## JULY FOURTH CELEBRATION TO BE IN CANYON

### PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR THE BIG CELEBRATION IN HONOR OF BOYS

Canyon and Randall County is preparing to give a monster celebration on July Fourth in honor of the boys who have returned from the service of Uncle Sam.

The Randall County Red Cross Chapter is in charge of the affair and is receiving the most hearty co-operation from all of the citizens of Randall County.

Every man who has served in the army and navy will be the guest of honor of the citizens of Randall County. They are asked to wear their uniforms.

The families of the men are urged to be present to assist in the monster welcome.

This will be the only public reception given in Randall County for the returning men, and the citizens are anxious to make it a great success. They want to show their appreciation for the work the boys have done.

A free canteen will be conducted for all men in uniform.

There will be a big parade in the morning.

A basket dinner will be served on the court house lawn.

There will be all kinds of stunts on the public square.

A ball game is scheduled for the Normal grounds.

A reception, program and dance will be given for the men at the Huntleigh Hall at night.

Preparations for the monster celebration and welcome to the returned soldiers and sailors is progressing rapidly. It is assured that no body of men who have served during the war will be given a heartier public reception than will those who have gone from their homes in Randall county. The Red Cross Chapter has charge of the enterprise, but all of the citizens of Randall county are taking an active interest in the welcome which will be given the boys. All over the United States the Fourth of July celebration will be turned into a day of welcome for the returned men, and Randall County wishes to make her welcome as hearty as any that will be extended on that day.

The Tucumcari Band will arrive in the morning and will give a concert. This is one of the very best bands in the country and will please all who attend the celebration.

At eleven o'clock the parade will start. R. A. Terrill is manager of the parade and reports plans nearly completed for this feature. Mrs. R. A. Stewart is assisting the business houses with suggestions regarding floats of which there will be more than twenty. Following these floats all auto-owners are asked to join, decorating their cars for the occasion. The soldiers and sailors will not be asked to join in the parade, but will form a reviewing party, the parade passing between two lines which will be drawn up. The parade will be completed by 12:30 at which time the dinner will be served on the court house lawn.

The dinner will be in the form of a basket dinner, each family bringing their baskets with plenty for themselves and extra for the guests. Tables will be provided by the committees of which T. C. Thompson is chairman so that the families may spread their dinner out in picnicking fashion.

During the afternoon R. A. Terrill will have a spirit program that will be unique and full of interest to all of the people.

At four o'clock the Canyon baseball team will take on the Happy White Sox. The Canyon bunch hasn't been together this year, but are now whipping themselves into condition, while the Happy Sox have been winning everything in sight and are bound to out-step the Canyonites. The game will be free to all.

During the entire day a canteen will be open free of charge to all men in uniform. The canteen will be in the court house.

Every man who has been in any branch of the service is requested to

wear his uniform as it will show the people who are the guests and will be a free passport wherever he goes.

The Red Cross Chapter has ordered gifts for every man who has been in the service. The gifts will be given the men during the day. Randall county sent 210 men into the service, ten of whom paid the supreme sacrifice.

At night a reception will be held at the Huntleigh Hall for all men and their wives or lady friends. No one else will be admitted. There will be a short program, followed by refreshments and dancing for those who wish to participate. Good music has been provided for the occasion.

This will be the only big public reception and welcome for the returning men, and the Red Cross Chapter hopes that all of our citizens will cooperate in making it a great success.

#### Lumber Will Be Very Scarce.

The ending of the war will by no means lessen the demands for lumber, but prospects are that lumber will be scarcer than ever and much harder to get for several years. Uncle Sam took almost all of the surplus during the war. Buyers are now coming from France to buy material to rebuild devastated regions.

C. R. Burrow, owner of the Canyon Lumber Company stated yesterday in regard to the lumber situation: "I am fortunate in having a good stock on hand, at present, but there is no guarantee for the future. All lumber dealers tell me lumber will be scarcer and much harder to get in the future than it has been during the past few years. The government is preparing to handle the wheat crop, but I am told by reliable parties that the storage plants cannot now handle the oats, barley and rye crops."

It looks like the farmers would have to store their oats, rye and barley or at least the major part of the crop, and many of them are getting their granaries fixed up, or building new ones. It is going to take a great deal of storage place to accommodate these grains in Randall county this year. To be safe the farmers should have a good house ready by threshing time.

#### Two Cent Postage

On July 1st the postage rate goes back to two cents on outside letters. The postage was raised as a war revenue measure.

### WHEAT CUTTING IS STARTED IN COUNTY

Help Is Very Scarce All Over the Country—Yield Will Be Heavy In All Grain Crops

Wheat cutting has started in Randall county. J. A. Wilson and J. A. Moore started their binders Monday. The wheat is not hardly ripe enough in many places over the county, but by the end of this week binders and headers will be running full blast all over the country. The wheat is generally reported to be very fine and the yield will be exceptionally large this year.

