Rogers' campaign brings Impeach Obama platform to Big Spring

Campaign workers for Kesha Rogers, a Larouche Democrat running for the U.S. Senate, were in Big Spring Wednesday afternoon with a message — impeach President Barack Obama. It's the platform Rogers has

based her campaign on and quickly caught the interest of some area residents.

The workers set up a booth on the public sidewalk by the Big Spring Post Office, soliciting petition signers to impeach President Obama and handing out campaign literature.

"He doesn't need to be in office. He shouldn't have ever been elected," said petition signer Jennie Womack.

"I'm on disability, and he is making problems for my Medicaid. It took me years to get it, and I can't afford to lose it," said Sebera Rocha of Big Spring, who said she suffers from Lupus. "He is making

everything in the world more difficult than it already was so it would be much better if he was out of office.

"With his new Obamacare, it doesn't help also," Rocha said. "They say they will eventually kick off everyone from Medicaid, and I will have to go to him. I have to get blood transfusions, and I have to get all kinds of medicine and it will not help me at all."

Rogers, who is from Houston, is in a runoff election against fellow Democrat David Alameel, a Dallas dentist and investor. See **ROGERS**, Page 3

Fort Hood gunman sought mental health treatment

FORT HOOD, Texas — An Iraq War veteran being treated for mental illness was the gunman who opened fire at Fort Hood, killing three people and wounding

16 others before committing suicide, in an attack on the same Texas military base where more than a dozen people were slain in 2009, authorities said.

Within hours of the Wednesday attack, investigators started looking into whether the man's

combat experience had caused lingering psychological trauma. Fort Hood's senior officer, Lt. Gen. Mark Milley, said the gunman had sought help for depression, anxiety and other problems.

Among the possibilities investigators planned to explore was whether a fight

or argument on the base triggered the attack.

"We have to find all those witnesses, the witnesses to every one of those shootings, and find out what his actions were, and what was said to the victims," said a federal

More suspects sought in sting

Two more people have been arrested in connection with a drug sweep conducted by area law enforcement officers earlier this week.

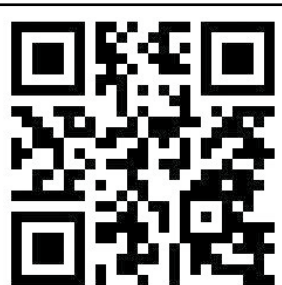

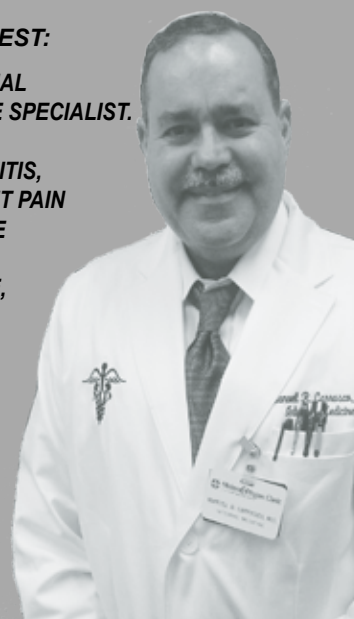

law enforcement official who spoke on condition of anonymity, because he was not authorized to discuss the case by name.

The official said authorities would begin by speaking with the man’s wife, and expected to search his home and any computers he owned.

The shooter was identified as Ivan Lopez by Texas Rep. Michael McCaul, chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee. But the congressman offered no other details, and the military declined to identify the gunman until his family members had been notified.

Lopez apparently walked into a building Wednesday afternoon and began firing a .45-caliber semi-automatic pistol. He then got into a vehicle and continued firing before entering another building, but he was eventually confronted by military police in a parking lot, according to Milley, senior officer on the base.

As he came within 20

feet of an officer, the gunman put his hands up but then reached under his jacket and pulled out his gun. The officer drew her own weapon, and the suspect put his gun to his head and pulled the trigger a final time, Milley said.

The gunman, who served in Iraq for four months in 2011, had been undergoing an assessment before the attack to determine if he had post-traumatic stress disorder, Milley said.

