

Fort Hood gunman sought mental health treatment

FORT HOOD, Texas — An Iraq War veteran being treated for mental illness was the gunman who opened fire at Fort Hood, killing three people and wounding 16 others before committing suicide, in an attack on the same Texas military base where more than a dozen people were slain in 2009, authorities said.

Within hours of the Wednesday attack, investigators started looking into whether the man's combatexperience had caused lingering psychological trauma. Fort Hood's senior officer, Lt. Gen. Mark Milley, said the gunman had sought help for depression, anxiety and other problems.

Among the possibilities investigators planned to explore was whether a fight or argument on the base triggered the attack.

"We have to find all those witnesses, the witnesses to every one of those shootings, and find out what his actions were, and what was said to the victims," said a federal



The shooter was identified as Ivan Lopez by Texas Rep. Michael McCaul, chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee. But the congressman offered no other details, and the military declined to identify the gunman until his family members had been notified.

Lopez apparently walked into a building Wednesday afternoon and began firing a .45-caliber semi-automatic pistol. He then got into a vehicle and continued firing before entering another building, but he was eventually confronted by military police in a parking lot, according to Milley, senior officer on the base.

The gunman, who served in Iraq for four months in 2011, had been undergoing an assessment before the attack to determine if he had post-traumatic stress disorder, Milley said.

He arrived at Fort Hood in February from another base in Texas. He was taking medication, and there were reports that he had complained after returning from Iraq about suffering a traumatic brain injury, Milley said. The commander did not elaborate.

The gunman was never wounded in action, according to military records, and there was no indication the attack was related to terrorism, Milley said. His weapon had been recently purchased in the local area and was not registered to be on the base, Milley said.

Those injured were taken to the base hospital and other local hospitals. At least three of the nine patients at Scott & White Memorial Hospital in Temple were listed in critical condition.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with all families involved," Diaz said. "There is loss on both sides here."

Wednesday's attack immediately revived memories of the 2009 shooting rampage on Fort Hood, the deadliest attack on a domestic military installation in U.S. history. Thirteen people were killed and more than 30 were wounded.

Until an all-clear siren sounded hours after Wednesday's shooting began, relatives of soldiers waited anxiously for news about their loved ones.

"Theyservewithvalor. They serve with distinction, and when they're at their home base, they need to feel safe,' Obama said Wednesday. "We don't yet know what happened tonight, but obviously that sense of safety has been broken once again."

Army psychiatrist Nidal Hasan was convicted last year for the November 2009 mass shooting at Fort Hood. According to trial tes-

timony, he walked into a crowded building, shouted "Allahu Akbar!" - Arabic for "God is great!" - and opened fire. The rampage ended when Hasan was shot in the back by base police officers.

Hasan, now paralyzed from the waist down, is on death row at the military prison at Fort Leavenworth in Kansas. He has said he acted to protect Islamic insurgents abroad from American aggression.

After that shooting, the military tightened base security nationwide. That included issuing security personnel long-barreled weapons, adding an insiderattack scenario to their training, and strengthening ties to local law enforcement. The military also joined an FBI intelligence-sharing program aimed at identifying terror threats.

In September, a former Navy man opened fire at the Washington Navy Yard, leaving 13 people dead, including the gunman. After that shooting, Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel ordered the Pentagon to review security at all U.S. defense installations worldwide and examine the granting of

Asked Wednesday about security improvements in the wake of the shootings, Hagel said: "Obviously when we have these kinds of tragedies on our bases, something's not working."

438 to 521 calories per day (http://tinyurl.com/ nj35qvh). That's an official sexbased caloric 10 percent rip-off of baby females. In addition to this government-sanctioned war on women, one wonders whether the NIH has a race-based caloric rip-off where they recommend that black newborns receive fewer calories than white newborns.

Anyone who watches "Lockdown" on television will see gross racial segregation in California prisons — such as Pelican Bay, Corcoran and San Quentin — where prisoners are housed by race. Colored signs have hung above living quarters — for example, blue for black inmates, white for white, red, green or pink for Hispanic, and yellow for others (http://tinyurl.com/m7n4df8). Sometimes inmate yard times are racially segregated.

racial segregation practices offensive. Prison Law Office, a public interest law firm that seeks justice for prisoners, criticizes such flagrant racial segregation policy, but I question its sincerity. Criticizing racial segregation while not uttering one word about flagrant prison sex segregation is at the minimum, two-faced. In my book, if the all-male military bastion is being eliminated, it stands to reason that prison segregation by sex should be eliminated. No decent American would accept the idea of a prison for blacks and another one for whites. If we value equality, we shouldn't accept one prison for men and another for women.