G. D. Walker was in the city yesterday morning and states that barley and oats were being cut in the south part of the county where he lives. He stated that Tuesday he made a record of 40 bundles in 52 seconds with his binder. Mr. Arnold on the McNaughton place was the first to start wheat cutting in Mr. Walker's section of the county.

Row crops are coming fine. While they are late this year the stand is generally reported to be very satisfactory.

The help question is serious all over the county and will grow more serious as the harvest advances. The Plains county will offer employment at high prices to any and all who are willing to work.

The Executive Committee of the Randall County Red Cross meets tonight at the court house for the purpose of hearing a report of Rev. A. E. Haynes on the Peace Program of the organization, and for other business.

### RED CROSS STARTS BIG PEACE PROGRAM

Organization Will Continue Work in This Country As Well as Looking After Children in Europe

Rev. A. E. Haynes went to Wichita, Kansas, Thursday, as representative of the Randall County Chapter of the Red Cross. The meeting was called for a conference on the work that would be undertaken by the organization during peace time.

It was stated that the organization had to choose between two methods. First, either disband all but a skeleton organization which would be held for another war or national catastrophe, or, second, use the efforts of the organization for promoting welfare in this country and among European countries. It has been decided that the latter course will be followed.

Three objects will be constantly before the organization: 1, First Aid; 2, Home Service; 3, Nursing.

In Europe the organization will devote its labors to looking after the welfare of the children.

The organization has done a magnificent work during the war, and the Peace Program promises to fill a need long felt in the world.

Mr. Haynes will make his report of the meeting at the monthly meeting of the Randall County Red Cross Chapter tonight.

#### ORGANIZE PANHANDLE-PLAINS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Frank Jamison and Hamlin Palmer of Amarillo were in the city today in the interest of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce which was started a short time ago in a big meeting in Amarillo. At that time there were representatives from twenty-two of the thirty-eight counties which the organization covers. A director was selected from each county, J. W. Reid, representing Randall county.

The purpose of the organization is many fold. Most important will be the matter of publicity, by which means it is hoped to get before the outside world true statements of fact concerning the Panhandle-Plains country.

Thousands of dollars have been expended by various communities in advertising which has not been profitable. This will be a concerted action of the great northwest Texas. Pictures are now being taken of crops which will be used in the big and reliable publications of the country. Then there are questions of transportation and highways, freight rates, and various other question which come up constantly in this country which will be handled by the organization.

It is estimated that \$25,000 per year will be necessary to make a real organization. There is practically one hundred and eighty million assessed valuations in the 38 counties, and one-sixth of a mill to the dollar will raise the money necessary.

The people of this section are very enthusiastic over the new enterprise. Work should go rapidly in order to gain all of the benefits of this splendid year.

During the war Randall County sent two hundred and ten men into the various branches of the service. Of this number one was killed in action and nine died from various causes. **Plan for a Community Meeting.** June is a busy month on the farm, but even in June there are certain opportunities for cooperative efforts which should not be neglected.

In every neighborhood in the South for one thing, plans should be made for holding a public meeting after crops are laid by, to promote neighborhood progress and unity. A pic-

nic dinner should be one feature of the meeting, of course; and community singing should be another. The mere act of coming together, eating together, and singing together will do a lot to put the people of any neighborhood in the right mood for working together along all worthy lines.

For this reason it will be worth while to have a picnic meeting even

if it is an aimless one. But it will be far better if the meeting is designed to interest the people in some one or more specific forms of community progress.

You will probably need to have some speaker from a distance, but we hope you will not make the mistake of having the program filled entirely by outsiders. Between a program of "all home talent" and one of all outside talent, better choose home talent exclusively every time. What most Southern communities need is local leadership, and you can't get this unless you give it a chance—and a sympathetic chance.

Please don't overlook our adjective "sympathetic." We beg you to try to boost the folks who seek to carry your community forward. Of course they are not perfect. None of us are. And perhaps for some reason you don't like your fellow citizen who is trying to interest all of you in better schools, or better roads, or cooperative marketing, or a community fair. Perhaps he used to drink too much. Or perhaps you once heard that he said something objectionable about you. Or perhaps he has an amusing weakness of some kind or other. Never mind. While he is unselfishly trying to do something for the community, let's forget his faults or weaknesses and remember only the good he is honestly trying to do.—The Progressive Farmer.

### Secret of Success for Hog Raisers.

It is important that we at once thoroughly appreciate the fact that we cannot compete with the North in hog production if the feed is to be chiefly or largely corn. The two reasons are plain: first, we grow too little corn for our own use and must buy corn; and, second, our average yield of corn per acre are too small, as compared with Northern corn yields.

If our other feeds, like peas, soy beans, cowpeas, velvet beans, sweet potatoes, fall and winter grazing chops and legume pastures, produce pork more economically than it is produced on corn as the principal feed, and we contend that it has been proved that they do, then the higher the price of corn goes the better it is for the Southern hog-producers, so long as the price of hogs is based on the price of corn and he grows his hogs on these cheaper feeds instead of on corn.

