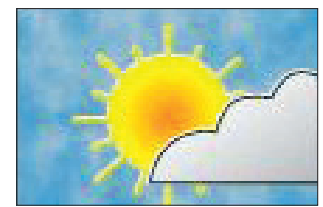

Forsan ISD may 'see green' from efficiency

FORSAN — School officials here are waiting to see if recent efforts to "go green" (become more energy efficient) will help the district "see green" — in other words, save money.

For more than a year, Forsan Independent School District crews have been installing systems designed to make campus buildings more energy

efficient.

Those steps ranged from installing light bulbs that use less energy to using motion detection sensors which allow lights to dim when spaces are not being occupied.

"These systems cost us \$160,000 in up front expenses," Johnson said. "Our consultants say these systems will save us \$23,000

a year, so hopefully, they'll pay for themselves within eight years."

The district recently received some help in paying down that debt when Oncor Electric Delivery Co. announced it was awarding a grant for \$25,000 to the school district as a reward for its efforts to increase energy efficiency.

Oncor established the grant program to help school districts defray costs of switching to new energy sys-

tems.

"Once we completed our projects, we sent the information into Oncor, and they let us know it qualified for the grant," Johnson said.

All public schools receiving electric service through Oncor wires are eligible to apply for grant funding to help pay for energy efficiency upgrades.

Make sure safety is a priority for everyone

As ghouls and goblins of all shapes and sizes get ready to take to the neighborhoods of Big Spring and Howard County to trick-or-treat this Halloween holiday, local officials are urging parents and guardians to stick to general safety guidelines to keep children safe.

According to Big Spring Fire Marshal Carl Condray, safety for trick-or-treaters begins with their costumes.

"You want it to be a fantastic costume, but you shouldn't forget about safety," said Condray. "One of the most overlooked issues, especially with homemade costumes, is whether or not the costume is flammable. You need to make sure that the costume will not catch fire if the material comes in contact with a flame, even for a very brief period. Keep in mind that your children will be going up on

Adult Probation schedules mandatory meetings for offenders

As little trick-or-treaters get ready to hit Big Spring's streets in search of tasty surprises this weekend, District Adult Probation will once again do its part to protect the community with mandatory meetings for local sex offenders currently on probation.

Kent Minchew, director of adult probation for the district, said sex offenders from Howard, Martin and Glasscock counties will gather for a probation meeting at the Howard County Courthouse during traditional trick-or-treat hours Sunday.

"Most of these people are eager to comply with the meeting because it not only keeps the public safe, it keeps them safe as well," said Minchew. "They're

all for it because they can't be accused of violating their probation because we know where they are and what they're doing."

"If they don't attend, I alert the Big Spring Police Department or the Howard County Sheriff's Office and have them pick them up. If they don't have an officer available, then I'll drive to their home and pick them up. Either way, they have to attend."

Minchew said the meeting consists of counseling, as well as a presentation by Victim Services, and marks the fourth year in a row the probation office has held the mandatory gathering, which was based on a similar program used in San Angelo.

"In the past, we would just drive to their homes and make sure their porch lights were off and they weren't doing anything to encourage trick-or-treaters," said Minchew. "It is much easier just to

have them all at one central location."

The District Adult Probation Office won't be the only local agency looking out for children this Halloween.

"We'll have our officers out in support of Adult Probation's program, just as we have in past years," said Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the Big Spring Police Department. "We'll be keeping a close eye on the trick-or-treaters. Unfortunately, we can't be everywhere at once, so as always, it's extremely important for parents to make sure their children are well supervised and as visible as possible when they go out trick-or-treating"

Everett said parents can find a list of sex offenders and their addresses by going to www.bigspringpd.net and visiting the Texas Department of Public Safety portal.

Back to Basics

Steers focus on fundamentals on bye

The Big Spring Steers have gone back to basics on their off week. No preparation for Snyder, no injuries to worry about, no pondering on the loss at Abilene Wylie, just the basics.

It's worked out well for head coach Phillip Ritchey and the Steers, too.

