## Further review set for Big Spring VA

*Audit team finds no intentional misconduct*

The West Texas VA Health Care System, headquartered in Big Spring, will receive further review as the result of an audit of all Veterans Health Administration facilities.

The audit, which studied various factors, including patient wait times for a variety of medical and mental health services at VA hospitals, concluded that Big Spring was among the VA facilities in need of further review.

Big Spring ranked low when the audit studied wait times for new and returning patients. About 8 percent of new patients requesting an appointment for services were forced to wait more than 30 days for an appointment, while established patients had to wait an average of 12 days for an appointment, one of the highest rates in the nation.

While the numbers are bad,

they were not the result of neglect on the part of local staff, auditors concluded.

"As previously communicated, the audit team did not convey finding any evidence of willful misconduct when they completed their review in Big Spring on May 15, and this still holds true," WTVAHCS Community Rela-

tions Director Iva Jo Hanslik said in a news release.

"We agreed with the team's assessment that we were not in full compliance with the scheduling directive and immediate steps were taken to improve this area," Hanslik added.

Those steps include: Local staff has been provided addi-

tional training and education on scheduling guidelines; Electronic Waiting Lists (EWL), which are designed to help cut wait times, have been implemented; and audit controls are in place to ensure more efficient scheduling practices, she said.

## Thompson guilty, gets prison term

ABILENE — A Big Spring man was found guilty in federal court Friday and sentenced to 105 months in the United States Bureau of Prisons.



Fifty-four-year-old Curtis Thompson was found guilty of possession with intent to distribute cocaine and aiding and abetting by Federal Judge Cummings of Abilene.

Narcotics investigators seized more than one ounce of cocaine and filed forfeiture on approximately \$5,500 in U.S. currency and two motor vehicles.

The investigation was the result of months of work with the Big Spring Police Department Narcotics Division and Homeland Security.

## FISD finds a way to save some cash

Trustees with the Forsan Independent School District approved a change of order in a major air-conditioning/plumbing project Monday night which will help contain costs budgeted for construction of a new elementary school and upgrades to the

junior/senior campus.

Trustees accepted a new bid on HVAC and plumbing projects for both the new elementary and secondary campuses, saving the district \$463,113. That money will be transferred to help fund the construction of a waste water treatment plant which had come over the initial budget and will help balance out the funding for the overall bond project.

Voters in the FISD approved almost \$24 million bond project in May of 2013 to fund the

major construction projects currently on-going. FISD trustees and officials have had to watch every penny when it comes to the budget as living and construction costs have dramatically increased in West Texas in the past few years.

With the new design on the elementary school building now finished, officials with the construction manager business overseeing the bond projects said the next step is to review the designs with the subcontractors for

the concrete and steel work to find more costs savings in those areas.

"We are really excited to be able to keep the elementary design very close to the original conception, and we hope we will be able to add back some of the smaller things we initially planned to do around the secondary campus," said Randy Johnson, FISD superintendent.

# Bird Poop: 'We've all gained from this paisano'

Her new condo offered a view of the lake and the city park. With residents parking behind their units, the roadway in front was unobstructed. Having finally unpacked from her recent move, the woman realized she had acquired more than a new home. Almost daily, from her second story window, she watched a roadrunner cross the highway and momentarily stop to investigate the parked vehicles. After walking to the end of the buildings, it would proceed to the street.

Its comings and goings across U.S. 87, and its dominance over this new terrain, was an added pleasure. Although more residences would be built in the future, the bird was taking advantage of the undisturbed slopes to the lake.

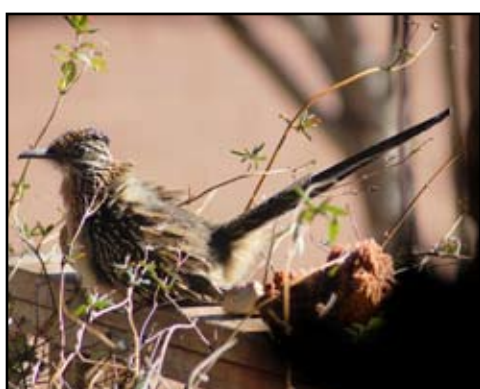
Underneath each juniper and behind every rock was something of interest. Spending most of its time on the ground among the native growth, the bird darted about in its hunt for lizards, insects, small birds, and snakes. Often, its long bill grasped its latest catch. Seldom did it fly.

