PLANS ARE BEING pushed toward completion for the 1964 Baird United Fund campaign. Some of the recently-completed details are printed elsewhere in today's Baird Star.

Special emphasis is being given this year for each Baird resident to consider the donation of a day's pay as a minimum gift to the UF.

On the surface, that will appear to many as unreasonably high. But those who give a closer look will find the amount a relatively small one considering the ground it must cover.

For the middle income wage-earners, the donation of a day's pay to the UF's agencies would average out as only about \$1 per agency. Almost everyone would give that to each of the agencies if they made separate drives.

The United Fund is designed to replace several charity drives with one. But to work effectively, each individual must donate as much as he or she would have to the single campaigns.

THE CALENDAR tells us it's time to begin football, but the temperature is saying otherwise these days.

Our Bears have been picked to finish well down in district standings by some of the pollsters. But, as a former sports-writer, we know that these polls are based heavily on paperwork and take little notice of the intangibles.

The season's outcome is not determined by polls nor by paperwork. The intangibles - hustle, desire, luck - often figure as prominently as do big tackles and swift runners.

Baird has experience and talent in its first unit, with lack of depth ranking as the major drawback. If the team is able to retain the hustle and desire it has shown to date, coupled with some good fortune, the Bears might surprise those pollsters and a few district members.

THIS SEEMS THE proper time to hand a bouquet to the Baird FT and a number of volunteer workers for the new covered walkway recently completed at the elementary school.

City Group Due At RR Hearing

Civic leaders in Baird are making plans to have the town represented later this month at hearings before the Texas Railroad Commission concerning two Texas & Pacific trains.

A group from Baird will attend either a hearing in Fort Worth Sept. 14 or one in Big Spring Sept. 16 before the commission. The hearing concerns a T&P request to discontinue trains 21 and 22 between Fort Worth and El Paso.

The Baird group will contend that elimination of the two scheduled runs would delay mail service to and from the city, and would disrupt passenger service.

Members of the Baird City Council have passed a resolution opposing the change, and officials of the Baird Chamber of Commerce have been working in opposition to the move.

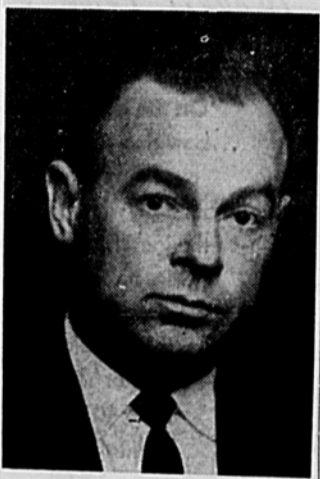
Each day will be a special day for the services, according to the pastor, the Rev. S. H. Salley.

Godfrey to Head Funeral Home

James K. Godfrey, owner of funeral homes at Baird, Albany and Moran, announced Tuesday moving of his headquarters to Baird.

Godfrey will actively operate the funeral home in Baird and will make his home here.

Godfrey assumed management of the funeral home in Baird Thursday. Herman Cupp has taken over as manager of the Albany funeral home.

Cupp, 30, is a former president of the Ranger Rotary Club and a charter member of the Ranger Jaycees. He also served as vice president of the United Fund. He came to Albany from Weatherford where he had been with Galbraith-Pickard Funeral Home the past year.

Godfrey, 37, is an Anson native and a 1948 graduate of Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science. He received his funeral director's license in 1950. He and his wife, the former Alma Ellen Evans of Breckenridge, have three children - Paula, 12; Jay 11, and Lynn, 7.

Godfrey purchased the Albany funeral home from the W. O. Wyles in 1959, and purchased funeral homes in Cisco, Baird and Moran from the same couple in 1963. He later sold the Cisco home.

He is a graduate of Anson High School, and a veteran of navy service. He was connected with funeral homes at Anson, Breckenridge and Dimmitt before buying the Albany home.

SEEK REVENGE OVER MOUNTAINEERS

Bears Tackle Santa Anna

Short on numbers but long on the revenge motive, the Baird Bears will visit Santa Anna Friday night to open the 1964 football campaign for both high schools.

Kick-off time is 8 p. m. at Mountaineer Field, which is on the south side of Santa Anna.

The Mountaineers carved out an 8-6 decision last year, and the Bears still have not forgotten that night.

The 25-member Bear traveling squad will leave about 5 p. m. Friday for the hop to Santa Anna.

A strong turnout of Bear fans is expected to attend the season opener, headed by the Baird High School marching band.

Coach Vernon Townsend has pointed to a veteran quartet of performers as his probable offensive backfield starters against the Mountaineers.

