Senate Joint Resolution No. 13.
A resolution to amend Section 5 Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows: Strike out the words "Four Thousand," found in the third line of Section 5, and insert in lieu thereof the words "Ten Thousand," and adding after the word "furniture" the words, "and this clause shall be self-enacting," and making an appropriation to pay necessary expenses hereof.

Be it Resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section No. 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 5. ARTICLE IV. GOVERNOR'S SALARY AND MANSION. He shall at stated times receive as compensation for his service an annual salary of ten thousand dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, and this clause shall be self-enacting.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1919, same being the twenty-fourth day of May, A. D. 1919, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to make the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same duly published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State and the official ballot shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the words, "OFFICIAL BALLOT," and also the words, "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and also the words, "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas."

All voters favoring such amendment shall erase, by making a mark through the words "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and all voters opposing such amendment shall erase, by making a mark through the words "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," if a majority of votes cast shall be "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes cast shall be "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas,"

State of Texas," said amendment shall be so declared.

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary to cover the necessary expenses attached to the proclamation and publication of this amendment, and the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation and cause the same to be duly published.

Amarillo people were struck dumb with amazement, last Monday morning, when the report was circulated that Max Goodman, for so many years connected with the Fair Store here, was dead. It was unbelievable and yet, but too true.

Mr. Goodman dropped dead in his room as he was getting ready to go to the store as usual, that morning. A brief service was conducted in the little chapel at the Griggs Undertaking Parlors and the remains were taken to Ft. Worth for burial.

Mr. Goodman had a wide acquaintance over the Panhandle country, having been manager of the dry goods department of the Fair store for years and always alert to see that customers were promptly and satisfactorily served.

PRESIDENT ANSWERS CRITICS OF LEAGUE

Boston, Mass.—President Wilson and party landed at Commonwealth pier at about noon Monday, and following the grand reception of the people of Boston the president came to Mechanic's hall in the afternoon to take up the battle for a league of nations.

This speech, the first direct answer to opponents of the league in the senate, was planned to lay the background for American support of his program.

TEXT OF SPEECH.

"Governor Coolidge, Mr. Mayor, Fellow Citizens:

"I wonder if you are half as glad to see me as I am to see you. (Applause. A voice, "You bet!"). It warms my heart to see a great body of my fellow-citizens again, because in some respects during recent months I have been very lonely indeed without comradeship and counsel, and I tried at every step of the work which fell to me to recall what I was sure would be your counsel with regard to the great matters which were under consideration.

"I have not come to report the proceedings or the results of the proceedings of the peace conference; that would be premature.

"The conference seems to you to go slowly; from day to day in Paris it seems to go slowly; but I wonder if you realize the complexity of the task which it has undertaken. It seems as if the settlements of this war affect, and affect directly every great and, I sometimes think, every small nation in the world; and no one decision can be made which is not properly linked in with the great series of other decisions which must accompany it, and it must be reckoned on with the final result if the real quality and character of that result is to be properly judged.

"What we are doing is to hear the whole case. Hear it from the mouths of the men most interested; hear it from those who are officially commissioned to state the claims that affect new nationalities, that affect new areas of the world, that affect new commercial and economic connections that have been established by the great world war through which we have gone. And I have been struck by the moderateness of those who have presented national claims. I can testify that I have nowhere seen the gleam of passion.

"I have seen earnestness. I have seen tears come to the eyes of men who pleaded for downtrodden peoples for whom they were delighted to speak. But they were not the tears of anger; they were the tears of ardent hope.

"I don't see how any man can fail to have been subdued by these pleas; subdued to the feeling, that he was not there to assert an individual judgment of his own, but to try to assist the cause of humanity.

"And in the midst of it all every interest seeks out, first of all when it reaches Paris, the representatives of the United States. Why? Because—and I think I am stating the most wonderful fact in history—because there is no nation in Europe that suspects the motives of the United States.

"Was ever so wonderful a thing seen before? Was there ever so moving a thing? Was there ever any fact that so bound the nation that had won that esteem forever to deserve it?

"I would not have you understand that the great men who represent the other nations there in conference are disesteemed by those who know them. Quite the contrary. But you understand the countries of Europe have again and again clashed with another in competitive interests. It is impossible for men to forget the sharp issues that were drawn between them in times past.

"They resort to that nation which has won the enviable distinction of being regarded as the friend of mankind.

"Whenever it is desired to send a small force of soldiers to occupy a piece of territory where it is thought nobody else will be welcome, they ask for American soldiers. And where other soldiers would be looked on with suspicion and perhaps met with resistance, the American soldiers are welcomed with acclaim.

"I have had so many grounds for pride on the other side of the water that I am very thankful that they are not grounds for personal pride, but for national pride. If they were grounds for personal pride I'd be the most stuck up man in the world. And it has been an infinite pleasure of ours of whom the constitution of the United States made me the proud commander. You may be proud of the Twenty-Sixth Division (laughter and applause), and see what they did under my direction! And everybody praises the American soldier with the feeling that in praising him he is subtracting from the credit of no one else.