We do not advise any Southern farmer to raise hogs if he feeds them on corn exclusively or chiefly, but if he will provide a proper rotation of the cheaper crops we have mentioned and use a minimum of cottonseed meal and corn, he can produce hogs cheaper than they are produced in the so-called corn-hog belt.—The Progressive Farmer.

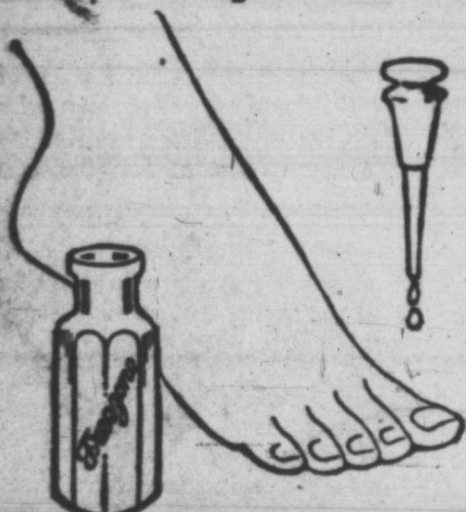

### Treating Pigs for Sore Mouth.

In treating pigs affected with canker sore mouth, which is a very common complaint here in Colorado, the scabs should first be removed and the affected parts swabbed with tincture of iodine diluted one-half with water. Small pigs may be conveniently treated by holding the mouth open in a bucket of Kresol No. 1 solution or some other coal disinfectant, taking care that the animals do not swallow any appreciable amount of the solution. The scabs and diseased tissue removed should be burned or mixed with lime or disinfectant. The udders and teats of sows nursing affected pigs should be washed daily with the disinfecting solution followed by drying with a clean towel to prevent soreness. The feed buckets and all equipment used about the pens should be thoroughly disinfected. Keep in mind the fact that these diseases are caused by a germ and that they are highly infectious, so that the utmost precautions must be observed to prevent them from spreading and causing serious losses.—Field and Farm.

### Found Dynamite Under Bank Vault.

A big stick of dynamite around which was bound a piece of wrapping paper bearing the name of Barry Hardware Co., and to which was attached a fuse, the end of which was burned, was found last Thursday beneath the floors of the vault of the building on South Main street which up to a year or so ago was occupied by the Clavis National Bank.

"It is evident that the explosive has been there for a number of years," stated chief of police Sadler when viewing the find. "The hole bored in the floor is not one of recent work, and must have been done four or five years ago."

Bank officials are puzzled over the finding of the explosive and are at a loss for a solution of how it got there, and who could have panned the scheme that evidently was intended to wreck the banking house.—Clavis Journal.

### Bitten By Rattler.

Howard Tunnell, a farmer residing southeast of Tahoka was bitten on the hand by a large rattlesnake. Mr. Tunnell was plowing in the field near his home, and at the end of a row he alighted from his plow to obtain a stick to scrape off the plow points. Just as he picked up the stick, which was in a nearby bunch of thistles, the snake drove its poisonous fangs into the man's fingers. A physician was called and at last reports the sufferer was doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances.—Tahoka News.

Oral Bowdel, Ralph Wilks and Everett Shahan were in Amarillo one day last week. While there Mr. Wilks and Oral Bowdel purchased a combination header and thresher. These two Lipscomb county ranchers are among the progressive class and are always having an eye for better methods of doing things. He says he expects to stay on the job until the road is put into good condition.—Texline Enterprise.

