The time has arrived for anothe chool building project in Dimmitt. Like others, it will be costly because school administrators have learned of the long-range economy of sticking to better, but initially more expensive types of construct

Taxes to pay for this new high school building will be increased proportionately. Not only the new building, but the additional teachers to handle the increased enrollment pushing its construction will be cause for added taxation. At the moment it appears the school system is growing faster than new taxable property is being develop-

Financially, it will be a heavy load. Yet this new proposed \$1 million High School building will make the local school system adequate for only about another five or six years! At the end of that time, it is estimated that all available classrooms will be full and the children of the great number of "war babies" of World War II will begin swamping the system. This is not speculation. It is a mathematical certainty of the future based on the facts of today.

There's not much that can be done about the enrollment. Some relief could come if Mexican Nationals and their families were not allowed to come to this country to live and work. While they are source of cheap labor, they take up the jobs that would ordinarily go to native Americans of Spanish descent and their children, born in Old Mexico, become the responsibility of the School District to educate. ## **County Will Need** 1,250 Cotton Pullers

Castro County citizens Judge Raymond Wilson and Ewing L Mathis will serve as a County Farm Laoor Committee and met with Mr. Billy B. Lynch, Manager of the Texas Employment Commission oflice last week to review the total easonal employment needs developed by the TEC.

The Committee was with the figures of the TEC that Castro County will be short 1250 otton pullers during the peak peiod of the cotton harvest. This hortage will be met by the importation of Mexican National Braero workers.

The Committee will function unier Public Law 78, obtaining facts elevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing in Castro County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by imported Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop.
