## Celebration Dampened **TERESA INGRAM CROWNED**

### By Early Fall Rains

WE THOUGHT perhaps that when Maize Days was set so early this year—still in the summertime according to the calendar—that the least that could be said for the early starting date was that the weather should be good for the celebration.

However, after the first few days of the week are fairly nice, that old regular Maize Days weather arrived on schedule here Thursday, just in time for the bulk of the celebration.

The rain and cool weather apparently were caused by Hurricane Delia, which didn't hamper the Texas coast to a large extent, but shoved its mass far inland for a change.

Farmers in the area probably wish the Chamber of Commerce had scheduled the celebration around the first or middle of August. That would have been a little better timing for the rain which fell. However, the moisture undoubtedly was still welcome by the sod-busters, even if the Maize Days promoters were shaking their heads.

We've heard it many times before, and perhaps it bears repeating—you never turn down moisture in this part of the country, regardless of when it falls.

Seems that farmers reason that moisture can always be useful for the current crop, or in setting the stage for next year's crop. With the underground water table constantly on the decline, and water import programs still in the talking stage, this undoubtedly will continue to be true.

It's typical Maize Days weather in the Friona area, with slow, drizzling rain starting on Thursday morning and continuing through Friday.

At 8 a.m. Friday, the official weather gauge had recorded .81 and rain continued, with City Manager Jake Outland updating the rain check at 11:15 a.m. Friday, when an additional .19 had been collected in the rain gauge for an even 1 inch.

The forecast called for continued rain through the weekend.

Thursday, the high temperature reached only 58 degrees and the low temperature recorded during the night was 51.

Fall is apparently here, as five of the last seven nights saw the temperatures fall below 60 degrees with daytime temperatures ranging up to 92 degrees.

Hurricane Delia gets the blame for the weather, as Delia is said to be ranging up and down the coastline in Texas and Louisiana causing widespread rains reaching into the Panhandle of Texas, and into Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kan-

sas and continuing into eastern states.

Some of the heavier rains reported in the Panhandle through Thursday night were in the northeast sections where more than two inches had been received in many areas by Friday night, and flooding low lying areas predicted from Lubbock eastward and south.

Rain was also expected to cut attendance at many football games, with the first games for high schools in Texas scheduled for Friday night.

On Wednesday night, a large crowd packed the carnival grounds at the Friona City Park, but by Thursday night, the carnival could not operate due to the weather, and prospects looked doubtful for Friday night.

Intermittent breaks in the clouds were predicted for Saturday morning, raising hopes for at least clear weather through the 10 a.m. parade and noon barbecue.

It was still an uncertainty as to what effect the rain would have on the motorcycle races scheduled for Sunday afternoon.

# Chieftains Blitz Rival Steers 34-0

The weather broke just right for the Friona Chieftains Friday night, but for the Farwell Steers it was just a rainy Friday.

Friona's Chieftains unleashed a running game that they weren't supposed to have, to go with the passing it was expected to have—and it all added up to a 34-0 victory over rival Farwell in the 1973 season opener at Chieftain Field.

The Chiefs, not expected to be overly potent on the ground, got excellent mileage out of seniors Ted King (85 yards) and Dale Parsons (73 yards) in running up a team total of 209 yards rushing in the season opener.

Bright spots in the opener were the team balance-five touchdowns scored by five different players, and the relative ease with which the team handled the Farwell eleven, which was predicted to be a favorite in District 3-A.

Neither team could score in its opening series. Friona drove to the Farwell 23, but a fourth-down pass fell incomplete.

But David Clark recovered a fumble at the 12 to put Friona back in business.

A measurement for a first down at the Farwell two proved the official wrong after a vital fourth down, and on the first play of the second quarter, Clay Bandy went over from the one on a keeper play. Davy Carthel's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead it would never lose.

Farwell fumbled on the first play following the kickoff, and fired up the Chieftains again. On the third play, Bandy headed around end, and being hemmed in at about the 10, pitched back to Parsons who was trailing the play, and Dale took the ball on in for the TD.

