BIG INCREASE SHOWN

Credit Union Assets Top \$900,000 Mark

Growth in total assets amounting to 55.7 per cent during the past year was announced this week by the Friona, Texas, Federal Credit Union.

Total assets at the local financial institution amounted to \$907,528.99 as of December 31, 1972. This was an astounding increase of \$324,837.32 over the total assets figure of \$582,691.67 recorded on the same date a year earlier, or a 55.7 per cent increase.

"We have set a goal of reaching a million dollars in assets by March 1, 1973," stated Geneva Williams, Credit Union treasurer, this week.

Other figures released by Mrs. Williams revealed that shares (savings deposits) at the Credit Union grew from \$461,349.81 on December 31, 1971, to \$697,679.59 this past December 31—a healthy increase of \$236,329.78, or 51.3 per cent.

The amount of money on loan as of December 31, 1972 amounted to \$827,470.44. This compared favorably to the figure of \$554,075.53 a year earlier, making a net increase of \$273,394.91 for the year.

ENJOYS GROWTH

"The Credit Union has enjoyed a healthy growth during the past year. We feel that there is a definite trend toward using the Credit Union, not only by Friona residents, but throughout Parmer County," Mrs. Williams stated.

Other figures supplied by the Credit Union treasurer indicated that the organization made 1320 loans during 1972, compared to 900 in 1971.

Total loans made during 1972 amounted to \$1,059,240.43. This represented over one-fifth of the total amount that the Credit Union has loaned out in its history—\$5,021,498.04.

The Credit Union had a total of 1521 accounts at the end of 1972, compared to 1189 at the end of the previous year.

The local financial institution recently paid out a total of \$15,644.03 to its members in dividends, compared to \$10,858.09 for the same six-month period of 1971.

NEW OFFICE
The Credit Union did not pay

an interest refund this year, due to expenses incurred in moving to its newly remodelled location at Sixth and Euclid Streets.

"But we were able to accomplish the move, purchase many items of new furniture, plus some new office machines. And we still were able to pay 5 1/4 per cent dividends to our shareholders," Mrs. Williams said.

This healthy report came on the heels of the all-time record report published last week by Friona State Bank, which points up the excellent financial condition of the Friona area.

MIDDLETON LEAVES

Ag Teacher Resigns, Replacement Named

At its regular meeting for January last Monday, the Friona School Board accepted the resignation of Bob Middleton, vocational agriculture instructor here for the past several years. Middleton has accepted a position with Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo beginning next Monday.

At the same time, the board approved the employment of Levon Harmon of Happy to replace Middleton. Harmon is a December graduate of Texas Tech University, and did his student teaching in Tulia.

Harmon is single, and was a Lone Star Farmer during his high school career. He will

assume his duties at Friona High School beginning next Monday.

Mrs. Bob Middleton, who was secretary to Junior High principal Tom Jarboe, has been replaced by Mrs. Eric Rushing, Jr.

The tax report showed that a total of \$167,338.99 was collected during December. The amount collected as of December 31 was up two per cent from the previous year.

The board called a trustee election for April 7, to coincide with the annual City Council election. Terms of three board members expire in 1973. They belong to John Blackburn, Floyd Schueler and Doyle Elliott.

Sales And Earnings Set Record At MBP

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. reported fourth quarter net income for the period ending October 28, 1972, of \$1,330,398, or \$1.16 per share on sales of \$116,920,295. This compares with net income of \$657,966, or \$0.58 per share on sales of \$93,942,557 for the comparable period a year ago.

"The 102 per cent increase in net income and the 24 per cent increase in net sales were a result of an ample supply of fat cattle, favorable operating margins and operation of all divisions at efficient operating levels," states Dave LaFleur, MBP president.

For the fiscal year ended October 28, 1972, net income was \$2,359,440, or \$2.06 per share, compared with \$1,933,404, or \$1.69 per share in 1971. Net sales were \$395,661,688 compared to \$303,997,615 for last year.

LaFleur stated that the 22 per cent increase in net income and the 30 per cent increase in net sales for fiscal 1972 were achieved notwithstanding a five-month labor strike at the Friona Division.

