Girls Win, Boys Lose In Tourney

COUNTY OFFICIALS have advised us that they are experiencing some special problems as regarding juveniles, and have asked us to make a few things clear, if not to the juveniles, at least to their parents. A juvenile (anyone under the age of 18) is liable to arrest and conviction of a crime, the same as an adult. They aren't exempt from being convicted and imprisoned just because of their age.

"A child can be prosecuted for everything an adult can, and in addition, can be prosecuted for trauma and as a runaway," state County Attorney Johnny Actkinson.

The county officials indicated that vandalism was the most common offense involving juveniles, and they warned that penalties for conviction can be severe.

A Class B misdemeanor (property valued at \$20 but less than \$200) carries a penalty of up to a year in jail or a \$2,000 fine.

Vandalism of property valued at over \$200 is considered a felony, and the degree of punishment for such a crime increases according to the offense, generally speaking.

"One problem we have is getting people to file charges," Actkinson states. Sometimes there is a situation where a person or his family is afraid to file charges out of fear of the person or persons being charged.

The county judge and attorney urged offended parties to file charges, as a means of combating the creeping increase of crime in our area.

It was indicated by the county attorney that he had filed on some 200 cases so far in 1975, and that although many of the cases are not convicted, at least a measure of punishment is received just by getting an offender to trial.

The Friona Squaws scored an exciting 55-48 win over Cooper in the first round of the Friona Invitational Tournament Thursday night, but the Chieftains fell to the Lubbock school, 74-65 in their first-round game.

The Squaws had to come from behind for their win, after leading for most of the first half and then falling behind during a frigid third quarter.

A technical foul called against the flamboyant Cooper coach, Don Watkins, seemed to be the turning point in the game. It spurred Friona into a lead it never surrendered.

Cooper was leading by two, 36-34, when the "T" signal was given. Rhonda Parsons scored the free throw, and after Friona inbounded the ball, Myrna Phipps made her turning jump shot for a 37-36 Friona lead and the Squaws were off on a 25-point scoring spree for the quarter.

Cooper had opened the scoring in the first quarter, but Terri Patterson tied the count for Friona and the Squaws took the lead and held it all of the first half. It was 13-10 at the end of the first quarter, and 26-25 at the half.

The third quarter was a scoring nightmare for Friona, as only four points went through the hoop. Luckily, the Squaw defense was

functioning, and Cooper managed only seven, to take a two-point lead.

Miss Patterson's layup shot 1:04 into the third quarter gave Friona a 28-26 lead, but the Squaws didn't score again until 1:10 remained in the quarter, a turning jump shot by Diane Bennett which tied the score at 30-all. Cooper countered with a goal for a 32-30 lead at the quarter mark.

Rhonda Parsons tied the score at 32-all for the Squaws, and then a moment later the technical foul incident spurred the Squaw rally.

In the course of the fourth-quarter uprising, Miss Patterson scored three baskets and two free throws, Miss Parsons a pair of field goals and six charity tosses, and Myrna Phipps clicked on three baskets and a free throw as the Squaws broke what had been a close game wide open.

The win left the Squaws with a 4-2 season record, and put them into the semi-finals against Farwell Friday night.

In the boys game, a disastrous second quarter, which saw the Chiefs outscored, 24-11, ruined the team's chances to advance in the tournament. The Friona boys won't be in their own tournament finals for the first time in a number of years.

The taller Pirates got almost every rebound in the early going, and built up a quick six-point lead, 8-2. It became eight points at 12-4, 14-6 and 18-8.

David Barnett sparked a Friona comeback with four baskets and a pair of free shots to pull Friona to within four points, 22-18, at the first quarter break.

Cooper once again got off to a good start, regaining their eight-point lead at 30-22. Friona's chances were hurt when Mark Neill got his fourth foul 2:20 before halftime, and Roy Smith did likewise 6 seconds before intermission.

Everything was going against the Chieftains at this point, as Cooper used a fast break to zoom into a 46-29 lead at the half.

The Chiefs came out fighting in the (Continued on Page 8)

Bobby Drake Contest Champion

Bobby Drake saved one of his better scores for the last week of the Friona Star's football contest, and it paid off with first place and the annual Cotton Bowl trip.

Drake, who was near the top most of the way, had been tied for second place with Jack Clark going into the final week's contest games. His weekly score of 15 gave him the title outright with a season score of 193.