He arrived at Fort Hood in February from another base in Texas. He was taking medication, and there were reports that he had complained after returning from Iraq about suffering a traumatic brain injury, Milley said. The commander did not elaborate.

The gunman was never wounded in action, according to military records, and there was no indication the attack was related to terrorism, Milley said. His weapon had been recently purchased in the local area and was not registered to be on the base, Milley said.

Lopez was from the U.S. territory of Puerto Rico and joined

the island’s National Guard in 1999. He went on a peace and security mission to Egypt’s Sinai Peninsula in the mid-2000s, and left the National Guard in 2010 to join the U.S. Army, said Lt. Col. Ruth Diaz, spokeswoman for the Puerto Rico National Guard.

Those injured were taken to the base hospital and other local hospitals. At least three of the nine patients at Scott & White Memorial Hospital in Temple were listed in critical condition.

“Our thoughts and prayers are with all families involved,” Diaz said. “There is loss on both sides here.”

Wednesday’s attack immediately revived memories of the 2009 shooting rampage on Fort Hood, the deadliest attack on a domestic military installation in U.S. history. Thirteen people were killed and more than 30 were wounded.

Until an all-clear siren sounded hours after Wednesday’s shooting began, relatives of soldiers waited anxiously for news about their loved ones.

“The last two hours have been the most

nerve-wracking I’ve ever felt,” said Tayra DeHart, 33, who had earlier heard from her husband that he was safe but was waiting to hear from him again.

Brooke Conover, whose husband was on base at the time of the shooting, said she found out about it while checking Facebook. She immediately called her husband, Staff Sgt. Sean Conover.

“I just want him to come home,” she said.

President Barack Obama vowed a complete investigation. In a hastily arranged statement while in Chicago, Obama reflected on the sacrifices Fort Hood troops have made – including enduring multiple tours to Iraq and Afghanistan.

“They serve with valor. They serve with distinction, and when they’re at their home base, they need to feel safe,” Obama said Wednesday. “We don’t yet know what happened tonight, but obviously that sense of safety has been broken once again.”

Army psychiatrist Nidal Hasan was convicted last year for the November 2009 mass shooting at Fort Hood. According to trial tes-

timony, he walked into a crowded building, shouted “Allahu Akbar!” – Arabic for “God is great!” – and opened fire. The rampage ended when Hasan was shot in the back by base police officers.

Hasan, now paralyzed from the waist down, is on death row at the military prison at Fort Leavenworth in Kansas. He has said he acted to protect Islamic insurgents abroad from American aggression.

After that shooting, the military tightened base security nationwide. That included issuing security personnel long-barreled weapons, adding an insider-attack scenario to their training, and strengthening ties to local law enforcement. The military also joined an FBI intelligence-sharing program aimed at identifying terror threats.

In September, a former Navy man opened fire at the Washington Navy Yard, leaving 13 people dead, including the gunman. After that shooting, Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel ordered the Pentagon to review security at all U.S. defense installations worldwide and examine the granting of

security clearances that allow access to them.

Asked Wednesday about security improvements in the wake of the shootings, Hagel said: “Obviously when we have these kinds of tragedies on our bases, something’s not working.”

after she won 22 percent of the vote in the March primary. The winner will go head-to-head against Republican incumbent John Cornyn for the Texas U.S. Senate seat in the general election set for November.

Campaign workers declined an interview with the Herald, saying it was campaign policy to direct all media questions to the candidate herself.

Roger’s campaign website states she wants to bring back the Glass-Steagall Act which,

There are several race and sex issues that need addressing. Let's look at a few of them with an ear to these questions: Should we insist upon equal treatment of people by race and sex or tolerate differences in treatment? And just how equal are people by race and sex in the first place?

According to the National Institutes of Health, male infants 1 to 3 months old should be fed 472 to 572 calories per day, whereas their female counterparts should receive 438 to 521 calories per day (<http://tinyurl.com/nj35qvh>). That's an official sex-based caloric 10 percent rip-off of baby females. In addition to this government-sanctioned war on women, one wonders whether the NIH has a race-based caloric rip-off where they recommend that black newborns receive fewer calories than white newborns.

