

The News was for the hospital because there is a distinct need for one in Canyon. We believe that the question is not defeated but merely postponed until an organization can be formed which will take enough interest to work out a definite and concrete plan that can be submitted to

The Hale county democratic chairman threatens to haul before the grand jury for perjury every voter who entered the democratic primary in July and then voted the republican ticket in November. Were this possible the grand jury of every county would have a merry time at the next meeting. Personally we can see no sense in that portion of the pledge on the ballot which says the voter will support the nominees of the primary. The first part of the pledge is right and should be strictly enforced. Republicans have no business going into the democratic primary any more than democrats would have in entering the republican primary. But when it comes to a final selection between two men to fill an office, it is no one's business who any man or woman shall vote for. If the democratic party selects a man the democratic voter cannot conscientiously support, and the republican nominee is a man in whom the voter has confidence; the principles of a free and [democratic government is undermined when the state says the voter must by law support the nominee of the primary he enters whether he wants the nominee or not. At least the Randall county grand jury would have a merry time were it to investigate all of the cases of democrats "not staying at home" in the general election.






