Aliens Must Register **During January**

Harlon B. Carter, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that aliens in the United Staes will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the person future.

addresses to the Attorney General within the near faure.
All aliens, with the exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement:

(1) Accredited Diplomats; (2) Persons accredited to certain organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms with which to make

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration Office during the month of January

Mr. Carter said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the re-porting requirement.

Gas Co. Seeks Rate Adjustment

Lone Sar Gas Company has flied with the Railroad Com-mission of Texas an application for an upward adjustment of the Company's authorized intra-company city gate charge.

The present charge of 30 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas delivered at the city gates in Texas cities served by Lone Star for domestic and commercial usage and unaccounted-for gas would be adjusted upward to 40 cents.

would be adjusted upward to 40 cents.

Approval of the requested upward adjustment would serve to re-establish the charge that existed for a long period of years prior to the year 1942 when the charge was reduced from 40 to 30 cents.

The application states that the proposed increase is based primarily upon the drastic increase in the cost of gas at the wellhead. This cost has risen approximately eights cents per thousand cubic feet since January 1, 1951. Additionaly, there have been substantial increases in taxes, material costs, labor and other operating expenses.

Residential and commercial consumer rates would not be Immediately affected by Railroad Commission authorization of an upward adjustment in the city gate charge. But a Company spokesman stated that the Company may be required at a later date to file applications

Company may be required at a later date to file applicaions for increases in residential and commercial rates.

Social Security

Would you like to get your first social security check as soon as possible after entitlement? You can help the social security office get your money to you earlier by applying beforehand and by getting the proofs needed together, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Tuley advised that all per-sons intending to retire get in touch with the social securiy ofsons intending to retire get in touch with the social security office one or two months before actual retirement. They should bring with them the papers necessary to establish their rights to benefits. These include the social security card, proof of age, and proof of recent earnings, such as the last W-2 form or last income tax return, with Schedule C or Schedule F and the cancelled check with which the self-employment tax was paid. If the retiring person's wife is 62, she should bring proof of her age. Also, if there are any children under 18, their birth or baptismal certificates, or other proof of age, should be furnished.

Severely disabled persons applying for freeze of social security status, if under 50, or for disability payment, if 50 or over, should bring information about medical examinations and treatment and employment for the past several years.
