

A charge of continuous sexual abuse of a child has been filed against the 54-year-old Big Spring man who was arrested in mid-

March on charges of abandoning/endangering a child - criminal negligence and prohibited sexual conduct incest, according to investiga-Edgar Dale Whitt, of 4302.5

#### Police officer killed in Austin, suspect arrested

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A police officer was shot and killed early Friday at a Walmart in Central Texas, and a suspect is in custody, police said.

Austin Police Chief Art Acevedo said the officer was shot in the neck and died at the scene. The officer was responding to a call about a drunk

man inside the store around 2:30 a.m., Acevedo said. The suspect attacked the officer as soon as he arrived at the store and the officer didn't have a chance to even pull out his own weapon. "The suspect produced a semi-automatic pistol

and shot the officer at point blank range," Acevedo said. The wounded officer was able to call for help using his police radio, he added.

The police chief declined to identify the officer or suspect, but he said the deceased man had two

"This was a routine call," Acevedo said. "What makes our job deadly is that there is no routine

Two Walmart employees tackled and held the suspect and locked down the store until another police officer arrived to arrest him. Acevedo praised their actions, saying they did all they were supposed to do. He said store video captured the entire inci-

"I am heartened that two brave souls took action. They tackled the suspect when they saw the officer was shot unprovoked," Acevedo said. Once the suspect was handcuffed, another officer gave the victim CPR and medics tried to revive him, but they pronounced the officer dead at 2:44 a.m.

#### Authorities seeking "high risk" sex offender

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas Department of Public Safety authorities say an ex-con they describe as a "high risk" sex offender has fled a Houston halfway

Police say 42-year-old Michael Elbert Young was last seen Thursday night at the Southeast Texas Transitional Center, a halfway house in east Houston. Authorities said Friday he climbed over a barbed wire-topped fence and detached an electronic tracking monitor from his ankle.

Young was released from prison after serving

eight years for two aggravated assault convictions. Both were sex related. He also served a 20-year term for sexual assault of a child and attempted aggravated sexual assault.

Authorities say he may be mentally unstable if not taking medication. He's not believed armed but has a history of using weapons, primarily knives, during his assaults.

#### Leader of Dallas arson scam ring gets 20 years DALLAS (AP) — Prosecutors say the leader of a

Dallas arson ring that scammed the Red Cross has been sentenced to 20 years in prison. A federal judge on Thursday sentenced 37-yearold Marthella Broadus and ordered her to make

more than \$1.7 million in restitution. Broadus last May pleaded guilty to wire fraud and arson in an investigation of three home fires since late 2008. Investigators say Broadus was the last of seven

Dallas residents to plead guilty and be sent to pris-

Authorities say the individuals removed personal property from the residences before the fires were set, then sought financial help from the Red Cross.

from home. According to law enforcement officials, there were also two other children living in the home at the time, a 5-year-old and a 2-year-old. Law enforcement of-

ficials said the boy told officers he was running away from home after having been allegedly restrained with a straight jacket by his parents. Whitt was arrested

and charged with two counts of abandoning/ endangering a child – criminal negligence and one count of prohibited sexual conduct – incest, a second-degree felony. Whitt is still in the custody of the Howard County Detention Center and has not yet bonded out.

According to Howard

County Sheriff Stan Parker, the newest charge — filed Thursday, according to Big Spring Police Department records — is a result of the ongoing investigation.

"Through the course

of the investigation, interviews were conducted with the children," Parker said. "Once we had a chance to gather all of the necessary evidence the decision was made to file the charge of continuous sexual abuse of a child against Whitt. The additional charge has been submitted to the district attorney's office."

Parker declined to comment on which of the children Whitt allegedly sexually abused — or how long the abuse had been taking place – citing an ongoing investigation.

Also arrested March 18 was Edgar Whitt's daughter, Tamara

Ruth Whitt, 26, also of 4302.5 S. Highway 87, on charges of abandoning/endangering a child criminal negligence (two counts).