Sales and earnings were the highest in the company's history. Also, during 1972 the company negotiated a \$12 million long-term secured loan with John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company to replace an existing \$8 million five-year term loan and to reduce short-term borrowings.

LaFleur stated the shift in the cattle feeding industry from

the Midwest to the South and Southwest and in particular to the Texas Panhandle was more dramatic in 1972 than anticipated and was of benefit to the company. In 1966, the Texas Panhandle fed out 1.2 million cattle. This increased to over 4 million in 1972.

Texas is now the largest cattle feeding state in the nation with 2.2 million cattle on feed (United States Department of Agriculture, "Cattle on Feed Report," December 1, 1972) compared to the second and third largest cattle feeding states, Iowa and Nebraska, having 1.7 and 1.6 million cattle on feed respectively. Over two-thirds of Missouri Beef Packers' operations are located in the Texas Panhandle.

LaFleur added that the new beef slaughtering and processing plant under construction near Boise, Idaho should become operational in the latter half of 1973 and that sales and earnings should continue to grow in 1973.

In December, 1972, it was announced that the company and Iowa Beef Processors, Inc. were considering the possibilities of combining the two companies. LaFleur reiterated that no agreement has been reached and that in the event that one is negotiated, many practical and legal problems would have to be resolved. An independent study recommended as a possible exchange ratio one share of Missouri Beef stock for two-thirds of a share of Iowa Beef stock.

Sunshine Puts End To Record Freeze

After a record-setting six consecutive days and nights (over 150 hours) when the temperature never made it above the freezing mark, the Friona area began to recover from winter's icy grip this week, with temperatures reaching into the 60s early in the week.

For the first time in a week, the mercury climbed above the 32-degree mark last Friday, and made it on up to 41 for the day's high. The mercury had climbed to 30 on Thursday, which dawned clear for the first time this year, or so it seemed.

Much melting was accomplished on Thursday and Friday, and by the time a clear weekend was over, the snow, which still measured four inches on the ground last Thursday morning, was about all gone except on the north side of buildings and in shady places.

The mercury reached a low point of three degrees last Thursday morning, but residents were basking in 63-degree weather on Tuesday of this week.

Farmers who still have cotton and sugar beets in the field are hoping for a continuing break from the elements, in hopes that they may terminate the 1972 crop, and get their land prepared for the 1973 crops.

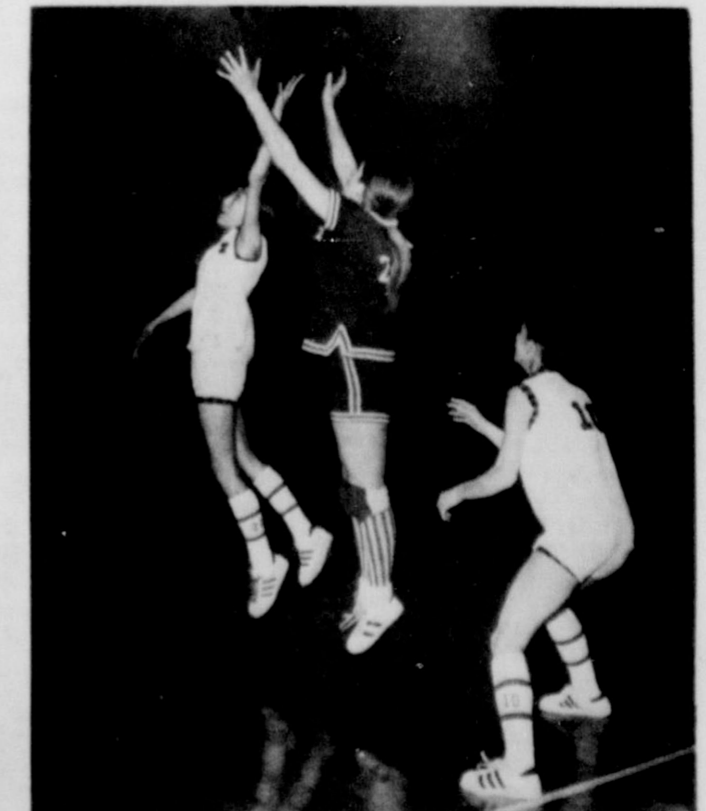
Holdover directors include Ray Landrum, president, Bill Teel, vice president, and board members Charles Scales and Jerry Brown.