"I have been searching for the fundamental fact that converted Europe to believe in us. Before this war Europe did not believe in us as she does now. She did not believe in us throughout the first three years of the war. She seems really to have believed that we were holding off because we thought we could make more by staying out than by going in. And all of a sudden, a short eighteen months, the whole story is reversed. There can be but one explanation for it. They saw we did—that without making a single claim we put all our men and all our means at the disposal

of those who were fighting for their homes, in the first instance, but for a cause—the cause of human right and justice—and that we went in, not to support their national claims, but to support the great cause which they held in common.

"And when they saw that America not only held ideals, but acted ideals, they were converted to America and became firm partisans of those ideals.

"I met a group of scholars when I was in Paris, some gentlemen from one of the Greek universities who had come to see me and in whose presence, rather than in the presence of those traditions of learning, I felt very young indeed. I told them that I had one of the delightful revenges that sometimes comes to man. All my life I have heard men speak with a sort of condescension of idealists, and particularly of those separate, enclosed persons whom they choose to term academic, who were in the habit of uttering ideals in the free atmosphere when they clash with nobody in particular.

"And I have said I have this sweet revenge. Speaking with perfect frankness in the name of the United States, I have uttered, as the objects of this war, ideals and nothing but ideals, and the war has been won by that inspiration. Men fought with tense muscles and lowered head until they came to realize those things, feeling they were fighting for their lives and their country, and when these accents of what it was all about reached them from America, they lifted their heads, they raised their eyes to heaven; then they saw men in khaki coming across the sea in the spirit of crusaders, and they found that these were strange men, reckless of danger, not only reckless, but because they seemed to see something that made danger worth while. Men have testified to me in Europe that these men were possessed by something they could not call only religious fervor. They were not like any of the other soldiers. They had a vision, they had a dream, and they were fighting in the dream, and fighting in the dream they turned the whole tide of battle, and it never came back.

"And now do you realize this confidence we have established throughout the world imposes a burden upon us? If you choose to call it a burden. It is one of those burdens which any nation ought to be proud to carry. Any man who resists the present tides that run in the world will find himself thrown upon a shore so high and barren that it will seem that he had been separated from his human kind forever.

"I invite him to test the sentiments of the nation. We set this nation up to make men free and we did not confine our conception and purpose to America and now we will make men free. If we did not do that all the fame of America would be gone and all her power would be dissipated. She would then have to keep her power for these narrow, selfish, provincial purposes which seem so dear to some minds, that have no sweep beyond the nearest horizon. I should welcome no sweeter challenge than it. I have fighting blood in me and it is sometimes a delight to let it have scope, but if it is a challenge on this occasion, it will be indulgence. Think of the picture; think of the utter blackness that would fall on the world. America has failed; America made a (Continued on page six)



PAY AND FILE INCOME TAX BEFORE MAR. 15

U. S. Internal Revenue Bureau Gives Warning That Severe Penalties Will Be Enforced.

WOMEN WITHIN LAW'S SCOPE; HOW THEY REPORT INCOME

The Income Tax drive comes to a close on Saturday night, March 15. All payments and returns due on that date under the provisions of the new Revenue Law must be in the hands of local Internal Revenue Collectors before their offices close that night.

The Income Tax is being collected to meet the war expenses. Every person who shouted and tooted his horn on Armistice Day is now called upon to contribute his share of the cost of winning the war.

The laggards and the dodgers will face severe fines and jail sentences. The Internal Revenue Bureau announces that its officers will check us all up to see that every person who comes within the scope of the Income Tax law did his share.

Where to Pay and File.

Residents of Texas are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex., or to deputy collectors who are now doing free advisory work on Income Tax.

Payments sent by mail should be attached to the returns and should be in the form of check, money order or draft. Cash payments by mail are sent at the taxpayer's risk of loss.

If you are unable to make your return personally because of illness, absence or incapacity, an agent or legal representative may make your return.

If there are any doubtful points as to your items of income or allowable deductions, you should get in touch at once with a Revenue officer or a banker for advice.

Women Pay Tax.

Women are subject to all the requirements of the Income Tax. Whether single or married, a woman's income from all sources must be considered.

If unmarried, or if living apart from her husband, she must make her return for 1918 if her net income was \$1,000 or over.

If married and living with her husband, her income must be considered with the husband's in determining the liability for a return. Their joint income, less the credits allowed by law, is subject to normal tax. The wife's net income is considered separately in computing any surtax that may be due. Husband and wife file jointly, as a rule. If the husband does not include his wife's income in his return, the wife must file a separate return.

Severe Penalties.

The new Revenue Law places severe penalties on a person who fails to make return on time, refuses to make return or renders a fraudulent return. For failure to make return and pay tax on time a fine of not more than \$1,000 is named, and 25 per cent of the tax due is added to the assessment. For refusing wilfully to make return, or for making a false or fraudulent return there is a fine of not exceeding \$10,000 and imprisonment of not exceeding one year, or both.

