

PARIS—(A)—The Ministry of the Interior announced Wednesday the expulsion from France of 19 Russians for "interference in French affairs" during the current labor crisis, which erupted in new violence as police and strikers battled in the streets of Lyon.

The announcement identified the Russians as members of the "Soviet Patriotic Union" and said they included the president, the treasurer and two secretaries-general of the organization.

The 19 were taken by bus to an unstated frontier and put across the border, the ministry said.



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



The Cowboy Crusader

The day before Congress reconvened, Senator Glen Taylor of Idaho, dressed in checkered shirt, cowboy pants, boots and sombrero, rode a horse up to the Capitol steps. There he told a small group of passing sightseers that he had just completed a nationwide peace tour-part of it

It will be recalled that Senator Taylor has given nonsenatorial shows on Capitol Hill before. Two years ago, when he first came to the Senate, he brought his family and his guitar up there and sang the housing blues because he couldn't find a place to live. But he seems to have confined himself to the spoken word on his recent

"A voice for peace must have some device to attract attention," he said, in explaining the rodeo costume and the horse. "Peace, it seems, does not make the headlines."

Now peace is not a word which requires elaborate definition. But in order to go along with the senator on that statement, in the face of contrary evidence of actions and sentiments, it might be necessary to know what he

We do not have transcripts of the seven speeches which the senator made on his tour. But his views on foreign policy in the recent past have seemed to agree generally with Henry Wallace's. So, perhaps, he really means that Senator Taylor's prescription for peace is not

Evidently Taylor does not think that the Marshall Plan is a plan for peace, or his remark about the headlines could not have been made.

Hunger, poverty, unemployment and other aspects of economic instability lead to political instability. That, in turn, is an invitation to civil war and international war. An effort to remove these war-breeding conditions could logically be called an effort in the cause of peace. But the senator from Idaho seems to think otherwise.

Maybe he was deceived by the oratory of Vishinsky and other excited Russians. They keep harping on American war-mongering and imperialism. But, stripped of their verbiage, their speeches are largely taken up with Russia's strength to meet an imaginary threat—Russia's historic defeat of invaders, her great record in World War 2,400 ocean-going ships with an U. S. industrial production, 33 II, her vigilance, her alleged discovery of the atomic bomb aggregate of 400,000 gross tons— per cent of its gainful employment and so on. One might say that they are doing a more than half as much as Great ment and more than 40 per cent bit of left-handed war-mongering.

If such harangues have misled the senator into believing that he is one of the few American spokesmen opposed to war, we earnestly hope that he will sit down and read the Russian diplomats' speeches more carefully. If they are not the basis for his tour, then it is difficult to escape the unflattering conclusion that it is Senator Taylor who must have some device to attract attention and make the headlines.

Displaced Persons Bill Has Support Of Women Voters Group

Support for legislation permitting the United States to admit its fair share of the displaced persons was renewed by the national board of the League of Women Voters at a recent meeting in Washington, it was announced by officials of the Midland League of Women Voters.

The board voted to urge the Senate and House to give attention to this matter early in the year and to act favorably on it during the 80th Congress. Miss Anna Lord Strauss, national president, said, further delay on our part can be justified neither by moral, economic, or political grounds."

Miss Strauss said the United States, as the wealthiest and most productive nation in the world cannot dodge its responsibility in helping to solve this problem which casts a continuous shadow on hopes

A farm business should be large enough to pay operating costs, interest on the investment, and family living expenses. J. L. Tennant A southern New England dairy farm, for example, should have at least 18 cows per man; a poul-

try farm, 1,500 layers; a market-garden farm, 10 acres; a potato farm, 40 acres; and an apple farm, 20 acres. Doing more business with the same capital investment is one way to lower costs and higher profits. With the larger business, the operator can spend more of his time at productive work. For example, workers on a dairy farm with 9 to 10 cows per man will be just as busy as on a farm with 15 to 18 cows per man. The gross sales and net income on the larger opera-

used in producing milk. Reducing costs per unit puts the farm operator in a stronger competitive position. If more crop land cannot be bought, perhaps it can be rented. Another plan is to check means by which crop production on present acreage can be increased. Ways to do this include: the use of lime and fertilizer; winter cover crops; higher yielding varieties; double

cropping; drainage and terracing. Another step toward efficiency is to install modern equipment which enables one person to produce more per hour. Overhead costs per unit of product can be lowered when each machine is used profitably for as many hours as possible.



Track Down the Facts

Old Ringtail, the racoon, holes up in hollow trees. He's hard to track down without trained 'coon dogs . . similarly, there are some hard-tolocate facts about any business. But no one needs any special "fact hunting" ability to get all the facts about

what determines livestock prices. A recent top price for beef steers on a midwest market was \$35, with an average of near \$30; best lambs, \$23.50, average \$23, and hogs were selling up to \$30, with a \$27 average. These prices for livestock are unusual but, in general, they are due to the demand for meats being greater than the supply. They reflect what the consumer is willing and able to pay for meats. All farmers and ranchers should remember these basic facts, whether prices are high or low. The price producers receive for their livestock is governed by what the packer can get for the meat and the by-products.