Ritchey said this week has given the Steers a chance to bring coaches from the freshman and junior varsity teams into practice, with the goal being to expose the younger players to what goes on in a varsity practice.

It's somewhat new for the Steers, Ritchey said, but something coaches want to be able to do often.

"We worked everybody

out together," he said. "Just kind of going through some two-a-day-type workouts, just fundamentals. Working the freshmen with the JV, with the varsity and everybody doing the same things. Worked out pretty good for us."

Snyder hasn't been too much of a focus on Big Spring's bye week. Coaches will be watching for the Wylie-Snyder game that will determine what's at stake in the Big Spring-Snyder game next week.

If Wylie beats Snyder tonight, then the Steers and Tigers would play for a playoff spot in the last week of the regular season, winner gets it. If Snyder beats Wylie, however, not only will Snyder or Big Spring

have to win next week, but the point differential will be key, as well.

The Steers know how big next week's game is, but to make it plain and simple for the players, Ritchey said he's let them know that no matter what, they have to win if they want the playoff spot.

"The thing that we know for sure is, we have to win," he said. "If it's by so many points, we don't know that. If it's just win and you're in, we don't know that yet, but we know that we're going to have to win that game."

The focus in practice will shift to Snyder Monday, considering coaches want one last look at the Tigers

Giants have 2-0 World Series lead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fans jumped up and down, shaking orange pompoms, waving scarves and chanting "Sweep! Sweep!"

While the Giants are looking more and more like a baseball juggernaut, they're only halfway to their first World Series title in 56 years. They hope to wrap it up on the road.

"We've just got to take that confidence and some of the good approaches that we've had into these last two games and take them down to Texas with us," Matt Cain said after Thursday night's 9-0 win over the Texas Rangers gave San Francisco a 2-0 Series lead.

Cain pitched 7 2-3 innings and combined with his bullpen on a four-hitter, and Edgar Renteria reprised his October success with a home run and three RBIs.

While the Giants had the best ERA in the majors during the regular season, they were just 17th in runs — the fewest among the eight postseason teams. Yet San Francisco has outscored Texas 20-7 and out-hit the Rangers .314 to .227. The Giants' offense is picking up speed faster than a cable car heading down Nob Hill.

"We've put ourselves in a good situation," said Cain, who hasn't allowed an earned run in the postseason.

After a day off, the Series resumes the first time in Arlington, Texas. Colby Lewis starts Game 3 for the Rangers on Saturday night against Jonathan Sanchez.

Forty of the previous 51 teams to take a 2-0 lead have

gone on to win the title, including seven straight and 13 of the last 14.

"I don't think we caught any breaks yet," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "We certainly don't feel like we're defeated. We're heading home. They took care of us in their ballpark, now we're headed to ours."

San Francisco improved to 11-0 against Texas at AT&T Park and got its third shutout in nine postseason wins. The Giants sent the high-octane Rangers offense to its first shutout since Sept. 23.

Not bad for a team that scored 19 runs in its six-game NL championship series win over Philadelphia.

"Unbelievable," said Renteria, who has just eight regular-season homers in the last two years. "You guys know I have power."

No team has overcome a 2-0 Series deficit since the 1996 New York Yankees against Atlanta. The Giants have won each time they took a 2-0 lead: in 1922, 1933 and 1954.

Cruz is 1 for 9. Josh Hamilton and Michael Young are each 1 for 8 with no RBIs.

"I think that more or less it has to do with the pitching we've been facing," Washington said. "We had some opportunities early in the ballgame to put some runs on the board, and we had the right people up there, and he made his pitches."

At this rate, team president and part-owner Nolan Ryan probably wants to grab a ball himself and get on the mound.

the pool in Big Spring should help. He said the boys still need practice, but they've been close to taking a meet. At the Abilene Invitational last week, the boys finished sixth with 73.5. Young Eagles grounded

The Young Eagles have been grounded — for this year, anyway.

