\$75,000 Fire Hits Elementary School

Fire of an undetermined origin as of presstime late Friday, left the Friona Elementary School with approximately \$75,000 in damage, said Friona Volunteer Fire Department Chief Ralph Shirley.

The fire, which was reported to fire officials around 6 p.m. Wednesday afternoon, heavily damaged the west portion of the school, leaving the most serious damage to the library.

As firefighters prepared to enter the library where hot, blue flames were dancing along the ceiling, the roof collapsed, taking with it part of the north wall of the library. Windows in the room had already popped out due to the intense heat.

The library was completely destroyed, although, strangely, not one book was burned in the blaze.

An adjacent storage room and classroom were also destroyed, and extensive damage was done to the principal's office, and some fire damage to the other adjacent classrooms.

The entire building had smoke damage and water damage. Cleanup began at the elementary school Thursday morning with several school faculty members assisting the maintenance crew and teenagers who were helping salvage books and equipment from the debris.

Although it was initially thought the fire began from electrical causes, that reason

was ruled out and no official cause has been recorded. The fire apparently broke out in a storage room adjacent to the

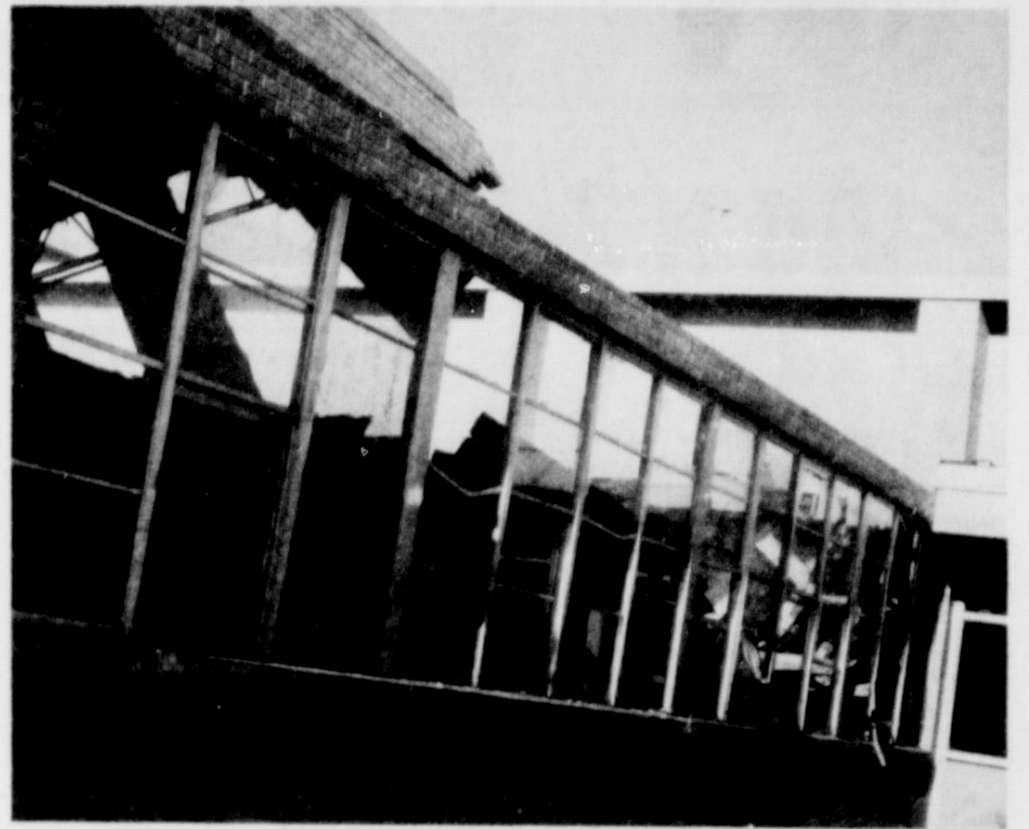
library and across the hall from the principal's office.

Thursday morning, Friona School Superintendent Alton Farr said he had not had time to consider an alternate site to begin school on August 27 as it would be virtually impossible to have the school repaired in time to open the doors when school begins.

School Registration Dates Are Released

School days for the 1973-74 school term are right upon us, and Friona School Superintendent Alton Farr has released registration dates for the schools here.

Superintendent Farr said the in-service program for all faculty members begins August 20 with a general faculty meeting at 9 a.m.

