#### Biscuits

(Using No Wheat)

#### Barley Biscuits

- 1 1-4 cups liquid
- 4 cups barley flour
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 6 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

#### Corn Flour Biscuits.

- 1 cup liquid
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 6 teaspoons baking powder
- 2-2-3 cups corn flour.

Suggestion: If 1 1-4 cups liquid are used the texture will be better, but it will have to be made as a drop biscuit.

#### Buckwheat-Corn Flour Biscuit.

- 50 per cent Buckwheat
- 50 per cent Corn Flour
- 1 cup liquid
- 1 1-4 cups buckwheat
- 1 1-3 cups corn flour
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 6 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt.

#### Corn Flour-Rolled Oat Biscuit

- 50 per cent Ground Rolled Oats
- 50 per cent Corn flour
- 1 cup liquid
- 1 1-2 cups corn flour
- 1 cup ground oats
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 6 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

#### Yeast Breads.

- 50 per cent Wheat flour
  - 38 per cent Wheat flour substitute
  - 12 per cent Potato (1:4 basis)
- (Any recipe given below will make an 18- to 19-oz. loaf)

Method: Make a sponge of the liquid, syrup, yeast, mashed potato and enough of the ground oats to make a batter. Allow to rise, until light (about one hour) and then add the salt, fat and remainder of the oats and the flour.

These doughs must be much stiffer than ordinary bread dough.

Knead thoroughly and allow to rise until double in bulk. Knead, mold into a loaf, and when double in bulk, bake 50 minutes to one hour. Begin in a hot oven (400 degrees F. or 205 degrees C.) After 15 to 20 minutes, lower the temperature to that of a moderate oven (380 degrees F. or 200 degrees C., and finish baking.

- 1 3-4 cups (7 oz.) wheat flour
- 1 cup (5 oz.) cornmeal
- 3-4 cup (6 oz.) mashed potato.

#### Rice Flour Bread

- 50 per cent Wheat flour
- 38 per cent Rice flour
- 12 per cent Potato (1:4 basis)
- 1-2 cup (107 c.c.) liquid
- 1 tablespoon syrup
- 1 teaspoon fat
- 1-2 cake compressed yeast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1-2 cups (6 oz.) wheat flour
- 1 cup (4 3-4 oz.) rice flour

- 50 per cent Wheat flour

- 1 tablespoon syrup
- 1 teaspoon fat
- 1-2 cake compressed yeast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1-2 cups (6 oz.) wheat flour
- 3-4 cup (6 oz.) mashed potato.

#### Cornflour Bread.

- 50 per cent Wheat flour
- 38 per cent corn flour
- 12 per cent Potato (1:4 basis)
- 1-2 cup (107 c.c.) liquid
- 1 tablespoon syrup
- 1 teaspoon fat
- 1-2 cake compressed yeast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1-4 cups (4 3-4 oz.) corn flour
- 3-4 cup (6 oz.) mashed potato.

1. The weights in parenthesis are exact, the household measures given approximately as nearly as possible these weights.

2. If dry yeast is used, make the sponge with 1-8 to 1-4 cake and allow it to rise over night. If liquid yeast is preferred, substitute 1-4 cup for 1-2 cake of the compressed yeast and reduce the liquid in recipe to 1-4.—U. S. Food Administration.

### TURNED HIM DOWN.

In the Crosbyton Review of May 17th, there appeared a letter from John W. Baker, candidate for State Treasurer, addressed to his opponent, J. M. Edwards, the present incumbent and candidate for re-election, suggesting that, in keeping with the spirit of the people in these strenuous times, Mr. Baker and Mr. Edwards agree not to make a personal campaign.

This idea is in line with what the Plainsman has been advocating and we feel sure would have the support of most of the citizens of our state. There is neither pleasure nor intellectual profit in a political campaign and at this time, there are many people who are actually denying themselves needed diversions, that they may be able to buy more Liberty Bonds and give more to the various war activities.

Of course the money expended on the campaigns comes out of the candidates' pockets and is free to the citizens but, in our estimation, the candidates could put it to better use. Texas is a big state and has an enormous crop of candidates and if each one of them spends from \$500 to \$2000 in his effort to be elected, think what an immense sum that would be, not to mention all of the animosity and hard feelings that a "stump" campaign is

bound to bring out.

It is to be regretted that Mr. Edwards refused to meet Mr. Baker half way in the matter and thereby has forced the latter to make an active canvass, also. Had these two agreed to such an arrangement, possibly some of the other political aspirants might have followed their example. In his letter declining to accede to Mr. Baker's suggestion, Mr. Edwards says: "I had much rather spend \$2,000 on a campaign and win than to spend only \$500 and lose", from which it may be inferred that he expects to spend the larger amount since few candidates enter a race with any purpose other than to win if possible.