Doug Norwood made the final basket with 20 seconds left to give Friona the win. The longest lead either team had was seven points. Dimmitt held this once 17-10 with 2:34 left in the first half and Friona held it twice 33-26 with 7:35 left in the game and 40-33 with 4:20 left in the game.

Friday afternoon Friona met Borger and was defeated 44-39. Friona took the lead in this game and kept it until Borger went ahead 15-14 with 4:36 left in the first half. Friona tied it up four times in the last half and went ahead 36-34 with 5:17 left in the game. Borger came back to take the lead 38-37 with 4:22 left and went on to win by 44-39.

Friona had to play again Friday night because of the number of teams entered and were defeated 50-28 by Olton. The game was much closer than

the final score as the longest lead either team had was seven points until the last six minutes when Olton hit a hot streak scoring 20 points, while Friona could manage only two. Friona led in the game until Olton tied it up 22-22 with 1:26 left in the first half.

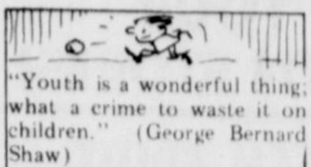

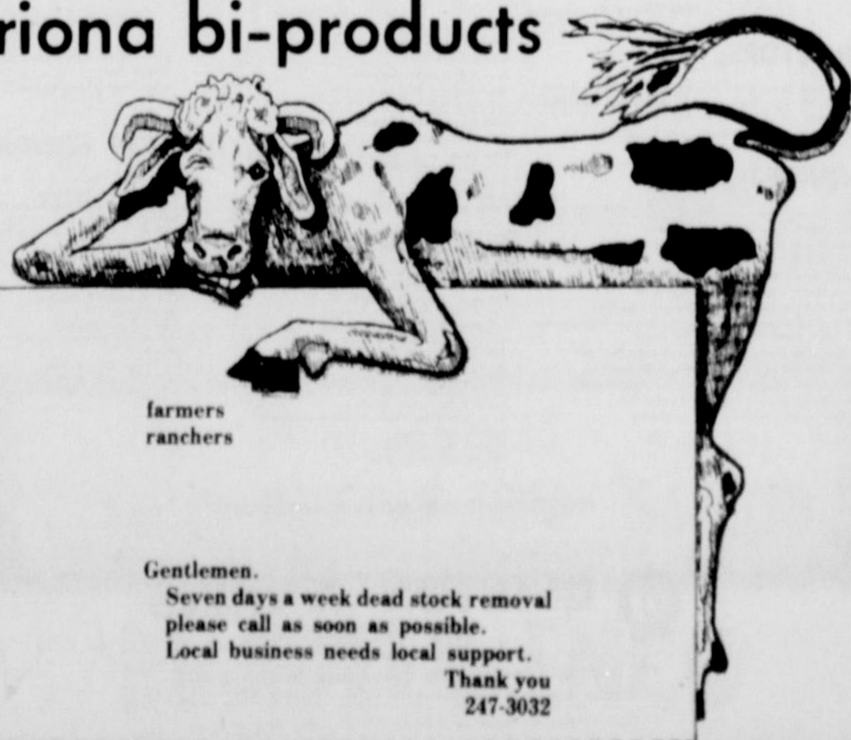

TWO OVERTIMES

Super Chiefs Nudge Rival Dimmitt 66-62

Pandemonium reigned at the Friona High School Gymnasium at about 9:30 last Friday evening.

Ray DeBord's Chiefs again just defeated the Dimmitt Bobcats in a double-overtime thriller in the District 3-AA opener for both teams.

The final score was 66-62, with Friona winning with one of the top come-from-behind efforts seen in the local gym in ages.

The manner in which they won the game was perhaps secondary to the fact that at least three of the players had missed workouts due to influenza during the week. But all three played the game, and their never-say-die attitude paid off with the top victory for the Chiefs in some time.

The win was the first for the Chiefs over Dimmitt in

eight years. The last Friona victory over the Bobcats was by the 1964-65 district champions, 51-48 on the local court. Dimmitt downed the Chiefs that year on the Bobcats' home court.