Superintendent Farr said the shots needed in order to attend school are polio, rubella, rubella and DTP.

He also reminded that in order to facilitate kindergarten classes, the Friona school is offering all day sessions. All youngsters who will be five years and six months of age on

or before March 1, 1974 will attend the first semester which begins August 27 and ends January 17.

Second semester students who will be five years and six months on or before September 1, 1974, will attend the second session from January 18 to the final day of school.

The superintendent said it is requested that all new pupils who have moved into the district register in the proper principal's office prior to August 27, the first day of school, if possible.

Registration for all high school students will be at 9 a.m. on Friday, August 24 in the high school auditorium.

Seventh and eighth grade students will register at junior high school in the auditorium at 9 a.m. on Friday, August 24 and sixth grade students will report for registration at the junior high school auditorium at 10:30 a.m. the same day.

Kindergarten through fifth grade students will register at the school on Monday, August 27, which is the day school officially begins the new year at 8:45 a.m.

Parents of kindergarten students and other students who have not previously provided shot records and birth certificates are asked to provide the shot records and certificates at registration.

MBP To Continue Slaughter Schedule

Jim Kofford, plant manager at Missouri Beef Packers' Friona plant, said Friday that the way things looked, the plant would be able to continue in operation "at least another week," as the local beef processor strives to weather the unsettled beef market situation.

Kofford said that workers in the Friona plant had been able to get in 36 hours this week, which enabled MBP to hold onto most of its work force.

The plant had faced a possible six-week shutdown prior to last Friday, when officials worked out arrangements to custom slaughter beef for supermarkets in the area, and thus remain open at a time when many packers across the country were closing or cutting back sharply.

Council OKs 1974 Budget

The Friona City Council gave tentative approval to a \$406,836 budget for 1973-74 at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The budget will be \$18,946 over that for 1972-73, or roughly a 4.9 per cent increase.

The council heard from a group of citizens over 65 years of age who were requesting a property tax exemption which is allowable under Texas laws, if the city approves. However, due to the fact that if the exemption well allowed, it would mean a decrease of \$8,400 in revenue to the city, and because of this, no action was taken on the matter.

Mayor R.L. Fleming explained that to take away the \$8,400 would cause the city to have to make it up in another place, and he thought the city's tax rate was at a fair level.

In other business, the council passed the ordinance authorizing the city's participation in the Texas Municipal Retirement System beginning with

the 1973-74 fiscal year.

A payment of \$1,054 to Brown Sheet Metal of Hereford, representing the cost of installing a cooling and heating unit at the Police Department, was approved. H.K. Kendrick, representing Friona Clearview, local cable television company, appeared before the council in answer to several who have asked for additional channels on the local system.

Kendrick said he was doing everything in his power to secure additional channels for the viewers, if an arrangement could be made that would be financially feasible for the company.

Miscellaneous business included a report on the progress of the city's paving project, on which the contractor is expected to begin in the near future, and an ordinance closing 20 feet of an extra-wide alley in the Drake addition, returning the property to the property owners.