Parker said the charge of incest was filed against Edgar Whitt after investigators discovered the man was not only the children's grandparent, but had also fathered at least one of them.

"As part of the investigation we were trying to determine who the father of the children were," Parker said. "The family had only moved to Big Spring about two years ago, which was making that somewhat difficult. However, after speaking to them for a while, it was discovered that Edgar Whitt — who is Tamara Whitt's father had fathered at least one of the children with his daughter. That's when the decision was charges against Edgar Whitt.'

The March 18 arrest wasn't Edgar Whitt's first run-in with law enforcement in Howard County, as the Big Spring Herald has confirmed, Forsan Independent School District where at least one of the children attended school — filed a criminal trespass warning against the Big Spring man prior to his arrest.

According to reports, Whitt had used profanity and threatened a teacher at Elbow Elementary, prompting the school district to file the criminal trespass warning, which did not allow the man on school prop-

A similar exchange of profanity and threats also landed Whitt in hot water with New Hope Christian School, where the remaining children attended daycare, according to unconfirmed

According to officials with the Howard County Detention Center, bond has been set for Edgar Whitt at \$5,000 for each count of abandoning/endangering a child criminal negligence and \$15,000 for prohibited sexual conduct — incest. Bond for the charge of continuous sexual abuse of a child has been set at \$75,000, for a total of \$100,000.

Bond for Tamara Whitt has been set at \$5,000 for each count of abandoning/endangering a child — criminal negligence, for a total of \$10,000. Neither have bonded out at this time and remain in the custody of the Howard County Detention Center.

etrospect, the enlightened survey of the past, which often causes us to reflect on where we have been and how we got there, sometimes produces those "aha" moments that bring distortions into focus. Like etching set in stone, the past is truthful and unchanging. Reflection

squeezes meaning out of confusion and ekes understanding out of turmoil and jumbled memories. It was a 19th Cen-

tury philosopher and theologian named Soren Kierkegaard who said, "Life can only be understood backward; but it must be lived forward."

For many of us, the idea of forward living with limited or no understanding of the future is a frightening idea. We like to be in control of our circumstances and strive to order our lives according to our desires. However, we often find that life is bombarded with difficulties and unexpected events that make no sense in our scheme of expectations. Only hindsight can straighten our toppled chains of

events and illuminate our darkened understanding.







## News in brief

#### U.S. economy adds 120K jobs, jobless rate at 8.2 pct

WASHINGTON (AP) — The job market slowed in March as companies hit the brakes on hiring amid uncertainty about the economy's growth prospects. The unemployment rate dipped, but mostly because more Americans stopped looking for work.

The Labor Department says the economy added 120,000 jobs in March, down from more than 200,000 in each of the previous three months.

The unemployment rate fell to 8.2 percent, the lowest since January 2009. But the rate dropped because fewer people searched for jobs. The official unemployment tally only includes those seeking work.

Despite the pullback in March, the economy has added 858,000 jobs since December — the best four months of hiring in two years.

Slower job growth could threaten a recent rise in consumer confidence and dent investors' enthusiasm for stocks. It also could prove a setback for President Barack Obama's re-election hopes.

But economists noted that it's just one month after three solid gains.

"We are disappointed," said Anthony Chan, chief economist at JPMorgan Wealth Management. "But when you go inside and lift the hood, the numbers look a little better."

Treasury yields and stock futures dropped sharply after the report came out. The yield on the benchmark 10year Treasury note fell to 2.09 percent from 2.20 percent, while Standard & Poor's 500 index futures fell 0.8 percent to 1,381. Both were little changed in the minutes before the report was released.

#### Santorum's support at home not what it once was

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — Rick Santorum is as unpopular in Pennsylvania today as he was six years ago when home-state voters kicked him out of the Senate in a rout. That sour public perception may doom his fading chances of sticking around in the GOP presidential race, along with other hurdles that dot his path to a possible, and needed, victory in the April 24 primary.