Mr. Edwards has turned down a perfectly good opportunity to add \$2,000 worth of Liberty Bonds to those he already possesses and allow his opponent to do the same.

The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You. (To the Women of Texas)

The eyes of Texas are upon the women of the State. Theirs is the privilege and the duty to elect a Governor who stands for the best ideals of the people and the welfare of the State.

We have worked for the right to participate in the election of the men who control the politics, enact and enforce the laws of our State. We now have that privilege. It carries with it serious responsibilities. Especially is this true when we are faced with the knowledge that opposed to the Governor who is responsible for our enfranchisement are the combined forces that have fought the political freedom, protection and advancement of women. We know from our own experience how strong is the organized liquor traffic, and its allied interests. We know how bitterly they resent the laws that Governor Hobby was instrumental in securing for the protection of the State, the Army and the homes of Texas. We know too how industriously they are working against him seeking to overthrow him and all the good laws that he has been instrumental in having enacted. Let us prove worthy of our responsibility.

So that the record may be kept straight let it be known that Governor Hobby when he entered politics in 1914 declared himself in favor of suffrage for women. He has consistently preserved that attitude against the wishes

of some of his best friends and close advisors. He stood for what he believed to be right and just and today it is in our power to justify his belief in our ideals and our standards.

Mr. Ferguson's opposition to suffrage and his action in fighting that measure at the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis in 1916 are matters well known to the women of Texas.

Governor Hobby is responsible for some of the most progressive legislation ever placed upon the statute books of any state. The Zone Law, the prohibition law, the primary suffrage law, the alien law, the literacy law, the delinquency law, the vice bills the age of consent law and the educational laws for the benefit of the schools all passed at the recent special session are measures in which every woman in Texas is vitally interested. Shall we preserve these laws and reject the man who advocated and assisted in their passage.

It has come to me that those opposed to Governor Hobby are seeking to mislead women who are not well informed on these matters in an endeavor to prevent his receiving the unanimous support of the women. I believe that these efforts will be in vain. I have confidence in the intelligence, integrity and appreciation of the women of Texas. It has been my belief in their integrity and intelligence and their sense of justice and

rights that has caused me to work for the laws giving them the rights they now possess. I know that they will prove true to the ideals for which they stand, to the principles of political integrity, honesty and civic duty which they wish their children to follow. I know that they will vote for clean politics, clean government, the continuation of prohibition and good morals for the elimination of the liquor traffic and the vice interests. **THAT THEY WILL VOTE FOR HOBBY.**

The women of Texas are more concerned with what a man is and how he has fulfilled a public trust than the technicalities of an impeachment proceeding. It is not whether the legislature had the authority under the constitution to declare Mr. Ferguson guilty but that Mr. Ferguson is guilty as charged of acts that render him unworthy of public trust and confidence. The misappropriation of public funds, the violation of state banking laws, the \$156,000 currency which he refused to account for, the unlawful handling of state funds, the use of public funds to pay his personal obligations, the appropriation of escrow money deposited in his bank to his personal use and his refusal to return it; his attempts to influence the Supreme Court and the Court of Civil Appeals at Beaumont in his own behalf and his vetoing an act of the legislature increasing the salary of the Supreme Court Judges when they refuse to be coerced by him—these are the matters that women are concerned with. The supporters of Mr. Ferguson do not deny his guilt. They only insist that though guilty the legislature had no authority to convict.

We believe that honor, integrity and civic responsibility are the test for public office. We are concerned with the ideals we set for the youths of this country and the women of Texas will not vote for a man who admits his guilt and pleads lack of authority to enforce punishment.

**Cut Out the Cut Worms.**

On account of the August rains last fall a great deal of weeds and other vegetation developed luxuriantly. This growth gave the cut worm moths abundant food plants for egg-laying and consequent partial development of the young. These young cut worms passed through the winter in an immature stage. Consequently they are exceedingly numerous this year, especially in gardens where any late vegetation was present last fall.

The cut worm is mainly nocturnal in activity and has the bad habit of cutting such plants as young tomatoes, cabbage and similar plants off near the surface of the soil, says Professor C. E. Sanborn of the Department of Entomology at Oklahoma A. and M. College, Stillwater.

The following formula is highly recommended by Professor Sanborn for controlling cut worms:

"Mix thoroughly 50 pounds of wheat bran, 2 pounds paris green or crude arsenic. Mix 1-2 gallon of low-grade sirup, then finely chopped pulp and peel three lemons or oranges in 7 gallons of water and then pour the mixture over the bran and poison. Stir it thoroughly so as to dampen it evenly. Sow broadcast over the garden or infested field."

The above formula is sufficient for covering ten or twelve acres. It is not only good for controlling cut worms but is also good for army worms and grasshoppers.