They are Tommy Barton, 145-pound senior with two letters at quarterback, Wally Harris, 135-pound senior two-letterman and Eddie Childers, 152-pound three-letter senior, at the halfbacks; and Richard Windham, 215-pound senior with two letters, at fullback.

Probable starters up front for the Bears are Kelton Jones, 135-pound senior with two letters, and Thomas Robbins, 154-pound

senior one-letterman at ends; Bobby Black, 177, a senior letterman, and Ronnie Price, 162-pound senior, at tackle; 160-pound Bruce Bell, a senior letterman, and 164-pound Jimmy Collins, a senior letterman, at guard; and Stanley McGowen, 173-pound senior letterman, at center.

Probable defensive starters for the Bears are similar, with Steve Stanley replacing Barton and Maxie Gordon taking over for Collins when Santa Anna has the ball.

Stanley, a 173-pound senior letterman, and Gordon, a 157-pound senior letterman, are also expected to get the call often on offense Friday night.

Others expected to make the trip to Santa Anna are Tommy Bearden, J. D. Faircloth and Jimmy Ault, ends; Robert Griggs and Pat McKennon, tackles; Dickie Hass, Bobby Jack Sims and Donald Barron, guards; Lester Hughes, center; and Richie Crow, Bennie Brame and Kenny Townsend, backs.

The Mountaineers are virtually an unknown quantity for Baird, since the team is operating for the first season under a new coach, Rufus Coburn.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Luther C. (Kate) Caldwell of Abilene; two sons, Marlin G. of Abilene and Frank of Route 1 Clyde; a brother, A. T. (Truman) Blalock of Scranton; one sister, Mrs. William Smith of Eula; five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Last Rites Conducted Thursday For Joe Pierce, Former Sheriff

Funeral was held Thursday for Joe E. Pierce, 74, of Abilene, a former Callahan County sheriff. Services were at 2 p. m. in Elliott Funeral Home chapel. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park.

Officiating were the Rev. H. B. Terry, Eastland Bethel Baptist Church pastor, and the Rev. Morgan Thompson, pastor of Elmwood Baptist Church in Abilene.

Mr. Pierce, a resident of Abilene since 1957, died at 8:15 a. m. Wednesday in Williamsburg Geriatric Home there. He moved to Abilene from Big Spring, where he had lived since 1954.

A deputy sheriff before being elected to the top office, he was a Callahan County sheriff from 1949-54. He was a deputy at Cross Plains from 1939-43, served as chief OPA office clerk in Baird for two years, and was deputy sheriff at Baird in 1947-48 before his election.

A native of Eastland County, he was born May 31, 1890. He married Sarah Addie Westerman in 1914 at Cross Plains. They moved to Plainview some 10 years after their marriage, returning to Cross Plains eight years later.

The couple moved to Baird in 1943.

Mr. Pierce was a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge and of

the Baptist church. Survivors include his wife; four sons, Granvel Pierce of Abilene, J. C. and D. W. of Big Spring, and Stanley of Temple; two daughters, Mrs. G. W. Blakeley of San Angelo and Mrs. Ray Galloway of Abilene; one sister, Mrs. W. B. Irvin of Fort Worth, and 11 grandchildren.

Enrollment Hits 421 For Baird

RANCHERS DRAW MOST BENEFIT FROM RAINFALL

A week-end of rains which brought amounts ranging from 1½ to 6 inches of moisture in various sections of Callahan County, left only one area critically dry -- the portion of the county south of State Highway 36, generally from Cross Plains to the Coleman Highway.

"The moisture situation is a whole lot better now than it was a couple of weeks ago," County Agent Pat Garner said this week, after a check over the county.

Stock water remains a problem to ranchers in virtually every corner of the county, since even the areas which received the heaviest week end rains found most of the moisture soaked up instead of running off into ponds.

Very few tanks in this area are full. Baird Lake caught about three feet of water during the rains, a total of more than six feet since mid-August when the long dry spell was first cracked.

Moisture which fell during the last half of August has put the soil in good condition for planting of small grains, Garner said, and appears to have helped the peanut crop "more than we first thought."

It came too late, however, to be of more than minor help to the county's cotton crop. Cattlemen and their pastures

probably benefitted most from the rain, with additional grass likely to grow before frost. It also appears likely that some hay can be harvested now, since the rain brought hay up in many fields.

The Putnam area received rainfall last week end up to six inches while Cross Plains received two to three inches. The Baird-Clyde area, which received some of the heaviest amounts earlier in August, also received about two inches last weekend.

1964 United Fund Campaign Asks One Day's Pay From Each Donor

"A day's pay for a year's work" is the theme for the 1964 Baird United Fund campaign, it was announced Wednesday by Charles Walker, drive chairman.

