

COMMISSIONERS COURT BREAKS OLD PRECEDENT

Another precedent has been broken, a record has been set, the un-heard-of has happened-the County Judge and Commissioners of Castro County have worked, not much but a little, for their pay checks. The guardians of the county funds rolled up their sleeves, and with other available laborers, poured concrete for new walks around the court house Wednesday. The original walks had sunken in the ground from about one to six inches and would, if it ever rained, cause water to run down the outside of the foundation. Enough concrete was poured by the County Judge, Commissioners and their helpers, to bring the walks back to their original levels.

Aside from the fact that this much needed improvement was accomplished with very little additional expense to the county, it was a treat to the citizens of the county-who do work-to have an opportunity to see Judge Ivey take a shovel in hand, and with an expression of excruciating pain on his face, heave one-half shovelful of cement after another into the cement mixer. He carried on however, until the job was finished, in a manner that should justify the trust placed in him by the voters of Castro County.