The Hangar 25 Air Museum youth group was scheduled to take to the skies Saturday in free flights provided by area pilots, but a lack of available aircraft has grounded the program for this year, said Joe Hayes, executive director of the museum.

“(Thursday), I spoke with Airport Director Jim Little, who had been in communication with Steve Clinton of the Midland Experimental Aircraft Association,” Hayes said. “Clinton’s group would have been conducting the flights for our area youth. The reason given for the cancellation is the unavailability of aircraft at this time.”

Hayes said the EAA’s pilots had been working to have their planes ready for Saturday’s event, but only one in four were available.

“The pilots are absolutely correct in making this call, because we are not going to take any chances

with airplanes that are not ready,” he said.

The flights had originally been scheduled for May, but adverse weather conditions forced a postponement.

Hayes said the group will try again next May.

“Hangar 25 Air Museum will look toward the spring of 2011 for the next opportunity,” he said. “It really is a big deal for us ... and it’s one of the things we really look forward to.”

Up to 50 children participated in past Young Eagle programs.

“The whole purpose of Young Eagles is to expose young people to aviation who might not otherwise have a chance to fly,” he said.

Children who have already registered will be contacted before the next round of scheduled flights, Hayes said.

porches with pumpkins that have a lit candle. Children can brush against a pumpkin with long, flowing costumes. Using a non-flammable material is really essential.

“Make absolutely sure that the child can move freely and see well. Remember that children will be climbing steps and walking through yards. Make sure your child can be seen. Select costumes that are bright colored. If that is not possible be sure to decorate the costume with reflective tape or reflective fabric paint. Reflective tape can be incorporated into the costume. For instance,

if your child wants to be a witch with a black cape, cut stars out of reflective tape and put them all over the cape. Having an authentic-looking costume is nice, but it’s never worth it to sacrifice the safety of our children.”

Condray also suggests sewing a name tag into your child’s costume, giving their name, address and phone number.

According to experts with Halloween-Safety.com, discussing rules for trick-or-treating — and the bad things that can happen if they are not followed — with children is essential to their protection.

The national Web site offers the following guidelines for everyone to discuss before trick-or-treating:

• Children should always go out trick or treating accompanied by a responsible adult. If you have a group of kids going, the parents should choose two or three of them to go along and keep an eye on things.

• Plan a safe route so parents know where their kids will be at all times. Set a time for their return home. Make sure that your child is old enough and responsible enough to go out by themselves. Make sure that they have a cell phone, as well.

• Let your children know not to cut through back alleys and fields if they are out alone. Make sure they know to stay in populated areas and not to go off the beaten path. Also, let them know to stay in well lighted ar-

reas with lots of people around. Explain to them why it can be dangerous for kids not to do this.

• Instruct your children not to eat any treats until they bring them home to be examined by you. This way you can check for any problem candy and get the pick of the best stuff.

• Instruct your child to never go into the home of a stranger or get into their car. Explain why this is not a good idea and what to do if someone approaches them and tries to talk to them.

• Make sure your child carries a flashlight, glow stick or has reflective tape on their costume to make them more visible to cars.

• Let them know that they should stay together as a group if going out to trick-or-treat without

an adult.

Information overload...

On a recent Saturday, the morning newspaper TV schedule bulged with college football game listings from mid-morning non-stop until the wee hours Sunday.

I planned to watch a couple of games intently, clicking in and out of others to check scores during commercial breaks.

It was not my plan to spend the better part of a half-hour with a "live" AT&T customer service guy who effectively wore down a small forest with his verbal "beating-around-the-bush" responses to my single question: "Does my TV package include 'the mtn'?"

There were, of course, the obligatory preliminary questions before I could pose mine. Some of them were so very pedestrian, such as my account number and home address verification. Then, there was a litany of questions designed, perhaps, to hearken sweet thoughts of bygone years, with strains of "Memories" wafting in the background.

You know the drill: Mom's maiden name, a favorite sport, place of birth, best-childhood friend's last name or perhaps the name of all-time favorite pet?