Farmers' Income Taxable.

Every farmer and ranchman who had a fair or a good year in 1918 must head the Income Tax this year. He must consider all his income as taxable. He is entitled to deduct from his gross income all amounts expended in carrying on his farm. The cost of farm machinery, farm buildings and improvements cannot be deducted. The cost of live stock, either for resale or for breeding purposes, is also regarded as investment.

Overtime and Bonus Taxed.

Salary and wage earners must consider as taxable every item received from employers and from other sources. Bonuses and overtime pay are to be reported, as well as the regular payments.

Allowances for Losses.

Losses sustained in 1918 and not covered by insurance are deductible items if incurred in the taxpayer's business or trade, in any transaction undertaken for profit, or arising from fire, storm, shipwreck or other casualty, or from theft.

* "Abatement petitions are dealt with open-mindedly. Refunds will be made in every case where too much tax is erroneously collected."

Oil News.

Stephenson Brothers, lumber dealers of Tulsa and Happy, and Cashier Morgan, of the Happy First State Bank, were in Amarillo, Monday, closing a contract for the material for the drilling rig which will be placed on Section 34, Block M6, near Happy, by the Happy Oil & Gas Company.

George A. Whittenberg of Plemons, is reported to be making a contract for a deep test on his ranch near Plemons in Hutchinson county.

Material is being hauled for a drilling rig which is to put a test hole down on the Ed Deal ranch in the north part of Carson county. The material is being unloaded at St. Francis on the Santa Fe railroad.

The Big Cabin Oil Company, which has been operating in eastern Oklahoma for more than two years, has decided to do some wild-cating in the Amarillo field. James Beal, of Vinita, Okla., will do the drilling and has already arrived in the city.

At a meeting of the directors of the Big Cabin Oil Co., Monday night the exact place of starting their first test well for oil was decided upon and as near as has been made public, the first well will be within a radius of fifteen miles of Amarillo.

D. C. Trigg & Sons, one of the biggest cattle concerns in the Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico, have recently contracted for two tests, one in New Mexico and the other sixteen miles north of Amarillo. The latter well is to be started by July 1.

C. H. Lockhart, a rancher north of Pampa in Roberts county, is reported to have let a contract for a test hole, work to be started as soon as material can be put on the ground.

A franchise has been granted the Buffalo Oil & Gas Development Company of Buffalo, N. Y., to furnish gas from the field to residents of Amarillo.

Charles N. Gould, the geologist who located the big gas well thirty miles north of the city, has returned here to make his home. He says that the Amarillo location is distinctive in that there has not been a dissenting opinion among more than a score of accredited geologists who have examined it, that this is one of the best oil structures in the Middle West.

Geologists of the Gulf Production Co., the Texas Company, the Empire Gas & Fuel Company, the Magnolia Petroleum Company and others, all of whom have leases here, join in the report that the structure is excellent. Gould says "there is an uplift of 500 feet in the Amarillo section. It sets up like a great turtle with warts on its back."

The activity in leases in this section has quieted down a little, much of the holdings having been taken off the market awaiting the actual spotting of the first few holes. As soon as work is actually commenced on drilling the excitement is expected to again reach the fever stage.

A deep test has been contracted for and located on section 125, southeast quarter, in block 6, 1 & G. N., twelve miles southeast of Amarillo in Randall county. This well will be spudded in right in the bottom of the canyon and work is to begin immediately under direct supervision of the trustees of the Palo Duro Oil Company.

Irrigation Projects in Colorado.

There are now in Colorado eleven completed irrigation districts in good financial condition ready to supply water to farmers at rates much better than reasonable when results are taken into consideration. In Montrose, Costilla, Crowley, Morgan, Logan, Weld and Mesa counties alone there are 154,823 acres of fine land waiting the hand of the cultivator. Every acre of this land is included in government projects. In the Uncompahgre valley reclamation of the United States government water is now ready for 40,000 acres of uncultivated land and 80,000 more are to be included at an early date. The project is planned to cover 80,000 acres, of which only 60,000 are now being farmed. The Grand valley district offers 26,000 acres for which water is immediately available. Completion of the system will put 18,000 more acres at the disposal of the settlers. Of this only 9,000 acres are being cultivated at present. In addition to these completed or partially completed projects there are twenty-three irrigation plans ready

for active launching, on ten of which work has actually begun. The whole state needs to take on an enthusiastic energy to increase our irrigation facilities.—Field and Farm.

Non-Essentials.
 (By Phebe K. Warner)
 The soldier was writing to his father and said: "Dear Dad, I hope you won't mind my bringing home my pal from the front. We are both on a furlough together." The answer was, "No son; but where's he from; what's his politics, his religion, his college and his family?" To which his true American son answered: "You ask him, Dad; we've been so busy fighting Fritz I never had time to find out."

