# LASTING PEACE CAN'T BE ONE OF VICTORY

SUCH IS STATEMENT OF PRESI-DENT WILSON IN A PERSONAL MESSAGE TO THE SENATE.

### WORLD LEAGUE PROPOSED

United States Could Enter Only if Justice is to Be Guaranteed All.

Opinion Not Unanimous.

Washington.-Whether the United States shall enter a world peace league and, as many contend, thereby abandon its traditional policy of plation and no entangling alliances as laid squarely before congress and the country Monday by Presi-Wilson in a personal address to the senate.

For the first time in more than a hundred years a president of the United States appeared in the senate chamber to discuss the nation's foreign relations after the manner of Washington, Adams and Madison. Russo-Roumania Lines Apparently Hold Against Enemy Onslaughts.

London.-The advance of the Teutonic allies in Roumania apparently has been brought to a standstill for the time being at least by the reinforced Russians and Roumanians. In the latest Berlin official communication the only successes reported for the invaders were gained through a surprise attack between the Suchitza and Putna valleys, where the army of Archduke Joseph captured an officer, 230 men and one machine gun, and south of the Oituz road, where a strong Russian attack was repulsed



# FEEDING FRUIT-EATING BIRDS FOOD PLANTS ALONG THE SEA-

Feeding fruit-eating birds is best ac in addition to fruit enough for all the birds. So far as fruit alone is concerned, fall is the season of overflowing abundance; in winter the supply gradually decreases, and late winter and early spring are the seasons of nectual scarcity. This is the critical time of year for many birds, and a plentiful supply of wild fruit will tide them over. Fortunately, everywhere fruits that performs the critical time of the control complished by planting selected spe-cies of fruit-bearing shrubs and trees. them over. Fortunately, everywhere eral trees and shrubs are better to in the United States there are some fruits that persist until there is no longer any need of them. If enough are planted, no birds able to live on this class of food should starve. The heart of these long-resisting fruits are attached to the start of the star best of these long-persisting fruits are juniper, bayberry, thorn apples and related fruits, holly and snowberry.

Information on fruits useful for this purpose in any section of the United States may be obtained from the United States bureau of biological survey.

Birds devour cultivated fruit principally because the processes of cultivation diminish the wild supply. The Japanes presence of wild fruit in a locality always serves to protect domestic va-rieties, especially when the wild trees or shrubs are of the same kind as the cultivated ones and ripen earlier Among those most useful for the pur pose are mulberry, wild blackberries and strawberries, serviceberry, wild and strawberries, ser cherry and elderberry.

### CONTROL THE APPLE BORERS

Insect Lays Its Eggs in or Under Bark

---Most Common Method of

Eradicating Pests.

The round-headed apple-tree borer which has caused so much trouble to orchardists lays its eggs in or under the bark of apple trees. After hatchthe bark of apple trees. After hatching the larvae feed upon the inner bark and wood to such an extent that the tree is seriously weakened or killed. The female lays her eggs, one at a time, in the bark, usually just above the surface of the ground. About 15 or 20 days later the larvae appear. When full grown these are nearly 1½ inches long. They form galleries and thrust out little heaps of reddish wood fragments around the base of the tree. The following year they live in the The following year they live in the trunk and emerge the third year as adult beetles. As the females rarely fly any considerable distance serious


ny any considerable distance serious infestation may be prevented.

The most common method of ridding an orchard of these pests is to cut away the bark in the late winter or common wealth or the serious and very early spring sufficiently to trace the burrows made by the borer. A hooked wire is then inserted into the burrow and the insect pulled out. Where the burrows are curved or obstructed in some way so that the wire cannot be inserted, cotton batting dipped in carbon bisulphide may be in-serted and the hole plugged with moist earth. Pure white lead and raw linseed oil, mixed rather thick, may be used to coat the trees without injury. and when applied to young, smooth bark, will form a protective coat durthe egg-laying season. Before ing painting the earth is removed from the base of the tree for a depth of from three to four inches. ### RABBIT TRAP IS ALWAYS SET

Doors Close Themselves as Soon as Animal Falls Into Underground Box—How It is Made.

This trap may be made any size desired. Two boxes are needed, one to stred. one. The bottom side of the upper box is hinged in two parts. The hinges may be made by boring holes through the boards at the proper places, pass-ing nails through these holes and driv-ing them into the edge of the bottom board, one nail on each side of each pivot. Any bits of iron with holes in can be tacked on for weights to pull the doors shut.