**New Bridge Across the Canadian.**

Is Texas So Benighted as To Re-Elect Jim Ferguson?

From Houston Press: The liquor interests now have on foot in Texas one of the biggest conspiracies they ever promoted, to restore booze in Texas.

The aim is to elect Jim Ferguson governor, get the prohibition laws repealed in the courts and inaugurate another reign of brewery government. "Impossible," many people will say. And the fact that they say so helps to eliminate the impossibility of the proposition.

Ferguson has with him the breweries, the whisky-soaked antis, the pro-Germans, many of the labor leaders, a large number of the farmers at the forks of the creek, and many of the politicians.

W. P. Hobby has with him the honest anti, most of the prohibitionists, a great deal of the honest rank and file of labor, the more intelligent people throughout the state, most of the voters in the towns and a goodly number of the women.

Hobby can be elected if his supporters are not too cock-sure of victory. But if they take his line-up as evidence that there is no use to fight, Ferguson is apt to be the next governor. Certainly the forces that stand behind Hobby are in the majority, if there can permeate the state a wave of intense interest that will guarantee a full-strength vote July 27.

With all due respect to the people of Texas, ignorance is dense in parts of this state. This does not apply to any person who has sufficient intelligence to know that it is true.

Ferguson is making his appeal to the ignorant on his land plank and won; the second time he appealed to the ignorant on the same proposition and won. Now he is telling the more ignorant people that a "bunch of high-brows are at Austin spending their tax money on higher education" and the more ignorant are believing it. The method of this campaign is something like the first one made by Ferguson and the breweries. In the first campaign the Ferguson-Brewery propaganda was circulated thruout Texas by the Commercial Secretaries in country papers by means of boiler-plate and thru bulletins; this time it is being done thru the Ferguson Forum, a publication started for the purpose of electing Ferguson. The state is being deluged with copies of this paper.

It has in it such appeals as "Back to the school room with the political teacher," and "Back to the courtroom with the political lawyer." Tho to an intelligent person these sayings would have no appeal, it is a strange thing that they will win applause from many people thruout the state. To many they are the last word in sound philosophy and thought.

Ferguson is an able campaigner. He is all camouflage, but he gets away with it among those to whom he addresses himself. For instance, Ferguson gets on a rostrum and when they bring him a glass to drink from, he refuses it and pulls from his pocket a gourd and drinks from it. That is downright sham and nonsense, but it really makes a hit with some people.

The people of Houston, men and women, should see to it that Ferguson doesn't put over this camouflage and get himself elected governor of a state in which their city is located. Houston should vote unanimously for W. P. Hobby.

CASH PRIZES FOR WAR LOAF OFFERED

In order to enable as many hotels, restaurants, clubs and dining car services as possible to go upon an absolutely wheatless basis, and to insure that those which have already taken the "no wheat" pledge may carry it out with the least possible hardship, John Mc E. Bowman, who is a practical hotel man now associated with the United States Food Administration, has offered prizes totaling \$1,000 for the best wheatless and ryeless sandwich bread that can be produced by a hotel or restaurant baker.

Five hundred dollars is offered for the loaf that is adjudged the whitest, the most palatable and the best looking and which can be produced at a moderate price. A second prize of \$300, a third of \$150 and a fourth of \$50 will also be given. Neither wheat nor rye in any form may be used.

The competition will be open only to hotel and restaurant bakers. Each contestant must produce a certificate from the proprietor or manager of his hotel or restaurant guaranteeing that the contestant is an American citizen; is a hotel or restaurant baker in good standing and is not employed in an outside bakery; has worked in his present position for at least six months preceding the date of the contest; and has originated and has baked the bread entered by him in the contest.

Each contestant must originate and bake one 16-ounce loaf of sandwich bread. This must be so packed as to reach Washington in the best possible condition. It should be sent parcel post and under a special delivery stamp. The bread should be accompanied by two typewritten copies of the recipe, in which every step should be briefly but accurately described and the general appearance of the finished product noted. All bread and recipes entered must reach the hotel, restaurant, dining car and steamship division of the food administration not later than May 25.

For the information of possible contestants whose bread will have to make a long journey, it is especially stated that the loaf alone will not be the sole basis of award. The recipe accompanying it must pass a thorough test.

HANDSOME WATCH GIVEN E. A. PEDEN

Gift of the County and District Food Administrators for Texas.