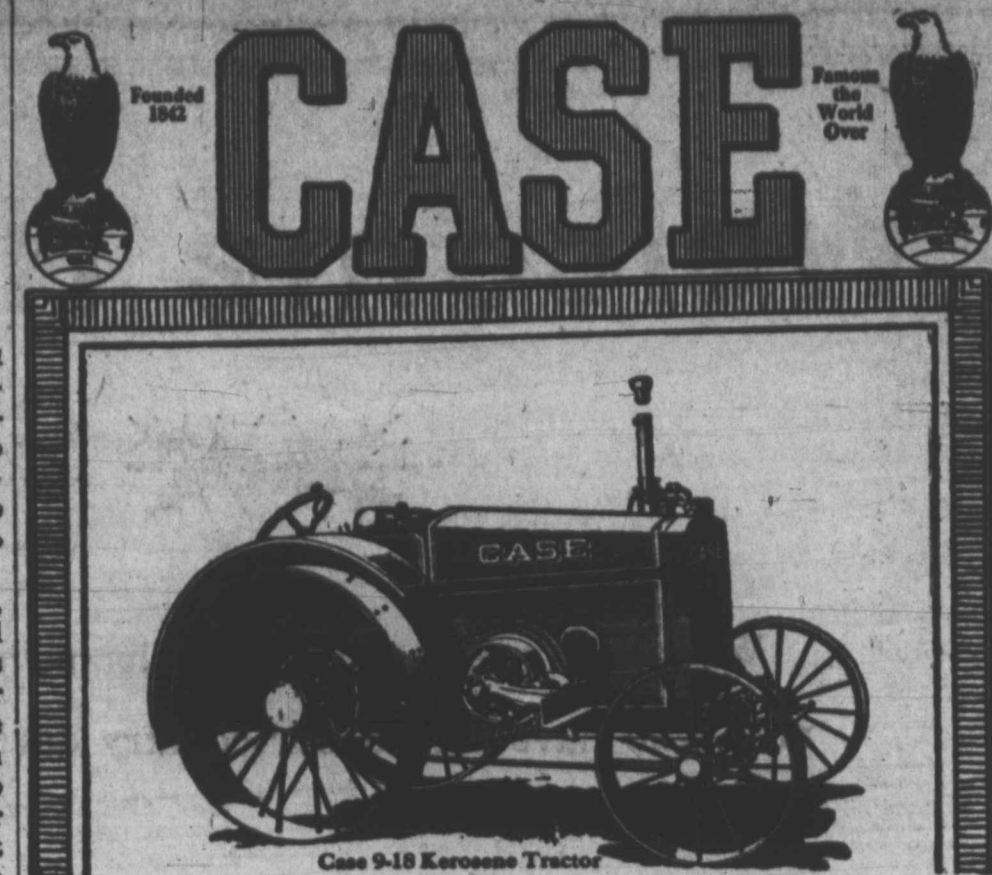

### The Crop Outlook.

Regular made-to-order harvest weather has prevailed over the Plains country for the past week but there will not be much wheat ready in this immediate vicinity before another week.

Summer set in sure enough, last Saturday, and it came so suddenly when it got ready, that a lot of us who had concluded that there wasn't going to be any summer this year, were plumb knocked out. Anyhow, we'll say its summer time now!

Local showers are interfering somewhat with the work in the harvest fields in some sections but as a general thing, the wheat is being put up in fine condition. Even the farmers whose crops were hailed out have found, in many instances, that the damage was not so great as they had feared and the damage done by the army worm was not very extensive, taking the territory as a whole.

But the farmers want to be on the look out for the next brood of those pestiferous insects for they are liable to take the entire row crop of the country unless strong measures are taken to combat them at their first appearance. The prospect at present is for as big a sorghum crop as we have a wheat crop and it would be a sin to let the worms take it.

This hot weather is just pushing the beans and cotton right along—and they needed it. The long cool season has retarded these crops especially and the present spell, while not so comfortable for us humans, is fine for the crops.—Southwest Plainsman.

### Want Bureau of Mines Reinstated.

Washington.—Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee are being importuned by Representatives Parrish and Lanham of the Texas delegation to reinstate the \$50,000 increase in the sundry civil bill for the Bureau of Mines to find means to prevent the waste of oil and gas. The House bill allowed \$100,000 and the bureau asked for the increase so that the study might be extended to Texas and Louisiana fields.

After the House in committee of the whole accepted the Parrish amendment which gave the increase, by Republican action immediately before the bill was sent to the Senate the increase was eliminated.

While doing this the Republicans voted \$200,000 for construction of a reflecting pool at the Lincoln memorial in Washington. Representative Buchanan of Texas offered an amendment that would have eliminated the expense, with the contention that it was needless and would cost half a million dollars before completed.

### Wheat Dealers To Be Licensed.

ducts, manufactured either wholly or partly from wheat flour.

The only exceptions are farmers and small bankers.

The proclamation which goes into effect July 15, applies to the business of "storing or distributing wheat, or manufacturing, storing or distributing wheat flour", as well as to the manufacture of bread or other bakers' products either wholly or partly from wheat flour. The exceptions are listed as follows:

(A) Bakers and manufacturers of bakery products whose consumption of flour in the manufacture of such products is, in the aggregate, less than fifty barrels per month.

(B) Retailers and farmers or cooperative associations of farmers or other persons with respect to the products of any farm or other land owned, leased or cultivated by them.

Common carriers are required to secure on or before July 15, a license from Mr. Barnes "in such form, under such conditions, and under such rules and returns governing the conduct of the business as he may from time to time prescribe."

Blank forms to be used in applying for such licenses may be obtained from the zone agents of the grain corporation in Baltimore, Chicago, Galveston, Minneapolis, Kansas City, Mo., New Orleans, Omaha, Philadelphia, Portland, Oregon, St. Louis, San Francisco, Buffalo and Duluth. After the applications have been filled out they must be sent to the wheat director, division officer Washington.

The proclamation states that "any person, firm, corporation or association other than those hereinbefore excepted, who shall engage in or carry on any business above specified after July 15, without first securing such licenses, or shall carry on any such business while such licenses is suspended or after such license is revoked will be liable to the penalties prescribed by law."