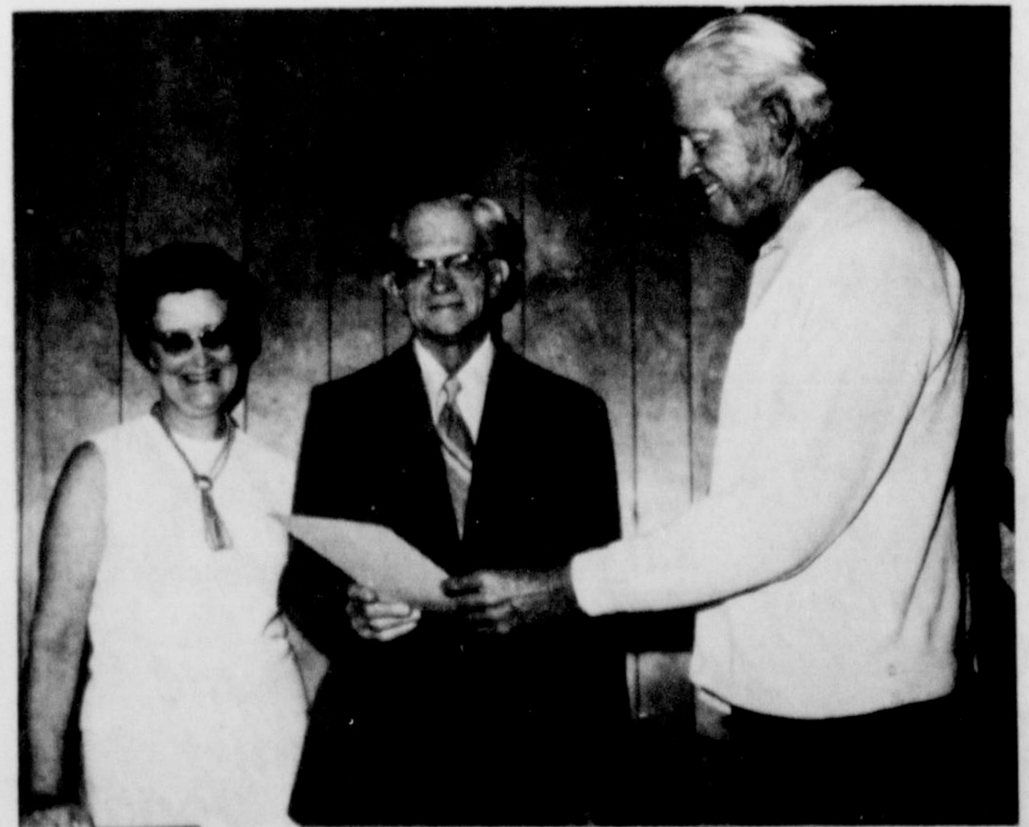

Dear Editor,

Recently, Parmer County residents experienced, in a very personal way, a tragedy. I am referring to the automobile accident which killed and hospitalized the members of the Salinas family.

Several of the children were taken to the hospital in Amarillo. Little Odella Salinas was hospitalized in the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Little Odella was left alone in Friona when other family members returned to their home in Alice, Texas, for the funeral and burial of those who died in the wreck.

When it was medically feasible for Odella to leave the hospital, none of the Salinas family was in a position to take her from the hospital and care for her.

I, as the caseworker for Parmer County and the Texas State Department of Public Welfare, received verbal permission from the Salinas family in Alice to go to the hospital in Friona in order to take Odella to Amarillo and place her in a foster home. You see, there are no authorized foster homes in Parmer County.

Odella had become attached to the Parmer County Community Hospital staff, and of course did not want to leave familiar surroundings to go with a strange person to a new home in a strange city. Some of the staff members at the hospital did not think it was

right for Odella to be moved when she wanted to stay. Several volunteered to keep Odella.

The welfare law, however, states that a person must meet certain criteria in order to become foster parents. This is for the protection of the child. In this specific instance, for Odella's protection. Volunteering to keep and care for Odella when the caseworker arrives to take her to an approved foster home came a little too late.

But it is not too late for other children. The welfare would like to approve foster homes in Parmer County so that there will not be a repeat of this situation. When the need arises for foster homes in Parmer County the Welfare Department would like to be able to place Parmer County children in Parmer County. If Parmer County residents, who have so recently been involved in this car wreck incident, would respond to this letter by contacting the Welfare Department in Tulia, Swisher County Courthouse, concerning foster home applications, we should be able to avoid another incident like the one with Odella Salinas.

The State Welfare Department has no foster homes in Castro or Swisher Counties either. For this reason I am placing this letter in the newspapers of Castro and Swisher Counties as well as Parmer County.

