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
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

Rough Fish Kill For Possum Kingdom

The enlarged program for rough fish eradication in Possum Kingdom lake is a chemical treatment process and no poisoning is involved, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries.

"Studies now are being made by biologists," the Director said. "During the latter part of July we will move enough men with boats and planes onto the water to cover the lake thoroughly in one day. This definitely is not a poisoning program. Through sampling we have determined the amount of chemical treatment necessary for removal of certain types of rough fish.

"This treatment affects the

"After this treatment the fish are still edible and thousands of pounds will be picked up by per-sons who will use them for food."

This treatment program on Possom Kingdom will be the largest of its kind ever attempted, according to the Director. It will involve the use of scores of men and boats and possibly airplanes. They will be equipped for spreading the chemical over the entire lake.

The program has the full sup-port of all the sportmen of the area, many of them offering as-sistance when the event is sche-duled.

They stoutly defend their inalienable right to dispute the decisions of baseball umpires or, for that matter, the officials of any sports contest. We figure the ancient American sport of rodeo is no exception. So here's a list of what cowboy judges base their decisions on in one of rodeo's five standard events.)

Bull Riding

No rodeo event is more dan-gerous to the contestant than bull riding. Perhaps because of this, figuring the bull rider has enough on his mind, the auth-ors of rodeo's rule book gave it the simplest set of rules.

e ors of rodeo's rule book gave it the simplest set of rules.

Everything that needs to be said about the event is summed tup in six short paragraphs totalling 150 words. About all the cowboy has to do is hang on for an eternity of eight seconds.

To help him hang on all he can use is a loose rope without knots or hitches. Held around the heaving, ton-heavy brute simply by the pressure of the rider's grip, the rope must fall off when the ride is over.

Unlike the brone riders, the bull rider isn't required to spur, teither on the first jump out of the chutes or later through the ride. But spurring, if he's able to do any, will earn him extra points. And the dull spurs, tucked into the loose folds of the brahma's hide, help him hold his precarious perch.

Bull rides are marked with the same spread — from 1 to 20 points for the rider and 65 to

But because there is less that can be done to make a good bull ride better, the top scores for the rider are usually lower.

A contestant who sticks to the whistle upright in his seat will usually mark about 10. A score of 14 is unusually good. Mark the rider down if you see him leaning to one side or hunched forward over the brahma's hump.

The only other bull riding rule common with the brone riding events is that the ride must be made with only one hand, the

made with only one hand, the other held free. Otherwise the ride is qualified as long as the

ride is qualified as long as the riding hand is on any part of the bull rope -- and the twister hasn't hit the ground -- when the whistle blows.

As though the bull needed anything to encourage him to buck, the bull rope must have a bell that dangles and clanks

buck, the bull rope must have a bell that dangles and clanks under the brute's belly throughout the ride.

If there are few rules to restrict the riders, there are none to hamper the bulls. Endowed with a permanently murderous attitude toward humans, they resort to anything to dump the cowboy so they can trample or gore him. A favorite trick is to throw the rider forward with a heaving high kick behind, then hook up at him with their huge, banana-shaped horns.

Another lethal type is the spinner, who swaps ends for the eight seconds like a freight car caught in a tornado. Hairraising tactics like these make the ride harder and boost the marking for the bull higher.

In the other riding events you will see the judges posted in the arena a few yards out in front of the chutes, one on each side of the brone. But if you don't see them right away in bull riding, look again.

Lawn Maintenance Aided By Mowing

Constant care and attention are necessary for the maintenance of a beautiful lawn. One of the basic factors involved, says E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, is mowing.

Improper mowing is responsi-ble for the detedioration of many lawns. Mowing too close many lawns. Mowing too close encourages the thinning of the turf and shallow rooting, resulting in lower resistance to drouth, diseases and invasion by weeds. Setting the mower too high results in many of the same problems, says Trew. Excessive soil drying and baking and heat damage to the lawn grass during the summer also result from too close mowing.

The leaves of the lawn grass not only produce the green color, but also manufactures the food required for the entire plant. When too much of the leaves are When too much of the leaves are clipped, the entire plant suffers, points out the specialist. No more than a half-inch of the leaf tip should be removed at any one mowing.

Proper mowing, advises Trew, requires a sharp, well-adjusted lawn mower.