Carthel's second kick made it 14-0, Friona, with just 1:23 gone in the period.

Parsons' 29-yard run on Friona's next series put the ball at the Farwell 15. From there, Bandy tossed a pass to Dale Cleveland, who was wide open in the end zone, and Carthel's perfect kick made it 21-0 with 7:32 left on the clock.

A Dee King to Ted King pass late in the half moved the ball to the Farwell 19, but with eight seconds left, a field goal try fell short.

The third quarter was almost scoreless, but David Hutson kept that from happening. The

defensive back got in front of a Kevin Hargrove pass at about the 10, bobbled it a second and then sped into the end zone for a touchdown. Carthel's fourth kick gave Friona a 28-0 lead.

Early in the fourth quarter, James Perea intercepted another Farwell pass and ran it to the Steer 35. On the first play, Bandy spotted Gene Strickland downfield and lofted a long pass which Strickland caught and went in for the score.

A high snap on the kick attempt caused the only conversion miss, but the 34-0 lead looked insurmountable with still over ten minutes to play.

Farwell's only time inside the Friona 30 came with reserves in the game during the final quarter.

Dee King, meanwhile, moved the team 50 yards in the final quarter, before a fumble stopped the drive.

The win, always sweet over a Farwell team, was even more so in that it was the fourth straight win for the Chiefs over the Steers, and tied up the longtime series, 18-18-1.

**Film Can Be Shown Upon Request**

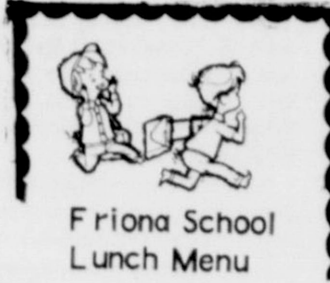
A new film about four young people who get social security payments is available on request through any social security office.

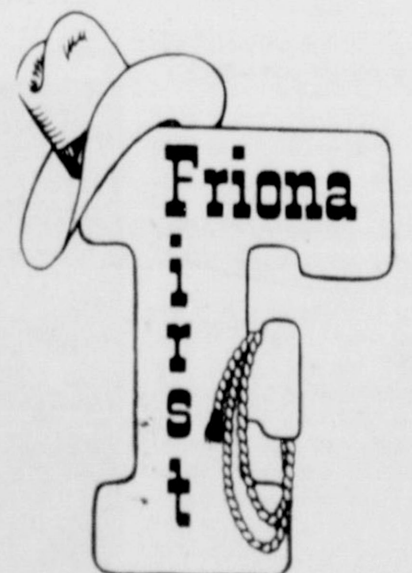

# Short Road Trip For Chiefs Friday

Game number two for the 1973 Friona Chieftains will find the team hitting the road, but they won't even have to leave Parmer County.

In fact, it's the closest road game possible for Friona, as the team travels to nearby Bovina to face their second straight county opponent in as many outings.

The 1973 Mustangs resemble Friona in many ways. Bovina returns several good players from a fine 1972 team which finished 6-3-1 for the season, tying for the championship in District 3-A.

Also like Friona the Mustangs are in a tough district alignment for 1973. Farwell and Springlake have been picked by many to win the championship of this district but Bovina coach Roger Ezell thinks Vega may be the team to beat and folks around Bovina aren't counting out the Mustangs if their new players come through.

One player who isn't new for Bovina is Billy Shelby, a six-foot, 165 pound senior who has been a three year letterman for the Mustangs.

Shelby was a two way all-district player last year at Bovina and was named to the All-South Plains defensive squad as a linebacker.

Coach Ezell has moved Shelby to quarterback this season as the Mustangs have switched to a T-formation attack.

Bovina has good size in its

line with center Terry Sherrill and Danny McKay both weighing in at 210 pounds, tackle Joe Steelman at 180 and sophomore guard Elbert Shelby weighing 180 pounds.