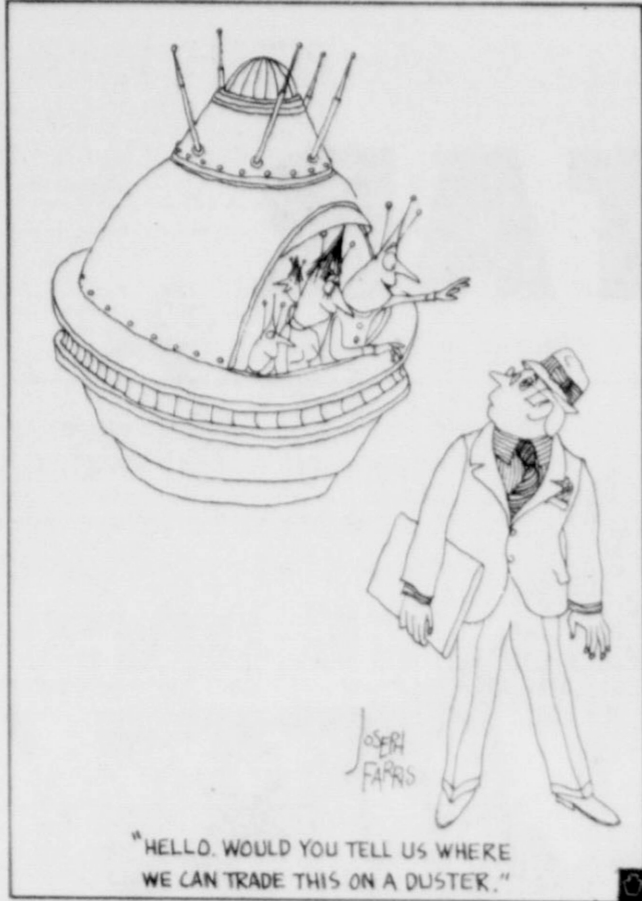

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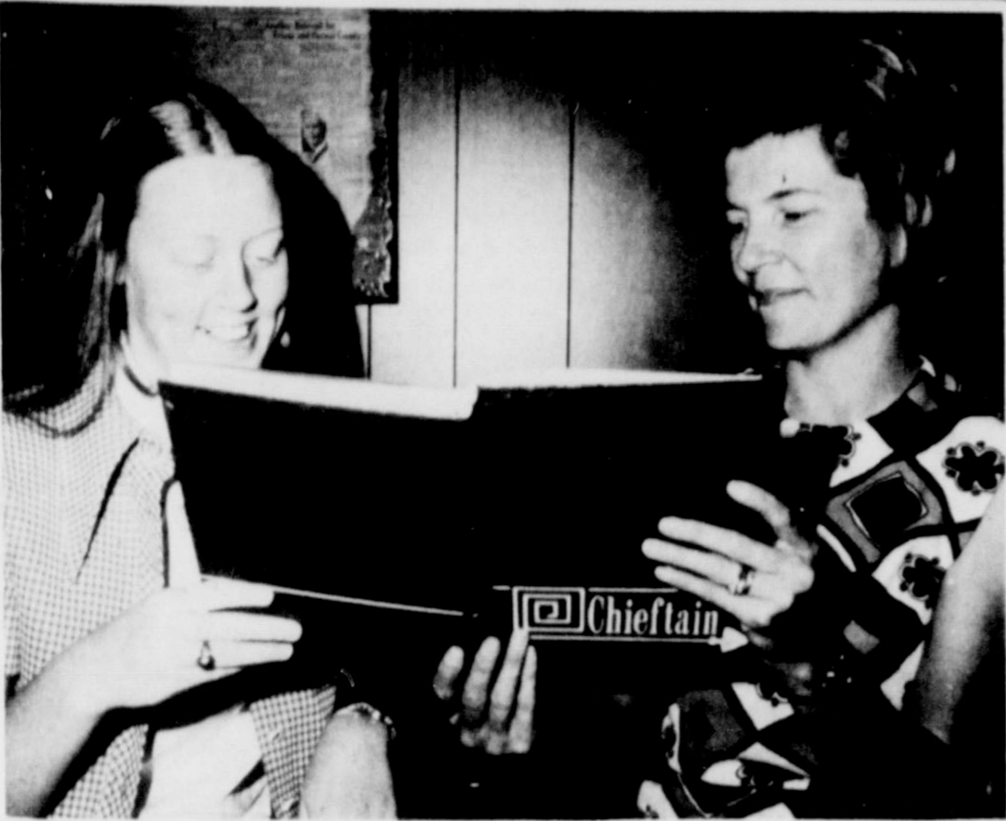

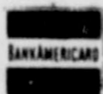

Youth's Heroism Is National News

It has been said that "Heroism does not go unrewarded," and this seems to be partially true in the case of eight-year-old Terry Jesko, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Jesko of the Lazbuddie community.

On Thursday, May 10, Terry was featured in the Friona Star in a story which outlined an averted possible tragedy involving his father on Friday, May 4.

In the August issue of a monthly publication which is distributed nationwide, "Farm Wife News," Terry's feat of heroism was noted on the front page.

A notation preceding the story said it was sent in by Mrs. Howard [Pat] Fleming with the following words—"This article testifies to the self-reliance that children have who are raised on a farm."