Do you suppose we will ever get so busy in our towns and cities and counties, fighting the various Fritzes, that we will forget to ask one another what party, what church, what society, what family is doing it?
 As a nation of intelligent human beings we stand today united on the essential things of life. But we are so shattered and scattered, so disjointed and divided, so cranky and stubborn about the nonessential that most of our energy is wasted combating one another. As a Nation we believe, first of all, in God. We are recognized both at home and abroad as a Christian Nation. There is, not a man or woman in America with ordinary common sense that does not believe there is a Power takes care of every bird and gives life to every flower. But we are so torn up and tempest-tossed by our doctrines; we are taught so many different things about the same thing that it is almost impossible for us to work together on anything. As a result one-half of the American people will not unite with any religious organization. Religion (or rather religious beliefs) that something which we say and sing, "will make us love everybody," and bring us all together is not only holding cities and states and nations apart, but it comes between the members of the same family. Yet we all believe in the same God, the same Savior, the same ten commandments, the same Golden Rule and the same Bible. But we have different ideas as to whether we would sit, stand or kneel when we pray. We have different notions about who should take the sacrament and how the preach-

er should be selected and the quantity of water necessary to wash away our sins.
 If you want to get a real clear idea of how important these items are in the eyes of the world, ask some groceryman, not a minister, what he thinks about it. Invariably he will tell you if a man pays his grocery bill it makes little difference to him how he prays; and if he does not pay his grocery bill, deliberately refuses to meet his financial obligations, it matters less what his religious views are. In other words, the world at large regards honesty far a surer sign of Christianity than a whole volume of forms and creeds and doctrines with honesty left out.
 As a republic we all believe in democracy, in liberty, in freedom. But we have such diverging notions as to what democracy and liberty means that we have been fighting each other for more than fifty years and there are still thirty-three men in the United States that do not seem to know what it is. They think democracy is a pronoun, first person, singular number, masculine gender, because it stands for man. As a result fifty years of progress have been lost fighting nonessentials instead of working together on the essential things in our national life. Health and happiness, education, industry, Christianity and liberty are a few of the essentials in our national life. Why in the name of the Stars and Stripes don't we work together to realize these things for ourselves and our children as our men have worked together on the fields of France for a better world? What a glorious Nation we would be, what a happy Nation we would be, what a healthy Nation we would soon be if we would throw all our forces for good together and go after sin and disease like our boys went after Fritz. But instead we stop so often to ask who is he? or who is she? What is his politics? What is her religion? And the sad part is so often the answer is, "If she don't belong to my set I'll not have anything to do with her. And if he does not believe like I do, I will not only refuse to work with him, but I'll do my best to defeat his purpose." Suppose Pershing and Foch had acted like that. The trouble with most of us is, we have never yet been in dead earnest about our work. We have thought more of ourselves and our job and our special set than we have of humanity. When we get in earnest about our business we, too, will forget the nonessentials.

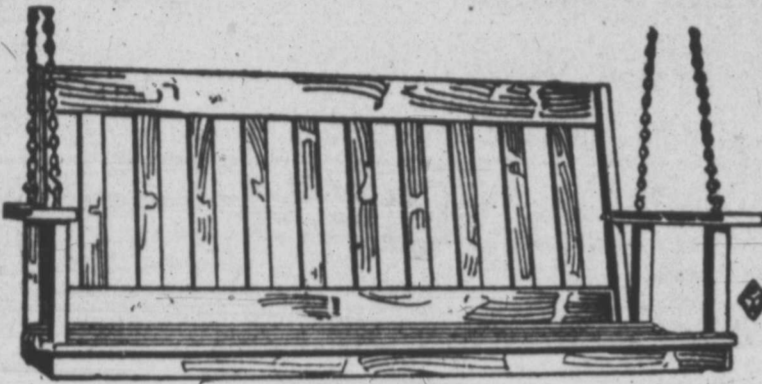

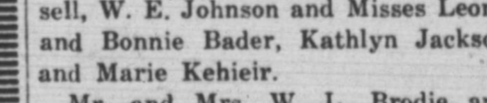

PRESIDENT ANSWERS CRITICS OF LEAGUE

(Continued from Page Two)

little essay at generosity then withdrew. America said, 'We are your friends,' but it was only for today, not for tomorrow. America said, 'Here is our power to indicate right,' and then the next day said, 'Let right take care of itself and we will take care of ourselves.' America said, 'We set up a light to lead men along the paths of liberty, but we have lowered it, it is indeed only to light our path.' We set up a great ideal of liberty and then we said, 'Liberty is a thing that you must win yourself. Do not call upon us.' And think of the world that we would leave.

"Do you realize how many nations are going to be set up in the present of old and new powerful nations in Europe and left there, if left by us, without a disinterested friend?"

"Do you believe in the Polish cause as I do? Are you going to set up Poland, immature, inexperienced, as yet unorganized, and leave her with a circle of armies around her? Do you believe in the aspirations of the Czechs-Slovaks and the Jugo Slavs as I do? Do you know how many powers would be quick to pounce upon them if there were not the guarantees of the world behind their liberty?"