Amid cheers Administrator Peden of the Federal Food Administration for Texas was presented at noon Sunday with a handsome gold watch, Howard make, with the following inscription, by the county and district food administrators for Texas:

To Our Chief E. A. Peden Texas Food Administrator (Seal) April 28, 1918

The event was the final session of the 325 district and county food administrators in Houston, and came in the wake of a presentation speech by B. F. Johnson, district administrator for Wichita Falls, who said:

"I have here, Mr. Administrator, a machine invented after such a manner that it will not run but by the power of loyalty, love and enthusiasm. Just in the measure that the men and women gathered here can furnish it. Because these men and women can and do so unreservedly contribute this power the inventor of this watch turned it over to us to use as we would; and we give it as a testimonial of our affection and regard for you. We pledge ourselves to 100 per cent efficiency."

The administrators passed a special resolution thanking the press of Texas for its magnificent support of the administration and making possible its success as a war activity; they also unanimously adopted a resolution thanking the Houston Post, the Houston Chronicle and the Galveston News for their splendid presentation of the happenings of the State meeting as they occurred.

Sunday afternoon the administrators took part in the patriotic program at the municipal auditorium; while between times they visited State headquarters, visited with members of the headquarters staff and got pointers.

COTTONSEED MEN OF TEXAS TO MEET FEDERAL EXPERTS

In order to afford Hugh Humphreys and George H. Denny of the cotton seed products division of the United States Food Administration to make a first-hand survey of the needs and the operation of the cotton seed industry in Texas, Administrator Peden has called a meeting of all persons and firms engaged in this industry, from the farmer to the miller, to confer in Dallas, May 3, at 10 o'clock, in the Adolphus hotel. C. W. Gibson, secretary of the Cotton Seed Crushers' Association of Texas, has been requested by Mr. Peden to issue invitations to all members of the association, and all non-members who are engaged in milling and distribution; while invitations are extended to the producer and the ginners through their respective organizations. Governor Hobby has been asked to make the opening address.

Among the special agents of the conference will be Governor Hobby of Texas; F. C. Wehnert, director of markets and warehouses for Texas; Fred W. Davis, commissioner of agriculture; Fritz Englehard, president, and M. Falkner, secretary of the Texas Farmers' Congress; D. A. Lyday, president of the Texas Farmers' Union; E. W. Cole of the state bureau of markets; T. F. Justice, president, and S. S. Fraser, secretary, Texas Cotton Ginners' Association; and Prof. T. O. Walton, Agricultural and Mechanical College, College Station.

### NEW U. S. RULES ON COMMERCIAL FISHING GIVEN

Local Restrictions Generally Removed; Sailing Authorized Without Regard to State's Closed Season.



With the new rules and regulations governing the Fish Industry of America, guaranteeing freedom of movement and production to the fisherman and the distributor, and lifting many restrictions and hardships which served to paralyze the industry, Texas should from now on have an abundance of good sea-food at a reasonable price.

All distributors have been notified by Administrator Peden to submit at once a schedule of costs and quantities of fish handled. Every effort is to be put forth to secure a stabilization of prices and to free the market of the speculative influences which too frequently made Texas fish cheaper in St. Louis and Kansas City than in San Antonio or Dallas.

All dealers and all fishermen are required under the rules and regulations to have license, which may be secured from the License Division at Washington free of cost. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations, or proof of speculation, eliminates automatically the fish dealer or fisherman from the field of fish production.

Dealers are required to submit address and change of address; to make reports under oath when requested; to be prepared at all time for inspection; to eliminate all waste, or suffer penalization if they fail to do so; they are forbidden to enter into fishing arrangements with persons or firms not holding license; only wholesome seafood will be shipped; containers not full must be so labeled; willful violation of contracts are forbidden; every effort must be put forth to market all seafood taken; damage to gear and equipment is forbidden.

The Federal law replaces the State law with the one exception: fishing is not to be followed by the use of seines at channels connecting one body of water with another. All persons fishing and selling fish must be licensed.



### NEW MEAT PROGRAM CALLS FOR ECONOMY

The new meat program of the United States Food Administration does not contemplate a definite quantity of meat per person, and through an inaccuracy in transcribing the telegram from Washington the phrase was used that the "ration would be one and a quarter pounds per person per week," whereas the statement should have read that the present meat ration in France and England is one and one-quarter pounds of meat a week.

In deciding upon a program of retrenchment in the consumption of meat the United States Food Administration does not include "Meatless Days," but it puts it up to every American to cut down his meat consumption and that of his family:

First: By eliminating every ounce of waste.

Second: By curtailing purchases and buying more closely.

Third: By serving smaller portions.

### LICENSED BAKERS TO FILE WEEKLY REPORTS.

All licensed bakers after May 11 are required to make up weekly reports and submit to the Federal Food Administration for the State of Texas.

Following the report inspections are to be made, the purpose being to make the baker realize, he must obey the regulations; to record consumption of wheat flour, substitutes, sugar and shortening; to record production of bread and rolls, and to show boarding of wheat flour, sugar and shortening.