"I'm not sure that many city-raised boys of eight years would have the presence of mind to do what the youngster did."

The publication from Milwaukee, Wis. carried the following story, condensed

here— Terry Jesko was in the field with his father who was drilling grain sorghum when he stepped from the slow moving tractor to check the seed. When he started to get back on the tractor his foot slipped and a wheel caught him, pulling him under the tractor wheel and rod weeder.

As the badly mangled farmer lay injured, eight year old Terry managed to stop the tractor and drove the family pickup approximately a mile and a half to seek help. His mother was not home, so Terry just dialed the telephone not knowing a number to dial. Reaching the operator, he told her of the accident and asked that a cousin, Pete Jesko, be called.

The operator summoned Jesko and an ambulance to bring the critically injured farmer to the hospital in Friona.

Although critically injured, "he's good as new," quoted a member of the family this week, and he's back farming again, still with the thought that Terry's action in May

saved his life. Six days after the accident, on Terry's ninth birthday, hospital visiting rules were relaxed briefly to allow the youngster to visit with his father in the hospital.

Drawback

Most of the damage was in the area where fourth grade classes are held.

Chief Shirley said firemen contained the blaze in the west end of the building and managed to extinguish the fire some two hours after it was reported, although they remained on the scene until around midnight. A firewall between the school building and gymnasium kept the gym from being consumed in the fire.

Friday morning, Superintendent Farr said he has a contractor in his office waiting to go to the elementary school to assess repairs to the building.

The superintendent emphasized that school will start on schedule, and probably classes will be held in the gymnasium and auditorium until the building can be repaired.

"We are trying to get a contractor lined up to get started on the building as soon as possible," he commented. "We also hope to be able to get a contractor who can handle all the work."

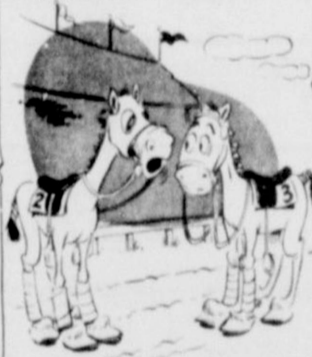

**On The Farm
In Parmer County
MACK HEALD

IF YOU WISH to plant a windbreak next spring, you might want to take advantage of trees offered by the Texas Forest Service. These windbreak seedlings are \$3.00/100 with shipment being next spring. Redcedar, a popular tree in this area, will be offered this year for the first time in several years. Others on the list are Austrian Pine, Black Walnut, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Mulberry, Oriental Arborvitae, Osage Orange and Ponderosa Pine. Applications for these trees can be obtained in my office.

THE CROP INSECT activity in this area has eased off a little over the past two weeks. Spotted concentrations of damaging insects can still be found, but for the most part the most harmful insects to grain sorghum and corn have decreased in population. Greenbug and corn leaf aphid activity is decreasing in most areas of the county. Parasitic wasps are building up and working well on the aphids. Mites can be found in several corn and milo fields. During the cool, damp weather of the past few weeks their population remained at a standstill. However, they may become a problem with several weeks of hot weather. Producers should check their fields to be sure.

Milo producers with young milo may have some trouble with both false chinch bugs and sorghum midge. The chinch bugs are bothering fields on the South Plains and may move up this way later on. Midge buildup has not yet been seen, but this may be a problem for young milo when it heads out later this month.

Southwestern corn borers are present in this area in a number of fields. The first generation larvae and pupae are present in the stalk with some egg laying taking place. The populations should be approximately 40% throughout the field to warrant spraying. Unnecessary spraying may bring about a heavy mite population, which will be more damaging than the corn borer. Again it's best to check your fields thoroughly to determine the population buildup.



**At Home In

WITH KNITS SO prevalent on today's fashion scene and knitwear so much a part of men's fashion I thought you could use tips on care of knits.

One of the great pluses of knitwear is its easy care and cleaning. But here again, the watchword is—be careful! When you consider that one fiber producer, alone, puts out 23 different types of acrylic fibers, you can imagine the complex of fiber blends that require a complex of differing instructions on care.

