#### THIS TASTES GOOD IN TEXAS

##### Recipe of the Week Apple Crisp

- 1 quart sliced apples
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon lemon rind
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Arrange apples in shallow, greased casserole (8 to 9 in.). Sprinkle with spice; add water and lemon rind. Work together sugar, flour, salt, and butter until crumbly. Spread over the apples. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 to 40 minutes until the apples are tender and top is nicely browned. Serve warm - plain or with cream. Serves 6.

##### TIMELY TIPS

- 1. Apples are plentiful now -

eat apples for health - they furnish minerals, roughage, vitamins, especially Vitamin C which prevent scurvy and helps maintain good condition of teeth and gums.

2. When the first nother begins blowing, try adding apples to muffins or griddle cakes. Place a slice of apple on top of the batter, after pouring it into the muffin cups. Sprinkle with a pinch of sugar and cinnamon. Two cups of well chopped apples added to the griddle cake batter and baked in the customary fashion should produce delightful results.

3. Economical apples also may form the basic ingredient of equally economical salad dishes.

4. Most apple combinations, in addition to being tasty, are economical. Try apples and sweet potatoes, or apples and cabbage, or fried apples with onions or carrots.

##### VENISON SAUSAGE

Venison's good. But have you tried venison sausage?

Deer hunters throughout the state are bringing down their bucks every day. And this means that the sportsmen not only get to stalk their deer in the field and spend a week in the open, but that venison will bring a little variation to the meat menu of many homes.

If the deer is properly cared for in the field, it will help fill the frozen food locker and build up the meat supply, says Roy W. Snyder, extension meats specialist of Texas A&M College. The rounds and loins make fine, tasty steaks, the shoulders can be used for ideal roasts, but other cuts of the deer carcass will make fine sausage.

To get the most out of the carcass, take the neck, the lower cut of ribs and there you have some fine meat for sausage. Use two parts of deer meat to one part of fresh pork fat. If three parts of deer meat are used, you get little drier sausage. For 50 pounds of meat season with 14 ounces of salt and three ounces of black pepper. And one and a half ounces of sage will give it that tangy flavor.

Snyder suggests seasoning the coarse cuts of meat before grinding it fine in a sausage mill. This way, the seasoning is ground into the meat. It you're planning to keep the sausage a while, stuff the product into a casing or a bag of muslin cloth. And it may also be smoked if that flavor is desired, says Snyder.

Sounds like a mighty tasty breakfast for a cold winter morning.

Agent's Column

FEEDING

Several people have asked the agent about balanced rations for hogs lately so it was decided to write a few lines on hog feeding. Whether you are feeding bred sows or gilts or market hogs the main principle is to feed a balanced ration.

Irritable condition of the gilt at farrowing time; frequent trouble in giving birth to the pigs; a tendency to develop the pig eating habit; and inability to secrete a good supply of milk for the pigs after birth. Some pigs were farrowed in Callahan county last spring that did not even have the ears developed.

A brood sow can use one and one-half gallons of skim milk per day. Where this much milk is fed, no other protein feed is necessary.

A good mineral mixture should be available for pigs at all times. It is usually a safe policy to also include one pound of the mineral mixture in each 100 lbs. of ground mixed feed that is fed to brood sows or other hogs.

Vitamins-green pasture, together with farm grains, and a protein feed and minerals should grow healthy hogs. Hogs need a certain amount of vitamin D. This is the sunshine vitamin.

**Texas 4-H'ers Win Special Recognition**

Edwin Hanz, Jr., 21, of New Braunfels received the State winner's award for outstanding achievement in the 1948 National 4-H Soil Conservation awards program. Edwin put into practice such soil saving and building operations as constructing terraces, contouring, using phosphate and fertilizer, making draining ditches, building dams and rotating crops. During three years of club work he has completed 18 projects and has served as assistant leader and president of his local club. In recognition of his achievements, Edwin has been given a \$50.00 U. S. Savings Bond, provided by Firestone.  
Promoting recreational and handicraft work has brought State recognition to Gene Massey, Jr., 16, of Moore. His record will be judged to determine the eight national winners in the 1948 National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program. Objectives of the program are to assist 4-H members in de-

veloping cultural and recreational opportunities in their homes and communities; help 4-H members develop a higher appreciation of rural arts; make 4-H programs more attractive and self-satisfy-ing and teach members to lead recreational activities. Each of the counties having an outstanding recreational program received a \$25.00 cash award, provided by United States Rubber Company.

Pre-planning a part of any meal is a wise precaution when you're busy. Banana Cream Torte is an interesting dessert and can be prepared the day before to save time at the regular meal-hour rush. Combine 2 1/2 graham crackers (2 cups) rolled fine with 1/2 cup softened butter or margarine and 2 tsp. sugar. Blend well. Press 1/3 of crumb mixture firmly against sides and bottom of well-buttered pan. For the filling prepare 2 pkgs. prepared vanilla pudding with 4 cups milk following directions on package. Cool and pour into crumb-lined pan. Slice 2 bananas over top of pudding. Beat 3 egg whites stiff but not dry, adding 6 tsp. sugar gradually. Spread meringue over bananas. Sprinkle remaining 1/3 crumb mixture on top. Bake in gas oven (350°) for 20 mins. Chill overnight before removing from pan. Serves 6 to 8.

In most Japanese homes, a small stove under the tub heats water for bathing. In this country, an automatic gas water heater holds the hot water to the necessary 105° for a refreshing hot bath.

When broiling grapefruit halves top them with apricot jam, spiced sugar, or Brazil nuts and brown sugar. Add dots of butter before putting them about three inches under medium flame.