STAGE RALLY

Friona had to rally from a ten-point deficit in the second half, and still trailed by six, 54-48, with only 1:35 to play in regulation time. But fans and players had a lot of basketball left in addition to the 1:35 which showed on the clock at that time.

Johnny Bandy canned a pair of free shots with 1:21 left to cut the Dimmitt lead to 54-50, and with 47 seconds left Dale Cleveland sank a pair after stealing the ball, to bring the Chiefs in to within two points at 54-52, and it became

apparent that the Chiefs "just might pull it out."

Dimmitt missed a chance to ice the game with 32 seconds left, missing a free shot, and Kevin Wiseman came up with the ball after the 'Cats first controlled the rebound.

BANDY SHOT TIES

Friona called time and worked the ball in with 25 seconds left. Bandy took a turning jump shot from about 15 feet out with seven seconds showing. The shot hit the backboard and banked into the basket to tie the ball game at 54-54. Dimmitt could not work the ball down in time, and the game went into overtime.

The first three-minute overtime was slow, compared to the action that preceded and followed it. Dimmitt scored first, with only 33 seconds gone,

for a 56-54 lead.

Willie Bailey missed a one-and-one with 2 minutes left, but Bandy's jumper from the corner tied the score again with 1:23 on the clock. Bailey again missed a free throw with 54 seconds left.

Friona had a chance to win the game in the first OT, getting control with 17 seconds left. However, the team had difficulty setting up the shot they wanted, and the buzzer sounded before the Chiefs could get off a shot.

Dale Cleveland's tip-in gave Friona a 58-56 lead 38 seconds into the second overtime, and the Chiefs would not be headed after this.

HITS SIX OF SIX

Bandy hit on six consecutive free shots, giving Friona 60-57, 62-59 and 64-59 leads. His last two shots, with 48 seconds showing, all but wrapped things up for the Chiefs, but Bailey added the clincher with a pair of charity tosses with only eight seconds left, making it 66-60, and the Bobcats' final driving layup was to no avail.

Friona had played flawless in the first quarter, taking an early lead of 8-2, and leading by three, 17-14 at the buzzer. Dimmitt stormed back, going ahead by seven, 28-21, while Bandy was resting on the bench. Johnny received his third foul before the first quarter ended, and spent the major part of the second quarter on the bench.

The Chiefs rallied on the shooting of Gene Strickland and Cleveland to trail by only one at the half, 30-29.

Friona started the third quarter cold, getting only two points in over four minutes of clock time, and the visiting Bobcats stormed back to a commanding 41-31 lead with 4:10 left in the period.

Two baskets by James Bartlett on long passes against the full-court press, and a pair of jump shots inside the circle by Strickland pulled the Chiefs back in the game at 46-43 as the

quarter ended.

HIT COLD SPELL

Once again the Chiefs started cold, as the team failed to take advantage of Dimmitt losing its 6-3 post forward, Kenneth Ringo, on fouls only 1:20 into the last quarter.

Dimmitt again opened up an eight-point lead (52-44), and it took Bandy's shot from the corner (Friona's first field goal of the quarter) with 3:32 on the clock, and a pair of timely free shots by Strickland with 2:53 remaining, to keep the Chiefs in the ball game at 48-52.

This set the stage for the late-game heroics by Bandy, who in spite of being slowed by the early-week illness and playing most of the game with three fouls and sitting out almost the entire second quarter—came up with his top point-production of the season with a total of 30.

In a departure from the usual, the Chiefs won the game at the free throw line, hitting 17 of 24 charity tosses. Dimmitt outscored the local team from the field, 54-46.

Friona hit 48 per cent from the field (23 of 48) and 69 per cent from the line (20 of 29). Dimmitt had 55 per cent from the field (27 of 49) and 37 per cent from the line (6 of 16).

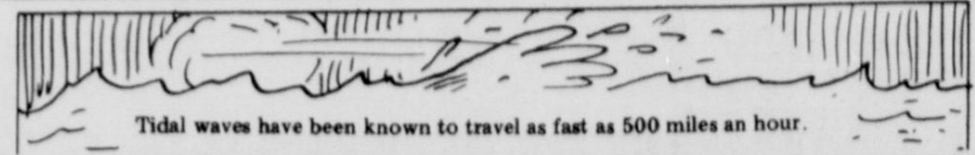
Friona had four men in double-figure scoring. Behind Bandy's 30 points came Strickland with 13, Bartlett with 10, and Cleveland with 10.