Anyone who watches "Lockdown" on television will see gross racial segregation in California prisons — such as Pelican Bay, Corcoran and San Quentin — where prisoners are housed by race. Colored signs have hung above living quarters — for example, blue for black inmates, white for white, red, green or pink for Hispanic, and yellow for others (<http://tinyurl.com/m7n4df8>). Sometimes inmate yard times are racially segregated.

Being 78 years old and having lived through an era in which I saw signs for white and colored

water fountains, waiting rooms and toilets, I find California's racial segregation practices offensive. Prison Law Office, a public interest law firm that seeks justice for prisoners, criticizes such flagrant racial segregation policy, but I question its sincerity. Criticizing racial segregation while not uttering one word about flagrant prison sex segregation is at the minimum, two-faced. In my book, if the all-male military bastion is being eliminated, it stands to reason that prison segregation by sex should be eliminated. No decent American would accept the idea of a prison for blacks and another one for whites. If we value equality, we shouldn't accept one prison for men and another for women.

There should be integration. Speaking of sex segregation, there have been recent calls to end the ban on women in combat units, but there's no mention of the Army's sexist physical fitness test. For a male 17-21 years of age to pass, he must do 35 pushups, do 47 situps and run 2 miles in 16 minutes, 36 seconds. His female counterpart, who receives the same pay, can pass the fitness test by doing a mere 13 pushups, doing 47 situps and running 2 miles in 19 minutes, 42 seconds. How can anyone who values equality and self-respect tolerate this gross discrimination? You say, "Williams, what's your solution?" I say we should either force women to come up to the physical fitness standards for men or pass men who meet the female standards of fitness. Maybe we should ask our adversaries which is better — raising female fitness standards or lowering those of males.

There are a couple of other

inequalities that cannot be justified, much less tolerated, in a society that values equality. Jews are only 3 percent of the U.S. population, but they take 39 percent of U.S. Nobel laureates. That's a gross disparity, for which there is no moral justification. Ask any academic, intellectual, or civil rights leader and he'll tell you that equality and diversity means that people are to be represented across socioeconomic lines according to their numerical representation in the population. The fact that Jews are 39 percent of U.S. Nobel laureates can mean only one thing — they are taking the rightful Nobel laureates of other racial groups.

Jews are not the only people taking more than their fair share of things. Blacks are 13 percent of the population but have taken nearly 80 percent of the player jobs in the National Basketball Association. Compounding that injustice, they are highest-paid NBA players. Blacks are also guilty of taking 66 percent, an unfair share, of professional football jobs.

Any American sharing the value of race and sex equality and diversity should find these and other differences offensive and demand that the liberal and progressive elements in society eliminate them.

The Man of Steele returns

Michael Steele is crossing the Midway Plaisance, a mile-long green swath that cuts through Chicago's Hyde Park and was once used for the world's first Ferris wheel, hootchy-kootchy dancing and the other earthly delights of the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893.

Today it is a verdant ribbon, wider than two football fields, that lies at the foot of the University of Chicago's grand Gothic spires and is used for ice skating, soccer and whatever else one does on a verdant ribbon.

Steele, who is a resident fellow at the university's Institute of Politics, manages to traverse the entire width of the Midway before the inevitable happens: A passing car comes to halt, and the driver lowers her passenger window and hails Steele as an old friend, even though they have never met.

Though Steele was once the (first black) lieutenant governor of Maryland and the (first black) chairman of the Republican National Committee, today he is far better known than he was then. This is largely because of the airtime he gets as an MSNBC analyst and during his appearances on "Real Time with Bill Maher" and "The Colbert Report."

He is outgoing, bright, magnetic, recognized on streets and in airports, and the one thing he was not while he ran the Republican Party: popular.

"I am the most misunderstood man in politics," Steele tells me.

Steele was elected to a two-year term as the RNC's chairman Jan. 30, 2009. It seemed like a good idea at the time. Barack Obama had moved in to the White House, and a lot of people were talking about a "post-racial" America. Nancy Pelosi was

running the House; Harry Reid was running the Senate; and it didn't seem as if the Republican message was selling all that well.