**100 Per Cent American Club.**  
The 100 per cent American Club from the Plains visited Tucumcari yesterday evening in search of a man by the name of Weeks who was tried here last week before United States Commissioner, but on account of insufficient evidence was turned loose. The Boys had sent a car in Wednesday after Weeks and had succeeded in getting him out of town but had car trouble and while busy with same, another car came along and before anyone knew what was up, had their man Weeks and brought him back to town. Yesterday the Club, about 40 or 50 strong, came prepared to take their man back with them. They found him and after a lively foot race down one of the main streets, captured him, threw him into a car and were headed south on Second Street when Sheriff Alex Street drove up and in order to stop them, rammmed his car into the side of the Ford conveying Weeks. The gentlemen, however, played fair with Sheriff Street, turning the man over to him. Deputy Grayson and City Marshal Brown took Weeks to the jail for safe keeping.—Tucumcari Sun.

## ZONE SYSTEM FOR ARMY'S PURCHASES

TERRITORY HAS BEEN ALLOTTED TO EACH OF THIRTEEN GENERAL SUPPLY DEPOTS.

### ORDNANCE EQUIPMENT READY

Every Soldier Leaving for France Has Been Fully Outfitted—American Merchants Take Over the Interests of German Fur Men.

(From Committee on Public Information.)

Washington.—A zone system for the apportionment of purchases throughout the United States and to facilitate distribution has been established by the quartermaster department. Territory has been allotted to each of 13 general supply depots. The general supply depot quartermasters are charged with the duty of ascertaining the manufacturing possibilities of their zones. On the basis of reports along this line forwarded to the acting quartermaster general, food and equipment for troops at the different camps will be purchased within the zone in which the camp is located.

Formerly nearly all of a particular class of supplies was purchased through a single general supply depot. Other articles were obtained through other supply depots. Manufacturers in sections distant from the particular supply depot buying their goods were at a disadvantage, and were unable to compete with rivals nearer the point. Under the new system most classes of supplies will be purchased through each of the 13 depots, and manufacturers will be able to transact their business through the depots nearest them.

Each general supply depot quartermaster besides ascertaining production facilities within his zone is instructed to recommend to the quartermaster general's office the employment of such producers as are in his judgment qualified to fulfill contracts. Each depot is expected to keep informed as to market conditions and spot goods located in that zone, and when shortages occur submit recommendations for purchase of articles which may be obtained within the zone.

Purchases are to be made after advertisement by open competitive bidding when time will permit. In emergency cases competition is desired whenever possible. The record of bids received and awards made will be open to public inspection.

The army ordnance department has thus far met every demand imposed by the new program for overseas shipment of American troops, according to a statement by the department. Despite the great acceleration in the sending of American forces to France, no infantryman goes aboard ship without a United States model 1917 rifle (modified Enfield), bayonet, belt, haversack, pack carrier, bandoleers, bayonet scabbard, and full mess equipment.

Tonnage is today a limiting factor in the shipment of ordnance material overseas, especially because of the present necessity of increasing the transport of infantry regiments.

Sufficient supplies of artillery—French 75-millimeters and 155-millimeters and American heavy railway artillery—are already in France to meet the present demand. Sufficient machine guns are also immediately available for American forces in France.

A Canadian order in council provides that no person, with the exception of manufacturers of flour, bakers, confectioners, wholesale or retail dealers, or persons living at a greater distance than two miles from a licensed dealer, shall hold or have in his possession or under his control more flour, made wholly or in part from wheat, than is sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period not exceeding 15 days.

Anyone living at a distance greater than two miles and less than five miles from a licensed dealer may hold or control flour made wholly or in part from wheat up to an amount sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period not exceeding 30 days. Anyone living more than five and less than ten miles from a licensed dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements up to 60 days, while a person living more than ten miles from such a dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period up to 120 days.

Any wholesale or any retail dealer licensed by the Canadian food board may not hold flour made wholly or in part from wheat in excess of a quantity sufficient for his ordinary trade requirements for a period exceeding 60 days.

The regulation regarding sugar parallels this save in the last clause. Manufacturers, wholesalers, or retailers may not have more sugar than is required for a period exceeding 45 days.

The Swiss federal government has by decree fixed the maximum price at which farmers may sell cattle for slaughter as well as the prices at which various quantities of butchers' meat may be retailed. Farmers may demand no more than 23 cents per pound for first-class fat beef cattle. The price applies to cattle sold on the farm. If sold in a city or other distant market cost of transportation may be added.

With the exception of sirloin and fillet cuts, retailers may ask no more than 40 cents per pound for beef.

Arrangements are being completed by which the interests of German fur men, amounting to several millions of dollars, will be purchased by American merchants and the money thus paid turned into the treasury.

