**THE GALVESTON MEETING**

The Texas Press Association held at Galveston last week was captivated by the Panhandle idea, and needed only an invitation to vote unanimously to make Amarillo the meeting place of the Association in 1924.

The Panhandle bunch went to the Galveston meeting strong and determined that the association would come to the Plains. It was as much a Panhandle fight as any we have ever seen. The Amarillo people are no more interested in the success of the vote to bring the convention to Amarillo than were the people of other Panhandle towns.

The ground work for the fight was laid at Denton last year when the Panhandle boys made the invitation. At the Panhandle Press Association meeting this spring little was thought of excepting the fact that the Panhandle would go to Galveston to get the big association meeting.

From the time the Panhandle bunch got on the train at Amarillo and started to Galveston until the vote was taken, every publisher from West Texas was on the job boosting for the Association to come to Amarillo. After the unanimous consent was given, then every fellow went to work urging that all attend this meeting. It is no farther from Galveston to Amarillo than it was for a bunch of our people from Amarillo to Galveston. But some of those fellows down the state do not look at things as we do out here in the West.

The Panhandle was truly in the saddle at this meeting. Sam Braswell of Clarendon was elected president of the Association for the coming year; L. P. Loomis of Canadian, poet; E. A. Carlock of Paducah, member of the executive committee; J. L. Nunn of Amarillo, flag custodian.

The Panhandle people are going to work with a view of showing the bunch from down state how things are done in the West. A special train will come from Ft. Worth, and towns along the line are asking for the privilege of feeding the bunch. Arrangements are being made to care for those coming up on the Santa Fe from the south. One of the features of the convention will be a visit to Canyon and the College. A special train will likely be used for this since the weather was against the trip planned for the Panhandle Press this spring.

The meeting this year was one of the largest in the history of the Texas Press Association, with about four hundred present. Galveston furnished a little entertainment, but the guests had to do much of the entertaining themselves, and this time was spent in the Gulf.

West Texas has again demonstrated the fact that it has not forgotten how it can rain.

One of the richest producing oil fields in the United States belongs to the Osage Indians in Oklahoma. 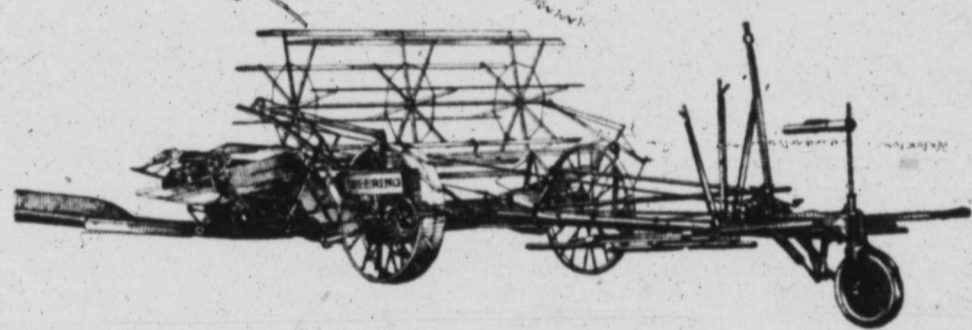

Selection of the subject for debate next year by the students of Texas High Schools has been made by the State Executive Committee of the Interscholastic League. The subject is, "Resolved, that the United States should join the League of Nations."

A special debate bulletin is being prepared by the Austin authorities, and both sides of the question will be presented in brief form.

The debates on this subject are expected to be of much popular interest. Over one thousand pupils participated in the debating contests this year, and the number is expected to be even greater the coming year.

Besides developing the speaking ability of the participants, the yearly debates are intended to educate the public to the general needs of the country, and to awaken more interest in the vital public issues.
