NEW COURSE OF STUDY HAS BEEN PRINTED.

Very Strong Faculty Will Have Charge of Public School During the Coming Year.

The Canyon Public Schools will open next Tuesday morning for the year's work. Mondays will be observed as the weekly holiday throughout the year as has been the custom in the past. The two ward schools will teach on Monday and observe the Saturday holiday, as this is more convenient to the pupils.

During the summer months the school building has been painted, and all of the seats renovated and repainted. The building will be in first class condition with the opening of school next Tuesday.

A new Course of Study has been printed and ready for distribution. One of the booklets will be placed in the home of each patron of the school in order that the parents may see what the school is expecting of the children during the coming year.

Suprerintendent A. D. Payne states that he has met all of the teachers at the Institute being conducted at the Normal this week, and that all are highly enthusiastic over the possibilities of the coming year. There are not quite so many hogs in the show this The people of Canyon will desire year as last, but the competition is going to be keener when the judging starts today.