After the usual "rat-atat-tat" of questions, one is mired in a sickly funk, realizing that the "real live person" knife cuts both ways. On the other end of the line is a guy who has a "live one," too! And he's highly trained in the art of "reeling us in."

In the following minutes, my question was lost in the back-

wash of the inquisitor with a boatload of questions to ask. And by hokies, he fully intended to ask every last one of them.

Do I still have two TV sets? Are there any problems with the volume on either set? Are pictures clear, devoid of "pixel issues?" Pausing for a quick draw of breath, he switched topics, honing in on our cell phones. Am I satisfied with coverage area? Ease of use? I told him that I am weary of sales pitches.... Of restaurant waitpersons' spiels that begin with drink suggestions of sparkling iced tea or fresh-brewed coffee, when all I want is wa-

ter with lemon. Of offers to be "started off" with an appetizer, and no, I didn't "save room" for dessert.

No, I don't want to guarantee late arrival, and no, I don't want trip insurance. I don't want "fries with that," and no, I don't want a new tie to complete the ensemble. I'll forego purchasing the extended warranty for the new toaster, spending a few dollars more for seats closer to the stage or anything to have on hand "in case this one breaks."

Then he interrupted — for the final time. "We're almost through," he promised. "Please answer some questions as to the helpfulness of this phone call. This will take no more than five minutes."

I flat out refused. As to my question about "the mtn," he confessed that he found nothing about it in any TV package. We joked about "Googling it." Alas, Google revealed nothing about AT&T packages. But I did learn that "the mtn" refers to the Mountain West Sports Network. (It was nestled between "taking the mtn to Muhammed" and the song, "Go Tell it on the Mtn.")

Glancing at my watch, I realized that I had missed kickoffs of both games I'd looked forward to all week.

Later, a ringing phone caused me to miss second half kickoffs, too. It was one of those automated surveys from AT&T to determine if my call to their customer service guy had been helpful.

I told the recorder that I'd sooner eat a carrot — and hung up.

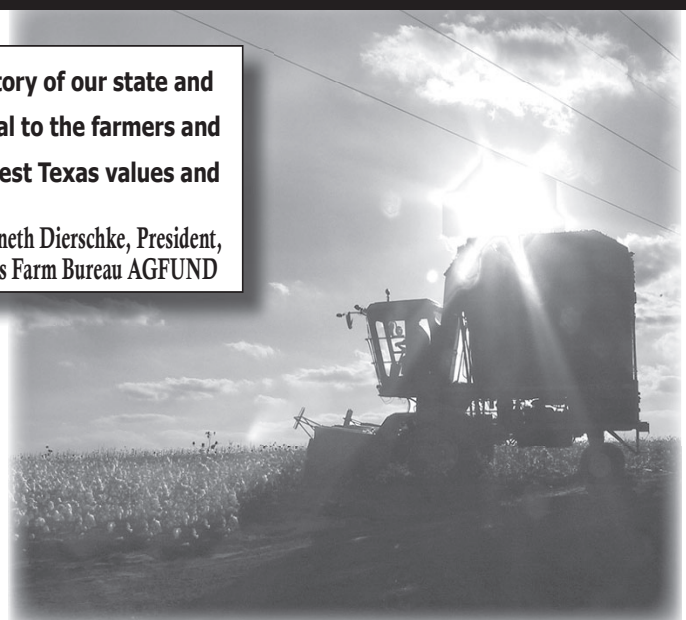

In, Oh, the Places You'll Go!, a children's book for young adults in transition, Dr. Seuss wrote, "You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes. You can steer yourself any direction you choose."

While steering ourselves in any direction that we choose appeals to most of us, we sometimes panic when we realize that we may steer ourselves off the road and into a ditch. As we navigate through life, we soon discover that believing all the tough decisions come when we are eighteen is just a myth.

News in brief

Crane barge accident affects Galveston electricity

GALVESTON (AP) — About 16,000 businesses and homes in Galveston lost electricity after strong winds were blamed for pushing a crane on a barge into some power lines.