"Have you thought of the sufferings of Armenia? You poured out your money to help succor Armenians after they suffered; now set up your strength so that they shall never suffer again."

"The arrangement of the present peace can not be standardized unless they are guaranteed by the united forces of the civilized world. And if we do not guarantee them, can you not see the picture? Your hearts have instructed where the burden of this war fell. It did not fall upon the national treasuries, it did not fall upon the instruments of administration; it did not fall upon the resources of the nations. It fell upon the voiceless homes everywhere, where women were toiling in hope that their men would come back. When I think of the homes upon which dull despair would settle if this great hope is disappointed, I should wish for my part never to have had America play any part whatever in this attempt to emancipate the world. But I talk as if there was any question. I have no doubt of the verdict of America in this matter. I have no more doubt of the verdict of America in this matter than I have doubt of the blood that is in me."

"The Europe that I left the other day was full of something it had never felt fill his heart so full before. It was full of hope."

"The Europe of the second year of the war, the Europe of the third year of the war, was sinking to a sort of stubborn despair. They did not see any great thing to be achieved even when the war should be won. They hoped there would be some salve; they hoped that they could clear their territories of invading armies; they hoped they could set up their homes and start their industries afresh. But they thought it would simply be a resumption of the old life that Europe had led—led in fear, led in anxiety, led in constant, suspicious watchfulness. They never dreamed that it would be a Europe of settled peace and justified peace."

"And now those ideals have wrought this new magic—that all the peoples of Europe are buoyed up and confident in the spirit of hope, because they believe we are at the eve of a new age in the world when nations will understand one another, when nations will support one another in every just cause, when nations unite everywhere with every physical strength to see that the right shall prevail."

"If America were, at this juncture, to fail the world, what would come of it? I do not mean any disrespect to any other great people when I say that America is the hope of the world and if she does not justify that hope, the results are unthinkable. Men will be thrown back upon the bitterness of disappointment, not only the bitterness of despair. All nations will be set up as hostile camps again; the men at the peace conference will go home with their heads upon their breasts, knowing that they have failed—for they were bidden not to come home from there until they did something more than sign a treaty of peace."

"Suppose we sign the treaty of peace and that it is the most satisfactory treaty of peace that the confusing elements of the modern world will afford and go home and think about our labors, we will know that we have left written upon the historic table at Versailles, upon which Vergennes and Franklin wrote their names, nothing but a modern scrap of paper; no nations united to defend it; great forces combined to make it good; no assurance given to the downtrodden and fearful people of the world that they shall be safe. Any man who thinks that America will take part in giving the world any such rebuff and disappointment as that does not know America."

"And so, my fellow citizens, I have come back to report progress and I do not believe that the progress is going to stop short of the goal. The nations of the world have set their hearts now to do a great thing and they are not going to slacken their purpose. And when I speak for nations of the world, I do not speak of the governments of the world. I speak of the peoples who constitute the nations of the world. They are in the saddle, and they are going to see to it that if present governments do not do their will some other gov-

ernments will, and the secret is out and the present governments know it.

"There is a great deal of harmony to be gotten out of common knowledge. There is a great deal of sympathy to be gotten out of living in the same atmosphere and except for the differences of languages, which puzzled my American ear very sadly, I could have believed I was at home in France, or in Italy, or in England, when I was on the streets, when I was in the presence of the crowds, when I was in great halls, where men were gathered together, irrespective of class."

"I do not feel quite as much at home there as I do at home, but I feel now that at any rate, after this storm of the war has cleared the air, men were seeing eye to eye everywhere and that these were the kind of folks who would understand what the kind of folks at home would understand, that they were thinking the same thing."

"I feel about you as I am reminded of a story of that excellent wit and good artist, Oliver Herford, who one day sitting at luncheon at his club, was slapped vigorously in the back by a man whom he did not know very well. He said, 'Oliver, old boy, how are you?' He looked at him rather coldly. He said, 'I don't know your name; I don't know your face, but your manners are very familiar.' And I must say that your manners are very familiar and let me add, very delightful."

"It is a great comfort, for one thing, to realize that you all understand the language I am speaking. A friend of mine said that to talk through an interpreter was like witnessing the compound fracture of an idea. But the beauty of it is that, whatever the impediments of the channel of communication, the idea is the same, that it gets registered, and it gets registered in responsive purposes."

New Holsteins In The 40-Lb. List.

