Election Results Show Two Runoffs For County Office Seekers

Over 6,000 voters in Callahan County are qualified to vote, yet only 2,002 went to the polls Saturday and made important decisions.

Vetoing a proposition which could legalize race-track gambling; Countians stayed with Governor Dolph Briscoe; and made no local courthouse changes. Returns showed incumbents generally successful, with two runoffs seen on the county level.

One is the race of County Superintendent between incumbent L. C. Cash and E. L. "Chief" Reese, which will be held June 1st. Cash received 860 votes to Reese's 673. Robert F. Joy Jr. was also in the race, and received 345 votes.

Another key race in the local level is that for County

Commissioner Precinct No. 3. Six candidates had filed for the position. Incumbent Duke Mitchell received 223 votes; E. F. (Franzell) Odom received 144, as did Nathan Foster. Billy Hines ran close behind with 140, Lester M. Wyatt and J. E. Blanton each received 22.

A recount has been called for Friday, May 10th, and a decision on who will be in the runoff election will have to be made.
