The budget was not available for the Press as late as Wednesday because the county auditor's office was working on it. It will be presented in this paper next week.

Reason for tabling the hospital bond issue petition was that there were not enough qualified voters Wednesday afternoon, to sign. To have forced the election would have required signatures of 10 per cent of the tax paying poll tax holding voters.

Master Mix Recipe: 9 cups sifted all purpose flour 1-3 cup double acting baking powder

tablespoon salt tablespoon cream of tartar

1-4 cup sugar 2 cups shortening which do not require refrigeration

Stir baking powder, salt, cream of tartar and sugar into flour. Sift ogether three times into a large mixing bowl. Cut in shortening with a pastry blender, until the mix is the consistency of corr meal, Store in covered containers at room temperature. To measure the master mix, pile it lightly into a cup and level off with a spatula.

Recipes Using Master Mix

3 cups master mix

2-3 to 1 cup milk Add milk to the mix at at once stirring 25 strokes. Knead 15 to 18 times on lightly floured board. Roll 1-2 inch thick, Cut. Bake on baking sheets in a hot oven (450) from 10-12 minutes. Makes 18 two-inch biscuits.

Muffins

3 cups master mix

2 tablespoons sugar

cup milk 1 egg

Add sugar to the mix Combine milk and beaten egg. Add to the mix Stir until flour is just mois tened (about 15 strokes.) Bake in greased muffin pans in hot oven (425F.) for about 20 minutes. Makes 12 medium sized muffins.

1 1-2 cups master mix

3-4 cup cornmeal 1-2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoon sugar

3-4 cup sweet milk 1 egg

Stir cornmeal, salt, and sugar into mix. Combine milk and beatenegg. Add to the mix, stirring until blended. Bake in greased pan in a hot oven (425F) about 30 minutes. Yield: 10" x 10" pan








