LARGEST DAIRY SHOW IN HISTORY OF CASTRO COUNTY HELD HERE FRI.

The largest number of entries and best quality of animals of any previous show were shown at the 2nd Annual Castro County Dairy Show at Dimmitt, April 11.

A total of 67 animals were exhibited with 34 Milking Shorthorns, 27 Jerseys and 6 Guernseys on exhibit.

R. C. Mitchell of Lockney, judge of the show mentioned that this was one of the best county shows he had seen and judged. Entrants were received from all parts of the county.

May 1 Is Deadline To Qualify In 1947 Farm Program

Producers are again reminded that May 1, 1947, is the final date for obtaining prior approval on summer-fallow acreage. Producers desiring to summer-fallow land in 1947 should come to the Castro County AAA office to obtain prior approval before May 1, 1947.

Producers who summer-fallow, but do not obtain their approval before this date will not be eligible for payment for this practice under the 1947 farm program.

Producers are urged to remember that no payment can be made for any practice carried out on his farm unless he secures a written prior approval before the practice is begun. Likewise, eligibility for payment is further conditioned upon the farmer reporting performance after the practice has been completed and before the expiration date shown on the form issued as prior approval.

If at any time during the program year a producer has any questions about any of the conservation work or matters pertaining to the Agricultural Conservation Program, he is cordially invited to contact the Castro County ACA office or his local County Committee.

Producers are urged to remember the payments under the 1947 program are conditioned on the following: (1) Secure prior approval before the practice is begun; (2) Make your reports before the expiration dates and (3) Extensions of time can be secured provided you contact the Castro County ACA office before the expiration date.

Garden Planting Time Is Here

College Station, April 17.—It's time to plant the garden on the High Plains of Texas.

Horticulturists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service list the vegetables that are ordinarily planted on the Plains during early spring. Here they are: beets, spinach, onions, potatoes, mustard, English peas, lettuce, radishes, cabbage, carrots, Swiss chard and a few other hardy plants.

The horticulturists say that experienced Plains gardeners hold off planting the not-so-hardy vegetables, such as tomatoes, peppers, sweet potatoes, cucumbers, squash and pumpkin, until danger of frost is past.

The battle against garden insects will begin as soon as the first green shoots break through, the horticulturists say, so a smart move now for gardener will be to check up on the latest information and materials for controlling insect pests. Agents in county Extension offices will give gardeners city or rural information on controlling insects.

Dimmitt Laundry Moved To New Building Location

The Dimmitt Laundry is being moved to its new location in East Dimmitt, just east of Reuben's Machine Shop, this week. Mr. J. B. Alley, owner stated that the laundry would probably be ready for operation by the latter part of next week. The new home of the laundry is a 20x70 foot barracks building acquired at the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp, and is being remodeled to embody all of the features of a modern laundry.

Proclamation...

Austin, Texas April 17. The State of Texas is planning to celebrate national "Public Health Nursing Week" April 20 to 26, as proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman.

The purpose of the week, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, will be (1) to recruit more public health nurses (2) to increase understanding of the fact that much needless sickness and suffering can be prevented or reduced by using public health nursing services (3) to encourage greater understanding of public health nursing as a service for everybody regardless of size of income (4) to encourage development of public health nursing services wherever needed (5) to increase citizen participation in public health nursing services.

From the beginning of this work more than thirty years ago, public health nurses have been concerned with the total health situation of the family including sickness, disease, prevention, and health protection.

In setting aside April 20-26 as "Public Health Nursing Week" for America, health administrators and all other friends of nursing should exert their efforts toward the extension of public health nursing services, so that there will be enough qualified nurses to meet the needs of all the people, and thus help in maintaining a maximum health level throughout the nation.

Price Support On Potatoes On Small Farms

Under the 1947 Price Support program for Irish Potatoes, producers on farms for which no 1947 farm goal was established will be eligible for support if the acreage planted to potatoes does not exceed 2.9 acres. In order for a producer to be eligible for price support under this plan, it will be necessary to make application in writing to the Castro County A. C. A. Committee for acreage determinations before June 1, 1947.

Price support is restricted to potatoes which are not objectionable because of disease, insect infestation, frost or other damage.

