUPPLY FOR SOLDIERS IN FRANCE.

AIRCPLANE MISHAPS ARE FEW

With Hundreds of Men Learning to Fly, War Department Records Show Number of Accidents at Military Aviation Fields Comparatively Small.

Washington, Gen. Pershing has requested shipment of 2,500 pairs of shoes for each 25,000 men monthly, which is approximately nine pairs of shoes per man per year. This quantity is in excess of actual consumption and is being used to build up a reserve for all troops in France. When such a supply is accumulated, the quantities per man will be reduced.

The quartermaster general's department now has on hand and on outstanding contracts, 7,564,000 field shoes and 7,873,000 marching shoes. It will be necessary to secure more than a million additional shoes during the year.

Records of the war department show that from the beginning of training in June, 1917, to February 22, 1918, the fatalities at military aviation fields in this country have been 51; 40 officers and 29 cadets killed in training flights, and 12 men killed in unauthorized flights and ground accidents.

Since the training began in the United States, student aviators have flown considerably more than 100,000 miles. Hundreds of hitherto inexperienced men have been learning to fly. Their early flights are under the guidance of instructors, and prior to these flights two or more months are spent in preliminary ground work. There comes a time, however, when every student aviator must take his machine up alone, and every precaution has been taken to reduce the number of accidents and safeguard the aviator in his solo flights.

The fuel administration is carrying on a series of conferences covering all industries which use large quantities of fuel, with a view to learning the requirements of each line during 1918. The industries themselves are playing a leading part in these discussions. The aim of the fuel administration is to arrive at a percentage of production which, under the circumstances, will be satisfactory to the manufacturers and their workmen, but which will not represent a consumption of fuel for the manufacture of supplies not needed during the current year.

The order which has been issued limiting the use of fuel for the production of window glass to 50 per cent of the amount manufactured in 1917 is the result of one of these conferences. A survey of the field indicated that while not more than 5,000,000 boxes of window glass would be used in 1918, competitive conditions were likely to result in an overmanufacture of at least 2,000,000 boxes.

It is through this system of limitation, together with large economy in the methods of using fuel, that the fuel administration expects to supplement the production of coal this year. It is hoped, as the railroads strengthen their facilities, that it will be possible to mine and transport a larger quantity of coal this year than last, but it is through these methods of reducing consumption that a repetition of this year's shortage is expected to be prevented.

Rifle and cartridge production in the United States has developed in volume and in quality on a scale assuring the satisfactory equipment of the army, according to a statement authorized by the secretary of war.

To achieve the rifle and ammunition production program the government has expended or has obligated itself to expend, during 10 months of war, \$400,000,000, and 200 officers, 80,000 men, and 10,000 women have been engaged exclusively in the manufacture of rifles and cartridges. Two government plants and three privately owned plants are engaged in making rifles and one government plant and nine privately owned plants are engaged in cartridge manufacture. Ordnance experts in this country and in Europe are in agreement that the United States army is being equipped with two of the best three rifles in the world.

"Stars and Stripes" is the name of the weekly newspaper being published in France for American troops, under the direction of the intelligence section. Practically the entire paper is devoted to American news, including a daily radio report of about 1,400 words supplied by the committee on public information to the French government.

Exports of corn to Canada for feeding and manufacturing purposes have been limited to those varieties and grades which are not suitable for seed purposes.

Divisional athletic directors who have received commissions will accompany their contingents to France, according to the war department commission on training camp activities. Boxing instructors will not be sent with the troops, as at present the need for these men is considered greater on this side.

There Are More Milch Cows.

Instead of the decrease the past year in the live stock of the country which was apprehended on account of the scarcity of feed and labor and the high price of all meat products, a recent report from the department of agriculture at Washington shows a

most encouraging trend in the opposite direction! for which we should all be very glad and give due credit to the courage and good sense of the farmers of this country. All the principal classes of live stock showed considerable gain during 1917. Milch cows increased 1.7 per cent and other cattle, 4.5 per cent. The number of milch cows estimated on hand Jan. 1, 1918, shows an increase of 123 per cent over that on hand Jan. 1, 1914, the year before the beginning of the European war; and other cattle, an increase of 21.5 per cent. The number of milch cows on the farms Jan. 1, 1918, is estimated at 23,284,000; and of other cattle 43,546,000. This gratifying situation shows that the difficulties of the past year, some of which are enumerated above, are not insurmountable; and we think it may safely be expected that, with the help of measures established by the government to foster and protect honest efforts at food production, much larger gains in live stock and other products of the farms may easily be made during the present year. Fur-

thermore, the possibility of hesitation and uncertainty among producers is now past. They are thoroughly aroused, determined and on their mettle. Success to their efforts!—Holstein-Friesian Register.