Here are some quick tips on the care of knits—

—Beware of severe laundering conditions for knits. This would include long wash cycle, hot water, high agitation, fast spin, also high temperature drying, overdrying, and excessively long tumbling. Instead—use a "Knitted Fabrics Cycle" if your washer is so equipped, or the "delicate" setting; use warm to medium water (according to color-fastness and amount of soil) for only six to ten minutes at medium or low agitation; use lowest spin speed to avoid wrinkles.

—When you're loading your dryer, try to keep lightweight fabrics (most synthetics) separate from heavier weight fabrics (cotton, rayon, linen). The former dry much faster, and mixing of the two can result in overdrying of the synthetics, which is likely to cause shrinkage.

—When caring for knitted fabrics, try to keep them apart from articles that have metal hooks, clips, etc., that might snag or damage knits. Or at least be sure all zippers are zipped and hooks hooked before going into the dryer. Turning knits inside out will also help prevent possible damage.

—Your washable knits should be dry-cleaned every 5th or 6th cleaning for best shape retention.

Most commercial drycleaners are geared up to meet the varying needs of knits in the cleaning process. The loosely knit, more delicate fabrics get what is called 'custom' care, while tightly knit garments, more akin to woven fabric, receive more conventional treatment. Where such a two-system service exists, the difference between the two treatments lies generally in three areas. First, the 'custom' garments are measured, both before and after the drycleaning and drying processes. Second, the 'custom' articles receive hanger, or 'air' drying as opposed to conventional tumble drying. Third, the finishing process for 'custom' articles is more detailed, including a special finishing unit for knits; removal by hand of any lint or fibers; measuring, plus blocking if necessary.

For those who want to do as much of their own garment care as possible at home, here's the most important step of all—Follow that label!

WHEN KNIT FABRIC is snagged—don't cut off the snag! Pull it through to the other side of the fabric. This repair is very simple with a needle threader which often comes with a package of needles. Push the wry end of the threader through the knit fabric from the wrong side at exactly the point where the snag is on the right side of the fabric. Catch the snag in the wry portion of the threader and slip it back through to the wrong side of the fabric.

There is still money to be made on cattle in Parmer County according to most producers. And one of the most economical and dependable livestock systems is high production improved grass. Most producers are finding that one acre of cool season grass under good management will carry up to four calves or two cow-calf pairs.

Parmer County has an ideal climate for some of the improved cool season pasture grasses. They can practically be grazed year around because they grow nearly all year.

More and more farmers who believe in diversifying their operations are planing cool season grasses. John Hays does not believe that a farmer can depend on any one crop. His answer is a cool season grass planting to fill his needs for livestock grazing. A cool season grass planted for grazing fits in and complements J.D. Carpenter's operation.

These farmers are planning for the future as well as the present. The indirect benefits of grasslands are as great as the direct and obvious ones. Soil erosion, whether from wind or from water, is reduced drastically; soil structure and production potential is improved; and the danger of hail and wind damage is almost nil.

Grass could be what would convert your operation from a good one to one that is ideal. For more information on what grass can do for you contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

SAYS 21 ARRESTS

City Activities Reported In Monthly News Release

According to the July City Report, a total of twenty-one arrests were recorded during the month of July, with 10 being recorded for traffic violations, six for drunk in control of motor vehicle and five drunk pedestrians.

The report further states that 21 complaints were received-five for domestic

disturbance; four for thefts; two each for vandalism, burglary, animal complaints and obscene phone calls; one each was recorded for disorderly conduct, minor disturbance; a shooting incident and miscellaneous.

The report said there were 12 man-nights of jail occupancy.

Also, a new Carrier heating and cooling unit was installed in the police building on July 6.

The fire department answered four alarms during the month; two were within the city and two outside the city

limits. One was a rescue mission when a girl became lost within the tall corn adjacent to the north of the Friona Apartments.

The greatest loss reported was to an automobile, destroyed by fire six miles north and two miles west of Friona off Highway 214.

Regularly scheduled fire drills were held on July 5th and 19th. Also four representatives including the fire chief, fire marshal and two firemen attended the Annual State Firemen's Training School at

Bryan, Texas on July 22-28. Administrative duties handled during the month included twenty-two delinquent tax notices mailed on July 2, with collections for the month amounting to \$2,137.01.

A total of 138 delinquent water bills existed as of noon July 11, with two cutoffs being made and eight carried forward.

The Board of Equalization met on July 17 with one taxpayer appearing in relation to the value placed on his mobile home.