Before the war broke in Europe, according to a statement issued by the alien property custodian, the trade of American furriers was practically nothing but a collecting and shipping agency for the Germans. Almost every pelt taken by American trappers went to Leipzig before it could be sold. Although London was the world's market, three-quarters of the fur shipped to London from America, Russia, and even China, went to Leipzig for dressing and dyeing.

The Leipzig dressers and dyers were recognized as the best in the world. Each year after the fur was prepared and German merchants had fixed the price, Americans were allowed to purchase as much as three-fifths of the year's output for manufacture into garments, but in so doing they were forced to pay the original cost, expense of dressing and dyeing, a big profit to the Germans, and a 30 per cent duty, before the furs were returned to America.

The war deprived Germany of the chance to purchase fur in London, and limited the supply from America—now also entirely cut off.

According to the Leipzig correspondent of a Christiania newspaper, the Leipzig spring fair showed exhibits of many substitutes and surrogates which have been placed on the market in Germany. Descriptions of some of these have been received by the United States chamber of commerce:

A surrogate for pepper is offered for sale which, judged only by its appearance, seems almost the same as real pepper. The color, odor and taste have been surprisingly well imitated.

A tea is shown to which the name of "German tea" has been given. It is prepared from any one or a combination of a great variety of plants, from strawberry leaves to linden blossoms. It is said to taste very much like genuine tea, but even a half dozen cups will not produce the stimulation caused by a single cup of real tea.

There are any number of surrogates for marmalades. Most of them are prepared from garden vegetables instead of from fruits, with a minimum amount of sugar.

Substitute soap is offered for sale, which is said to have been prepared from the oil in berries and from pumice stone. It lacks, however, the one main characteristic of soap, that of working up into a rich, creamy lather; otherwise it is very good. Substitutes are also to be had for laundry blueing.

Substitute bicycle tires are sometimes made of two concentric iron rings with small springs between them. They are very serviceable on asphalt pavements, but are not exactly as noiseless nor as easy riding as genuine rubber tires.

A large number of articles offered for sale had been prepared largely or entirely from paper—coarse working clothes for men and women, blouses, aprons, and other fabrics. There were paper belts which seemed capable of driving heavy loads.

Many artificial and substitute leathers were noticed. Brass and copper articles were not seen, and attempts were made to place substitutes on the market in the form of plated wares.

A committee on public information representative in London says:

London has never heard of a baseball season before, but will get its chance this year when the American baseball league gets its schedule of games well underway. There are eight American and Canadian teams recruited from various organizations stationed in London, with games scheduled for each Saturday during the summer.

The thousands of American soldiers who may pass through London, or be invalided or stationed here, are in a fair way to be made to feel that England is the next best place to home and that English hearts are kept warm for them.

"Make England the Sammy's 'blighty,'" is the way the English press puts it in urging readers to entertain the American troops. "Blighty" is the war word for everything the soldier wants in intervals of his fighting work; the place where friends, recreation, and homelike comfort await him.

The Weekly Dispatch recently called for suggestions for a public entertainment to be offered American soldiers and an instant response made thousands of dollars available for amusements and entertainments. The idea that found greatest favor, however, was to throw open the homes of the nation to the Sammies.

An officer commanding an American squadron operating with the British fleet has reported on a late inspection and speaks in high terms of the present state of efficiency in which he finds both ships and men.

"Vessels show the most gratifying improvement in battery and fire control," he said. "Our ships are smart, spick and span, and have been recipients of many high compliments from British flag officers."

Prior to the war the treasury prepared approximately 150,000 checks annually for the payment of interest on registered bonds of all loans, the issue of these 150,000 checks being distributed through the year. In the May payment of interest on registered bonds of the second Liberty loan more than twice that number of checks were prepared.

More than 2,000,000 members of American fighting forces are now insured by the United States government.

### All Right, But—

Alcohol as a By-Product of Bread.  
Through the seizure of a still in a  
bakery in New Mexico, where a quan-  
tity of alcohol was discovered that  
had been distilled from bake-oven  
fumes, considerable discussion has  
taken place concerning the feasibility  
of manufacturing alcohol as a by-  
product of bread.

This still was a crudely construct-  
ed affair, the vapor from the bread  
being conducted from the oven into a  
worm, which was cooled by passing  
through a barrel of water, condensing  
the vapor. The baker was not ar-  
rested, as it was clearly shown that  
no evasion of the law was intended.  
However, possession of a still is in  
violation of the law, and this one was  
seized by the internal-revenue ser-  
vice. This baker states that quanti-  
ties of alcohol can be manufactured  
for war use at a very small cost by  
army bake shops and bakers in large  
cities. The practicability of the plan  
remains to be worked out.—Oklahoma  
Livestock News.

