**Natural Gas For Amarillo.**  
At a regular meeting of the city commission Tuesday at 3 p. m., at which Mayor Marrs, Commissioners Cazell and Trolling, Manager Bartlett, Secretary McKinnon and Attorney Jackson, also Judge J. W. Cradgington, representing the Union Petroleum Company, of New York, were present, a franchise was granted that company giving them permission to pipe natural gas into the city and to sell it to the citizens at a rate of 50 cents per thousand cubic feet for the first 30,000, with a \$1 minimum, and providing that the Union Petroleum Company have the gas piped into the city and ready for distribution within six months after the granting of the franchise.

The proposed franchise was filled with the city commission on October 2, but, as provided by the city's charter, it could not be passed until it had been on file a certain number of days.—Amarillo News.

#### The Panhandle Wheat Situation.

Further indication that the railroad administration is fully aroused to the Panhandle wheat situation is given in a letter received by Representative Marvin Jones from W. C. Kendall, Manager of the car service section of the division of operations.

He wrote: "The wheat corporation has just advised that the outlook for additional tonnage at Galveston is very good and they anticipate a sufficient number of boats within the next ten days or two weeks to relieve the elevator and car congestion. This in turn will reflect throughout the region. For your information I will state that instructions are outstanding that preference be given to cars for the loading of wheat when shippers are in position to ship same to market or port which can handle the grain promptly upon its arrival, so as to avoid unnecessary delay as to equipment."

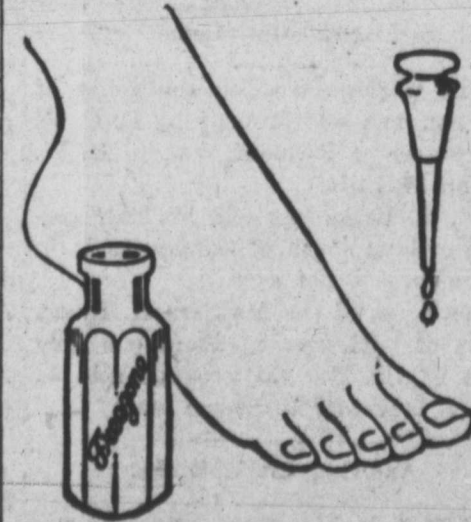

**Hoover's Little Surprise.**

When President Wilson, at the request of Herbert Hoover, asked Congress for an appropriation of \$100,000,000 with which to carry on food relief work in Europe, what a howl of protest went up from Congress! First there was the dark suspicion that some of the money was to be spent for Germany, and the suspicion was persistently voiced even when it was announced that Germany would have to pay for all she got. Then there was heard the call to selfishness, a cry that America, which direly needed food, was being denuded to feed the worthless rabble of Europe. Wilson was a waster. Hoover was a man who had spent so much time in Europe (doing, as we now recognize, the greatest work performed by any single private citizen during the war) that he had lost all touch and sympathy with America. The plan was a British scheme to get the United States to foot the bill for supplying Europe's starving, while the other Allies did nothing.

It would be well to recall some of

these things while reading the following paragraph in Hoover's statement on laying down his powers, his job completed:

"I also plan to prepare a report for Congress showing the exact detail of the \$100,000,000 appropriated for relief purposes and to hand over to the United States Treasury between \$85,000,000 and \$90,000,000 of this sum in obligations of foreign governments, together with an accounting for the expenditure of the balance within the act. I hope this will be an agreeable surprise. Most of Congress thought that the money was gone forever, but voted for it anyway."

Of the \$10,000,000 voted by Congress over its indignant protests, between \$85,000,000 and \$90,000,000 has come back. And Hoover, little knowing the nature of a discomfited congressman, hopes it will be a pleasant surprise. Pleasant! Adjectives fail. If Hoover was not so long abroad as to forget his American devotion he was certainly gone long enough to forget what animates a partisan politician.—Star-Telegram.

**PANHANDLE CITIZENS APPEAL TO INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION**

Bankers, business men, farmers and railroad officials met in joint session Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of laying plans to secure adequate transportation facilities to move the great Panhandle grain crop, which is at this time being damaged hundreds and thousands of dollars each day on account of farmers not being able to move their crops.