Coach DeBord lauded the effort put out by the players, especially those who had been ill. "I believe this will give them a shot in the arm," he said.

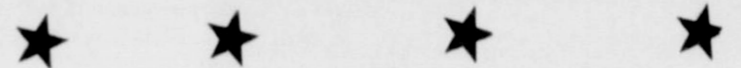

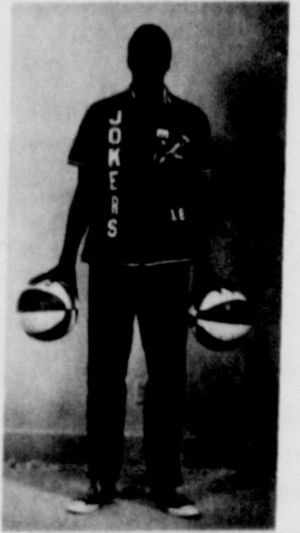

Lubbock Christian High Bops Friona 75-52 For 14th Win

Avananche-Journal Sports Staff Friona suffered a 32-minute cold spell Tuesday night and Lubbock Christian High School routed the Chiefs 75-52 in schoolboy basketball action.

The Eagles, now 14-8 overall, used the talented floor play of senior Dale Mansell to ignite their breeze. Mansell scored 23 points, with most of his 10 floor shots coming from the 22-27-foot range.

LCHS shot with amazing accuracy most of the contest, finishing with 58 per cent from the floor.

The Eagles held a 10-6 first-quarter lead and the AA visitors could sense trouble from that point. They scored only two points in the period, until going on a hot streak in the last half-minute.

The Eagles blew the game open in the second period, shooting to a 12-point halftime bulge. Paul hit 12 points in the period, scoring six in the final minute. The Chiefs committed 13 turnovers in the first half, completely losing any chance for an upset.

Friona's troubles continued in the second half, as it could score only four points in the first half of the stanza, as the Eagles zoomed to a 45-23 lead. Early in the quarter, a Friona technical and intentional foul gave the Eagles three quick points and a 37-19 advantage.

Bartlett hit a jumper at 5:37 of the final quarter to pull Friona within 15 at 56-41, but

Teddy Paden scored twice from the charity stripe, Mansell hit a 25-footer and Johnson a tip-in to up the margin to 20 at 4:24 before subs from both sides flooded the floor.

Friona managed to win the battle from the foul line, connecting on 14 of 18. LCHS clicked on 21 of 31, getting many second chances when eager Friona rebounders stepped into the lane too quickly.

Friona scored a 51-39 victory in the JV game, with Bobby Lewellen hitting 15 points. Rex Paine notched 12 for LCHS.

Romping to the second-highest score ever registered by a girls basketball team at Friona, the Squaws were in complete control of the game by the end of the first quarter, and Coach F.G. Crofford could have practically have named his score in the game.

The Squaws won their second District 3-AA game of the season Tuesday night at Olton, 64-37.