There should be integration. Speaking of sex segregation, there have been recent calls to end the ban on women in combat units, but there's no mention of the Army's sexist physical fitness test. For a male 17-21 years of age to pass, he must do 35 pushups, do 47 situps and run 2 miles in 16 minutes, 36 seconds. His female counterpart, who receives the same pay, can pass the fitness test by doing a mere 13 pushups, doing 47 situps and running 2 miles in 19 minutes, 42 seconds. How can anyone who values equality and self-respect tolerate this gross discrimination? You say, "Williams, what's your solution?" I say we should either force women to come up to the physical fitness standards for men or pass men who meet the female standards of fitness. Maybe we should ask our adversaries which is better — raising female fitness standards or lowering those of males.

a society that values equality. Jews are only 3 percent of the U.S. population, but they take 39 percent of U.S. Nobel laureates. That's a gross disparity, for which there is no moral justification. Ask any academic, intellectual, or civil rights leader and he'll tell you that equality and diversity means that people are to be represented across socioeconomic lines according to their numerical representation in the population. The fact that Jews are 39 percent of U.S. Nobel laureates can mean only one thing — they are taking the rightful Nobel laureates of other racial groups.

Jews are not the only people taking more than their fair share of things. Blacks are 13 percent of the population but have taken nearly 80 percent of the player jobs in the National Basketball Association. Compounding that injustice, they are highest-paid NBA players. Blacks are also guilty of taking 66 percent, an unfair share, of professional football jobs.

Any American sharing the value of race and sex equality and diversity should find these and other differences offensive and demand that the liberal and progressive elements in society eliminate them.

"I mean, again, I think that's an individual choice." He also said that pro-choice people "absolutely" have a place in the Republican Party. Though he is personally against gay marriage, he thinks each state should be able to decide whether it is legal or not. And no, he does not think being gay is a choice. Those statements seem less explosive now than they did then, and Steele has been considering running for public office. "I am absolutely a Republican and very much a conservative and proud to be," he says. "But I will be damned if I will let anyone label me. A party that litmus tests its members diminishes itself." He thinks Sen. Rand Paul might make a good Republican nominee for president — might and Steele doesn't say so, but perhaps Paul could do worse than selecting a big-tent African-American running mate. "While government has a limited purpose, it still has a role," Steele said. "Leadership can make a difference." Then he had to get on a plane for Washington. There was a TV show to do.

Steele, who is a resident fellow at the university's Institute of Politics, manages to traverse the entire width of the Midway before the inevitable happens: A passing car comes to halt, and the driver lowers her passenger window and hails Steele as an old friend, even though they have never met.

Though Steele was once the (first black) lieutenant governor of Maryland and the (first black) chairman of the Republican National Committee, today he is far better known than he was then. This is largely because of the airtime he gets as an MSNBC analyst and during his appearances on "Real Time with Bill Maher" and "The Colbert Report."

He is outgoing, bright, magnetic, recognized on streets and in airports, and the one thing he was not while he ran the Republican Party: popular.

"I am the most misunderstood man in politics," Steele tells me. Steele was elected to a two-year term as the RNC's chairman

Jan. 30, 2009. It seemed like a good idea at the time. Barack Obama had moved in to the White House, and a lot of people were talking about a "post-ra-Amen cial" America. Nancy Pelosi was

had conservative Republican credentials, the reaction of some of the party kingpins ranged from displeasure to dismay. And then there was the race thing. Maybe the country was not so post-racial after all.

"After I was elected chairman, there were some people who refused to shake my hand," Steele says of some Republican bigwigs.

He was a different kind of chairman. He got involved in controversies that earned him the wrath of John McCain (not that hard a thing to do, actually) and made a series of statements that some found baffling.

He said that the war in Afghanistan was a war "of Obama's choosing" and that he was going to tell local Republican chairmen: "Don't think this is a country club atmosphere where we sit around drinking wine and eating cheese and talking amongst ourselves.

If you don't want to drill down and build coalitions to minority communities, then you have to give that seat to someone who does."

Some of his ideas were actually pretty good. He said he wanted an "off the hook" public relations offensive to reach out to "the young, Hispanic, black, a cross section" and apply party principles "to urban-suburban hip-hop settings."

That earned him the wrath of Rush Limbaugh, which could be considered a badge of honor, but Steele was the chairman of the Republican Party, a party that didn't really think of itself as being that "off the hook."

Steele ran for re-election as party chairman in 2011 but withdrew after four rounds of voting, knowing he was not going to make it.





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

However, South would have made the slam had he concentrated on the task at hand instead of allowing himself to wallow in his earlier misfortunes. After learning about the trump situation, he should have tried for an elimination play.

This could have been done by cashing the king of trumps and king of clubs, followed by a diamond to the queen and a club ruff. The A-K of diamonds, another club ruff and a trump lead would then have put West on lead in a hopeless position. With only spades remaining in his hand, he would be forced to lead one and thereby present South with his 12th trick