### Big Land Deal Consummated.

Berkley Dawson of Amarillo and Lee  
Russell of Fort Worth purchased the  
Capitol Syndicate Headquarters at

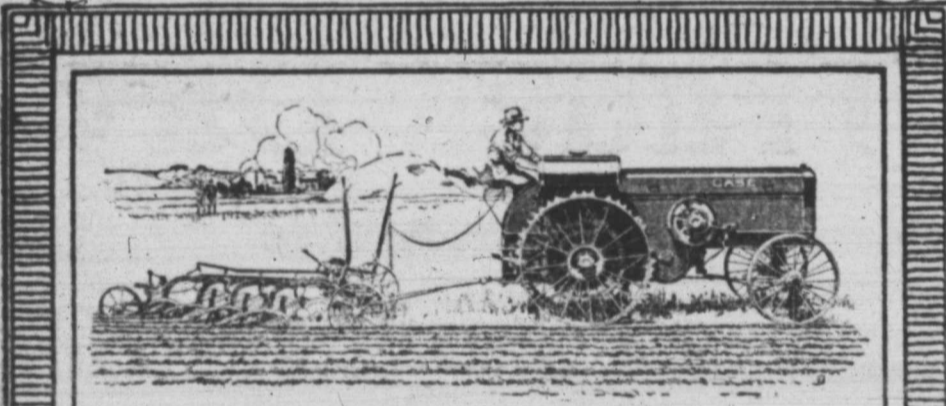

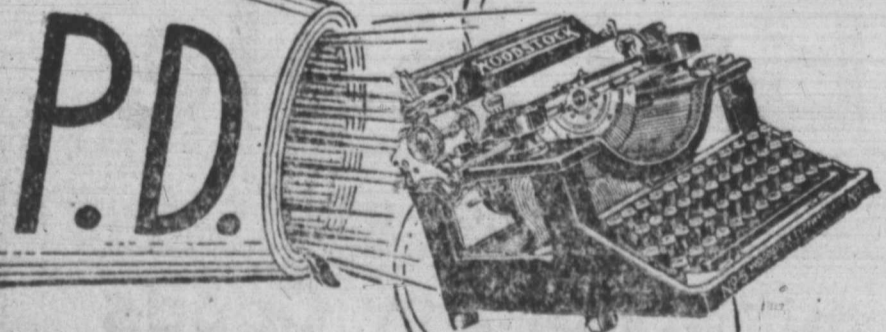

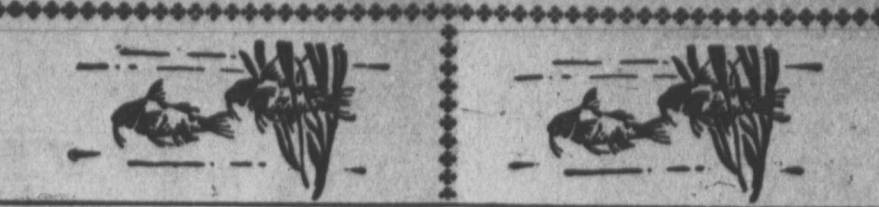

## To All Who Eat—Eat Fish

SHIPMENTS OF MEAT ABROAD INCREASING VASTLY; NATION ON A VOLUNTEER MEAT RATION; HELP THE NATION BY EATING FISH.

Below are some recipes showing manner of preparing fish in many styles, which no doubt will be very welcome to the housewife who is conserving meat.

#### BOILED FISH

Clean and boil on fish-rack or tie in cheesecloth, 5 to 8 minutes per pound, according to thickness of fish. Place on hot platter. Remove skin and garnish with parsley and lemon. Serve with Hollandaise Sauce and Parsley Potatoes. A sauce is a necessary accompaniment to boiled fish.

#### HOLLANDAISE SAUCE.

- 1/3 Cup peanut oil
- Yolks of 2 eggs
- 1 Teaspoonful lemon
- 1/4 Teaspoonful salt
- Speck cayenne
- 1/3 Cup boiling water.

Place all ingredients except hot water in upper part of double boiler. Stir constantly until begins to heat, then add the water and cook until slightly thickened. Chopped cucumbers which have been drained of their liquor may be added just before serving.

#### PARSLEY POTATOES.

Boil old or new potatoes, then roll in butter and chopped parsley. Season with salt and paprika. Do not serve butter with bread at this meal, as enough fat has been utilized in the above dishes to meet dietary needs.

#### BROILED FISH.

Clean and wipe dry—sprinkle with salt and pepper and place in well-greased broiler until done. Slices of fish should be turned often while broiling. Whole fish broil first on flesh side, then turn and broil on skin side till skin is crisp and brown. Remove carefully to hot platter.

Brush with butter and lemon juice and sprinkle over with chopped parsley. Broiling is one of the most delectable ways of preparing fish.