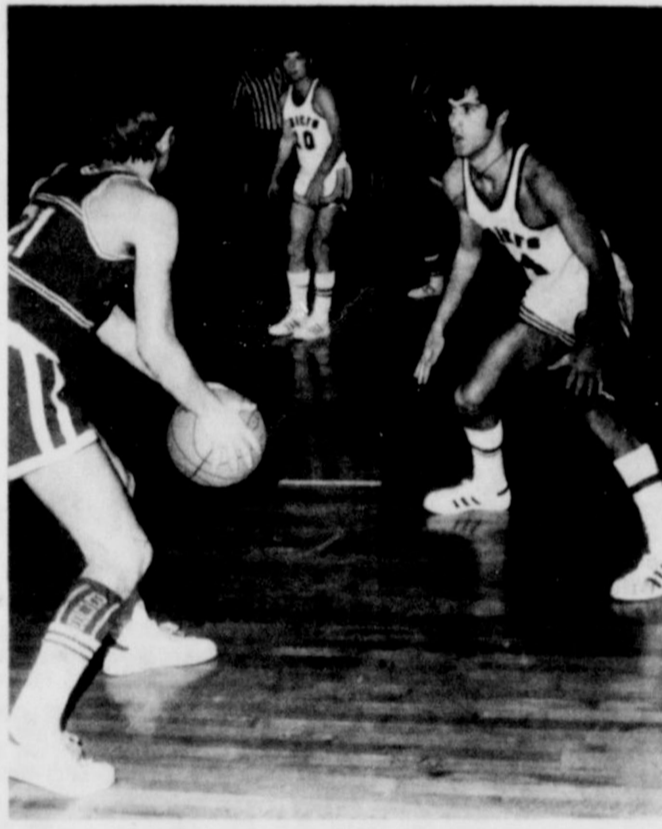

New Soil Discovery Labeled "Friona Loam"

FRIONA LOAM. This is the name of a new soil found during the soil survey of Parmer County, says Herb Evans, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

Herb Bruns, Soil Scientist, who mapped Parmer County, was the first to discover this soil. He couldn't make it fit into any soil series classified at that time.

So Bruns carefully described the soil, took samples, and

determined its extent. The information was sent to SCS soil correlators. After thorough study of the data, the new soil was approved by the Washington Office.

The Friona soil series has taken its place in the nationwide system of soil classification. Hereafter, any soil found in the country that fits the Friona series classification will be given this name. There are about 10,000 different soil series in the United States.

Soils are named for a local community, town, city, school or other landmark.

The Friona soil is a brown, loamy, friable soil that has hard white caliche at about the 30 inch depths. It is similar to the Amarillo and Arvana soils.

Other soils correlated in the Parmer County survey are Estacado, Olton, Posey, Pullman, Randall, and Zita.

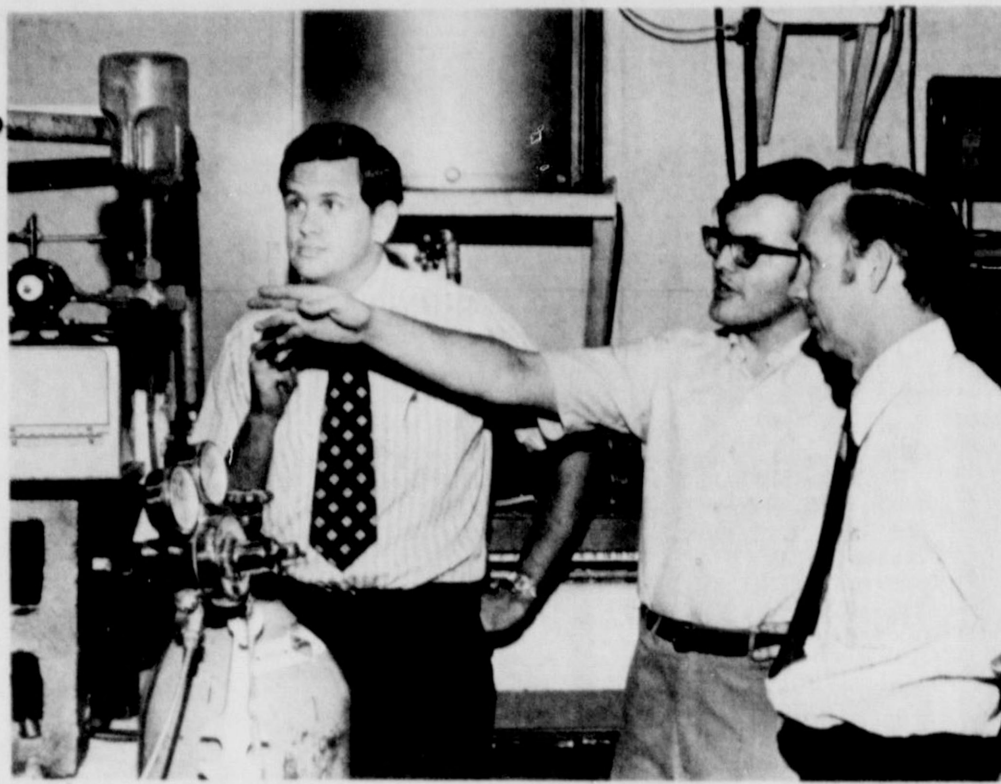

America's farmers feed not only cattle, hogs, and poultry, but everything else that flies, swims, runs, or crawls on farm and ranchlands—an estimated 80 percent of the nation's wildlife.