So maybe it was time for a change. Except Steele's election took six ballots, and though Steele had conservative Republican credentials, the reaction of some of the party kingpins ranged from displeasure to dismay. And then there was the race thing. Maybe the country was not so post-racial after all.

"After I was elected chairman, there were some people who refused to shake my hand," Steele says of some Republican bigwigs.

He was a different kind of chairman. He got involved in controversies that earned him the wrath of John McCain (not that hard a thing to do, actually) and made a series of statements that some found baffling.

He said that the war in Afghanistan was a war "of Obama's choosing" and that he was going to tell local Republican chairmen: "Don't think this is a country club atmosphere where we sit around drinking wine and eating cheese and talking amongst ourselves.

If you don't want to drill down and build coalitions to minority communities, then you have to give that seat to someone who does."

Some of his ideas were actually pretty good. He said he wanted an "off the hook" public relations offensive to reach out to "the young, Hispanic, black, a cross section" and apply party principles "to urban-suburban hip-hop settings."

That earned him the wrath of Rush Limbaugh, which could be considered a badge of honor, but Steele was the chairman of the Republican Party, a party that didn't really think of itself as being that "off the hook."

Steele ran for re-election as party chairman in 2011 but withdrew after four rounds of voting, knowing he was not going to make it.

He says that party leaders "scoffed" at his "off the hook" remark but that Republicans "were a party stuck in the past" and the party base was "demoralized."

Steele is pro-life, but when he sat down for a long and fascinating interview with GQ magazine, he was asked whether "women have the right to choose abortion."

"Yeah," Steele said. "I mean, again, I think that's an individual choice." He also said that pro-choice people "absolutely" have a place in the Republican Party.

Though he is personally against gay marriage, he thinks each state should be able to decide whether it is legal or not. And no, he does not think being gay is a choice.

Those statements seem less explosive now than they did then, and Steele has been considering running for public office.

"I am absolutely a Republican and very much a conservative and proud to be," he says. "But I will be damned if I will let anyone label me. A party that litmus tests its members diminishes itself."

He thinks Sen. Rand Paul might make a good Republican nominee for president — might — and Steele doesn't say so, but perhaps Paul could do worse than selecting a big-tent African-American running mate.

"While government has a limited purpose, it still has a role," Steele said. "Leadership can make a difference."

Then he had to get on a plane for Washington. There was a TV show to do.

Run to History

Record-setting 4x400-meter relay squad leads BSHS into District 4-3A track meet

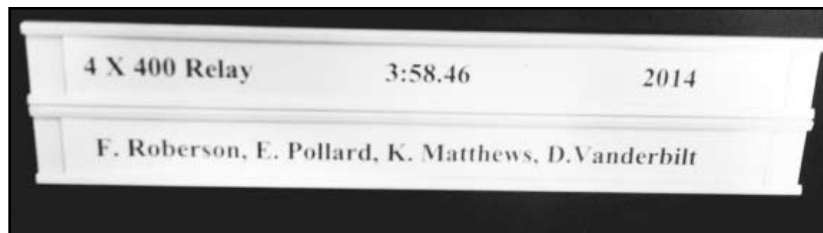
When senior Dyrshae Vanderbilt stepped across the finish line at the Honeybee Relays recently, she knew she and her teammates had just ran a really good time in the 4x400-meter relay.

Just how good, she would learn later when BSHS head track coach Nick Roberson informed them they had broken the school's all-time record. The team ran a time of 3 minutes and 58.46 seconds and shattered the previous school-best by almost a full second.

It was also more than 8 seconds faster than the team had ever run before.

The news that the team had beaten their personal record as well as the school mark was news that stunned even Vanderbilt, one of the most decorated track and field athletes in BSHS history.

"To be honest, I didn't think we would break it," said Vanderbilt, a four-time medalist as the state track meet. "At the last minute before the race, we switched legs so I didn't think we would. We were just hoping



to do well."

They did much better than what said Roberson. The Lady Steers made a statement heard around the state.

"That was a big race for us," said Roberson. "Make no mistake about it, the relay is a big focus point for our team. They went in and made a statement, and we beat our (regional) rival (Stephenville)."