#### FISH SOUFFLE.

- 4 Tablespoonful rice flour
- 4 Tablespoonful fat
- 1 Cup skim milk
- 1 Cup flaked left-over fish
- 3 Eggs
- 1 Teaspoonful salt
- 1/2 Teaspoonful pepper
- Few drops lemon juice.

Make white sauce from the flour fat and milk and seasonings. Add the beaten yolks to sauce. Add fish and lemon juice. Fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites, place in a greased baking dish and bake in slow oven until firm.

#### FISH STEW.

- 1 cup cooked native fish—flaked
- arrange in layers in casserole with
- 2 cooked potatoes—sliced or diced
- 2 tomatoes—sliced, or 1/2 cup stewed tomato
- season with
- 1 tablespoonful fat
- few grains pepper or paprika
- 1 tablespoonful chopped parsley, add
- 1 cup milk.

Cover casserole with buttered substitute bread crumbs. Bake 1/2 hour.

To butter crumbs: Allow 4 tablespoonful butter or a substitute, as peanut oil, to each cup of crumbs.



## LIFE OF CHILD IN LIFE OF MILK

Now Is the Time to Make Use of a Food Made Abundant by Green Fields and Ripening Grain—No "Little One" Should Be Stinted of Its Milk Ration—Germany Saves Her Children by Saving Her Milk for Their Use; SO MUST WE.

The Food Administration desires to secure economy in the consumption of all kinds of meats without the reinstating of the Meatless Day. There is now an abundance of milk products which can well be substituted in various forms for meat.

If less milk is used, less milk will be produced. Farmers will be obliged to sell their dairy cattle because of the high cost of feeding them, and the failure to find a market for the product, and this country will face the same conditions from which the people of Europe are now suffering. Milk is a cheap animal food. There is at the present time a surplus of both cheese and butter. If these are not used an important outlet for surplus milk has been removed and milk production will diminish.

Where possible, provision should be made to supply each child in the family with a quart of clean, wholesome milk a day. For each adult a pint is desirable when the meat consumption is low. Children should have whole milk, adults may use milk and cheese in place of meat. The present prices of butter have made many families refrain from using it. Those who are able to purchase it should do so. Unless all members of the family are using whole milk, they need some butter in the diet. If the family must economize, the amount of butter may be reduced, but the amount of milk should be correspondingly increased to secure the right total of the fat of soluble growth-promoting substances. The use of butter and cheese should be encouraged since the storage of milk in these forms is an important method of conserving an unmarketable surplus of this food.

#### TEN INSPECTORS AND THREE THRESHERMEN ADDED TO FOOD STAFF.

The inspectors of the State Food and Drug Department have been placed at the disposition of the Federal Food Administration for Texas, and in all ten inspectors have been officially deputized by the Food Administration to check up on food sales over the State. These ten inspectors plus the agents of the Department of Justice who are continually at the disposal of the Food Administration gives to the State Administrator a splendid nucleus for this department of the State work.

The personnel of the inspectors from the Food and Drug Department now federalized consists of Dr. W. H. Minton, Houston; Richard Hudson, Houston; R. A. Buford, Austin; R. H. Hoffman, Austin; D. F. Snyder, Austin; Tom H. Johnson, Round Rock; E. H. Golaz, Austin; Andy Byas, Fort Worth; Jow Jahne, Austin, and C. M. Cocconougher, Denton.

#### SIDEWALK AND RAILROAD TRACK JOBBERS MUST BE LICENSED.

The attention of the Federal Food Administrator has been called to the fact that in some and probably all of the cities of Texas parties are engaged in the business of buying up rejected shipments of commodities, or buying directly from producers, and selling the same to retailers on sidewalks or at the railroad tracks.

All persons so engaged are jobbers, the Administration announces, and if the commodity handled is one licensed under the president's proclamation, such handling can not be legally done without a license issued by the United States Food Administration. Those who contemplate continuing or engaging in such business practice hereafter will do well to apply immediately to the License Division of the U. S. Food Administration at Washington for a license.

Anyone engaging hereafter in such a business without having previously obtained or applied for a license will be liable to criminal prosecution of a serious character.

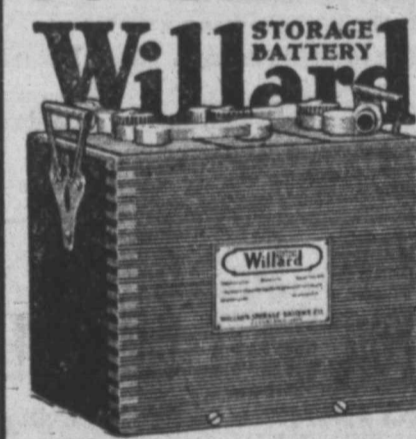