The Coast Guard says nobody was injured Thursday. The accident forced temporary closure of the Intercoastal Waterway at the causeway.

CenterPoint Energy spokesman Keith Gray says crews were able to roll service over to another transmission line. Power was restored within about three hours.

The National Weather Service recorded gusts of up to 30 mph Thursday morning.

Funding could change for Texas higher education

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board has endorsed a revised method of funding public universities and community colleges.

Board members, during a meeting Thursday in Austin, also approved plans for a greater emphasis on merit for certain financial aid.

The cost-saving proposals go to Gov. Rick Perry and the 2011 Legislature.

The board wants 10 percent of the base funding for universities to be indexed to so-called "student outcomes," including graduation rates.

The Austin American Statesman reports 10 percent of community college funding would be on the

basis of degrees awarded, certificates completed, college-level math course completions and other performance measures.

Current base funding is strictly linked to enrollment.

Conviction of Dallas man in death of wife, girl

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas man who confessed to police that he killed his estranged wife and drowned her 6-year-old daughter has been convicted of capital murder.

The penalty phase begins Monday for 39-year-old Gary Green. He faces life in prison or the death penalty.

Police say Lovetta Armstead, who was stabbed more than two dozen times, was seeking to have their 2009 marriage annulled.

Investigators say Green drowned Jazzmen Montgomery in a bathtub and forced his two stepsons, who were 9 and 12 at the time, to view the corpses.

The September 2009 attacks took place in the family's home.

Green's videotaped confession was played in court. He did not testify.

New Braunfels man pleads guilty to killing cousin

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas (AP) — A New Braunfels man has been sentenced to 40 years in prison for killing his cousin in an attack in which the vic-

tim was shot eight times.

A judge in New Braunfels on Thursday sentenced 26-year-old Juanito Correa, who pleaded guilty to murder in the 2007 death of Matthew Gutierrez. The victim was gunned down on a New Braunfels street after attending a fair.

The New Braunfels Herald-Zeitung reports investigators got a break in June when a witness came forward after police did a video reenactment of the crime and posted it on the Internet.

Prosecutor Sammy McCrary says Correa, who had felony drug and weapons convictions, told relatives "I can't even tell you why" he shot and killed his cousin.

New Braunfels is 25 miles northeast of San Antonio.

Eules woman pleads guilty to killing husband

FORT WORTH (AP) — A Fort Worth-area woman accused of killing her husband and then buying a freezer to try to store the body has pleaded guilty to murder.

The penalty phase was scheduled to continue Friday for 51-year-old Patricia Jeffress of Eules.

Jeffress on Wednesday pleaded guilty over last year's fatal shooting of her 59-year-old husband, Joe, while he was asleep at their apartment.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports the woman told police she had shot her spouse on May 12, 2009, but she didn't report the killing until three days later.

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

How many points does the opening bidder indicate by his rebid in each of the following sequences?

Opener	Responder
1. 1♦ 1 NT	1♠
2. 1♥ 2 NT	1♠
3. 1♠ 3♦	1 NT
4. 1♥ 2♦	1 NT
5. 1♠ 3♣	1 NT

1. **Thirteen or 14, or 13 to 15 points**, depending on the range of your opening one-notrump bids. (If you play 15- to 17-point notrump openings, you should not have more than 14 points when you rebid one notrump.) The one-notrump rebid shows a balanced hand (4-3-3-3, 4-4-3-2 or 5-3-3-2 distribution) of the minimum class and willingness to play at one notrump if responder has a balanced minimum (six to 10 points).

2. **Eighteen or 19 points**. The jump to two notrump by opener shows a balanced hand containing 18 or 19 high-card points. It is not a forcing bid; responder may pass with minimum values (six points) for his one-spade response.

3. **Sixteen to 18 points**. The invitational jump-rebid promises at least six spades including two or more honors. Responder may pass with minimum values (six or seven points) for his one-notrump response. In most cases, the three-spade bidder will have only 15 or 16 high-card points, with the rest of his count based on distributional values.