He failed to heal a rift with fiscal conservatives who had lost confidence in him or reassure party leaders that he could temper his hard-line positions on social issues that repel the moderate and independent voters who are crucial to success in statewide elections in this diverse state.

Even some who know Santorum say flat out he isn't the best candidate.

The former senator also faces a nearly insurmountable hurdle to stop Mitt Romney, who emerged as the nominee-in-waiting after his sweep of contests this week in Wisconsin, Maryland and Washington, D.C.

None of that seems to be deterring Santorum.

"People in Pennsylvania know me," he said this week while campaigning at a Pittsburgh-area diner. "We've got a strong base of support here, and we're going to work very, very hard."

#### Syria broadens offensive in Damascus suburbs

BEIRUT (AP) — Syrian forces broadened an offensive against opposition fighters in three Damascus suburbs Friday in an apparent attempt to crush pockets of rebellion near the capital less than a week before an internationally sponsored cease-fire is to go into effect, activists said.

Troops conducted raids in the suburbs of Sagba and Douma following overnight clashes with army defectors in Saqba and the nearby suburb of Arbeen, said the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights. The group said three members of the military were killed.

Plumes of smoke rose above Saqba, and activists said regime forces torched at least one house.

Tanks patrolled deserted streets in the sprawling Douma district, about 8 miles (12 kilometers) outside Damascus, said activist Mohammed Saeed. Snipers set up positions atop a 12-story medical building.

Troops had entered Douma on Thursday in what activists described as one of the most violent raids near the capital since the uprising against Syrian President Bashar Assad began more than a year ago.

#### Panel: Marine who criticized Obama should be dismissed

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP) — A military board has recommended dismissal for a Marine sergeant who criticized President Barack Obama on his Facebook page, including allegedly putting the president's face on a "Jackass" movie poster.

The Marine Corps administrative board said after a daylong hearing late Thursday at Camp Pendleton that Sgt. Gary Stein has committed misconduct and should be dismissed.

The board also recommended that Stein be given an other-then-honorable discharge.

That would mean Stein would lose his benefits and would not be allowed on any military base.

The board's recommendations go to a general who will either accept or deny them. If the general disagrees with the board, the case could go to the secretary of the Navy.

Stein's lawyers argued the 9-year Marine was expressing his personal views and exercising his First Amendment rights.

#### Out go the crumbs: 'logistical mayhem' as Israeli chefs clean kitchens for Passover

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The Jewish springtime holiday Passover is known as a festival of freedom, but its hallmark is a litany of dietary restrictions centered on not eating leavened bread for a week.

The rules are so elaborate that chefs who want to observe the ritual law must prepare weeks before, removing every last crumb, buying up new sets of kitchen utensils and planning menus without bread or wheat flour.

At Liliyot, one of Tel Aviv's most prestigious kosher restaurants, chef Noam Dekkers oversaw his staff on Wednesday, their last regular day in the kitchen before the annual Passover scrubdown — a process he calls "logistical mayhem." The holiday begins Friday at sundown.

At the end of the day, Dekkers' cooks threw away leftovers like chopped vegetables and fish. Then, they stored plastic cutting boards and boxes, locked grains away and scrubbed all steel cooking ware.

The following morning, city rabbis oversaw the final sterilization, when the restaurant staff blowtorched grease off the grills and dunked all the metal and glass cooking utensils into cauldrons of boiling water. As of Thursday night, Liliyot was kosher for Passover.

#### **Coast Guard cannons** sink Japanese ghost ship

OVER THE GULF OF ALASKA (AP) A U.S. Coast Guard cutter poured cannon fire into a Japanese ghost ship that had been drifting since the last year's tsunami, sinking the vessel in the Gulf of Alaska and eliminating the hazard it posed to shipping.

The cutter's guns tore holes in the 164-foot Ryou-Un Maru on Thursday, ending its long, lonely journey across the Pacific that began when the deadly tsunami set it floating more than a

#### Maryland court poised to hear lesbian divorce case

WASHINGTON (AP) Maryland's highest court is poised to hear arguments in a precedent-setting case involving two women who married in California but were denied a divorce in Maryland, which does not currently allow same-sex weddings.