The Soil Conservation Service figures show that farmer encouragement of wildlife is on the increase.

Farmers, ranchers and other landowners have improved more than 7½ million acres of land and water areas for the benefit of wildlife—a 28 percent increase over last year.

Further, SCS reports, more than half a million acres of other rural land was converted from crop or rangeland into wildlife and recreation areas during 1972.

SCS helps landowners improve food, water, and cover for wildlife. Improved habitat increases wildlife populations even faster than stocking. The 7½ million acres of habitat improvement is only a small part of the American farmer's aid to wildlife. Widespread farm and ranch conservation practices, such as stripcropping (alternating banks of crops and grass), building ponds, protecting woodland areas, planting windbreaks and improving rangeland also attract many wild creatures.

These and many more conservation practices indicate

At Home In Parmer County Jana Pronger



First article in a three-part series on small electrical appliances:

Save those papers! I am referring to important "papers" in the box with a small electrical appliance.

You should read every word before using the appliance. Read and heed registration cards first. Complete them and mail to the manufacturer. These cards let him know where the appliance was purchased and where the product is in case a safety defect makes it necessary for him to notify the owner. Sending the registration card also may speed servicing.

Guarantee or warranty papers are second on the reading list, and they mean about the same thing. Learn what they promise in writing on product performance, such as "guaranteed not to tarnish" or "guaranteed to be free of defects in material or workmanship." Some promise specific action, such as repair, refund or replacement if the product fails to meet standards of quality or performance stated in the guarantee.

Read until you find the following six points:

- [1.] What it guarantees. It should list parts covered.
- [2.] How long it is guaranteed. The entire appliance or different parts may be guaranteed for different time lengths.
- [3.] Manufacturer or seller promises. If product is defective, they may furnish parts and labor or parts only, and they may replace the entire product or refund purchase price.
- [4.] Steps owner must take to receive benefits the guarantee promises.
- [5.] Limitations or conditions of the guarantee. It may tell the owner to complete and mail the registration card.

Synanon Representatives Seek Texas Beef, Chance To Assist

Four former drug abusers will be in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico from now through February 20 contacting cattlemen to procure the beef necessary to feed young men and women who live in Synanon, the drug rehabilitation center which has grown in fourteen years from a small group of addicts to a unified community with centers in five California cities and in Michigan.

The four are Roy Gewart, Les Hart, Arlene Heede, and Don Thornton.

Roy Gewart used heroin and

other drugs for 15 years, served time in many state and federal institutions, and was considered incurable when he arrived at Synanon's door five years ago.

Roy is an example of what can happen at Synanon for those declared "incurable"—he has remained free of drugs for five years now, and is a role model for newer residents of Synanon. Roy, 36, is now married and he and his wife live in Synanon's ranch community near Tomales Bay in Northern California.

PIONEERS SELF-HELP

Synanon is responsible for the pioneering and development of the self-help concept of drug addict rehabilitation, an approach that is now widely accepted as being, by far, the most effective.

In late 1971, Synanon turned its energies toward the lost generation—America's teenagers, mostly teenagers, juvenile delinquents, some Vietnam war veterans.