On an early day in June, the woman waited for the bird to begin its morning ritual. An hour passed without its arrival. Wondering if it had chosen another area in which to hunt, she grabbed her purse for a quick run to the grocery store. After unlocking her vehicle, she decided to walk up the incline behind her unit to check the highway.

An uneasy feeling gripped her inner being. When she could see that the pavement was clear, she relaxed.

Carefully watching her every step, as each rock offered a chance to slip, she took her time going back to her car. Her descent was causing her to be about a unit away from her residence. Once on level ground, she finally took her eyes off her feet.

Noticing a dark shape underneath her car, she was momentarily puzzled by its presence. Her first thought was of a feral cat. Kneeling by the side of her car allowed her to realize it wasn't a cat. It was her roadrunner.

Seeing it lying on its stomach enabled her to realize its tail was as long as its body, and it was larger than she had imagined. It didn't move. Distaught, the woman called to ask if we could come help the bird.

When we saw where the roadrunner lay under the car, we knew there was no alternative. Hopefully, my

getting underneath the vehicle would allow me to grasp the bird and hand it out to Art. Wishful thinking was going to be a lot easier than doing it.

As I stretched out to wiggle underneath and between the front and back tires, I could feel West Texas grit beneath my shirt. Above, grime from lubricants mixed with dust was a given.

A towel tucked inside my belt could be pulled free and used to put over the roadrunner. But first came a slow approach in hopes of not frightening the bird.

Lying on my back, and inching toward it by moving hips and elbows, was a slow, tedious process. Finally, I lay near the roadrunner.

With eyes closed, the bird at least was still breathing. Not to be fooled, I realized the moment I touched it could cause it to try to burst away from any perceived danger.

Barely able to turn on my side, I took the towel from my belt and stretched it the full length of the bird. To place it over the bird and tightly grasp its wings to its body in one motion was my hope.

Accomplishing that would allow me to hand the bird to Art.

Although the June morning was in the mid 80s, the air was stifling underneath the car. No breeze offered relief. Fortunately, the towel and my hands quickly contained the bird.

To hold the wiggling roadrunner while inching toward Art's feet was a challenge. The appearance of his hands finally grasping the bird allowed me to relax.

None of us could surmise what had happened. Semis and the turbulence they create might have slammed the roadrunner to the pavement. Bruised and shaken, it could have sought refuge in the familiar shelter of the

condos.

The next day at the Eos Wildlife Sanctuary in Midland, Midge Erskine could find no signs of injury. With rest, diet, and a quiet place to recover, she felt it was releasable.

Calling the woman to tell her of our findings was to share a common respect for the noble hunter.

She, too, had noticed the iridescent sheen of its feathers. When it had chosen to fly to a nearby mesquite, she had seen the white patches that adorn its short, rounded wings.

As it sometimes seemed to strut in the middle of the road, its crested head was upright and showed the pale blue/orange-red bare skin back of its eyes. She felt the prominent streaking on its breast and back enabled it to hide in the nearby brush.

The woman was unaware that the bird's name had been created to describe a unique being that ran ahead in the roadway during the pioneer days of horse drawn conveyances. Its place in history was assured.

Sharing with her another culture's admiration for the bird, I mentioned friends from Mexico and along the border felt a roadrunner crossing one's path meant wealth would come one's way. Supposedly, to confirm the sighting of a compatriota was to tie a knot in a cloth handkerchief. By nightfall, something of merit would occur.

The lady smiled as I added that the sighting of one in the wild, or even a nestling or adult brought to our care, reminded us of our good fortune. Then she added, "We've all gained from this paisano."

One of the biggest problems facing the local VA is one new residents are well aware of — the lack of available housing. This particularly hurts the hospital in its efforts to attract quality medical staff to this area, officials said. Steps are being taken

in that regard as well, Hanslik said.

"Despite issues with the economic conditions of the environment and challenges to maintain adequate provider staffing, many initiatives are in place to recruit and retain high quality providers to improve and sustain access," she said. "Director Michael Kiefer has and will continue to exercise authorities to offer attrac-

tive benefit packages to bring and retain health care providers to West Texas."

