30th ANNUAL PIONEER REUNION ATTENDED BY NEARLY 1,000

Despite soaring temperatures, approximately 1,000 persons attended the 30th Annual Callahan County Pioneer Reunion at Treadaway Park in Cross Plains Friday. Old settlers, 375 strong, braved the blazing sun to register and enjoy the day's activities.

At an afternoon business meeting, the Callahan pioneers voted to continue the reunion on a yearly basis, and approved a slate of officers selected by the nominating committee.

Serving the organization in 1969 will be: J. Rupert Jackson Jr. of Baird, president; Frank Spencer of Cross Plains, vice-president; and Mrs. B. L. Boyd-stun of Baird, secretary-treasurer. Outgoing president is I.

G. Mobley of Putnam.

Morning activities included registration, presentation of ribbons to old settlers and a silent tribute to deceased pioneers, led by B. H. Freeland, Master of Ceremonies. Also serving as Master of Ceremonies during the day were James Paul Shanks, Callahan Co. Attorney and Randall Jackson of Abilene.

Guest speakers for the occasion were Dale King of Anson and Jim Ashlock of Washington. D. C. Mr. King, administrative assistant to Congressman Omar Burleson, spoke on politics. Ashlock, a native of Baird, now regional official for Eastern Airlines, reviewed the county's history and high points of the "old days."

During the afternoon, personal award winners were recognized. B. D. Bell of Cross Plains, area resident for 88 years was recognized as the earliest cowboy and also earliest pioneer man. Earliest pioneer woman was Mrs. Louella Childress Knox of Houston, who also traveled the greatest distance of the ladies. Mrs. Knox came to Callahan County in 1885.

M. P. Wilcoxon of Cottonwood, resident of the county the past 30 years, was recognized as the oldest man with continuous residence in the county. Oldest native born man with continuous county residence was J. P. Purvis, 80, of Cross Plains.

Oldest man and woman present who were born in Callahan County were John A. Burks of Girard, who is 82, and Mrs. Martha Holley of Merkel, 85.

The man coming the greatest distance to attend the reunion was Wyatt Robinson of Los Angeles, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams of Cross Plains were recognized as the couple having been married the longest. The Williams will be married 55 years Dec. 25th.

Completing activities of the 30th reunion, the old-timers were entertained with an old fiddlers contest, square dancing and a show presented by Cross Plains Riding Club.

Supt. Jon Tate and family have moved into the L. B. Howard home in Ross Acres. Mr. and Mrs. Tate have one son, age 4. They moved to Baird from Albany where Mr. Tate was Principal of Albany High School.

Bill Gunn, age 37, with 13 years experience in teaching, will be Baird High School Principal. The Gunn family will move to Baird around August 17 from Sinton where he taught Math and was Head Basketball Coach. Mr. and Mrs. Gunn have one daughter, in Junior High. Mr. Gunn was a member of the Cross Plains faculty from 1956 until 1961.

Bill Denman, 40 years old, will assume the duties of Elementary and Junior High Principal. Mr. and Mrs. Denman and family are making their home on North Market Street in Baird. Callahan County Outpost Staked

Davis Brothers of Abilene staked No. 1 Mrs. Tom B. Barton, et al, in Callahan County, southeast of Eula.

The planned 1,500 foot rotary venture, which will test the Moutray Sand, is 3/8 mile southeast of production. It spots 850 feet from the south and 2,800 feet from the east lines of Section 15, BBB&C Survey.

Location has been amended for Davis Brothers No. 6 J. T. Edwards, in the same area.

New sites is 330 feet from the south and 1,600 feet from the east lines of the northeast quarter of Section 18, BBB&C Survey. Permit depth applied for is 1,500 feet with rotary.

Applications amending the operator and location have been filed for two regular field projects four miles north of Putnam.

W. E. Miller of Cisco is now the operator. They were originally filed by B. F. Thomas and W. E. Miller.

No. 3 J. E. Burnam is 1,100 feet from the north and 340 feet from the west lines of Section 22&2, TE&L Survey.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the electors at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per cent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1964, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of an election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-J to read as follows:

"Section 1-J. NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature, provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

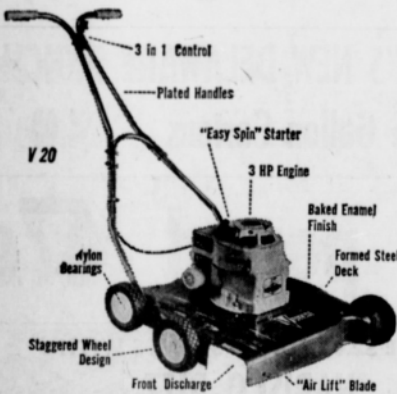


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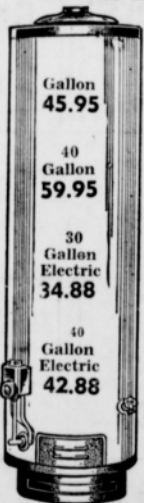