The Court of Appeals of Maryland in Annapolis was set to hear

arguments Friday from lawyers for the lesbian couple who are seeking to end their marriage.

A Maryland judge declined to grant their divorce in 2010, basing his decision on the conclusion the women's marriage is not valid under current Maryland

But lawyers for the women disagree, saying the state should recognize gay marriages performed elsewhere even though Maryland does not allow same-sex weddings at the present time. The high court's ul-

timate decision may have limited effect since same-sex weddings, and by extension divorces, are set to start in the state in January 2013 under a law passed this year.

# Ryan, Ventura meet again as opposing team officials

ARLINGTON, Texas — Robin Ventura hasn't spoken to Nolan Ryan since charging the mound against the Hall of Fame pitcher 19 seasons ago.

When Ventura makes his managerial debut for the Chicago White Sox on Friday at Texas, Ryan will be sitting in the front row of his team's new-

Six months after being hired to his first managing job, Ventura's first test comes against the two-time defending American League champion Rangers for which Ryan is now president, CEO and part-own-

"It's more of what the teams were going through at that time," Ventura said Thursday when asked what he was thinking when he took off for the mound that hot August night at old Arlington Stadium in 1993. "It wasn't a me against him thing."

Ventura was then a 26-year-old third baseman for the White Sox who played 12 more seasons after that. Ryan, the major league strikeout king in the final season of his record 27-year playing career, got the player 20 years younger than him in a headlock and landed several blows.

Video of the brawl is still wildly popular at Rangers Ballpark, getting cheers every time it is shown. But Rangers fans won't get to see it during the weekend series since the team has no plans to show it on the large video board while the White Sox are in town.

They still get a chance to boo Ventura when he's introduced before the opener.

"I've seen it, so it's not like I haven't seen it. They can play it if they want. It's not going to change any decision I make or anything else I do," Ventura said. "I've played here in the past, it's not like I never came back here. (Fans) can get all riled up all they want. ... I'm concerned more about what my guys are doing and how we play than I'm worried about if I get booed."

Ryan has said he plans to speak with Ventura during batting practice or another time Friday. He said the two have never spoken because their paths have not crossed through the years.

"It happened so long ago, and there's no animosity on anyone's part," Ryan said, referring to the scuffle almost 19 years ago. "It was part of our careers, and just a response to the moment."

Ryan said that even now, a picture of the moment is one of the most frequent item he's asked to auto-

"I'm surprised that it's taken on the life that it has," he said.

Ventura said there are no hard feelings.

The Rangers are marking the franchise's move from Washington to Texas on the heels of their only two World Series appearances, and twice coming within a strike of a championship-clinching victory last October. The first-pitch ceremony Friday will include 13 players from the 1972 team.

It will be the 12th opening day for Michael Young, the Rangers' longest-tenured player who hit .423 in 19 Cactus League games this spring.

"I know it's a lot (of opening days)," Young said. "Every year, it's getting better."

Colby Lewis, another Texas pitcher who previously pitched in Japan, goes in the opener against left-hander John Danks, like Lewis a former firstround pick by the Rangers. It is the first openingday start for both.

Yu Darvish, the top pitcher from Japan that the Rangers committed more than \$107 million this winter to sign, is scheduled to make his major league debut in the fourth game, Monday night

Lewis pitched two seasons in Japan before returning two years ago to the Rangers, who drafted him 38th overall as a supplemental first-round pick in 1999.

He won 10 games as a Rangers rookie in 2003, and was in the rotation to start the following season before a rotator cuff injury derailed his progress. He eventually had stops in Detroit, Washington and Oakland before going to Japan.

His first opening-day start for his original team comes after being so close to a World Series title six months ago.

"I feel blessed for the opportunity, and grateful," Lewis said. "We did everything we needed (last year) except for one pitch really. ... We've got the same group of core guys back. The opportunity is there for us to do it again."