Four building permits were issued during the month; one new residence at \$38,000 and three addition/alterations to the amount of \$3,000 for \$41,000 in permits for the month.

Also two trash and eight dog

complaints were received and the compilation of the basic budget was completed; ten changes in ownership of city property was reported by the county clerk's office and there were two purchase orders and 82 work orders processed.

According to the city report, records indicate approximately 30,053,700 gallons of water were pumped and 30,341,000 accounted for in sales to indicate an efficiency of 99 percent in the distribution system. This averaged 969,474 gallons pumpage per day and is comparable to last month's pumpage.

Two new water taps were made to bring the total active taps to 1308. And a fire hydrant had to be replaced at 11th and Cleveland after it was hubbed by a truck on July 16.

The cemetery well went out

and repair is pending the arrival of necessary parts; and annual maintenance on the north tower was done by installation of new anodes. The tank is reported to be in good condition and holding water well.

Repairs were made to a two inch main at Sixth and Prospect on July 30.

According to records from the city sewage department 7,053,162 gallons of waste water were processed at the plant during the month. This averaged 227,521 gallons per day and is practically the same figure as last month.

Two new sewer taps were made to bring the total number of active taps to 1274 and two mainline stoppages occurred. Minor vandalism was reported to the pump house during the month.

One interment was made at the cemetery during July, Mrs. Thelma Ford on July 25.

Trees were manicured in the city park on July 24 and attempts were made to keep irrigation water off the lower end of Austin Avenue on July 10.

Routine maintenance of dirt streets and alleys became increasingly difficult due to intermittent rains and preliminary work got underway on the upcoming paving project.

Richard Vickery, employee of the street department, resigned on July 25 giving working conditions as principal reason for leaving the city.

The city was called upon, according to the report, to assist in controlling millions of small mite-like bugs behind White's Grocery on July 6.

A regular monthly meeting

of the Library Board was held on July 18 with Rev. Albert Lindley named chairman; Mrs. Irene McFarland, vice chairman and Mrs. Zora Gaede as treasurer for the board for the year.

Burning Violates Act

Burning off grain fields, paraffin or oil pits is a violation of the Texas Clean Air Act laws concerning air pollution control, according to an announcement from Vick Newsom, regional supervisor of Region Two of the Texas Air Control Board.

Some exceptions may be made for unusual circumstances or emergencies, says Newsom. Examples are infestations of some type or an oil spill that is creating a hazard.

Persons who feel they have grounds for an exception should contact the regional office of the Texas Air Pollution Control Services at 1906 Fourth Street in Lubbock or phone 744-0090, says Newsom.