Representatives from all sections of the country were present at this meeting and much enthusiasm was shown. According to statements made by several of the representatives, it appears that the railroad officials did not realize at the beginning of the season, the enormity of the Panhandle wheat crop, and as a result did not prepare to handle it. Local railroad officials have done all in their power to relieve the situation, but the trouble seems to be of such a nature as to make it impossible for them to bring about any great change.

It was pointed out that in other communities, even in this state, that the car shortage was not so bad as in the Panhandle, and that while in some sections at least fifty per cent of the nineteen nineteen crop had been moved, only about twenty per cent of the Panhandle wheat had left this territory.

The Santa Fe and Rock Island railroads handle most of the wheat in this section, and it is next to impossible to get a car on either of these roads. The F. W. & D. C., it seems, has never suffered a car shortage, but that line runs below the great wheat belt, and is of very little value to wheat growers, especially at this time.

Conditions, it was pointed out, are very critical. Farmers have spent their money. They have harvested a great wheat crop, but unless relief comes at an early date, it appears that they will lose all their profits. Many of them have already announced that they will not plant a crop next year. Farming, under the present conditions, it is claimed, is very unprofitable. Federal price fixing is working havoc among the farmers, according to their own statements. They have the grain, but they have no market for it. Many farmers have offered to sell their wheat at a dollar a bushel—any price, just so they get it off their hands before it is lost.

After thoroughly discussing the situation it was decided that the Interstate Commerce Commission might be in position to assist, and the following telegram was sent to Washington:

"Please refer to wire sent you September first, setting forth the peril of the Panhandle crops through inadequate transportation facilities. Since then the very worst fears have been and are now being realized. It is now estimated that between seven and ten million bushels of threshed wheat is on the bare ground, exposed to the heavy rains already and yet expected. Some twenty per cent of the wheat is in the fields unthreshed. All elevators and ware houses are bursting full. Crops of maize and kaffir, estimated at thirty million bushels, now maturing, being harvested and thrown on the ground in the same way. Farmers are threatened with eternal ruin, with all allied financial and commercial interests suffering severely. In view of these conditions farmers are unable to do little toward seeding or arranging another crop. They claim that the most important duty ahead of them now is that of saving the present crop, already damaged millions of dollars. Car scarcity is worse than ever, with the same old story of unfilled promises from the Grain corporation, Shipping Board and the Railroad Administration. Less than twenty per cent of the Panhandle wheat crop is moved, meaning big discrimination against this end of the state. Farmers and all business interests in great despair, and wish to know if this complaint could be filed as a basis for a quick emergency hearing at Amarillo before the Examiner from the Interstate Commerce Commission; said complaint to be lodged against the Railroad Administration. Efforts to be made to have in attendance on hearing representatives from the Grain Corporation, Shipping Board and others interwoven with domestic and foreign shipping commerce. In this way it is hoped that the responsibility can be fixed, with the proper remedy found and applied. This situation as set forth is not and could not well be exaggerated and if not relieved thousands of farmers will have been ruined, and the Panhandle set back many years. Please wire answer stating whether or not it is possible to order such hearing at Amarillo and how soon. Unless it is at an early date many millions of

Plant a few black locust trees and a few honey locust trees in the same place and see which will be the best trees in a few years. It is worth the experiment, if you are a black locust booster.—Canadian Record.