Danks, from the Austin area about three hours away, was drafted ninth overall by Texas in 2003. He grew up going to Rangers Ballpark and always looked forward to possibly pitching on opening day there one day.

He will do it for the White Sox, who gave him a new \$65 million, five-year deal this winter. Chicago acquired him in December 2006 in a five-player deal that sent Brandon McCarthy to Texas.

"To be against anyone, it will be exciting," said Danks, downplaying the significance of doing it

against Texas. Having been to so many games at Rangers Ballpark as a fan, and a player, Danks has often seen

that video of his manager's brawl with Ryan. "We might take a couple of stabs at Robin if we win a couple of games here," said Danks, adding with a smile that there haven't been any jokes about it yet. "I need to learn him first and make sure I can. He

might beat me up."

# Audio recording: Saints targetted injured 49ers

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — On the same day the NFL heard the Saints' appeals in their hits-for-cash scandal, a recording of Gregg Williams emerged that purports to capture the disgraced defensive coordinator telling players to "put a lick" on 49ers receiver Kyle Williams to see if he had lingering effects from a concussion.

Filmmaker Sean Pamphilon, who had access to Saints meetings for a documentary on football, posted the audio on his web site. Pamphilon initially shared the con-

tent with Yahoo Sports, telling the website that while he was not bothered by much of Williams' profanity-laced speech, he was troubled by comments about the previously concussed player.

"I thought, 'Did he just say that?" Pamphilon said in an article posted Thursday. "That was the red flag for

Kyle Williams' father, White Sox general manager Kenny Williams, said his son "has definite feelings on the subject but has chosen to remain commit-

ted to providing all his answers to any

questions on the field next season." But

Kenny Williams had his own thoughts on the recording.

"Personally, suspension or not, it's probably best I'm never in a room with Gregg Williams and wonder if such an order crosses the line of the aggressive, competitive spirit we all know and love about the sport; and leans closer to a criminal act and therefore a litigious matter," Kenny Williams said in an emailed statement.

Gregg Williams, who is suspended indefinitely for his admitted role overseeing a bounty system that offered Saints defenders payment for painful hits, did not respond to a phone message and email left with his foundation in Missouri on Thursday.

Williams left New Orleans after last season — his third with the Saints and was hired as defensive coordinator by the St. Louis Rams.

Pamphilon made the recording of Williams' speech during a meeting before

the Saints lost to San Francisco in a divisional playoff last January, the final game Williams coached. When the New York Giants defeated the 49ers a week later in the NFC title

game, several Giants players made sim-

ilar comments about wanting to get hits

on Kyle Williams, who fumbled twice in the game, because they knew he had previous concussions.

In Pamphilon's recording, Williams also tells his players to set their sights on running back Frank Gore, quarterback Alex Smith and receiver Michael Crabtree.

"We need to decide on how many times we can beat Frank Gore's head,"

Williams also implores his charges to "lay out" Smith and later adds, "We need to decide whether Crabtree wants to be a (expletive) prima donna or he wants to be a tough guy. He becomes human when we ... take out that outside ACL."

Pamphilon also described Williams pointing to his chin when he said, "We hit (expletive) Smith right there."

Pamphilon said Williams then rubbed his fingers together as one might do when doling out cash, saying, "I got the first one," which Pamphilon understood to mean the defensive coordinator had placed a cash bounty on Smith.

The NFL has said Williams' bounty system offered off-the-books cash pay

# **Westwood looking** to win first major

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Lee Westwood might be wondering if he's contending for a green jacket or the claret jug.

In search of his first major title, Westwood returned to the course Friday at the Masters — a day that felt more like a British Open.

Heading to the tee box for his morning tee time, Westwood was greeted by blustery winds and temperatures in the 50s — a stark contrast to the warm opening day when he shot 5-under-par 67 to take a one-shot lead over Louis Oosthuizen and Peter Han-

Ben Crane, meanwhile, birdied the par-5 second to move to 4 under.