### RABBITS GNAW APPLE TREES

Covering That Extends From Ground to First Branches Will Afford Ample Protection.

If young orchard trees are not pro tected from rabbits and mice during the winter, they are likely to come out in the spring minus a part of the bark.

Any covering that extends from the ground up to the first branches will serve as protection from attacks by these animals. Such materials as corn-stalks, paper, rags, wire screens, or anufactured covering may used. If a close fitting material like paper or wood veneer is used, it is best to remove it in the spring to prevent injurious insects and mice from collect-ing about the trunk of the tree. Wire protectors may be left on for several years. A mulch of seed or grass should never be piled around young trees in winter.—Clemson College Bul-

### BALANCED RATION FOR MILK

Cow Must Be Given Combination Necessary to Maintain Her Functions and Produce Milk.

For the most profitable milk production, the cow must be fed a balanced ration at the cheapest price such ration can be provided. By balanced ration is meant the combination of such a proportion of nutrients and is such quantities as the cow requires to maintain her bodily functions and as she can utilize in the production of maintain her bodily functions and as she can utilize in the production of milk. These nutrients are classified as protein, carbohydrates, and fats. Protein is one of the principal con-stituents of milk; fats and carbohy-drates perform much the same func-tions, that is, produce energy and heat, and in the balancing of a ration are usually classed together. 

COOKING FEEDS FOR SWINE NOT FAVORED

Experiment Stations Have Found Actual Loss in Practice, Says Kansas Expert.

Cooking food for swine generally is not an advisable practice, points out fay Gatewood, instructor in animal haspandry in the Kanses State Agri-

cultural college.
"Much experimenting has been done along this line" said Mr. Gatewood, "and practically all experiment stations have found an actual loss encountered by cooking feeds.

"With most feeds, cooking tends to lower the digestibility, resulting in a larger amount of feed being required to produce a given amount of gain. This raises the expense of production and cuts down the producer's

. Some feeds used in certain localities-such as potatoes, field peas, and roots-have their palatability improved their water content lowered cooking, which results in a ger consumption. These, however, are not common feeds in Kansas. Cooking requires special apparatus and of course takes time and labor, all adding to the expense of pro-

"It may be profitable to heat drinking water and water in which feeds are mixed in cold weather, as this will decrease the amount of feed required to maintain the body temper-

Regular Exercise Is Essential and Hard Work Should Be

12. Don't neglect daily exercise as

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAYSCHOOL LESSON

**LESSON FOR JANUARY 28** REVERENCE OF JESUS FOR HIS FOLLOWERS' HOUSE.

LESSON TEXT-John 2:13-22.
GOLDEN TEXT-My house shall be called a house of prayer.—Matt. 21:13.

Skipping the details of genealogy, birth and boyhood, John plunges into the work and ministry of our Lord. Our previous lessons have taken up the matter of his eternal Godhead, the word made flesh, the witness of John, Jesus and John the Baptist, his first disciples and the wedding at Canaan. Some of these events have been skipped over without much consideration, yet the teacher should review them briefly. The wedding at Canaan probably curred in March, A. D. 27, and the events of this lesson in April of the events of this lesson in April of the Passover week of that year, both events occurring early in the first year of the ministry of our Lord. Jesus went to the wedding for he had many things to teach by means of it. The story is familiar, and yet God is performing the same miracle every year except by somewhat slower process. John lays strong emphasis upon the John lays strong emphasis upon the "signs" which Jesus performed as evidence of his office. This miracle is an allegory. It also throws light upon Jesus' relation to the home.