4. **Thirteen to 18 points**. The change of suit in this sequence might be based on minimum values, e.g., ♠94♥AQ863♦AQ752♣10, or on values well above a minimum, e.g., ♠AQ8♥KQ752♦AQ104♣3. Because of the inherent ambiguity of the opening bidder's change of suit, the responder often finds himself awkwardly placed in choosing his next action. If he has only six or seven points and a preference for opener's second suit, he can pass, but with all other hands, he must bid again, and must use his judgment as to how to continue.

5. **Nineteen or more points**. This bid — a jump-shift — is 100 percent forcing to game, so responder must keep bidding until game (or slam) is reached. The bid tends to say that the combined hands contain enough points for game — even if responder has only six points — but opener is not yet sure where the best game lies.

Annie's Mailbox®

Dear Annie: Our son recently informed us that our 7-year-old grandson has high-functioning Asperger's syndrome. I have extensive experience with children on the autism spectrum.

"Jeremy's" behaviors, while rowdy, are not typical of Asperger's.

What we have noticed, however, is a crippling degree of anxiety and numerous phobias in our daughter-in-law, "Lois." Jeremy is not allowed to play outside, have friends over or do any activities normal for a boy his age. Lois keeps him on a rigid schedule designed for a much younger child. He is not allowed to bathe alone, brush his own teeth or wipe himself after using the bathroom, even though he is capable of doing all these things. As a result, he acts out and has serious behavior problems at school.

When Jeremy is with me, he is a totally different child. Even his father has a better experience with the boy than his wife does. With his mother,

however, Jeremy's behaviors are alarming and clearly meant to get attention. I actually saw waitresses cringe when we entered a pizza parlor. He is cruel to small animals and says he wants to kill the family cat.

Lois confessed that she had pressured a specialist into giving her son the Asperger's diagnosis. When I gently suggested getting a second opinion, she told me to leave her home and then had a screaming tantrum. My terrified grandson hid in the garage. My son admits his wife has a mental health problem, but he runs away to the office. He said Lois called him at work demanding that he come home if he ever wanted to see his son alive again. She once falsely accused him of molesting the boy. He told me that she locks herself in her room for days at a time, often keeping Jeremy in there with her. She even insists she can read the thoughts of others.

What can I do? — **Deeply Concerned**

Dear Concerned: Your daughter-in-law is mentally ill and is abusing her son emotionally. The fact that Dad permits this is reprehensible. Call Child Protective Services, and ask that someone check out the home situation. Talk to the principal and counselor at Jeremy's school. Then tell your son to stop hiding at work and contact the National Alliance on Mental Illness (nami.org) at 1-800-950-NAMI (1-800-950-6264) and ask for

help.

Dear Annie: My husband insists on blowing his nose at the dinner table. This includes when we eat out at restaurants with linen napkins. I've told him repeatedly that blowing one's nose into a napkin, especially a cloth one that our server will have to handle, is downright rude. He doesn't care and believes I am over-reacting.

I would so appreciate it if you would please give us a lesson on nose-blowing etiquette. — **Too Mortified To Dine Out**

Dear Mortified: One should excuse oneself from the table when blowing one's nose and never, ever use a napkin. We suggest you bring along a handkerchief or travel pack of tissues for those moments when your husband feels the need to honk in public and see if it helps.

Dear Annie: I read the letter from "Needing Advice," whose boss is having an affair with a co-worker. Yes, she should tell the wife.

Two years ago, I was that wife, and

no one told me. I was hurt to discover that everyone knew except me. Women I thought were my friends did not say a thing to me. I felt so betrayed.

Please advise "Needing" to tell the wife. I seriously doubt her job will be jeopardized. His wife will make sure it isn't. — **Betrayed in New Mexico**

Dear N.M.: We understand your sense of betrayal, but a personal friend is not in the same position as the husband's employee. His love life is the employee's business only insofar as it affects the job — in which case, she should approach her employer, not his spouse.

