In Nov. 1918 Mr. Arnold bought the plant. He had replaced all generators. There are now 41 street lights, which have been put on a new circuit this past year, and railroad crossing light. The plant is now running 19 hours per day. There is no day load at this time, but Mr. Arnold hopes to secure a small unit before summer to take care of this light day load. It takes as much coal to produce the 8 to 10 kw. which are now being used during the day, as though 75 kws. were being used. RADIO PARTS COMING IN.



This question was asked the Eagle by County Superintendent Eck Smith, of Brazos county, As long as we have a system of education that will give the child on one side of the highway three months^{tr} public school training and perhaps on the other side of the same road in the same county children will receive six or perhaps nine months of public school training there is something radically wrong. Every child in the commonwealth of Texas should have the same chance of winning knowledge. Texas has amended and patched her constitution until it is almost a joke-a public calamity. Texas needs a new deal to take her place among the great states of the Union. The public schools of Texas must be maintained on a basis of equity and every child must have the same chance based upon attendance and not on enrollment and the public school houses of Texas, fully equipped and with a force of militant teachers for nine mouths in the year. An uneducated and untrained citizenship for the future means disaster and a decaying citizenship. The time has come in Texas for a new deal and a new constitution to meet the demands of the new conditions and perpetuate and save our great institutions that stand for liberty, justice and civilization. Shall we hesitate longer? Our forefathers wrought well and laid a great foundation but we have wasted much of their heritage and now there must be another sovereign declaration for future greatness and glory of the commonwealth. Shall we fail?