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I HAVE NO RELIGION, BUT I AM AN HONEST MAN

Ask millions of average Americans what they think of religion and their answer will run something like this:

Why, Religion is all right, I suppose. It does a lot of people a lot of good. For myself though, I am not what you would call a religious person. Sure, I believe in God, but that doesn't mean I need to run to church all the time. In fact, I'm far better than most of those people who are always running to church. I found out that many of them are just hypocrites.

"I treat the other fellow the way I want to be treated. I work hard to take care of my family. I mind my own business and pay my debts. I am respectable and honest. That's my religion."

But is that honest? Is that religion? A mediocre and insufficient kind of honesty, yes. No one denies that there is a minimum honesty which consists in avoiding some stupid excesses and in discharging certain duties which are popularly regarded as those of a respectable person, especially when no great sacrifice is involved and when it serves one's personal interests. However a person is thoroughly honest, when he is careful to respect all his obligations. When he disregards his obligations to God—his Creator upon whom he owes all he is or has, is he truly honest?

He may attempt to keep his conduct and his relations with others respectable but still he disregards his obligations to God, which cannot be disregarded without denying His Supremacy—His very existence. He withholds honor, loyalty, and service where they are due. That is not being honest with God.

When he insists that he fulfills his duties to himself, to those near and dear to him and to his neighbor, but not to God, is that religion? It looks like religion—with religion left out. You may call it

the Golden Rule, brotherly love, respectability, humanitarianism, and the will to cause trouble to no one, but this is religion with God left out. There cannot be practical Brotherhood of Men when the most important Fatherhood of God is disregarded.

No, religion is simply elementary justice which obliges us to give God the recognition, the honor, the loyalty and the respect which is rightfully His and which is our duty privately as individuals and publicly with our fellow men. Leave God out of the picture and you are unjust—you are dishonest. How can you disregard God in your life without being irreligious?

There is no such thing as full-fledged Christian honesty when you are concerned only about the rule "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," but are admittedly unconcerned about the more important command: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with thy whole mind..."

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HAPPY EDGE CLUB

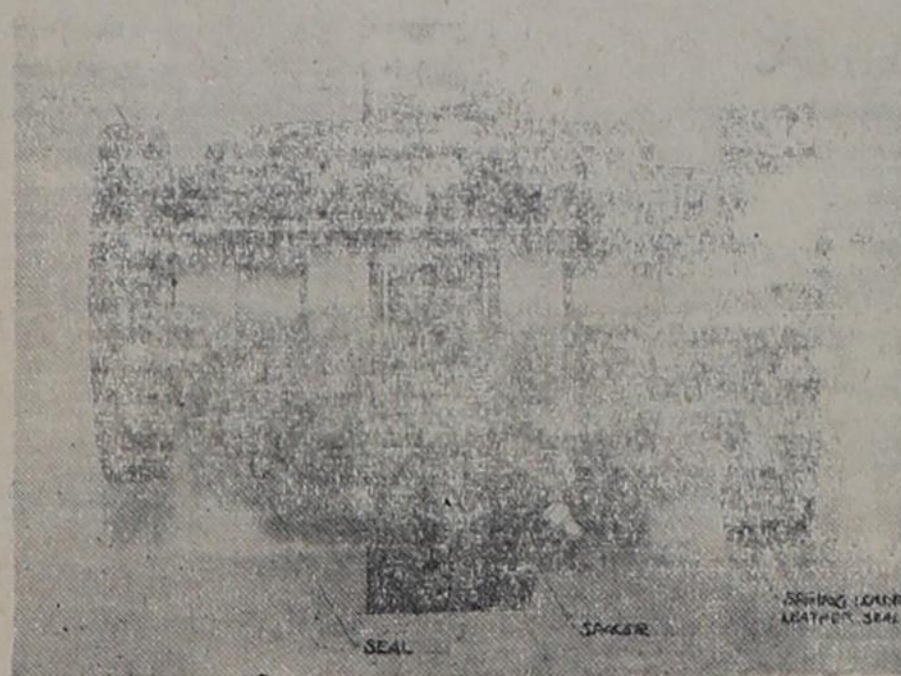
The Happy Edge club met in the home of Mrs. Frank Henderson April 9.