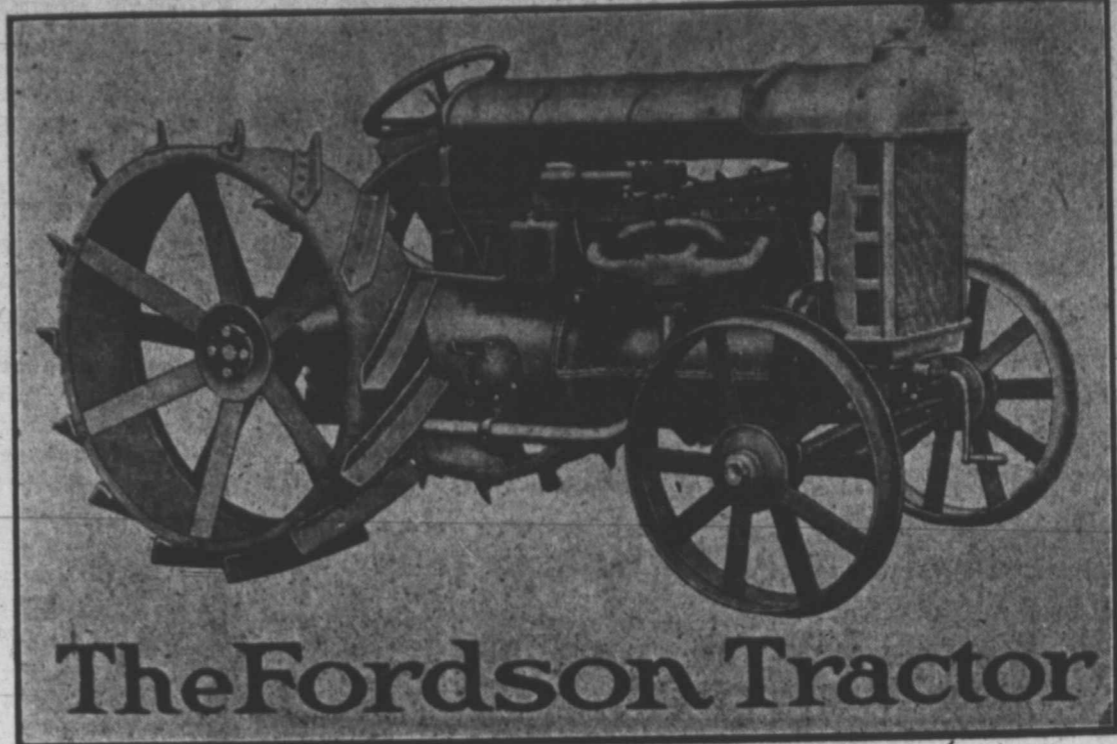

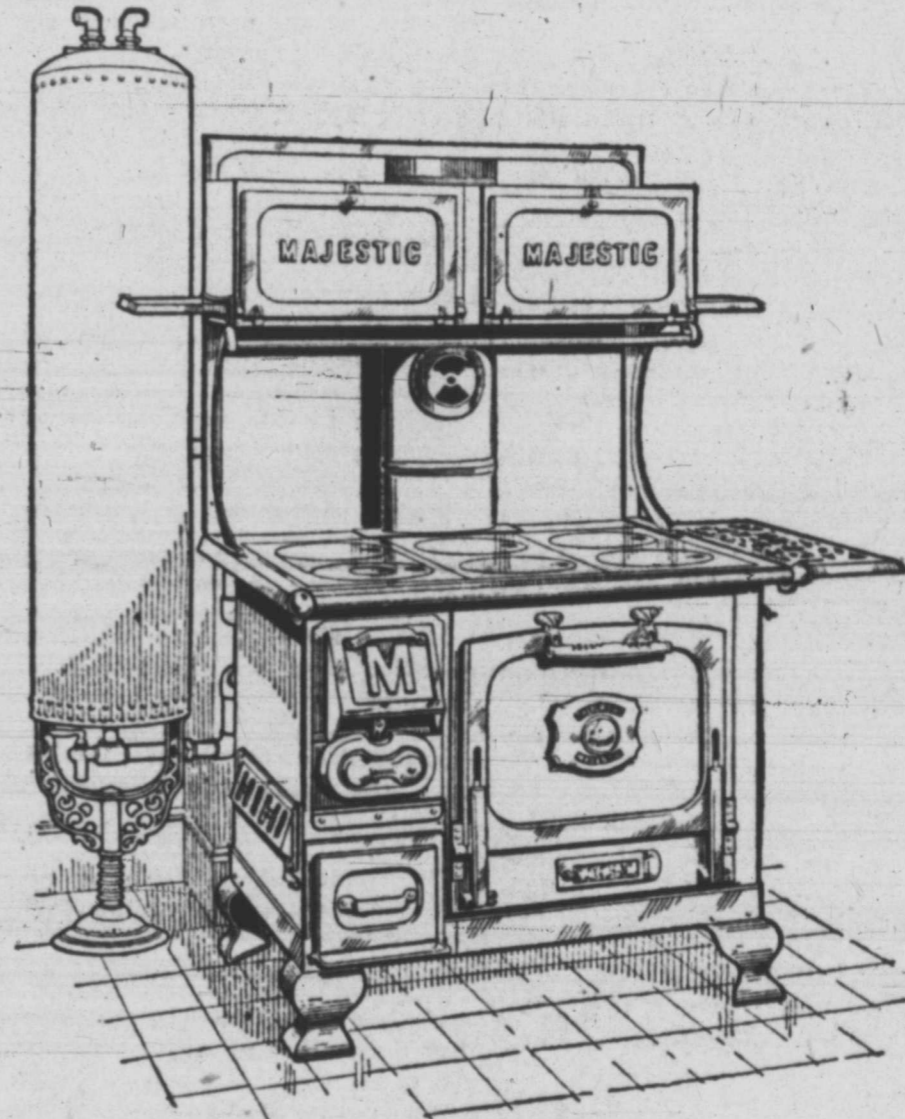

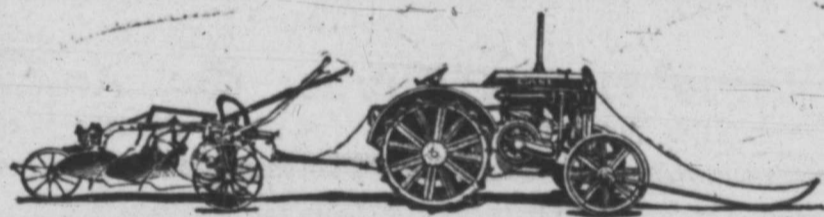

## RED CROSS ARMY NOW MOBILIZING

STATE CONFERENCES RECENTLY HELD IN SIX CITIES TO DISCUSS PLANS.

### FIGHTING MEN VOLUNTEER

Responses by the Hundreds Pouring In to Appeal For 1,000,000 Workers.

Mobilization of the vast army of Red Cross workers has begun. Reports reaching Red Cross division headquarters in St. Louis indicate that plans for the Third Roll Call, November 2 to 11, are well under way in almost every one of the 655 Red Cross Chapters in the five states—Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas—comprising the Southwestern Division.

Chapter Roll Call Directors have been appointed in virtually every city, town and county and with but few exceptions working organizations are in process of formation at each place. State Directors have been appointed to take charge of the rapidly forming machine. Added impetus has been given to the preliminary campaign by the holding of State-wide Roll Call conferences recently at St. Louis, Topeka, Dallas, Houston, Oklahoma City and Little Rock, at which definite campaign plans affecting every section of each State in the division were decided upon.

Meanwhile, responses to the call for 1,000,000 volunteer workers to serve during the coming drive are pouring in by the hundreds to Red Cross headquarters. "Once a Red Cross worker, always a Red Cross worker" is the slogan adopted. Soldiers, sailors and marines, some of whom were in the thick of the fighting overseas, are offering their services. Many of these men will be utilized as speakers to describe some of the benefits accruing to the fighting men by reason of the presence of the Red Cross in the field of hostilities.

During the first part of the campaign there will be a house-to-house canvassing for Red Cross memberships under a distinct arrangement; but on the last two days district lines will be disregarded and former service men as well as women volunteer workers will take up their tasks with roving commissions. Not only are discharged service men wanted as Red Cross canvassers but State and National Guardsmen are urged to enroll as quickly as possible. The Red Cross welcomes assistance of all former Army and Navy officers and men who approved of the work of the Red Cross during the war.

Speakers and writers are being sought by the organization and asked to "do their bit." Numerous acceptances already have been received from speakers and at present a determined effort is being made to obtain the services of all newspaper men who saw service overseas and are qualified to speak or write of their adventures. A preliminary campaign is being waged through text posters and other printed matter that has been sent to throughout the country.

Red Cross officials are stressing the point that the drive is to be made for memberships only—and that no appeal is contemplated wherein the general public will be asked for funds. An encouraging number of public spirited men and women through the division already have applied at Red Cross Chapters asking a renewal of their memberships for next year.

### POSTERS FEATURE DRIVE

ONE NAMED "THE SPIRIT OF AMERICA" BY ARTIST.