### Representation for West Texas

(From the Ft Worth Star Telegram)

If the people of West Texas and the Panhandle do not back up the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to the limit in its demand that the representation in the State Senate be reapportioned at the coming special session of the Legislature, the matter is going to be ignored again. R. E. Huff of Wichita Falls, who has given much attention to this question has been made chairman of a committee to take up the matter with the Governor and the Legislature, but the support of all of the people

of this section is going to be necessary to put it over.

Let's see if we can make the situation plain to the average man in this section. Take this, for example: There are 93 counties in West Texas and the Panhandle, that had a population of 627,729 in 1910, and in which all the big oil fields are located, that are represented in the State Senate with only three Senators.

Compare this with 24 counties that have no oil interests—13 of them

In Northeast and 8 in Southeast Texas—that had a population of 543,125 in 1910—and that are represented in the State Senate by six Senators.

Examine the figures closely. Observe that 543,125 people in East Texas have twice the representation that is accorded 627,729 in West Texas and the Panhandle. And remember that West Texas and the Panhandle have been growing twice as fast as any other section of the State since 1910, and that since the discovery of oil the rate of increase has been growing more rapid every day. With such a situation existing how long is it to be expected that the oil industry will be protected from unfriendly legislation?

We want to put the matter practically, so that the practical application of this condition may be appreciated. See how the present Senate was named, for example. In the last primary election 87,628 men and women voted in the districts referred to above and which are represented in the State Senate by six Senators. In the districts containing all the big oil fields 131,263 men and women voted and they are represented by only three Senators. In spite of the fact that the oil districts cast more than 40,000 votes in excess of the number cast in these other districts, the oil districts have only half the representation.

No matter on what basis you figure it, the result is the same. In 1910 there were 92,849 poll taxes paid in the West Texas districts referred to here, and in the six East Texas districts which we are using here for illustration, there were only 78,061 poll taxes paid. Three Senators representing 92,849 poll taxes and six Senators representing 78,061 poll taxes. If that is not taxation without representation we should like to know what it is.

Let no man think that we are just "seeing things" in declaring that this condition is a menace to the oil industry and to every other legitimate interest in West Texas. Already West Texas and the Panhandle have been paying into the State treasury every year a great deal more than it has ever received back in service or anything else. But now that the oil industry has been developed, the danger of further aggravation of this injustice has been increased. We say we are not "seeing things" and we are going to prove it. There was no man more active in the State Senate at the last session in proposing prastic oil legislation than Senator Darrough of Texarkana. Now we are not saying anything against Senator Darrough, except that there are no oil fields in his district. He had a stack of oil bills in his grip when he arrived in Austin, however, and he made a fight to put them through the Legislature. Now let's see what proportion of the people Senator Darrough represents.

In the primary election in which he was named there were 10,582 votes cast in his district. And in the same election the district in which the Wichita-Burkburnett oil fields are located cast 61,695 votes—nearly six times as many. And yet that district has only Senator Steve Bell to cast one vote for it. In other words the 10,582 voters whom Senator Darrough represents have just as much to say about legislation to regulate the oil industry as the 61,695 in the district in which oil wells are located. Indeed, allowing for the unusual activity of Senator Darrough, they had a great deal more to say.

And the situation was quite as bad with respect to the other oil fields. The Senator from the district in which the Ranger, Eastland and Stephens county fields are located, represents 39,297 votes that were cast in that district in the last election. And in the district in which the Comanche and Brown fields are located there were 30,371 votes cast. In Senator Darrough's district there was a population of 83,325 in 1910. In the Wichita-Burkburnett district there was a population of 235,300. In the Ranger - Eastland - Stephens district there was a population of 219,219, and in the Comanche-Brown district there was 173,210. In every one of them there was more than twice the population of Senator Darrough's district, and in one of them nearly three times as much. And that was in 1910. What must it be today?

Understand there is a great deal more to the question of redistricting than its relation to the oil industry. It is a question of removing fundamental injustice all around. But we have cited the oil industry because this Legislature which has not been able so far to find time to redistrict the State, found a great deal of time to propose oil legislation. We have no objection to adequate oil legislation that is fair to all concerned and that is representative of the will of the people. BUT THE PRESENT SENATE IS INCAPABLE OF REFLECTING THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE SO LONG AS SUCH INEQUALITIES IN REPRESENTATION EXIST. That is one of the reasons why they ought not to exist a single day longer than is necessary to bring about the change.

We have put the whole matter in this fashion in order to awaken some of our people to just what we are up against. This matter ought to interest every citizen in every county that is developing an oil field. It ought to interest every community that is adjacent to an oil field and that is dependent upon the development of the oil industry for its growth. It ought to interest every man who expects to continue to live in West Texas and the Panhandle and who knows the future development ahead of that entire section. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is going to the front in this matter, not as an academic proposition, but because it has practical bearing upon every legitimate interest in West Texas and the Panhandle. It has practical bearing upon the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars of taxes which West Texas and the Panhandle pay into the State treasury. And unless the people make their voice heard in Austin in a fashion that cannot be mistaken, this injustice is going to continue.

