CYCLONE EAST OF **TOWN HITS FRED** SCHUTTE'S PLACE

FEARFUL DESTRUCTION OF LIVE STOCK AND PROPERTY

Storm Hit About 4:30 Sunday Afternoon, Covering Territory About Two Miles Long.

The house belonging to Fred Schutte living five miles east of town, was torn into splinters, all sheds, and fences stock killed as the result of a cyclone terday. which dipped down a mile south of his farm home Sunday afternoon, and finally lifted a mile to the north.

The storm was seen to gather about four miles west of Canyon and rapidly travel to the east. The cyclone-did not let down to the earth until reaching the G. B. Bourland farm east of town. A heavy hail accompanied the storm and beat out several wheat fields in

The strength of the storm swung to the W. S. Hastings place, killing one cow, one horse and crippling another cow. It missed the Hastings home, turning north, passing the Bourland home about two hundred yards to the east of the house and seemed to hit dead center into the Schutte place. Not a single board of the house was left standing on the foundation. The windmill was picked out of the ground, late instructions and betray confidanchor posts and all. A small pile of grain remained where the grainary had stood. Sheds, barns and fences were smashed and completely demol-

The only stock Mr. Schutte has remaining are a few hogs and chickens. One old sow with her pigs escaped uninjured. Another big fine sow with a good litter had her back broken and form, efficiently and effectively. had to be killed. Several chickens were completely picked of all feathers.

The storm headed toward the Gus Leseberg home, but fortunately had spent itself before great damage was done. Mr. Leseberg lost his windmill, and his header was carried up against the side of the house, but no further damage resulted.

Randall county has boasted that no cyclone has ever touched this section. In fact, there have possibly been no more than half a dozen cyclones in the entire Panhandle country within the past ten or fifteen years. 



The Wonders of America By T. T. MAXEY

ESTES-ROCKY MOUNTAIN TIONAL PARK.

MANY years ago three Englishmen hunted big game in the Rocky mountains. They had hunted in Asia, Africa and South America, but as they stood on the continental divide in northcentral Colorado and looked down into Estes park it seemed to them a very paradise on earth. One of Colorado's most satisfying outing places ever since that time Uncle Sam. in 1915, proclaimed part of Estes and the territory immediately to the west a pational park.

Only 70 miles from Denver, it is the most accessible to the largest number of people of any of our great national playspots. Here, at an average elevation of 7,500 feet above sea level, is a pine-scented, snow-capped pleasureland-a perfectly delightful refuge of peaceful grandeur, where one may be out every day from May to October in clear, bracing air, beneath a bright but scorchless sun and enjoy every night the cool, refreshing sleep that only the mountains can induce.

Long's Peak stands sentinel over the park, in which are lakes on which float ice cakes in August; masses of snow (glaciers) a mile long and hundreds of feet thick, supposed to be older than the pyramids of Egypt, always exposed to the sun, far away from their starting point, yet slower than a snail; moraines-great ridges formed by glaclers which moved through the park centuries ago; rock-walled canyons; magnificent forests of pine and aspen; numerous mountain-trout streams; broad valleys, carpeted with luxuriant wild flowers of many varieties, including the delicate columbine—the state flower of Colorado.