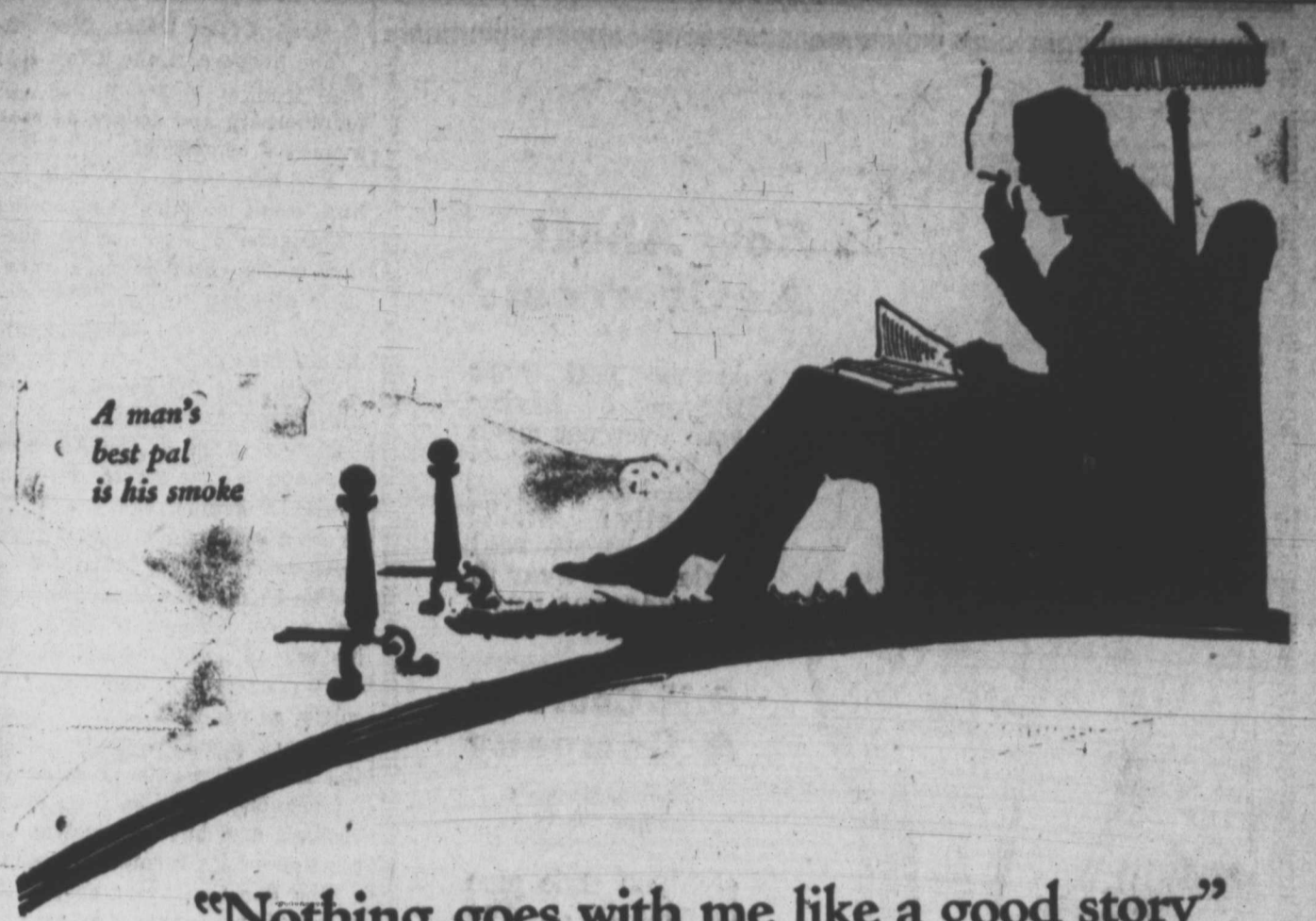
Foremost Painters Portray "Greatest Mother in the World" and Red Cross Nurse.

The services of some of the foremost artists in the country have been obtained in connection with the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11. Posters by Howard Christy and Haskell Coffin are features of a preliminary text poster campaign that is being inaugurated.

The Christy poster is entitled "The Spirit of America." A silken flag—the National Colors—forms the background in front of which stands the appealing figure of a Red Cross nurse. At the bottom of the poster is a large red cross and the inscription "Join."