The theme and the campaign will be slanted toward urging residents of Baird to donate one day's pay to the 1964 drive. The one donation will cover all 14

of the UF agencies.

A goal of \$4,555 has been set for the approaching drive by UF officials. The campaign will begin Oct. 1.

"If every wage-earner in Baird will contribute a minimum of one day's pay to the campaign, we will more than reach our goal," Walker said. He pointed out that the average employee's pay for one day would still mean about only \$1.00 donation per agency for the entire year.

This year's campaign has been broken down into smaller categories than in years past. Chairmen for the various divisions are currently being selected.

Goals of the various divisions include businesses, \$1,250; general, \$500; ranchers, \$600; out-of-town, \$300; clubs and organizations, \$500; business employees, \$400; courthouse employees, \$300; hospital employees, \$75; school employees, \$200; bank employees, \$150; highway department employees, \$80; railroad employees, \$50; city employees, \$100, and co-op employees, \$50.

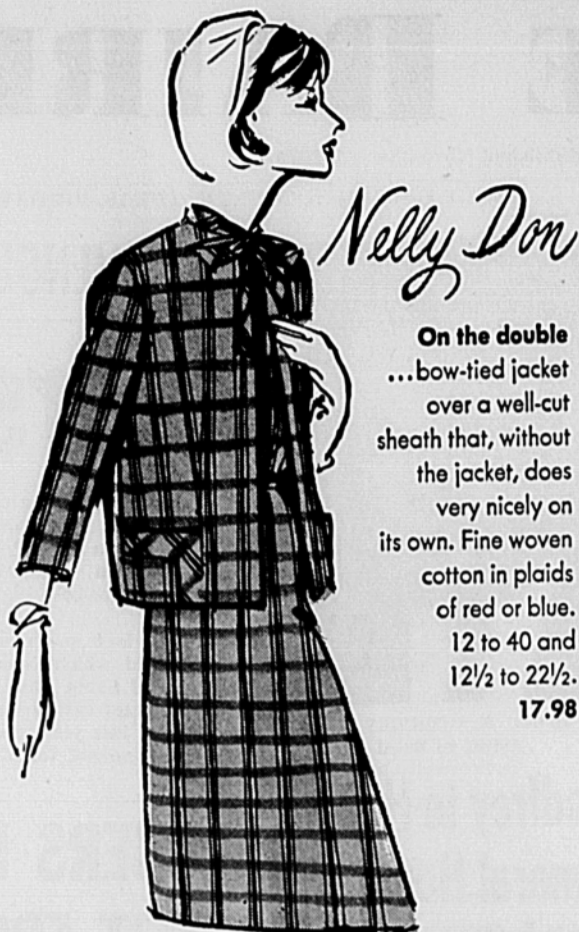

You are hereby notified that a Complaint in condemnation has heretofore been filed in the office of the Clerk of the above-named Court in an action to condemn the following estates for public uses, to adequately provide for the establishment of additional facilities for the use of the Department of the Air Force, and for other military uses incident thereto in connection with Dyess Air Force Base, Taylor County, Texas, and for such other uses as may be authorized by Congress or by Executive Order, which estates consist of the following rights in and to the land described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto:

A perpetual and assignable easement for the establishment, maintenance, operation and use for a restricted area in, on, across and over Tract No. S-11-107E, consisting of the right to prohibit human habitation; the right to remove buildings presently or hereafter being used for human habitation; the right to prohibit entry on said tract except by the owners, their employees, agents and lessees; the right to limit the use of said land to agricultural and grazing purposes; the right to prohibit the use of firearms and explosives; the right to limit the use of explosives in operations for the exploration, production and removal of oil, gas and other minerals to the use of explosive bullets or shaped charges in gun perforation or similar techniques, provided that (a) such perforation operations are conducted at depths at least 750 feet below the surface of the ground; (b) all safety measures normally observed by prudent and experienced operators are carried out; and (c) timely advance notice is given and acknowledged by the using agency; the right to prohibit all pits, exposed pipelines, heater-separators, storage tanks, transfer points and like or similar facilities within the easement area, except that slush pits and water storage tanks are permitted; the right to prohibit drilling or production of wells within 350 feet of the center of the silo site; such prohibitions to remain in effect as long as the easement estate remains in effect; furthermore, any proposed mining activity within the limits of said tract whether tunnel or open pit type must have approval of the Air Force Officer in charge; the right to post signs on said tract indicating the nature and extent of the Government's control in such manner as not to interfere with agricultural, grazing and mining operations; and the right of ingress and egress over and across said land for the purpose of exercising the rights set forth herein; subject, however, to existing easements for public roads and highways, public utilities, railroads and pipelines; provided that if and when the United States of America and its assigns cease to use said tract for a period of one year, then and in that event, all interests hereby acquired shall terminate.