The activities of Judge Huff and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce must be backed up to the limit during the coming special session. Meetings should be held in all the districts which are being discriminated against. And the Tarrant County district is one of them, by the way. There were three times as many votes cast in this district in the election in which Senator Carlock was named as there were in Senate Darrough's district in the same election. And the population of this district in 1910 was 148,840 as against 83,305 in Senator Darrough's district. Today, because of the great growth in population in Fort Worth alone since 1910, the difference is much greater. The question is of immediate interest to this district, therefore, and we do not doubt that we can count upon the active support of our Senator in this matter.

#### Boy Drowned at Lockney.

Lockney and community was shocked beyond expression by reason of the sad accident that befell one of its most highly respected sons Tuesday evening, when the news was phoned to town that Ewel Shelton, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Shelton, had met his death by drowning in a lake ten miles west of town, where he had gone in company with Artie, Robin and Dorsey Baker, Otis Carter and Madison Ayres, to go in swimming. Arriving at the lake they all went in, and after swimming around Ewel announced to the other boys that he was going to swim across the lake. He started out, and the boys knowing him to be a good swimmer did not pay much attention to him, when on reaching a hundred and fifty or two hundred feet of the opposite side of the lake, he was heard to call for help, and the water being deep the boys went around a neck of the lake to him, but before they got to him he sank the last time, never to rise again. He drowned in water estimate dfrom 7 to 8 feet deep, and it is supposed that he took the cramps in his hips and legs. He sank and rose five times, and the last word he was heard to say was, "Help Archie, Help." Ewel was the best swimmer in town among the boys and had not swam very far when he began to sink, and it was the belief of the boys with him that he must have cramped in his legs and hips.—Lockney Beacon.