The review news was not all bad for the facility. Recently, WTVAHCS was surveyed by The Joint Commission, which Hanslik said provides the "gold standard of mental health care accreditation." This scheduled survey reviewed four specific programs: Outpatient Care, Men-

tal Health, Home Based Primary Care and Community Living Center.

"The preliminary results as presented by the survey team indicated that all programs will be fully accredited for an additional three years, a mark of high quality," she said.

Hanslik said WTVAHCS personnel will work hard to improve problem areas identified by the audit.

"We have renewed and redoubled our efforts locally to improve internal systems to ensure appropriate access for our veterans," she said. "Our main goal is to always focus on what is best for our veterans and we will continue to do this. We welcome VA's continued review to enhance these efforts."

get to see their fathers on Father's Day, and some do not get to see or know their fathers at all.

But CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) volunteers from CASA of West Texas can provide help for these children. CASA volunteers are everyday members of the community who are specially trained and appointed by courts to advocate for children in foster care. They work to guide the children through foster care and into safe, permanent homes as quickly as possible.

"Our volunteers get to know the child and advocate for the child's mental and physical health and education-

al needs," said Patty Pisklak, CASA of West Texas executive director. "Most importantly, however, they work diligently to get the child out of foster care and into a loving home."

CASA volunteers advocate first and foremost for reunification with the child's family, and if that's not possible, placement with an extended family. But when there is no safe and willing relative, CASA volunteers work to help place the child

with a caring, adoptive family.

There are 51 children in the child protection system and currently only 19 CASA volunteers in Howard County. That has forced CASA to have to turn down anymore court appointed cases and leave children in Howard County without a CASA volunteer.

"Every child that needs one should have a CASA volunteer, but we

happen," Pisklak said. "Consider becoming a CASA volunteer so that more of these children can celebrate Father's Day with loving families."

Children who have CASA volunteers typically spend less time in foster care, get the services they need to begin to heal and do better academically. That is good for children and it is good for taxpayers,

# Heat know Spurs will be inspired in Game 3

MIAMI (AP) — Dwyane Wade thinks there's no one better than the Miami Heat at dealing with the mental challenge of the playoffs. In his eyes, only one other team might compare.

He's talking about the San Antonio Spurs.

That's why Wade believes these NBA Finals are just getting started.

When he looks at the Spurs, he sees qualities his own team has, including an ability to break down a loss and quickly correct things. It's what Miami did before Game 2 of the finals and it's what Wade expects the Spurs to do before the title se-

ries resumes with Game 3 in Miami on Tuesday night.

"You never put them away," Wade said. "I think they always believe and it's the same with us. You can't, you won't, put us away because we're always going to believe. That's why this is a perfect, different animal, kind of series. They're the other team like us. They don't lose much and when they do they come back and be better in the next game. So we've got to come out and do the same thing."

That would explain why on Monday, instead of a day off, the Heat

gathered to watch video of Game 2. By winning in San Antonio to even the finals at 1-1, home-court advantage now belongs to the Heat. But no one in their locker room thinks it's going to get easy now.

"They came out great. They played a great game," Spurs guard Tony Parker said after Miami's 98-96 win in Game 2, the 13th straight time the Heat immediately followed a postseason loss with a victory. "Now it's our turn to go over there and get one. We played pretty well all season long on the road and so we're going to

have two great opportunities to try to come up with a win."

Miami has won a franchise-record 11 straight postseason games at home. The last team to win a playoff game in Miami was the Spurs, winning Game 1 of last season's finals.

"We are in a tough situation because we've got to go to Miami and we've got to get one," Spurs guard Manu Ginobili said. "We don't want to come back here 3-1 down. It's very hard to overcome that. Definitely going to be a great challenge for the team to play in an arena like that

and having to win."

A challenge, sure, but it's one Heat coach Erik Spoelstra knows the Spurs can handle. "Coming back here there has to be an incredible sense of focus and urgency," Spoelstra said Monday. "They're a veteran, poised, championship-level team that's been through a lot. The crowd won't affect them much."

Neither team thought it played all that well in the game that it won so far in these finals.