Starting ends are senior Roy Hartzog and another sophomore Tommy DeLeon.

Joining Shelby in the backfield will be fullback Ray Martinez, halfback Joe Delgado and halfback Bryan Fillpot.

Another returning letterman for Bovina is Tony Serna, a guard and Chuck Gilbreath, a 140-pound backfield candidate.

Although Friona has won the last five out of six games against Bovina coach Bob Owen said he isn't taking the game lightly.

"If we let up an inch it could be disastrous," Owen said. "Bovina is a dangerous team and we need to treat them as such. They'd like nothing better than to knock us off," he said.

It's the first time in a number of years for the two schools to meet on Bovina's gridiron. The last six games have been played in Friona with the Mustangs counting the contest as a home game on alternate years, but beginning with the 1973 match the series goes back to a home and home affair.

This county rivalry isn't as old nor as storied as the Friona-Farwell series, tracing its origin to the year 1951.

In the 13 games played between the two schools prior

to this year, Friona has won nine, Bovina has won three and there has been one tie. The tie was a 6-6 contest played here in 1971 that broke a four-game winning streak for Friona.

Bovina's last win in the series was 35-6 over the Chieftains in a game played here in 1962 so the Mustangs are anxious to get back into the win column against Friona.

Game time at Mustang Field next Friday will be 8 p.m.

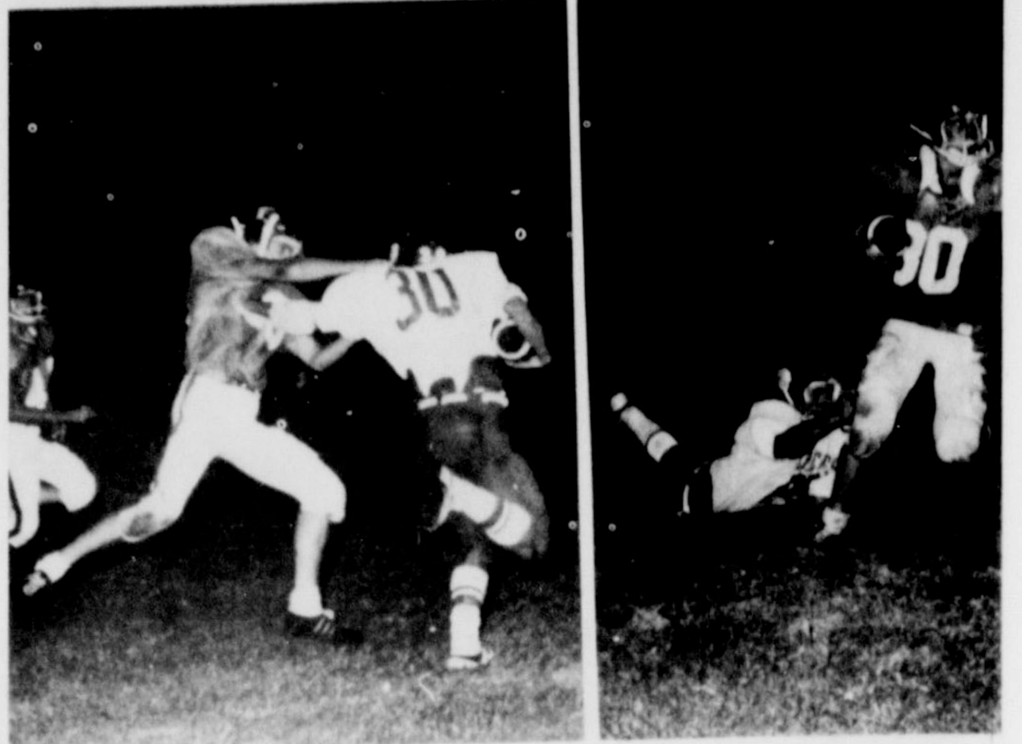

**SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
**SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973**

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)**

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)**

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 11)**

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)**

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 6)**

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)**

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative."