A failure so to serve an answer shall constitute a consent to the taking and to the authority of the Court to proceed to hear the action and to fix the just compensation and shall constitute a waiver of all defenses and objections not so presented.

You are further notified that if you have no objection or defense to the taking you may serve upon plaintiff's attorney a notice of appearance designating the property in which you claim to be interested and stating the nature and extent of the interest claimed, and thereafter you shall receive notice of all proceedings affecting the said property.

You are further notified that at the trial of the issue of just compensation, whether or not you have answered or served a notice of appearance, you may present evidence as to the amount of the compensation to be paid for the property in which you have any interest and you may share in the distribution of the award of compensation.

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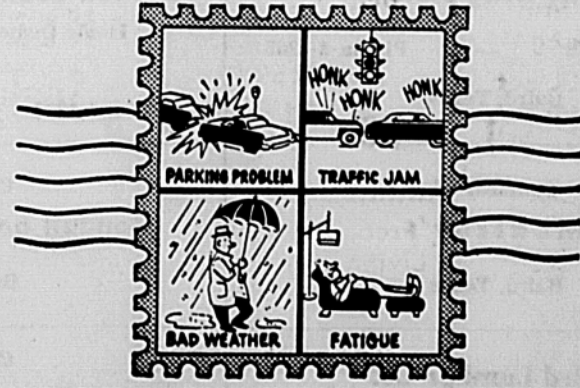

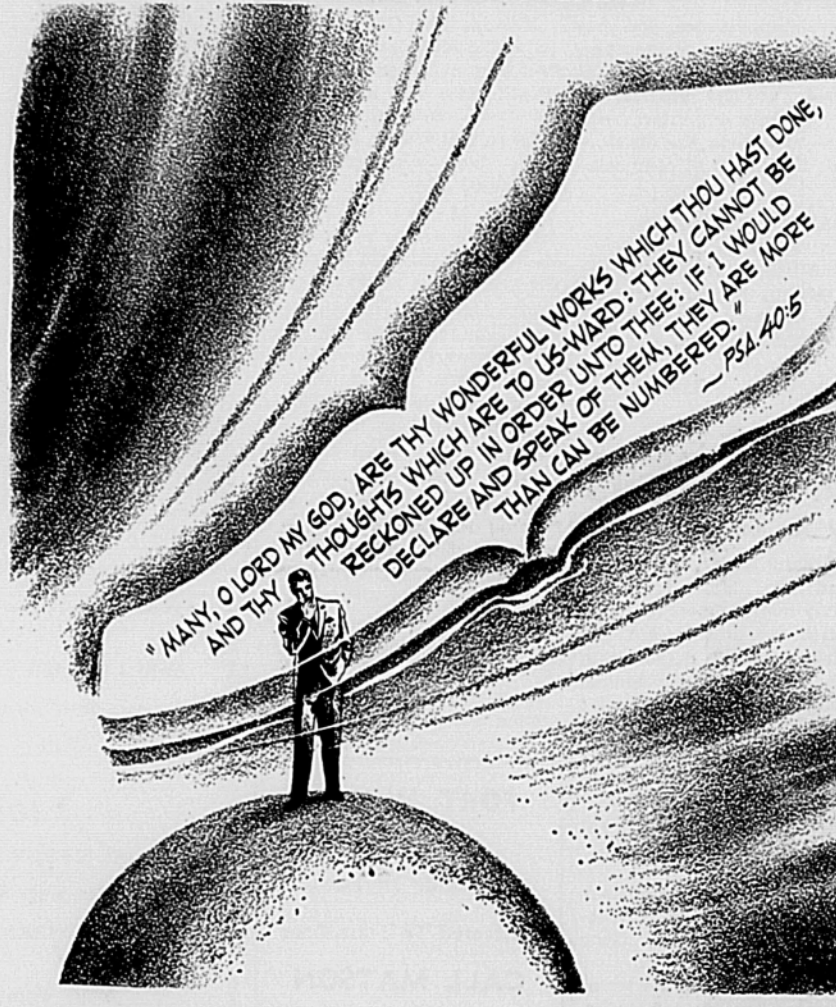

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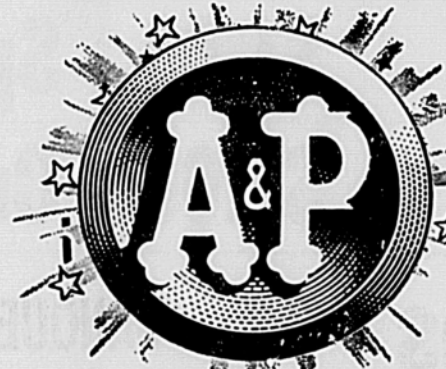
