



At a regular meeting of the city commission Tuesday at 3 p. m., at which Mayor Marrs, Commissioners Cazell and Trollinger, Manager Bartlett, Secretary McKinnon and Atterney Jackson, also Judge J. W. Crudgington, representing the Union Petroleum Company, of New York; were present, a franchise was granted that company giving them permission to pipe natural gas into the city and to sell it to the citizens at a rate of 50 cents per thousand cubic feet for the first 30,000, with a \$1 minimum, and providing that the Union Petroleum Company have the gas piped into the city and ready for distribution within six months after the granting of the franchise.

The proposed franchise was filled with the city commission on October 2, but, as provided by the city's charter, it could not be passed until it had been on file a certain number of days .- Amarillo News.

Bankers, business men, farmers and railroad officials met in joint session Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of laying plans to secure adequate trans portation facilities to move the great Panhandle grain crop, which is at this time being damaged hundreds and thousands of dollars each day on account of farmers not being able to move their crops.

It was pointed out that in other communities, even in this state, that the car shortage was not so bad as in the Panhandle, and that while in some sections at least fifty per cent cent of the Panhandle wheat had left

The Santa Fe and Rock Island railways handle most of the wheat in this section, and it is next to impossible to get a car on either of these roads. The F. W. & D. C., it seems, has never suffered a car shortage, but that line is of very little value to wheat growers, especially at this time.

Since then the very worst fears have been and are now being realized. It is now estimated that between seven and ten million bushels of threshed wheat is on the bare ground, exposed to the heavy rains already and yet expected. Some twenty per cent of the wheat is in the fields unthreshed. All elevators and ware houses are bursting full. Crops of maize and kaffir, estimated at thirty million bushels, now maturing, being harvested and thrown on the ground in the same way. Farmers are threatened with eternal ruin, with all allied financial and commercial interests suffering severely. In view of these conditions farmers are unable to do little toward seeding or arranging another crop. They claim that the most important duty ahead of them now is that of saving the present crop, already damaged millions of dollars. Car scarcity is worse than ever, with the same old story of unfilled promises from the Grain corporation, Shipping Board and the Railroad Administration. Less than twenty per cent of the Panhandle wheat crop is moved, meaning big discrimination against this end of the state. Farmers and all business interests in great despair, and wish to know if this complaint could be filed as a basis for a quick emergency hearing at Amarillo before the Examiner from the Interstate Commerce Commission; said complaint to be lodged against the Railroad Administration. Efforts to be made to have in attendance on hearing representatives from the Grain Corporation, Shipping Board and others interwoven with domestic and foreign shipping commerce. In this way it is hoped that the responsibility can be fixed, with the proper remedy found and applied. This situation as set forth is not and could not well be exaggerated and if not relieved thousands of farmers will have been ruined, and the Canhandle set back many years. ### FIGHTING MEN VOLUNTEER

Responses Ly the Hundreds Pouring In to Appeal For 1,000,000 Workers.

Mobilization of the vast army of Red Cross workers has begun. Reports reaching Red Cross division headquarters in St. Louis indicate that plans for the Third Roll Call, November 2 to 11, are well under way in almost every one of the 655 Red Cross Chapters in the five states-Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas - comprising the Southwestern

Chapter Roll Call Directors have been appointed in virtually every city, town and county and with but few exceptions working organizations are in process of formation at each place. State Directors have been appointed to take charge of the rapidly forming machine. Added impetus has been given to the preliminary campaign by the holding of State-wide Roll Call conferences recently at St. Louis, Topeka, Dallas, Houston, Oklahoma City and Little Rock; at which definite; campaign plans affecting every section of each State in the division were

Meanwhile, responses to the call for ,000,000 volunteer workers to serve during the coming drive are pouring by the hundreds to Red Cross headquarters. "Once a Red Cross worker, always a Red Cross worker" the slogan adopted. Soldiers, sailors and marines, some of whom were in the thick of the fighting overseas, are offering their services. Many of these men will be utilized as speakers to describe some of the benefits accruing to the fighting men by reason of the presence of the Red Cross in the field of hostilities.

During the first part of the campaign there will be a house-to-house canvassing for Red Cross memberships under a distinct arrangement; but on the last two days district lines will be disregarded and former service men as well as women volunteer workers will take up their tasks with roving commissions. Not only are discharged service men wanted as National Guardsmen are urged to enroll as quickly as possible. The Red Cross welcomes assistance of all former Army and Navy officers and men who approved of the work of the Red Cross during the war.


ONE NAMED "THE SPIRIT OF AMERICA" BY ARTIST.

Foremost Painters Portray "Greatest Mother in the World" and Red Cross Nurse.

The services of some of the foremost artists in the country have been obtained in connection with the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11. Posters by Howard Christy and Haskell Coffin are features of a preliminary text poster campaign that is being inaugurated.

The Christy poster is entitled "The Spirit of America." A silken flag—the National Colors—forms the background in front of which stands the appealing figure of a Red Cross nurse. At the bottom of the poster is a large red cross and the inscription "Join." The Red Cross nurse is also the subject of the poster by Coffin. This is in pastel shades and portrays one of the merciful workers with arms outstretched in supplication. The poster bears only the inscription "Third Red Cross Roll Call." Another poster has to do with the better health program of the Red Cross and has the "Greatest Mother" as a background to a text which reads "Make our Red Cross in Peace as in War - The Greatest Mother in the World.'