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)**

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

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The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative."

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)**

Article XI of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)**

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

**SLAUGHTER ONLY**

**MBP Open On Limited Basis**

Earlier last week, Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. president Dave LaFleur announced that the beef processor plant would have to bow to pressures brought by the beef price ceiling imposed by the government and close the Friona plant as of Tuesday, September 4.

However, late Tuesday, LaFleur announced that the Friona plant would re-open on September 6.

Friday morning, Tino Morales, personnel director at the Friona Missouri Beef Packers plant said the slaughtering department resumed work on Thursday, and the plant is in limited operation. The breaking and fabricating departments are expected to resume work on Thursday, September 13, following extensive repairs to the two departments.

He said, "We are not in full operation at this time, only the slaughter division has resumed

work, but expect to be in full operation by next Thursday."

According to the personnel director, approximately 50 percent of the workers, with around 300 carried on the payroll, have resumed work, following a two day shutdown.

When LaFleur announced the plant would shut down he commented, "We are doing this because the price of beef has gone past our own ceilings at which we could break even with our slaughter operations."

For three weeks before the brief shutdown, Missouri Beef had avoided interruption in work schedules by custom slaughtering beef for chain stores bringing beef into the plant for processing, and putting most of the more than 300 employees on a shorter work week.

"We hope to reopen the plant and resume slaughter operations on Monday, September 10, or earlier if we can," added

LaFleur at the time he announced the shutdown.

At the time of the announcement, Friona sources said the rumors were that the plant would not reopen until September 14 or later.

The Federal ceiling on beef is scheduled to be lifted September 12 after being in effect for more than two months.

"We will be making some mechanical changes in the Friona plant during the period, so we will keep a small number of people on duty in the plant," added the plant president when he made the announcement.

On August 3, Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. initially announced they were shutting down operations at the Friona plant until the freeze was over, but on August 6, the company said they would remain open operating on a limited custom slaughter basis.