The Spurs turned the ball over too much for the Heat in Game 1 — the game that will be

remembered for the air conditioning malfunction and cramps inside a steamy building forcing LeBron James to leave in the final minutes. In Game 2, the Heat weren't thrilled with a slow start and how they spent much of the game playing from behind. When James got rolling in the third quarter, things started swinging Miami's way in Game 2.

When he found Chris Bosh for the 3-pointer that put Miami ahead for good with 1:18 left, it was just another example of the four-time MVP setting a teammate up for a big play.

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Lonnie Chisenhall has driven in nine runs, tying a Cleveland record, and hit three homers among his five hits against the Texas Rangers.

Chisenhall had two-run home runs in the second and fourth innings Monday night before hitting a three-run shot down the right field line in the eighth to give the Indians a 17-6 lead. Chisenhall becomes only the fourth major

league player since RBIs became a statistic in 1920 to have at least five hits, nine RBIs and three homers in a game, and he is the first since Boston's Fred Lynn in 1975, according to the Indians.

The other nine-RBI game in Cleveland history was by Chris James against Oakland on May 4, 1991. The last player to drive in nine runs in a game was the New York Mets' Carlos Delgado in 2008.

## Moreland could return sooner than planned

ARLINGTON (AP) — Texas Rangers first baseman Mitch Moreland is considering a procedure on his ailing left ankle that could get him back on the field two months earlier than originally planned.

The team said Monday that Moreland could opt for a procedure to remove a bone in the back of the ankle rather than reconstructive surgery that would sideline him for three months. The shorter timetable is three to four weeks.

Moreland, who wasn't in

the clubhouse when it was open to reporters Monday, said Sunday he could no longer play through pain he's been dealing with all season. He became the everyday first baseman when Prince Fielder decided on neck surgery that ended his season. The loss of their top two first basemen has the Rangers scrambling to fill the spot. Donnie Murphy was set for his second straight start and third of the season against Cleveland in the finale of a four-game series Monday night.

# Kings on the brink of Stanley Cup title

NEW YORK (AP) — It turns out Jonathan Quick and the Los Angeles Kings are just as good with the lead as they are without it.

That leaves the New York Rangers with little hope of making much of a series out of the Stanley Cup finals.

Quick stopped 32 shots in his best start of the series, Jeff Carter scored in the final second of the first period, Jake Muzzin and Mike Richards added goals in the second, and the Kings beat the Rangers 3-0 on Monday night to move within one win of their second Stanley Cup title in three years.

Los Angeles leads 3-0 and can claim the Cup on Wednesday night in New York.

The Kings have already survived three Games 7s on the road, so this amount of success has their confidence soaring.

Quick hardly showed it when he took the podium wearing a black hooded sweatshirt.

"I don't think it would be any different if we were down 3-0," Quick said. "We're just trying to win a game in a couple days here. That's the focus."

After the Rangers blew two-goal leads in each of the first two games of the championship round in Los Angeles, they came home and couldn't get anything going against Quick.

The All-Star was sharp early and in the middle when the Kings built their lead.

Not even six power plays could jump-start New York's offense.

"We did a lot of things the right way," Quick said. "Now we get ready for the next one. The fourth one is always the most difficult."

Los Angeles escaped with two overtime wins at home and then took complete command inside Madison Square Garden.

The Kings grabbed their first lead of the series on Carter's goal and then stretched the edge to three goals in the second — something the Rangers failed to do in California.

The Houston Astros scored all their runs in the first two innings in a 4-3 victory over the Diamondbacks on Monday night.

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

Today is Tuesday, June 10, the 161st day of 2014. There are 204 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 10, 1964, the Senate voted to limit further debate on a proposed civil rights bill, shutting off a filibuster by Southern senators. (The Civil Rights Act of 1964 went on to win congressional approval and was signed by President Lyndon Johnson.) On this date: In 1692, the first official execution resulting from the Salem witch trials in Massachusetts took place as Bridget Bishop was hanged. In 1864, the Confederate Congress authorized military service for men between the ages of 17 and 70. In 1907, eleven men in five cars set out from the French embassy in Beijing on a race to Paris. (Prince Scipione Borghese of Italy was the first to arrive in the French capital two months later.) In 1921, President Warren G. Harding signed into law the Budget and Accounting Act, which created the Bureau of the Budget and the General Accounting Office. In 1934, English composer Frederick Delius, 72, died in Grez-sur-Loing, France. In 1940, Italy declared war on France and Britain; Canada declared war on Italy. In 1942, during World War II, German forces massacred 173 male residents of Lidice (LIH'-dyiht-zeh), Czechoslovakia, in retaliation for the killing of Nazi official Reinhard Heydrich.