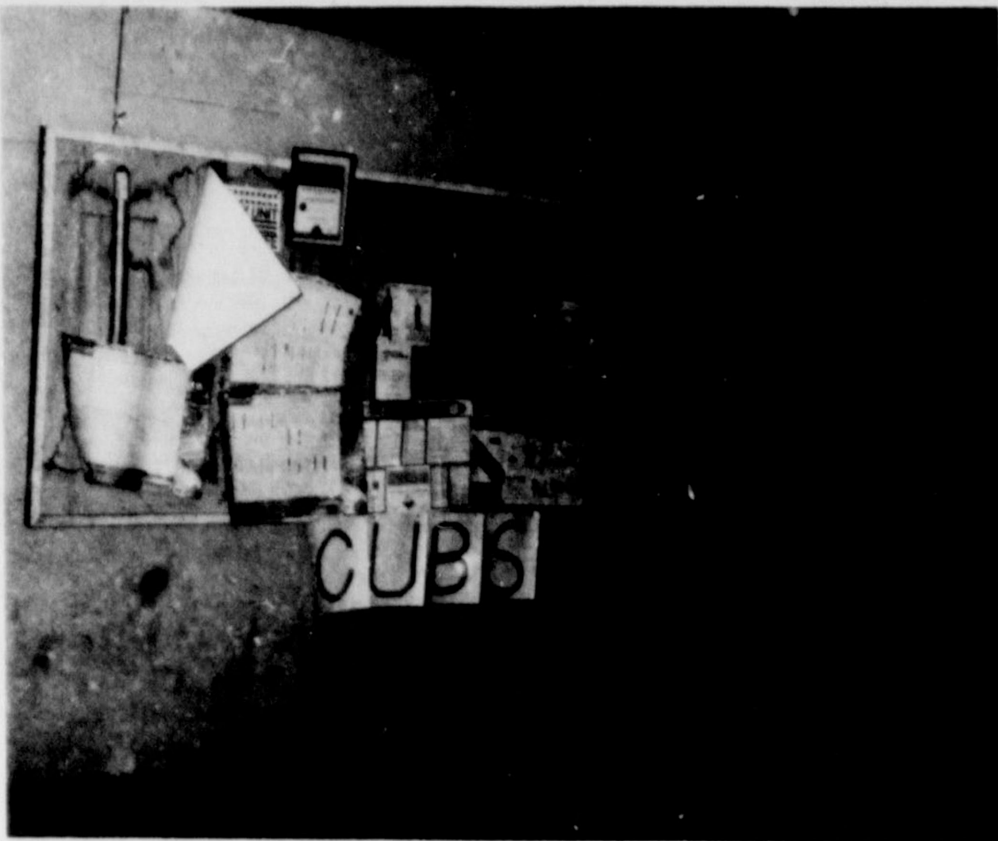

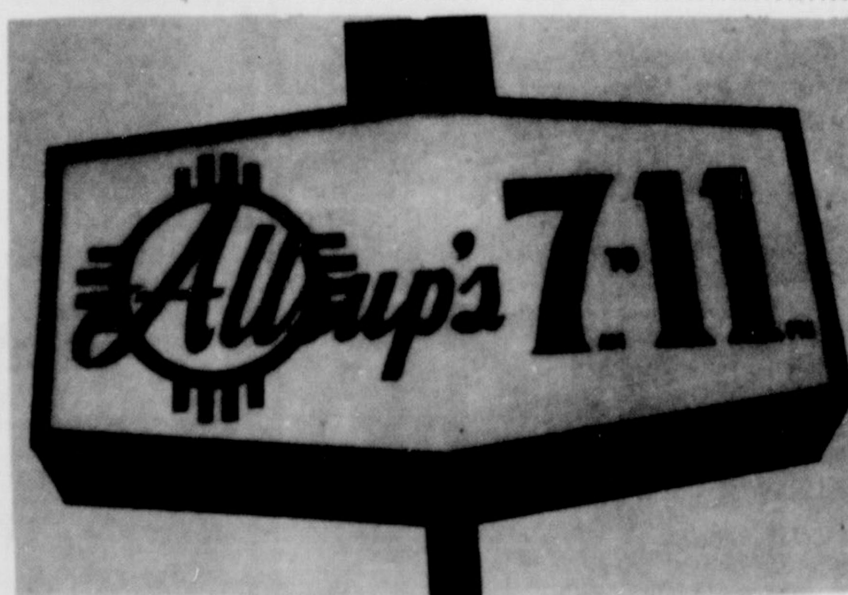

Revisions of the King James Bible were inevitable, because no translation can transcend its own time. The translators of the King James Version could work only in light of the knowledge of their day. Since the translators in 1611 did not have at their disposal many manuscripts which are now known, the King James Version was based on an inferior Greek text. Also, many archaic words whose meanings are obscure or misleading remain in the King James Version. The English language has changed greatly since 1611. Because of these shortcomings, a revision of the King James Version was begun late in the nineteenth century.

The revision which began in June of 1870 was completed in May of 1885. This was called the English Revised Version. An American edition of this revision was printed in 1901, known as the American Standard Version. It differs from the English Revised Version on points of idiom, spelling, word-order, and the like. These revisions were based on better manuscripts and cleared up the misleading archaisms of the King James Version.

About 1929, a revision of the American Standard Version was begun. The revision was done because [1] of the many inadequacies of the King James Version, [2] of the failure of the English and American revisions to overcome all of these inadequacies, [3] and the discovery of new resources warranting a new revision. In 1952, the publication of the Revised Standard Version completed this revision.

The Revised Standard Version could take into account fully the findings of recent research. The Revised Standard Version's greatest gain over its predecessors is its readability. The Bible, of all books, should be put in language which is understandable and easy to read. The Revised Standard Version tries to recapture the beauty of the King James style in a way that is clear and pleasing to the reader.

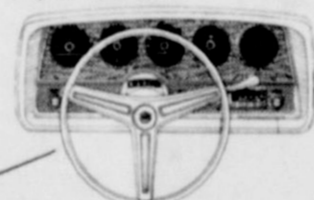