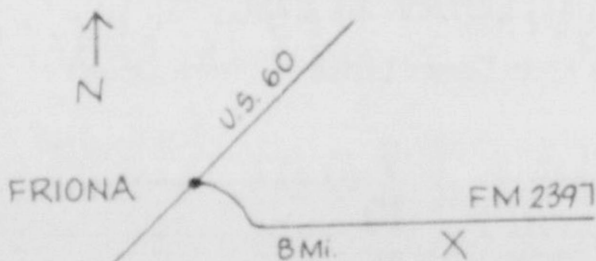

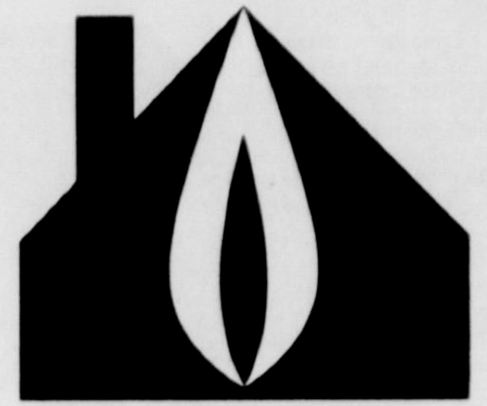

### Lessons Start

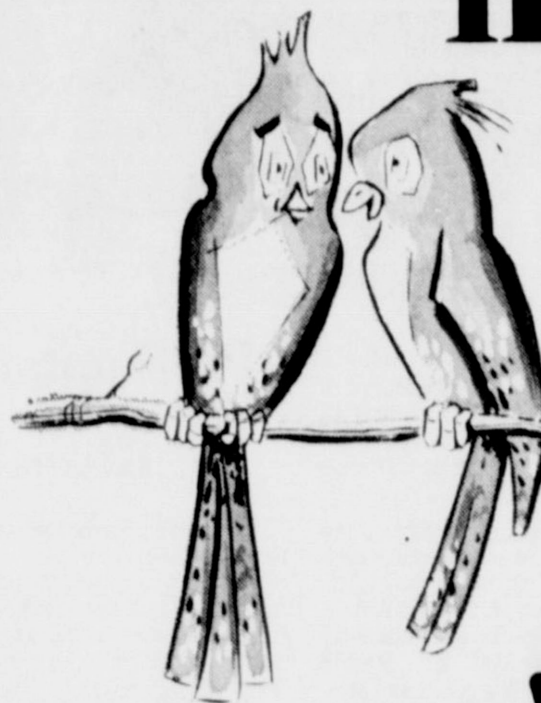
Friona's Buttons and Bows Square Dance Club is kicking off its fall enrollment for square dance lessons, it has been announced.

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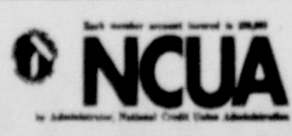

We study the Bible in the hope and expectation of coming to know God and be known by Him. This is quite different from studying the Bible in order to find precepts or ideals which we, of our own strength, will "live up to." We study the Bible, not alone to learn words by which we can guide ourselves, but to discover what may be disclosed through the words of God and his purposes for us. Insight and illumination may come while we are actually reading or at some other time, but such revelation comes because we have pondered thoughtfully some portion of the Bible and its meaning for us.

We study the Bible in search of a deeper relationship to God, a renewed sense of belonging to his people, a better understanding of what our faith has to say to the day's work or the decision we must make.

Thus, the Bible deals profoundly with our life experiences. But we must be clear that it is the God who discloses himself to us in and through the Bible who makes the Bible relevant to experience. We are not here talking about some vague "inner glow" or "uplifted feeling" which comes after reading some familiar Bible passage; this is not what is meant by experience.

Experience here refers to our living of life, how we handle all the involvements, problems, and events that come our way. As we reflect on what we know of God through the biblical record, and at the same time look on our day-to-day life as the scene of this God's activity, we find meaning, guidance and significance which we would not otherwise know. The Bible deals with the total range of men's experiences in the light of God's working through all such experiences to accomplish his good purposes. Our day-to-day lives and our time in history belong to that range of men's experiences.

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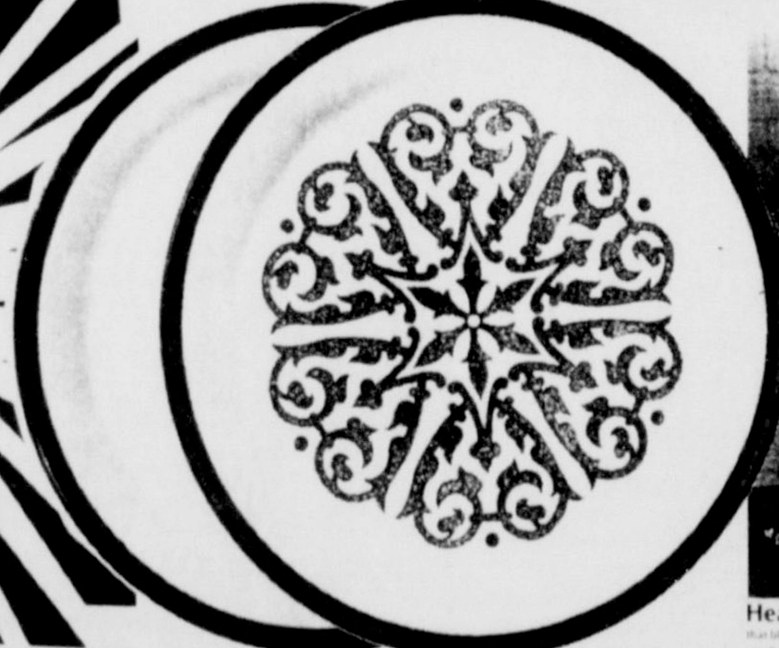
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