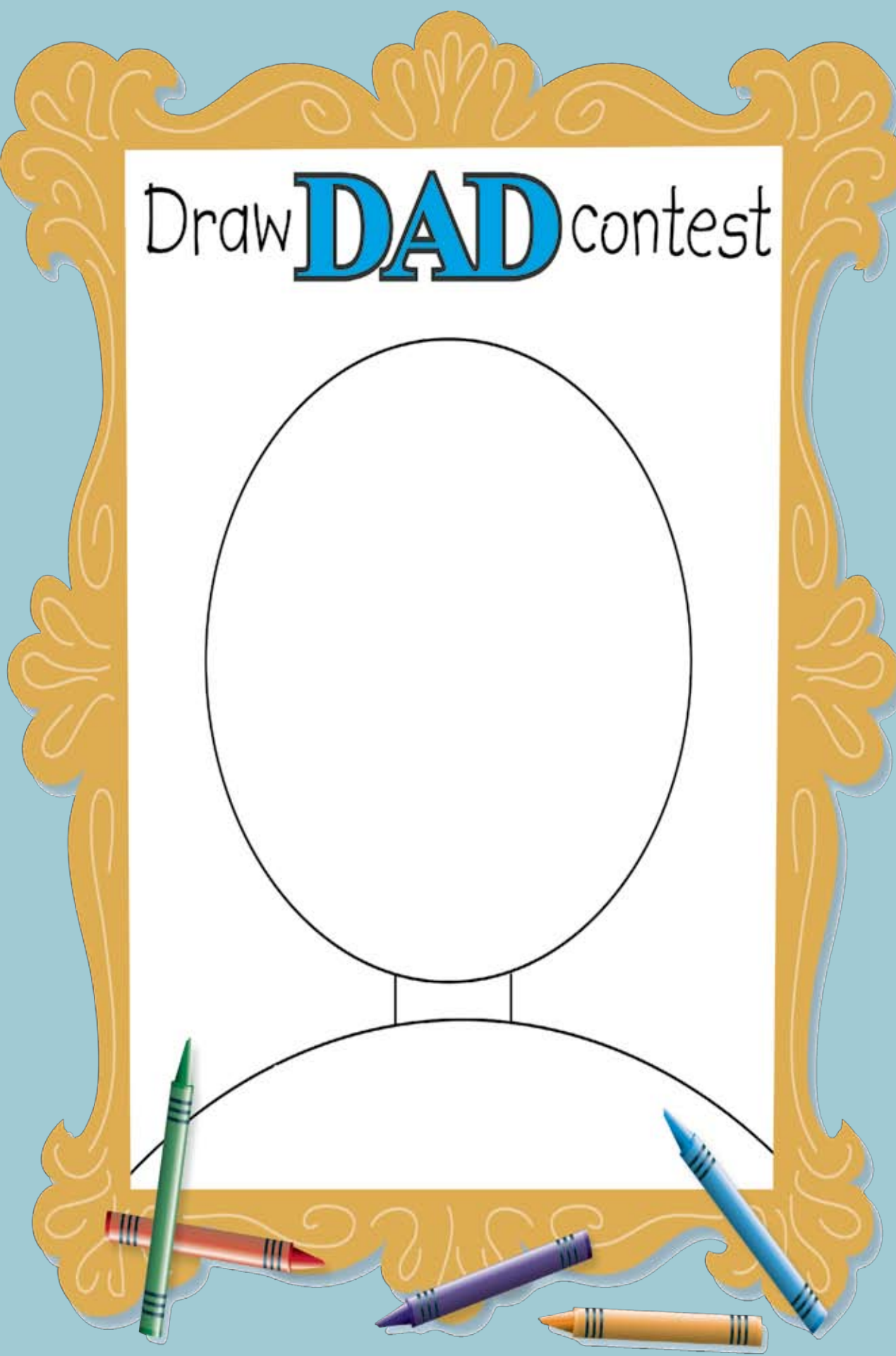
