"We have set a goal of reaching a million dollars in assets by March 1, 1973," stated Geneva Williams, Credit Union treasurer, this week.

Other figures released by Mrs. Williams revealed that shares (savings deposits) at the Credit Union grew from \$461,349.81 on December 31, 1971, to \$697,679.59 this past December 31-a healthy increase of \$236,329.78, or 51.3 per cent.

The amount of money on loan as of December 31, 1972 amounted to \$827,470.44. This compared favorably to the figure of \$554,075.53 a year earlier, making a net increase of \$273,394.91 for the year.

ENJOYS GROWTH

"The Credit Union has enjoyed a healthy growth during the past year. We feel that there is a definite trend toward using the Credit Union, not only by Friona residents. but throughout Parmer Co-

unty," Mrs. Williams stated. Other figures supplied by the Credit Union treasurer indicated that the organization made 1320 loans during 1972, compared to 900 in 1971.

Growth in total assets Total loans made during 1972 an interest refund this year, its history-\$5,021,498.04.

The Credit Union had a total financial institution amounted of 1521 accounts at the end of 1972, compared to 1189 at the end of the previous year.

America's farmers feed not only cattle, hogs, and poultry,

encouragement of wildlife is on the increase.

Farmers, ranchers and other landowners have improved more than 71/2 million acres of land and water areas for the benefit of wildlife-a 28 percent increase over last year.

Further, SCS reports, more than half a million acres of other rural land was converted from crop or rangeland into wildlife and recreation areas during 1972.

SCS helps landowners improve food, water, and cover for wildlife. Improved habitat increases wildlife populations even faster than stocking. The 71/2 million acres of habitat improvement is only a small part of the American farmer's aid to wildlife. Widespread farm and ranch conservation practices, such as stripcropping alternating banks of crops and grass), building ponds, protecting woodland areas, planting windbreaks and improving rangeland also attract many wild creatures.

Synanon Representatives Seek Texas Beef, Chance To Assist

Four former drug abusers other drugs for 15 years, will be in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico from now through February 20 contacting cattlemen to procure the beef necessary to feed young men and women who live in Synanon, the drug rehabilitation center which has grown in fourteen years from a small group of addicts to a unified community with centers in five California cities and in Michigan.

The four are Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede, and Roy Gewant used heroin and

served time in many state and federal institutions, and was considered incurable when he arrived at Synanon's door five Roy is an example of what

can happen at Synanon for those declared "incurable"-he has remained free of drugs for five years now, and is a role model for newer residents of Synanon. Roy, 36, is now married and he and his wife live in Synanon's ranch community near Tomales Bay in Northern

TEXAS BOY

Les Hart is from Gruver, where his father, Don Hart, operates feedlots. In 1971, two Synanon representatives were in the Gruver area, contacting local cattle feeders.

Don asked them to talk to his son, Les, who was using pills and psychedelics and had found other "cure" tries totally unsuccessful. The Synanon representatives talked to Les. and four days later he came to Synanon where he has been successfully rebuilding his life for almost two years.

Arlene Heede, 25, began smoking marijuana in college, then went on to pills and finally heroin. Three years ago she came to Synanon, after spending time in hospitals and jails trying to end her addiction. Now she's one of the team members for Synanon's Supply Department, the department with the responsibility of seeing that Synanon obtains the food and other needs to keep it operating.

Don Thornton is 38. He started using pot and pills when he was in his teens, and after he got out of the Army began with heroin. For the next eight years he was in and out of jails and hospitals because of his heroin addiction. Then he came to Synanon in 1965 and he's been completely free of drugs ever since, able now to offer a helping hand to others still caught up in the drug scene.

Roy, Les, Arlene and Don personify the clean-cut, personable, healthy young men and women produced by Synanon, where the emphasis is on hard, rewarding work, wholesome socializing, selfreliance, honesty, and personal responsibility.

While in the three states, the four Synanon people will be available to local youths who may be in need of Synanon's environment. They will speak have given Synanon their full publicly or privately to support. individuals or groups requesting their appearance.

From a storefront operation in 1958, founded by Chuck Dederich, an ex-alcoholic, and subsidized by his \$33 unemployment check, Synanon has

become in 1972 the oasis for nearly 2,000 men, women, and children from every corner of the United States

PIONEERS SELF-HELP

Synanon is responsible for the pioneering and development of the self-help concept of drug addict rehabilitation, an approach that is now widely accepted as being, by far, the most effective.

In late 1971, Synanon turned its energies toward the lost generation-America's teenagers. At no charge, with no federal or state welfare aid, Synanon welcomed 500 addicts, mostly teenagers, juvenile delinquents, some Vietnam war

One of the facilities Synanon operates is a factory building encompassing one square city block in San Francisco, a gift from N L Industries (Dutch Boy Paints). This additional space will enable another group of addicts to enter Synanon this

ACQUIRE RANCHES

Another unprecedented change has taken place at Synanon, allowing it to accept more new residents. Two full-scale ranches have been acquired in California. There young people are developing character, getting in top physical and mental condition in the clean country air, and gaining their self-respect in Synanon's drug-free, alcoholfree, crime-free, violence-free and tobacco-free community.

Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede and Don Thornton have three purposes in their current Texas. Oklahoma and New Mexico trip: to thank the cattle industry for the tremendous support it has given Synanon in the past, to impact the need for continued support of Synanon in its efforts to reshape the lives of the many additional troubled individuals who are seeking help, and to provide information to anyone who may wish Synanon's help in solving their own problems of drug addiction, alcoholism, alienation, or other character disorder.

It takes 400 head of cattle a year to feed the Synanon population, and organizations like the National Livestock Feeders' Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Arizona and California Cattle Feeders, and Iowa Livestock Feeders Association and Iowa Beef Producers Association

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



Read I John 3:11-14

What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?

Responsible living calls for one to have the will and the capacity to act. Micah used three action words to say what is required--to do, to love, and to walk. If one would be God's instrument in society, he must accept the call to action.

To do. It is not sufficient that one abhor crime, racism, poverty, drug abuse, and pollution. One must do something, employing his resources and energies in eliminating these destructive forces.

To love. Love is an action word, hence one cannot say that he loves and then fail to demonstrate that love for his neighbor. One must love concretely: and in loving, he must carry that love to the object of its concern.

W.H. "Shorty" Jones, 64, a resident of Friona since he was 16, died last Thursday in Parmer County Community Hospital.






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
