In the past few months Fort Worth has seemingly had a change of heart in her attitude toward the development of West Texas and has taken great interest in the organizing of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

With the development of great oil fields out in the West Texas country, she is even trying to claim "kin" to us.

Up here in the Panhandle, that wonderful piece of philanthropy, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce—originated in Ft. Worth and controlled and officered by that city—has been looked upon as a huge joke.

Moreover, that city's claim to belonging to West Texas is so far-fetched that it is really ludicrous. Unless Ft. Worth has moved since we last looked at a map, it is somewhere 'round a hundred miles east of the CENTER of Texas.

Ft. Worth is a perfectly good town and all Texans are willing to "point with pride" to its remarkable growth but like all the rest of East Texas, it thinks that West Texas was created and exists by grace of its good will and for the purpose of contributing to its exchequer.

Mr. Morris R. Locke, of Colorado, strikes the keynote in an article which appeared in last week's issue of the Colorado Record. He says:

"It is all right for Fort Worth to originate and organize and set in motion the 'West Texas Chamber of Commerce' with as many counties of West Texas as members as possible and collect from these counties the sum of \$5,000 or more, for their membership, and let them elect one delegate apiece, and the whole to be controlled by the 'charter members' so-called.

The Warrant for High Wages

It would probably contribute something toward the solution of the labor problem to dismiss the idea of a general reduction of wages at an early day. Prices and values are inflated, and this is as true of wages as it is of everything else. But the inflation of wages has mostly followed, and very little preceded the inflation of prices of the products of labor. High wages are much more the effect than the cause of the high cost of living.

The war likewise caused a great expansion of credit, which, quite as inevitably, also had the effect of enhancing the prices of the things which are essential to existence. Another cause, and probably a larger one than most of us like to think, has been profiteering.

In his report to Dr. Mott, Chaplain Edrop said: "I have examined the written complaints of overseas Y. M. C. A. service in an effort to determine the specific nature of the soldiers' grievances. In addition I have personally interviewed overseas soldiers."

"By the very nature of such an investigation as I have been able to make, it is only possible to obtain one side of the story completely, namely, the complainants'. The remoteness of the individuals complained of has made it impossible to obtain their replies to the charges, although the official Y. M. C. A. view has been available in some instances.

"I, therefore, again call upon the people of the United States to make even more generous contributions than they have made heretofore to help re-establish these ancient and sorely oppressed people in their former homes on a self-supporting basis."

Weekly Financial Review

A general outline of development in the field of Federal Reserve banking during the calendar year 1918 is presented by the Federal Reserve banking during the calendar year, 1918, is presented by the Federal Reserve Board's weekly statement of condition of the reserve banks on the last Friday in 1918 and 1917.

Some indication of the growth of the system is afforded by the comparative figures of paid-in capital, which shows an increase of over 10 millions, from \$70,442,000 to \$80,881,000, representing an increase in the aggregate capital and surplus of member banks of \$341,300,000, practically all of which is due to the acquisition of new members during the year.

Gross deposits of the reserve banks shows an increase from 1,771 to 2,312.5 millions, the largest increases under this general head being shown for members' reserve deposits and foreign Government credits. Net deposits indicate a much smaller growth because of the reduction in Government deposits and the larger "float" carried at present by the reserve banks.

Holdings of Treasury certificates decreased 2.8 millions at all reporting banks. United States bonds, rather than circulation bonds, show an increase for the week of 32.2 millions, substantial gains being reported by both reserve city and country banks.

War paper, i. e., loans secured by Government war obligations, increased 8 millions, largely at banks outside reserve cities. All other loans and investments decreased 77.7 millions.

SOLDIERS ACCUSE Y. M. C. A. OF EXCESSIVE OVERCHARGES

Complaints or returning soldiers about overcharges in Y. M. C. A. canteens will be investigated through army channels. This decision has been reached by Chief Executive Dr. John R. Mott as a result of a report submitted to him by Chaplain P. T. Edrop. Those complaints that are specific will be referred to Third Assistant Secretary of War Frederick P. Keppel, with the request that they be investigated through the Inspector General's department, A. E. F.

Upon receiving Chaplain Edrop's report, Dr. Mott said that the Y. M. C. A. would pursue the policy of perfect frankness. In a public address Dr. Mott said:

"We want to know all our shortcomings, both of omission and commission, so that as far as possible they may be corrected. Y. M. C. A. WAR COUNCIL BUYS 1,800 PHONOGRAPHS

Music, that played such a prominent part in the winning of the war, promises to be of even greater value during the period of demobilization of the fighting forces, according to reports from the equipment department of the Y. M. C. A. War Council. That Department has just placed an order for 350 pianos; 500 portable organs and 1,800 phonographs. As an indication of the use to which those phonographs will be placed 694 needles will be sent along with each phonograph.

That Johnny before he comes marching home, is not to be forced to keep warm by stamping his feet in time with the music is shown by the purchase by the same department of 2,500 heating and cooking stoves. For the inner man there will be the service of 3,500 hot drink boilers and immense quantities of stew pans, soup, chocolate canteens and the like. And to clean up after him the department has provided 4,000 brooms, 5,000 galvanized pails and 2,000 dish pans. Added to these totals are 8,000 tables, 1,600 benches and 10,000 chairs to replace similar articles that have cracked under the strain.

The 'Y' officials have not been found wanting in preparations for a cold winter, as is proved by the order of 50,000 blankets, 4,000 cots and 2,500 mattresses. Most of this equipment will be distributed among the various leave resorts to which the American fighting man goes when relieved from military duty.