Junior Erin Pollard helped the Lady Steers get off to a great start. Running the first leg, she covered the first 400 meters of the race in a time of 61 seconds before handing the baton to fellow freshman Kaitlin Mathews.

Mathews turned in a time of 58.8 seconds over the second lap.

Freshman Faith Roberson ran the third leg of the race, turning in a time of 58.1 seconds before delivering the baton to Vanderbilt, who fin-

ished off the race with a 61.18 over the final 400 meters.

Roberson said she thought the stream had a chance to break the school record, especially considering the whole team's work ethic.

"We've been working so hard this season," said Roberson, who already shares a piece of Big Spring relay history. "I thought we had a chance to do it."

Roberson, along with Mathews and Brittney Clay and Haddie Jimenez, was part of the Lady Steers' 4x400-meter relay relay record two seasons ago.

Nick Roberson doesn't feel the Lady Steers have seen their better days. In fact, he feels the BSHS squad could break their own record several times over the next few weeks as they

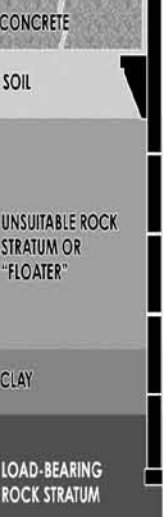

All bridge players at times experience a good-luck streak where everything goes right. However, there are also times when everything goes wrong. It is during these unlucky streaks that the true mettle of a player is tested. Unfortunately, some players spend so much time feeling sorry for themselves that they make no effort to overcome their bad luck.

For example, consider what happened to South in this deal. He was in six hearts and would have been home free had the trumps divided 2-1, or even 3-0 with East holding the three trumps. Furthermore, even if West had all the missing trumps, South still had a spade finesse in reserve. All these chances combined made him a huge favorite to make the slam.

He won the queen-of-clubs lead with the ace and got his first bad news when he cashed the ace of trumps and East showed out. Having suffered a few similar misfortunes in the recent past, South had expected this development. And when, shortly afterward, he attempted the spade finesse and the queen lost to the king, he was down one, bemoaning his continuing bad luck.

However, South would have made the slam had he concentrated on the task at hand instead of allowing himself to wallow in his earlier misfortunes. After learning about the trump situation, he should have tried for an elimination play.

This could have been done by cashing the king of trumps and king of clubs, followed by a diamond to the queen and a club ruff. The A-K of diamonds, another club ruff and a trump lead would then have put West on lead in a hopeless position. With only spades remaining in his hand, he would be forced to lead one and thereby present South with his 12th trick.

This Date In History

Thursday, April 3, the 93rd day of 2014. There are 272 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On April 3, 1974, deadly tornadoes began hitting wide parts of the South and Midwest before jumping across the border into Canada; within a 24-hour period, more than 300 fatalities resulted from what became known as the Super Outbreak. On this date: In 1776, George Washington received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Harvard College. In 1860, the legendary Pony Express began carrying mail between St. Joseph, Mo., and Sacramento, Calif. (The delivery system lasted only 18 months before giv-

ing way to the transcontinental telegraph.) In 1882, outlaw Jesse James was shot to death in St. Joseph, Mo., by Robert Ford, a member of James' gang. In 1913, British suffragist Emmeline Pankhurst was sentenced to three years in jail for inciting supporters to bomb the home of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, David Lloyd George. (Pankhurst, known for staging hunger strikes in prison, was repeatedly released and reincarcerated, serving roughly 30 days total behind bars.) In 1936, Bruno Hauptmann was electrocuted in Trenton, N.J. for the kidnap-murder of Charles Lindbergh Jr. In 1944, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Smith v. Allwright, struck down a Democratic Party of Texas rule that allowed only white voters to participate in Democratic primaries. In 1946, Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, the Japanese com-

mander held responsible for the Bataan Death March, was executed by firing squad outside Manila. In 1948, President Harry S. Truman signed the Marshall Plan, designed to help European allies rebuild after World War II and resist communism. In 1968, the day before he was assassinated in Memphis, Tenn., civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his famous "mountaintop" speech to a rally of striking sanitation workers.
