The fate of Canyon's schools will be settled June 2nd, when the election will be held to raise the tax rate from 75c to \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation. We understand some tax payers say they will vote against the tax increase. Just what does this mean? If the tax should fail to carry, there is just one answer—that the school year coming in September would be cut short about three months on account of the lack of funds. It would mean that good teachers would hardly be induced to teach in a six months school when they could go to a nine months school; it would mean that the state affiliation the school now has would be lost, as this state affiliation can be maintained only by having a nine months school term. But some voters may consider this warning as pure bunk. If they will investigate for one moment they will realize the truthfulness of the statement. The interest and sinking fund for the new building will cost the district \$7,500 per year. This amount must be paid whether there is any school held or not. \$7,500 per year means 25 cents on the \$100 valuation of the taxable property of the district. If this \$7,500 is not added to the tax roll through the increased levy then it must be taken from the amount collectable under the 75 cent rate, which would mean a shortening of the school term, as the trustees would have no other methods of raising money. It is true that valuations might be increased to partly offset the increased tax, but in this case the fellow who votes against the increased rate would simply be robbing himself in order that corporations, whose assessable values are more or less fixed would escape further taxation by keeping the old tax rate and the old valuations, while the property owners who are not now assessed as any way near full value would have to be boosted to cover this decrease. The people of Canyon have decreed by unmistakable majorities in three elections that they wanted good schools, and when they voted in favor of a new high school building we believe they thoroughly understood that it meant higher taxes, and this being the case we are convinced that on June 2nd they will go to the polls and vote in favor of the additional tax levy in order to pay for the new building which they voted to build, and to maintain the schools at the present high standards.

Texas is farming out her prisoners to a shirt manufacturing company for labor in the factory. Such a thing is a hard blow to the citizenship of Texas, and to the fair name of the greatest commonwealth in this nation. In addition to being entirely unfair to the laboring men of Texas, it is unjust and unspeakable from the viewpoint of the convict. If our prisons are to manufacture a worse criminal element than we confine within the institutions, we have failed. An earnest attempt should be made to reform those unfortunates who are taken into the folds of the laws, and certain-

ly farming the convict out to the unmerciful manufacturer is no way to reform the unfortunate. Farming with the convicts has proven a failure. Farming is a scientific profession, and convicts and prison guards are not to be classed as scientific. Texas should go into the road building business with the convicts. It is the only practical method many states have found of employing the convicts, and is profitable to the state, and not detrimental to the convicts.

America has more fires than all of the rest of the world combined. The people of Europe build more substantially than we do, in the first place, as a home remains in the family for centuries, and wood is more scarce there than here. However, the insurance companies do not lay so much blame on the materials used as upon the habits of the people of the different countries. America is a very careless nation in regard to fire and fire hazards. America is careless in the use of matches; in the disposal of cigarettes; in the neglect of burning trash. We are paying the price in high insurance rates. Every fire adds to the cost of this insurance. A little prevention would save millions of dollars in fire losses and other millions in fire insurance premiums. But America is too busy to consider a few paucity millions. We are used to such big things in this flourishing young nation of ours.

Governor W. A. Johnson died at Memphis Saturday morning. Johnson was a country newspaper man who gave his life for his state, and was one of the outstanding leaders in the politics of the state. He was a regent of the state university for several years. He served the Panhandle as state senator for eight years; he was lieutenant governor under Hobby. Texas has lost two of her outstanding newspaper men during the past week—Lee J. Rountree and W. A. Johnson. We were honored to be numbered as a friend of both. Both went out suddenly, dying while in their line of duty. Texas has need of more men such as Rountree and Johnson. Texas has sustained a great loss in the death of these men, but Texas is richer on account of the lives they lived and the work they did while with us.

Governor Neff is right in asking for a Commission to collect historical material for the state. Historical material does not continue forever unless some one takes the pains to collect and preserve it. Texas has a vast amount of priceless historical material that is fast passing away. Today is too late to get much of this material. Tomorrow will see much more of it destroyed.