With the testing season in full swing the reports coming from the office of the Superintendent of Advanced Registry are extremely interesting. Nine new 7-day butter records each over 40 lbs. have been reported in the past few weeks. Five of these famous Holsteins were bred in New York state, one in Illinois, one in Iowa, one in Massachusetts, and one in Minnesota. The ages of the cows vary, one being three years old; three are 4-year-olds; one is five years, and four are six years of age. These nine Holsteins produced in one week under strictly official test 6,009.4 pounds of milk containing fat equal to 368.85 pounds butter. Practically all of them are showing up equally well in their 30-day tests; Rag Apple Aggie Colantha, the Massachusetts 4-year-old, produced just over 164 pounds during that period. Adirondac Wietske Dairy Maid, with her 41 pounds 7-day butter record, is the highest 7-day butter cow developed in California, while Katie Paul Burke (44.61 lbs.) displaces the former world's champion junior 4-year-old, Lady Netherland Pontiac, whose record for 7 days is 43.59 pounds butter.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Prohibiting the Manufacture and Sale of Intoxicating Liquors.

House Joint Resolution No. 1. A resolution proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20 thereof by striking out and repealing said section and substituting in lieu thereof a new Section 20, prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter or exchange in the State of Texas of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, except for medicinal purposes, scientific or sacramental purposes, and providing that the Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this section; providing that until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different regulations on the subject of the sale of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, for medicinal purposes shall be made only in cases of actual sickness, and then only upon prescription of a regular practicing physician, subject to certain regulations with reference to the same; providing that this amendment shall be self-operative, and until the Legislature shall provide other or different penalties, the violation of any part of this constitutional provision shall be deemed a felony punishable by confinement in the penitentiary for a term of years specified, without the benefit of any law providing for suspended sentence; conferring authority upon District Courts and judges thereof, under their equity power, to issue upon suit of the Attorney General or threatened infractions of any part of this constitutional provision; providing that, without affecting the provisions herein, intoxicating liquors are declared to be subject to the general police power of the State; declaring that the Legislature shall have power to pass any additional prohibitory laws in aid thereof which it may deem advisable; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment and prescribing certain rules and regulations with reference to the same; declaring that the provisions of the General Election Law shall govern in all respects as to qualification of electors and method of holding the election and in all other respects where applicable; directing proclamation for the election and making certain provisions for the election and ballots thereof and method of voting; prescribing certain duties for the Governor of the State; and making appropriation to carry out this resolution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out and repealing Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu of said Section 20 the following:

Section 20. (a) - The manufacture, sale, barter and exchange in the State of Texas, of spirituous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes, are each and all hereby prohibited.

The Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this section. (b) Until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different regulations on the subject, the sale of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, for medicinal purposes shall be made only in cases of actual sickness, and then only upon the prescription of a regular practicing physician, subject to the regulations applicable to sales under prescriptions in prohibited territory by virtue of

Article 598, Chapter 7, Title 11, of the Penal Code of the State of Texas.

(c) This amendment is self-operative, and until the Legislature shall prescribe other or different penalties, any person, acting for himself or in behalf of another, or in behalf of any partnership, corporation or association of persons, who shall, after the adoption of this amendment, violate any part of this constitutional provision shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and shall, upon conviction in a prosecution commenced, carried on and concluded in the manner prescribed by law in cases of felonies, be punished by confinement in the penitentiary for a period of time not less than one year nor more than five years, without the benefit of any law providing for suspended sentence. And the district courts and the judges thereof, under their equity powers, shall have the authority to issue, upon suit of the Attorney General, injunctions against infractions or threatened infractions of any part of this constitutional provision.

(d) Without affecting provisions herein, intoxicating liquors are declared to be subject to the general police power of the State; and the Legislature shall have the power to pass any additional prohibitory laws, or laws in aid thereof, which it may deem advisable.

(e) Liability for violating any liquor laws in force at the time of the adoption of this amendment shall not be affected by this amendment, and all remedies, civil and criminal, for such violations shall be preserved.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May, being the twenty-fourth day thereof, A. D. 1919. At said election, the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words "Official Ballot." Said ballot shall have also written or printed thereon the words, "For Prohibition," and the words, "Against Prohibition."

All voters favoring said proposed amendment shall erase the words "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same, and those opposing it shall erase the words, "For Prohibition," by making a mark through the same.

If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition," said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes shall be "Against Prohibition," said amendment shall be lost, and so declared.

All the provisions of the General Election Laws as amended and in force at the time of said election shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and all other respects, so far as such election laws can be made applicable.

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for and Relating to Equal Suffrage.