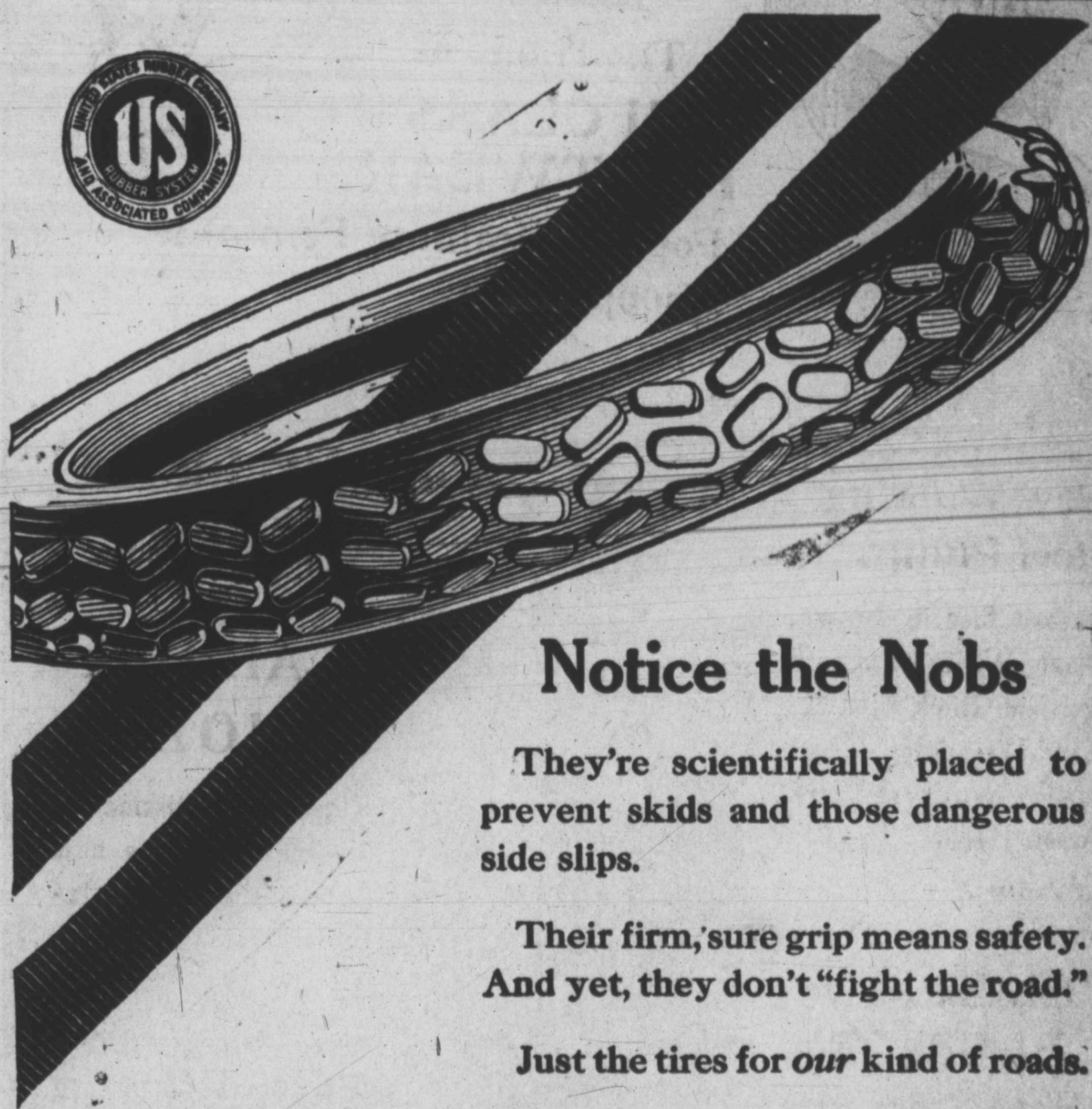

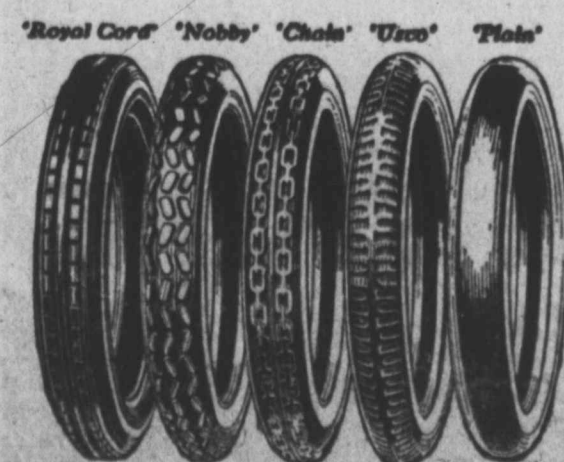

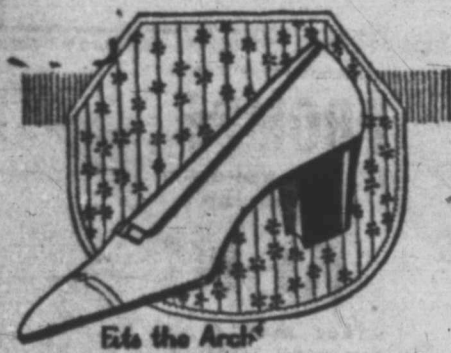

**INTERNED GERMAN  
WARSHIPS SCUTTLED**

SEACOCKS OPENED BY GERMAN OFFICERS AND SEAMEN AND THESE ARE PRISONERS.

London.—The German officers and sailors, forming the complements of the German ships interned at Scapa Flow, have sunk most of their fleet. All the big ships, the battleships and battle cruisers, excepting the Baden and numerous smaller craft, were sunk, while others went ashore in a half sunken condition. Eighteen destroyers were beached by tugs, four are still afloat, while the remainder went under.

The wholesale sinking of the German ships, which were surrendered under the terms of the armistice, was carefully arranged by officers and crews. All explosives had been removed and therefore the only means of destroying the fleet was by opening the seacocks. The ships went down slowly with the German flag, which the crews had hoisted, showing at the mastheads.

The crews, composed entirely of Germans, under the terms of the armistice, which did not permit of British guards aboard, took to the boats when the vessels began to settle. While making for the shore the boats were challenged and called upon to surrender. Some of them ignored the summons and were fired upon, a few casualties resulting.

Angeles Asks Reason for Sortie.

El Paso, Texas.—"I decline to have any communication whatsoever with you or your principal," Brigadier General James B. Erwin has replied to a communication received from General Felipe Angeles, commanding revolutionary forces in Mexico, regarding the reason American troops crossed the border last Sunday night. A courier from General Angeles' camp delivered the communication to General Erwin. It was signed by General Angeles and bore the seal of Villa's revolutionary government.

Phelan Would Check Japanese.

Washington.—Cancellation of the so-called gentlemen's agreement with Japan and prohibition of all immigration from that country was urged before the house immigration committee by Senator Phelan (Dem.) of California, who declared the Japanese rapidly were making "silent" conquest of the Western Hemisphere. America's next war, he said, would be "on the Pacific and not on the Atlantic."

Legislation Planned to Promote Trade.

Washington.—Legislation to permit all national banks to become stockholders of corporations engaged in promoting foreign trade will be recommended to congress by the federal reserve board. An amendment to the federal reserve act will be suggested which will unlock perhaps \$100,000,000 of capital for financing the tremendous purchases which other nations desire to make in this country.

Contract Let for Reserve Bank.

Dallas.—Contract for the new Dallas federal reserve bank building has been awarded and construction on the building at Akard and Wood streets will begin within two weeks, according to R. L. Van Zandt, governor of the eleventh district bank. The building will consist of five stories and a basement and will cost over \$1,000,000.

June 28 Czecho-Slovak Day.

Austin, Texas.—Gov. W. P. Hobby has named June 28 as Czecho-Slovak day, and has been requested by the American-Bohemian organization in Texas to announce that all funds raised on that date should be turned over to county judges and by them forwarded to County Judge G. Q. McCracken at Galveston.

Canal Tolls to be Changed.