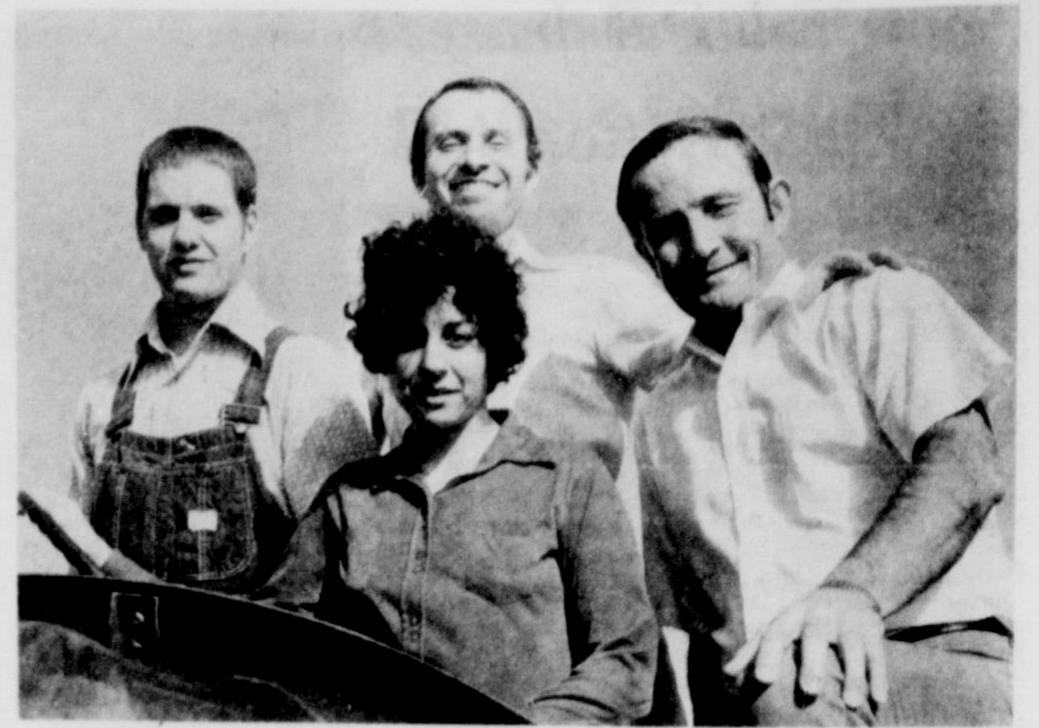
One of the facilities Synanon operates is a factory building encompassing one square city block in San Francisco, a gift from N L Industries (Dutch Boy Paints). This additional space will enable another group of addicts to enter Synanon this year.

ACQUIRE RANCHES

Another unprecedented change has taken place at Synanon, allowing it to accept more new residents. Two full-scale ranches have been acquired in California. These young people are developing character, getting in top physical and mental condition in the clean country air, and gaining their self-respect in Synanon's drug-free, alcohol-free, crime-free, violence-free and tobacco-free community.


Roy Gewart, Les Hart, Arlene Heede and Don Thornton have three purposes in their current Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico trip: to thank the cattle industry for the tremendous support it has given Synanon in the past, to impact the need for continued support of Synanon in its efforts to reshape the lives of the many additional troubled individuals who are seeking help, and to provide information to anyone who may wish Synanon's help in solving their own problems of drug addiction, alcoholism, alienation, or other character disorder.

It takes 400 head of cattle a year to feed the Synanon population, and organizations like the National Livestock Feeders' Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Arizona and California Cattle Feeders, and Iowa Livestock Feeders Association and Iowa Beef Producers Association have given Synanon their full support.

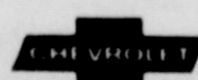

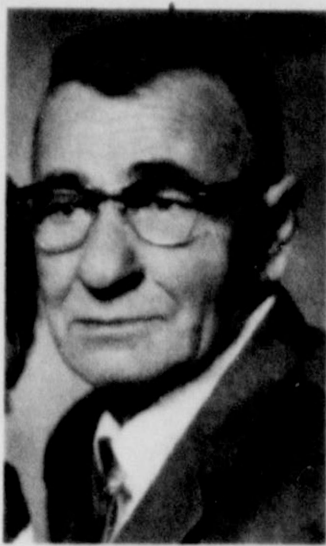
Burial was in Friona Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

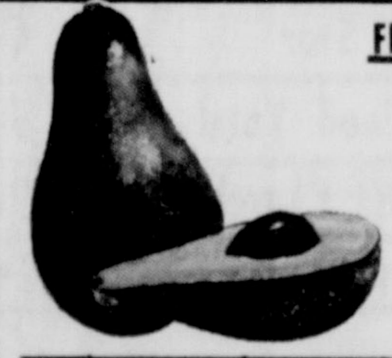