(Senate Joint Resolution No. 7) Proposing: to amend Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas so that it shall hereafter, in substance, provide that every person, male or female, subject to no

constitutional disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall reside in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; declaring that the electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; providing that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he or she shall offer to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that poll tax has been paid before the first day of February next preceding such election; declaring that if said voter shall have lost or misplaced such tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote, upon making affidavit that such tax receipt has been lost, which affidavit must be in writing and left with the judge of the election. And declaring that all laws now on the statutes relating to qualified voters and governing and regulating elections shall apply to male and female voters alike; and all laws relating to elections shall remain in full force and effect until changed or modified by the Legislature, and declaring that this amendment to the Constitution shall be self-enacting. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter said section shall read as follows, to-wit:

Section 2. Every person, male or female, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he or she offers to vote at any election in the State and hold a receipt showing such poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. All laws now on the statutes of this State relating to and relating to qualified voters in both primary and general elections shall apply to all and govern and regulate both male and female voters, and shall be in effect until such statutes are changed or amended by the Legislature. And this amendment to the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held for such purpose on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1919, the same being the twenty-fourth day of said month; at said election, the votes shall be placed on an official ballot which shall have printed, or written, thereon the words, "For the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the

State of Texas, providing qualifications for male and female voters," and also the words, "Against the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas." All voters favoring this proposed constitutional amendment shall erase the words "Against the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas," and those opposing it shall erase the words, "For the amendment to Section 2, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas,"

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

GEO. F. HOWARD, Secretary of State. (A true copy.)

Section 4. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election. GEO. F. HOWARD, Secretary of State. (A true copy.)

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Giving the Legislature Power to Give or Lend, or Authorize the Giving or Lending, of the Credit of the State for the Purpose of Assisting Citizens, Heads of Families, to Acquire or Improve Their Homes.

(House Joint Resolution No. 19) To amend Section 50, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide that the Legislature shall have power to give or lend, or authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting citizens who are heads of families to acquire or improve their homes; authorizing the State to acquire, improve, sell or lease real estate or assist such citizens to acquire or improve their homes upon terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature; authorizing the Legislature to create such agencies as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this section; providing that obligations created under this section shall never be taxed; and providing that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a method of securing any deferred payments for lands purchased hereunder, and that such obligations shall be secured in addition to the usual liens by an annual assessment collected as a tax against the land; and providing that the Legislature shall have no power to relieve any person from any obligation entered into under this provision or any statute enacted thereunder; and providing for the classification of lands acquired under this Act, and limiting acreage sold to any one person whose lands are classed as agricultural.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 50, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:

Section 50. The Legislature shall have no power to give or lend, or

to authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State in aid of or to any person, association, or corporation, whether municipal or other, or to pledge the credit of the State in any manner whatsoever, for the payment of the liabilities, present or prospective, of any individual, association of individuals, municipalities or other corporation, whatsoever, except that the Legislature shall have the power to give or lend, or to authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the State for the purpose of assisting native born or naturalized citizens who are heads of families and who will become in good faith actual occupants, to acquire or improve their homes; and for this purpose the State is authorized to acquire, improve, sell or lease real estate or assist such citizens to acquire or improve their homes upon such terms and conditions and in such manner and subject to such limitations as the Legislature may from time to time prescribe. Provided that no land shall be acquired by the State under the terms of this amendment to the Constitution until the said lands are examined, and the value of said lands is appraised and ascertained as to its actual value for agricultural purposes, by a commission hereby authorized, composed of the Governor, Attorney General, Land Commissioner, Comptroller of Public Accounts and the State Treasurer; and their report shall be available to all prospective land purchasers. The Legislature shall have authority to create by law such agencies as may be deemed necessary to effect the purposes of this Act. Obligations created under this section shall never be taxed, and the Legislature shall have authority to provide a method of securing deferred payments for lands purchased hereunder, and in addition to the usual liens may secure the same by an annual assessment collected as a tax against the land; provided, however, the Legislature shall have no power to relieve any person from any obligation entered into with the State under this provision or any statute enacted hereunder. The terms of this Act shall not apply, or be extended to any person who is not a bona fide resident citizen of the State of Texas and who has not been such citizen at least two years prior to the extension of such aid, nor shall the terms of this Act ever be applied to any lands outside of the State of Texas. Provided further that all land acquired by the State under the provisions of this section for which the State may lend its credit shall be classed as agricultural lands or otherwise, and if classed as agricultural lands, then no more than 200 acres shall be sold to any one person under the provisions hereof.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the 24th day of May, A. D. 1919, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 50, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE POWER TO GIVE OR LEND, OR AUTHORIZE THE GIVING OR LENDING OF THE CREDIT OF THE STATE FOR THE PURPOSE OF ASSISTING CITIZENS WHO ARE HEADS OF FAMILIES TO ACQUIRE OR IMPROVE THEIR HOMES."

All voters favoring said proposed amendment shall erase the words "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 50, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE POWER TO GIVE OR LEND, OR AUTHORIZE THE GIVING OR LENDING OF THE CREDIT OF THE STATE FOR THE PURPOSE OF ASSISTING CITIZENS WHO ARE HEADS OF FAMILIES TO ACQUIRE OR IMPROVE THEIR HOMES," and those opposing it shall erase the words, "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 50, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE POWER TO GIVE OR LEND, OR AUTHORIZE THE GIVING OR LENDING OF THE CREDIT OF THE STATE FOR THE PURPOSE OF ASSISTING CITIZENS WHO ARE HEADS OF FAMILIES TO ACQUIRE OR IMPROVE THEIR HOMES,"

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof, as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. GEORGE F. HOWARD, Secretary of State. (Attest: A true copy.)