The Red Cross nurse is also the subject of the poster by Coffin. This is in pastel shades and portrays one of the merciful workers with arms outstretched in supplication. The poster bears only the inscription "Third Red Cross Roll Call." Another poster has to do with the better health program of the Red Cross and has the "Greatest Mother" as a background to a text which reads "Make our Red Cross in Peace as in War—The Greatest Mother in the World."

More than 40,000 window displays are being prepared for use in mercantile stores throughout the country. Department stores in the larger cities have promised to feature these displays during the Roll-Call period. Special moving picture slides and motion news pictures have been arranged for and will be provided for use prior to and during the campaign.

**Green Feeds In Winter.** Green feeds, such as sprouted oats, alfalfa meal, chopped alfalfa, and clover hay, cabbage, and mangled beets should be supplied hens confined in small yards and also to all hens during the winter season when no green feed is available. Cabbage may be hung up in the poultry house. Beets are usually split and stuck on nails on the side walls of the pen about one foot above the floor. Frozen vegetables can be thawed out and fed to fowls, but usually do not keep well after thawing. Clover and alfalfa may be fed as hay, cut into one-fourth or one-half inch lengths, or they may be bought in the form of meal. **Red Cross Drive, Nov. 2-11.**  
The purpose of the Third Red Cross Roll Call is to renew each expiring membership and secure as many new members as possible.

The Red Cross Roll Call is an annual event in which the American Red Cross submits its record to the people and seeks from them a renewal of their allegiance.

The Red Cross needs people quite as much as money and wants not only a dollar, but the heart, the head, the service, of its members.

Money given by the American people and administered by American business genius has made the Red Cross a stupendous business organization, but the loyal enlistment of the people themselves has made it a spiritual force difficult to parallel in the history of organized endeavor.

The American Red Cross is not solely a war-time organization. For 32 years previous to the great war the Red Cross existed in America as a peace organization. Its present activities are but a renewal and expansion of its former program.

The Red Cross is a cooperative and coordinating, as well as an operative agency. One of its primary purposes will be to stand back of existing organizations and to give them its encouragement and support.

The Red Cross is continuing and expanding its program in response to requests from hundreds of communities in this country that feel the need of expert advice in solving their welfare, health and community problems.

**Plans for the Future.**

Fore most will be nation-wide activity for the promotion of public health, and hand-in-hand with this crusade will go a vigorous campaign for the extension of the country's nursing resources; the broadening of Home Service, so that in addition to benefiting families of soldiers and sailors, it will be of general usefulness where other social agencies are lacking; greatly increased Junior Red Cross activities; extension of Red Cross facilities for emergency disaster relief; completion of relief measures for the victims of the war in this country and overseas, and preparation to fulfill whatever duties may be laid upon it as the official volunteer relief social authorized to assist the Army and Navy.

The primary purpose of the American Red Cross is to serve the American people.

**West Texas In The Saddle.**  
It is a noteworthy circumstance that of the twenty-nine county agricultural exhibits at the State Fair at Dallas, nineteen are from counties in the western and northwestern part of the State. The Panhandle and the great Plains section have looked upon the fair as a great show window wherein may be displayed to thousands of eyes the agricultural greatness of their homelands, and with an enterprise which goes hand in hand with their supremacy in food and feed production they have taken advantage of the opportunity to a much greater degree than have other sections of the State.

It is something to be the biggest thing at an event of this kind, even in preponderance of numbers alone, but West Texas and the Panhandle do not rest their case only in numbers and extent of exhibits. Individual excellence of the exhibits claims the attention of the fair visitors and diversification of products is a marvel to the one-crop farmer of the oldest sections of the State.

It goes without saying that West Texas and Panhandle livestock easily carry off the honors at the fair, as they have in the past. The farm exhibits themselves demonstrate that these sections of the State are as productive as any in the world, and the enterprise which brought such a large number of county exhibits attests to a wide-awakeness of West Texas and Panhandle people that goes well with supremacy in production.

A wonderful food empire is being builded to the west and the northwest, and the whole world is coming to know it.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

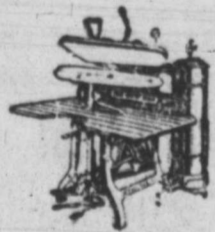

The banking institutions of a community are as a rule the criterion by which the prospective resident judges the standing of that community.