Freed death row inmate enjoys 'surreal' moment

HOUSTON (AP) — Anthony Graves spent half of his adult life waking up inside a cage locked by steel doors. So when he awoke as a free man for the first time in 18 years on Thursday, he wasn't entirely sure whether he'd escaped the "hell" of Texas death row.

"It's just a surreal moment," Graves said at his lawyer's office less than 24 hours after walking out of the Burleson County Jail. "For

the first few moments or few hours, I thought I would wake up and be right back in the cell. It just wasn't real to me. It's still not real to me."

Graves was convicted for the 1992 slayings of six members of a Somersville family, including four young children. But the only evidence tying him the fatal stabbings and shootings was the testimony of his co-defendant, who recanted shortly before his execution ten years ago.

An appeals court eventually tossed Graves' conviction, and prosecutors — proclaiming Graves' innocence — decided this week to drop the case.

"I never lost hope," Graves said. "Once you lose hope, you're just a dead man walking. I knew one day would come to this. I just didn't know when it would."

Graves, 45, spent two years awaiting his first trial, then another four in jail awaiting a second

trial. But those years followed a dozen on death row, which Graves described as "hell, hell, hell."

"Whatever your description of hell is, that's what it is," he said. "You don't even need to elaborate. Just hell. You think about hell, that's it."

Describing his first full day of freedom, however, was a bit harder. He said he'd become accustomed to waking up to "steel doors, sleeping on a steel bunk, on a plastic mattress. My own personal hell, for 18 years."

Then one day, he just walked out.

"It's hard to make that adjustment. It's hard to even process that," he said.

Graves and his co-defendant, Robert Earl Carter, were convicted separately of the murders of Bobbie Davis, 45; Nicole Davis, 16; Denitra Davis, 9; Brittany Davis, 6; Lea Erin Davis, 5; and Carter's 4-year-old son, Jason Davis.

Court records showed Carter was upset that one of Davis' daughters, four days earlier, had named him in a paternity suit, a step toward seeking child support.

The six victims had been stabbed or shot, or both, and were dis-

covered by firefighters responding to a blaze at a home in Somersville in the early morning hours of Aug. 18, 1992. Their killer tried to burn the bodies to hide the deaths, prosecutors said.

An autopsy showed Bobbie Davis was stabbed 29 times in the head and beaten with a blunt object. Nicole Davis had been shot five times and stabbed in the head and chest. The other four victims were stabbed between seven and 13 times.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans overturned Graves' conviction in 2006, ruling that prosecutors withheld evidence and elicited false testimony. Graves was removed from death row, then held in the county jail to await retrial.

"It's kind of a rare situation where a prosecutor without use of DNA or any other type of evidence that dispels guilt looks at a case and says there is no evidence," District Attorney Bill Parham said Thursday. "This man is not guilty."

Kelly Siegler, a former Harris County assistant district attorney hired by Parham as a special prosecutor to handle Graves' retrial, said she could find no credible evidence to tie Graves to the slayings.

Siegler said that Charles Sebesta, the now-retired district attorney, "handled this case in a way that would best be described as a criminal justice system's nightmare."

Sebesta told The Associated Press on Thursday that the developments were "surprising, especially the part about having no evidence." He has said he believed a third person was involved in the murders, but there was insufficient evidence to move forward.

"All the evidence pointed to three people," he insisted.

"I still feel like there were three people involved. Until I have an opportunity to look at what (prosecutors are) saying, it's difficult to really address the issue."

One of Graves' attorneys, Katherine Scardino, said that while her client might not be angry, she was.

"I think this is a prime example for those who are anti-death penalty," she said. "To wonder if we really have a system that is flawed, that we have a system that's only not working, it's simply broken."

In 2007, a prosecutor disclosed that crucial evidence was missing and might never be found including the skull caps and clothing of the victims.

Special prosecutor Patrick Batchelor told a Burleson County judge then that other missing evidence from the original trial included fingerprints, bullets from the victims, a bloody hammer and a hunting knife.