There was a six-way tie at 3 under that included 2007 champion Zach Johnson and Scotland's Paul Lawrie, the 1999 British Open champion who probably felt at home in these conditions.

Teeing off later were Tiger Woods (even), Phil Mickelson (2 over) and Rory McIlroy (1 under), all of whom have wins this year on the PGA Tour and were among the top contenders.

Westwood injected his name into that mix, too. The world's third-ranked player, one of the best to never win a major, certainly looked comfortable as he opened his quest on Thursday.

He made four straight birdies on Nos. 5 through 8 and didn't face a put of more than 10 feet on any of

He took the lead after the first round of a major for the first time in his career.

"I figured if I drive the ball well, which I generally do, then I'm going to have a chance to get it close to flags and from there, it's just an issue of how many putts I hole," he said.

Westwood has six top-three finishes since 2008. At Augusta two years ago, he was the leader heading into the final round. On that day, he three-putted the ninth green to lose the lead and ended up as a bit player while Mickelson won his third green jacket.

Westwood's methods after all these close calls?

"When you're in contention and don't finish it off, you go home and assess what you didn't do and what you can improve," he said. "And that's what

# Astros open play tonight

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Astros begin the Jim Crane era on Friday night against the Colorado Rockies, fielding a team filled with young players looking to bounce back from a season that was the franchise's worst.

The sale of the team from Drayton McLane to Crane was completed in November.

Crane immediately began looking for ways to improve the Astros in their last year as a member of the National League — also the 50th anniversary of the franchise.

A condition of the sale requires a move to the AL West in 2013.

Crane insists that the team, which went 56-106 last season, will be better in 2012. The new ownership group is looking long-term,

meaning the Astros will give young players — and a lot of them — a chance to play this season. The Astros hired general manager Jeff Luhnow in the offseason after firing Ed Wade, and Luhnow

made it clear everyone would have to compete for

their jobs this spring. "These guys are ready to go and I'm excited to see what they can do," Luhnow said.

"There's a lot of energy in the clubhouse ... and there's going to be a lot of excitement here on Fri-Houston first baseman Carlos Lee appreciates

the work the new owner and executives have done this offseason, but knows in the end they don't determine the results. "A lot of times you can make all the changes

above and in the front office and all that and the game is the same. It's still up to us to go out there and perform and try to win games," he said. Jeremy Guthrie, in his first year with the Rockies, will make his fourth career opening day start

when he faces Astros left-hander Wandy Rodri-Last year's opening day starter, Brett Myers, is

Guthrie went 9-17 with a 4.33 ERA last season with the Orioles.

"It was a good spring," he said. "I got the work in I wanted and the opportunity to work on the things I wanted — particularly the location of my off-speed pitches — and get acquainted with my

new teammates. And I stayed healthy. That's an important thing, too."

The Rockies hope to rebound from a disappointing season after beefing up an offense which already included Todd Helton, Carlos Gonzalez and Troy Tulowitzki, with Michael Cuddyer, Marco Scutaro and Ramon Hernandez. Guthrie is looking forward to pitching with that offense behind

"We have speed and a bunch that can bang the ball pretty good," he said.

"This lineup has the potential to be a good offensive team. Guys like Troy and Todd bring a lot of power to the game, and we have made some nice additions, including some excellent young prospects. So I think this can be an exciting club."

The Rockies are relieved that Tulowitzki is OK and should be ready to start on Friday after being hit in the left elbow by ex-teammate Ubaldo Jimenez of Cleveland on Sunday. Jimenez was suspended five games and fined for

intentionally throwing at Tulowitzki. He played for the first time since the beaning on Wednesday and went 0 for 2 in four innings. For ten Houston players, Friday will be the first

time they've been on a major league roster on opening day. Just two position players who started for Houston last season will start Friday. Third baseman Chris Johnson is the only player starting in the same spot, with Lee, who is in the

last season of a \$100 million contract, moving from left field to first base. Lee is one of the few veterans on one of the youngest teams in baseball. Seven of the 25 players on Houston's active roster are 25 or younger,

and the 35-year-old Lee and 31-year-old backup catcher Chris Snyder are the only position players over 30.