Washington.—Efforts to get early enactment of legislation changing the system of levying Panama canal tolls, was renewed in communications sent to congress by Secretary Baker, Governor Harding of the Canal Zone, and Captain Sargent, marine superintendent at the canal.

20,000 Cars to Move Grain Crops.

Kansas City.—Twenty thousand grain cars for use in handling the grain crops of Kansas, Oklahoma and northern Texas have been accumulated in this territory. It was announced by Hale Holden, regional director for the United States railroad administration.

Cotton Men Meet in Ft. Worth.

Fort Worth, Texas.—John T. Scott of Houston was chosen by Texas bankers at a meeting held in the Fort Worth clearing house to form the permanent state branch of the \$100,000,000 International Cotton Export Financing corporation.

Ready for Advance on Germans.

Paris.—Marshal Foch is forming one front against the Germans from the Rhine to the Danube and will extend his command over the Czecho-Slovak, Roumanian and Polish armies.

Texas Ports to Load Mixed Cargoes.

Washington.—Permission has been given Texas ports by the division of operations of the United States shipping board to load mixed cargoes, which has been desired by the ports for a long time.

**GERMANS WILL SIGN ALLIED PEACE TREATY**

NATIONAL ASSEMBLY VOTES 237 TO 138 IN FAVOR OF SIGNING. FIVE REFUSED TO VOTE.

**SOME RESERVATIONS MADE**

Government Does Not Acknowledge Responsibility of the German People for the War.

Berlin.—German will sign the peace treaty of the allied and associated powers. The national assembly, by a vote of 237 to 138, has decided to sign. The assembly also voted confidence in the new government of Herr Bauer, 236 to 89. Sixty-eight members abstained from voting.

On the question of signing the treaty, five members of the assembly abstained from voting.

Before the vote of confidence was taken, Herr Bauer, the new premier, declared the government would sign the treaty, but without acknowledging the responsibility of the German people for the war and without accepting the obligations contained in articles 227 to 230 in the treaty relating to the trial of the former emperor and the extradition of other German personages.

Declaring that by signing the treaty under reserve the government yielded to force in order to spare suffering Germany from a new war and disruption of national unity by further occupation, starvation for the women and children and an unmercifully longer retention of German prisoners, Herr Bauer says:

"But the government expects, in view of the stupendous burden thus assumed, that all military and civilian prisoners will be returned without interruption, beginning July 1. At this solemn moment the government desires to express itself with absolute clearness in order to meet beforehand any possible reproaches that the conditions imposed aid Germany's power to perform, and we therefore decline all responsibility for the consequences that may befall Germany should her utmost endeavors prove the conditions impossible of fulfillment.

"We furthermore lay the greatest emphasis on the declaration that we can not accept and by our signature do not cover article 231, demanding that Germany confess herself the sole author of the war."

**Will Not Grant Homeseekers Rates.**

Washington.—No rates to homeseekers will be granted by the railroad administration during the season, according to information given by Director General Hines, based upon several reasons, the chief of which is that it would mean a loss of considerable revenue to the railroads. This decision does not affect tourist rates which may be established. "The chief difficulty which confronts the railroad administration is that such rates would not be of material benefit to any part of the country, while at the same time they would result in a diminished revenue to the railroad administration."

**Winnipeg Under Martial Law.**

Winnipeg, Man.—Winnipeg, strike-torn since May 15, is under martial law. After hot fighting between thousands of strikers and the city and provincial police, in which one man was killed, another injured probably fatally and more than a score hurt, Mayor Charles F. Gray, formally turned over the city to the protection of the federal military forces. General H. D. B. Ketchen announced that he had taken full charge of the situation.

**Gompers Again President of A. F. L.**

Atlantic City, N. J.—Samuel Gompers has been re-elected president of the American Federation of Labor in convention here. Mr. Gompers, in a speech, said the selection was American labor's answer to its traducers and opponents.

**B. Y. P. U. Convention at Palacios.**

Dallas.—Representatives from all of the 4,000 Baptist churches in Texas, the B. Y. P. U. organizations, Sunday schools, and the women's auxiliaries, will be sent to the B. Y. P. U. convention which will meet at Palacios July 8 to 20.

**Bill Introduced for New Bridge.**

Washington.—A bill has been introduced by Representative Raburn authorizing the construction of a bridge over Red river near Preston, between Grayson county and Marshall county, Oklahoma.

**Large Eleemosynary Appropriation.**

Austin, Texas.—The senate finance committee's appropriation bill for the maintenance of the state eleemosynary institutions carries a total of \$5,114,786.

**Nitti Asked to Form Cabinet.**

Rome.—King Victor Emanuel has requested Francesco Nitto, a former minister of the treasury, to form a cabinet. Former Premier Tittoni will be foreign minister, it is said.

**Attorney to Meet in Galveston.**

Dallas.—The attractions of the sea-wall city will be revealed to the members of the Texas Bar association, which will meet on July 1 and 2 at Galveston for the annual convention.