Notice of Bond Election.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the court house of Potter County, Texas, in the town of Amarillo, within the Amarillo Independent School District on the 29th day of March, 1919, to determine whether the bonds of said district shall be issued to the amount of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00), payable forty years from their date and bearing interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public free school building of brick material and purchasing a site therefor, within said district, and whether there shall be annually levied, assessed and collected on all taxable property in said district for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

R. H. McAlpine has been appointed manager of said election, which shall be held as nearly as may be possible in conformity with the general election laws of the State. No person shall vote at said election unless he be a qualified voter under the constitution and laws of this State, and a taxpayer in said Amarillo Independent School District.

Those in favor of the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "FOR THE BONDS AND THE TAX"; and those against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "AGAINST THE BONDS AND TAX."

Said election was ordered by the Board of Trustees of said Amarillo Independent School District by order passed on the 21st day of February, 1919, and this notice is issued pursuant to said order. Dated this 24th day of February, 1919.

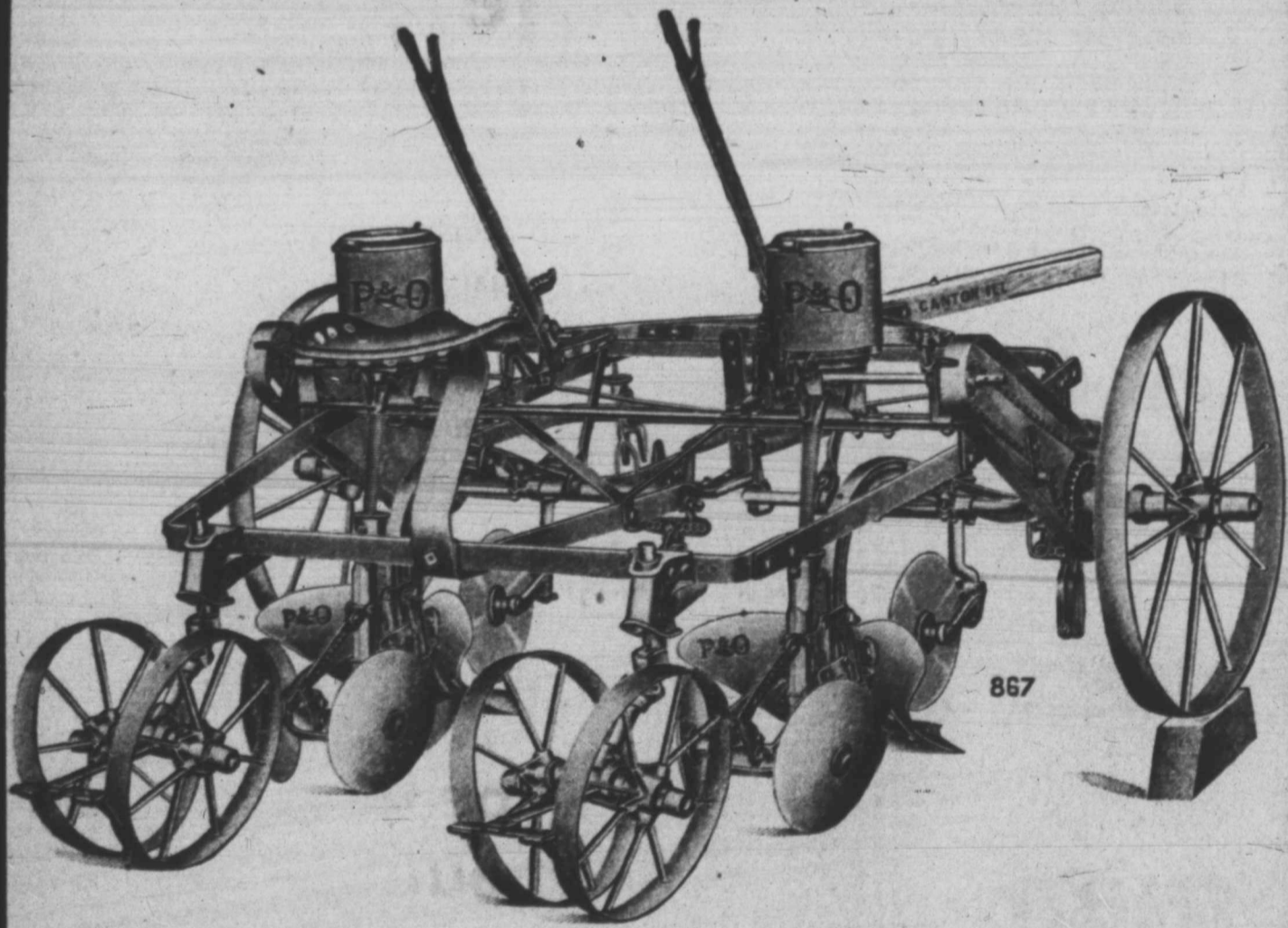