The Germans have made an offer of settlement of the war indemnity. It was promptly rejected by the French. The fact that the offer was made is cheerful news. It shows that the nations will attempt to get together, but as slowly as two experienced mule traders.

The Lubbock Avalanche was burned Sunday night. This is the second time the Avalanche has burned out in the past five years. The Avalanche bloom-

ed forth a bigger and greater paper after the first fire. We trust that the paper shall not suffer from the last fire.

The Panhandle is going after the Texas Press Association meet for Amarillo in 1924. The best way to get that meeting is for every Panhandle publisher to become a member of the Texas Press Association, and to be at the meeting in Galveston next month.

Fliers have crossed the United States in a non-stop run, going at the rate of 100 miles per hour. A few years ago a prize of \$50,000 was offered the first man to fly across the little English Channel. The world do move!

A White Way for Canyon is something to be greatly desired and to be worked for by all of our citizens. The town is not sufficiently lighted. More street lights and a White Way will add greatly to the beauty of the city.

**MAY BEETLE OR JUNE BUG**

The beetles seen crawling late of evenings are causing some damage to wheat and are still to be found in droves or herds. Soon breeding season will be on and at this time they will be scattered and their damage will be more severe. This is the time to do effective work. There are three different methods that can be used very effectively:

1. The roller used especially on the sown ground as you have a firm foundation.
2. The bar ditch made either with the road grader or a good sod plow. In this ditch ever 10 or 20 feet dig a post hole 12 to 18 inches deep with straight smooth sides. The beetles can not fly and are very awkward and will fall in and soon die.
3. Poison Bran Mash. Made as follows: 20 pounds bran, 3 pounds arsenate of lead, 3 1-2 gallons water, 2 quarts of cheap molasses, 3 lemons or oranges grated fine; this is enough to scatter over 5 acres of ground where the beetles are starting in a field. This can be scattered for 6 to 8 feet in width across 40 acres and will be very effective.

Some measures should be followed as the beetles will do damage to the row crops.

### Dairy School at Zita Success; Jowell Community Next Place

The first of the one-half day dairy schools which is to be given by the College Departments of Agriculture and Home Economics was held at Zita school house Wednesday evening. The school was more of a demonstration than a lecture.

Prof. F. R. Phillips told the object of the meeting and gave a short talk on Dairy Farming which was illustrated by a large chart with many pictures. He was followed by T. C. Thompson, who gave a demonstration with the latest model cream separator. Mr. Thompson gave the most approved methods of taking care of dairy equipment; however, he stressed the fact that he came only at Mr. Phillips' invitation to show the people the latest dairy equipment and not for the purpose of trying to persuade them that his line of utensils were the only line one should buy.

#### Makes Fireless Cooker

Miss Burton of the Home Economics Department of the College told about the importance of milk in the diet. She talked about school lunches and illustrated her talk with a few things that have been found helpful in preparing hot lunches at the school houses. She gave a demonstration in making a fireless cooker using a bushel basket, a two-gallon bucket, a brick and some ashes. Miss Olga Standifer, who will have charge of the Home Economics work for the Canyon High School assisted Miss Burton.

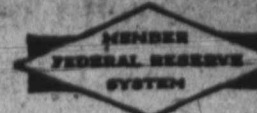

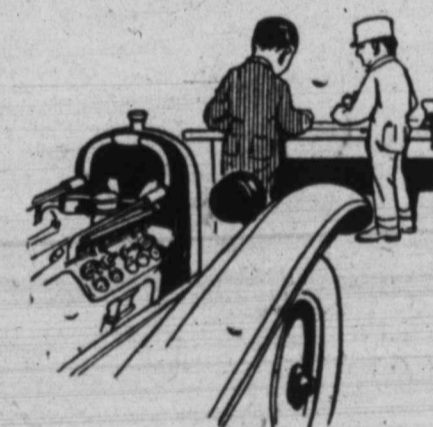