Lee said being around so many youngsters puts an extra bounce in his step.

"It's real exciting and I love to go out there and see those guys and be around all of them who are playing so hard," he said. "They want to make a name for themselves in the big leagues."

The Rockies have quite a different makeup, with a roster that includes 41-year-old Jason Giambi, Helton, who is 38, and most notably starting pitcher Jamie Moyer, who turns 50 in November.

Moyer, entering his 25th major league season, is scheduled to start on Saturday.

It is not clear whether Pamphilon had earlier

shared the recording with the NFL. He did not immediately respond Thursday to

email requests for additional comment.

The recording was released hours before Payton, Loomis and Vitt went to NFL headquarters in New York for an appeal hearing regarding their unprecedented punishments.

After Vitt's appeal was heard, his lawyer, David Cornwell, was asked about the audio tape.

Cornwell said Payton viewed Williams' comments as "a rogue coach about to get fired." "He was fired two days later," said Cornwell, who

also serves as executive director of the NFL Coaches Association. "He was on the way out." However, when Williams left New Orleans for the

Rams in January, nobody with the Saints characterized it as a firing. At the time, Payton said it was apparent shortly before the season ended that Williams, with his contract expiring, was likely going to join new St.

Louis coach Jeff Fisher, an old friend. The Saints and Williams never discussed an extension, Payton said then.

The league informed the Saints at the start of the playoffs that it was reopening its bounty investigation. Cornwell said Loomis and Payton then told Williams, "There's no place for this in this organization or this league."

The NFL, however, in its statement last month announcing the penalties for team officials, said the GM and coach made only "cursory inquiries" into the possible presence of a bounty program.

Pamphilon told Yahoo Sports that Payton and Loomis were not in the room when the recording of Williams was made.

The filmmaker did not return messages seeking comment from The Associated Press.

Williams can be heard using metaphors he has often used throughout his coaching career, such as, "kill the head and the body will die."

That was Williams' way of urging players to disrupt opposing teams' star players with intimidating and nasty physical play. Another of Williams' mantras was that "respect comes from fear," which he repeats in the recording.

"We've got to do everything we can in the world to make sure we kill Frank Gore's head," Williams

"We want him running sideways. We want his head sideways."

Standing in a concourse at Comerica Park during the seventh-inning stretch, wearing his Detroit Tigers windbreaker and hat, Walt Thompson seemed to speak for every fan on opening day.

"You look forward to it all season and when you get here again, you smell the hot dogs cooking and it's the best thing in the world," he said

With a nod to the past and a glimpse at the future, baseball returned across America. Under sunny skies, too, with nary a snowflake in sight. It really was Opening Day III. Oak-

land and Seattle officially started the season last week in Tokyo, and the Miami Marlins debuted their splashy new park Wednesday night. In Cleveland, it almost felt like a

doubleheader. The Toronto Blue Jays beat the Indians 7-4 in 16 innings, making it the longest opener in major league history.

Six more games were on tap, and new Boston manager Bobby Valentine was eager to get going.

"It's opening day and there's only one opening day. It's a very special day. It's the start of some-

thing new," he said. Looked that way at Petco Park in San Diego, where the Padres hosted the Los Angeles Dodgers. That's where Magic Johnson, part of the group that's buying the

Dodgers, sat with outgoing owner Frank Mc-Court and chatted away. There was plenty of pomp elsewhere — plus top performances by Justin Verlander, Roy Hal-

laday and other aces. At Citi Field, the New York Mets began the afternoon by paying tribute to late Hall of Fame catcher Gary Carter. At Great American Ball Park in Cincinnati, Pete

young boy. Stone had 6-year-old son Cooper to the game with hopes of catching a ball. Cooper