I. Jesus Applies the Word of God (vv. 12-17). As the "Son of the Law" Jesus observed all of its requirements and therefore went to the Passover (Deut. 16:16; Luke 2:41). We would suggest the reading of Edersheim's "Life of Christ" at this point, especially his description of the feast. Jesus found much of interest, and also saw that which filled his spirit with indigation as he entered the temple (v. 4). Great numbers of oxen and sheep and doves were required for the sacrifices. Every family must bring for sacrifice a lamb, the sacrifices being lain in the inner court near the great altar. Those living nearer the ci could bring their own sacrifices, b those who came from far distant points found it more convenient to purchase their sacrifices nearer the temple. Thus a business had grown up within the courts, which gave rise to an immense amount of covetousness and selfishness. The yearly tax due from every Jew could not be received except in the native coin; hence the money changers within the courts. The result was that the temple had become a "den of thieves" (Mark 11:17). This had undermined the power of religion, and turned men away from the truth. This place, made to be a house of prayer (Jer. 7:11; Isa. 56:7) had become a vanity fair; a show, and the very object of the temple was sacrificed to the greed of gain. The de-fense often made in our day, of buying and selling in the house of God that it has to do with the cause of worship will not bear scrutiny in the light of this passage. Into these sur-roundings this young reformer enters, and places his finger upon the heart of the matter when he quotes the scripture. The reason of his action was what the scripture said about the house of God. Present day followers of Jesus can learn a lesson from these

(vv. 18-22). Jesus spake as one having authority, and these merchants knew they were in the wrong. He em-bodied in himself, as prophet, the moral sentiment of the nation, and exerted his authority. It looked like higherted his authority. It looked like high-handed usurpation unless Jesus were a prophet sent from God; therefore the demand for his credentials (v. 18). Jesus gave a sign, a sign which they did net understand at the time (v. 19; Matt. 12:38-40; 16:1-4). The resur-rection of Jesus is God's seal to all of the claims of Jesus. He also speaks of his body as a symbol and type of what is to take place in their national forty years later, though they at the time did not understand it. Jesus foresaw that these leaders would destroy his body on the cross, and that for the same reason they were at the present time opposing him in what he had done. The Jews, thinking only of their temple, in whose courts they were standing, referred to the time spent in the erection of the building (v. 20), and thought that their argument was invincible, but they did not know what was to take place. Not even the disciples of Jesus understood his words at the time, but after his resurrection at the time, but after his resurrection they remembered them and their fulfillment. The death and resurrection of Jesus was in accordance with the word of God. His whole life, birth and works can be traced in the Old Testament in type and prophecy.

tion and development of this city plan-ning movement emphasizing the need of intrusting its successful exetutive to "duly authorized city officials or a special commissioner created for the purpose," the correction of mistakes, purpose," the correction or mistakes, and the general problems of transpor-tation. In the delightful chapter, "Gar-den Cities," he declares that the gar-den city movement goes much further than to provide attractive homes for those who live in or near large cities or centers of industry. "It is really a protest against the extreme central ization which has lately been the ter dency in city development." Late chapters are devoted to a comparison of city planning legislation in England, Germany and the United States, the municipal progress made under this legislation, methods of financing a city plan, and various municipal land poli-cies. Having indicated in the body of his book "what a city plan is, how It is developed, the various problems It is developed, the various problems to be solved and the conditions which It is necessary to provide for or guard against." Mr. Lewis points out in his concluding chapters the opportunities and responsibilities of the modern mechanical engineer, who is today making "the most substantial contribution toward the orderly development and administration of our cities." Indeed, he declares the basic purpose of his book to be "to bring home to them this responsibility and awaken in them a realization of this opportunity."— The Planning of the Modern City. ### CONCRETE GROWS IN FAVOR

Use of That Material in House Construction Is Becoming Popular With All Classes of Builders.

Since the advent of the concrete block industry, some rapid steps have been made in house construction. The special facings which it is possible to apply to the concrete blocks make them a solution of almost any problem in house building where something special is desired in finish. By the use of white cement in connection with sultable coloring material almost any shade or tint may be obtained and a very close imitation of highly expensive stone may be built at a reasonable cost. Marble, granite, sandstone and lime-stone may be imitated with such ex-actness that there is no advantage gained in the use of the true material

A house just put up in Watertown is an example of the beautiful effect which may be obtained by the use of special face concrete blocks applied to the construction of the porch and chimney of a frame house. The facing used in this case is intended to imitate white marble. This facing consists of a mor-tar made of some brand of white cement and marble chippings.—Boston Herald.

Do not forget that old trees starve to death just as surely as young trees, though by reason of greater bulk and a far-reaching root system they do not so quickly show the ueed of food nor so quickly succumb. Stable manure dug or plowed in 20 or more feet afound the tree will do as much good as anything. Conifers that are trimmed up from the bottom and the soil raked clear, or sown to grass right up to the trunk generally undergo a slow but sure loss of vigor. Soil should be occasionally enriched and dug up deeply and the needles always left for a mulch.

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