The real battle turned out to be for second place, which includes the tickets to the Sun Bowl game. Four contestants came out in a dead heat for second place with scores of 191. They were Fred Barker, Jr., Jack Clark, Marie Fleming and Movelda Fortenberry.

A tabulation of the four contestants' tie-breaker scores for the entire season was necessary to determine the second and third place winners.

Mrs. Fortenberry came out second, with a combined score of 176 points off on her scores. Marie Fleming took third, with a score of

197. Low score on the tiebreakers determined the winners.

Clark, who had led or tied for the lead for eight weeks during the season, lost out on the tie-breaker count.

Mrs. Fortenberry had the most ground to gain of any of those ending in the top prizes. She went into the final week with a score of 175, tied for fifth place four points behind the leader. Her score of 16 for the week also earned her the weekly first prize of \$10—the third time she had finished "in the money" in the contest this year.

Barker gained the second place tie with a 14 on the final week. Mrs. Fleming, who went into the last weekend holding the lead with a 179 score, had a 12, and Clark scored a 13.

Drake receives two tickets to the Cotton Bowl game plus \$30.00 cash. Mrs. Fortenberry was awarded two tickets to the Sun Bowl Game and \$20.00 cash. Mrs. Fleming received \$15.00 cash.

For the week, in addition to Mrs. Fortenberry, three others also picked 16 games correct, and each was awarded \$5.00. They were Leslie Broadhurst, Donny Carthel and Tim Elmore. All are out-of-town contestants who mail their entries in each week.

Only eight contestants were correct on 15 games. In addition to Drake, they were Buford Hartwick, Mike Field, Bobby Wied, Michael D. Means, Cindy Carthel, Ron Cain and Raymond Auburg.

One of the 20 contest games, the Georgia-Georgia Tech game, turned out to be a Thanksgiving night game, having been rescheduled for television, so all contestants were given that game.

Only 90 contestants entered the final week's event, the smallest number for the 13-week run, but for the course of the contest, a total of 2371 entry blanks were received, from 294 different contestants.

Pheasant Season Kicks Off December 13

The 1975 pheasant season in Parmer County will get underway Saturday, Dec. 13, and continue through Sunday, Dec. 28, spanning three weekends this year as the season did in '74.

Reports from farmers, interested observers and members of the Parmer County Game Management Association in the Friona area indicate this may be one of the "best years ever" for hunting the colorful bird since the sport began in 1964. More than 2000 pheasants were

game association in 1964 and '65 with the population growing steadily since that time.

Jack Patterson, a member of the association, reported that he believed there were more pheasants than any time since '64, particularly the male bird. I've seen as many as six to eight cocks in one bunch and a number of other men have reported seeing large numbers of the cocks this year, more than usual," Patterson said.

The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters with the hens being protected by state laws.

The limit this year will be two cocks per day with four in possession, the same as the past several years. The season and rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The later season for hunting pheasants proved popular, especially with college students last year. Although a large number of hunters will be in the fields throughout the season, most of the hunters will be stalking the colorful bird the opening weekend of the season.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and Farwell again this year with three

cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize with second place awarded \$10 and third place \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Parmer County Game Management Association.

Further details concerning the local contest will be printed in next week's edition of The Friona Star.

The club will serve a breakfast of eggs, sausage, bacon, biscuits, gravy and hot coffee beginning at 5 a.m. at the high school cafeteria. A charge of \$2.50 per person will be made, and the club guarantees "all

you can eat" for the admission price.

Serving will continue as long as traffic demands. "You don't have to be a hunter to come enjoy our breakfast. Everyone is invited," said Baker Duggins, spokesman for the club.

Proceeds from the breakfast will go to help purchase equipment for the Friona Boy Scouts, according to Duggins.

He had been sent over the Santa Rosa cut-off on information that the route was passable.

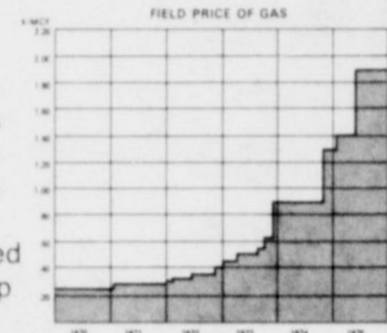

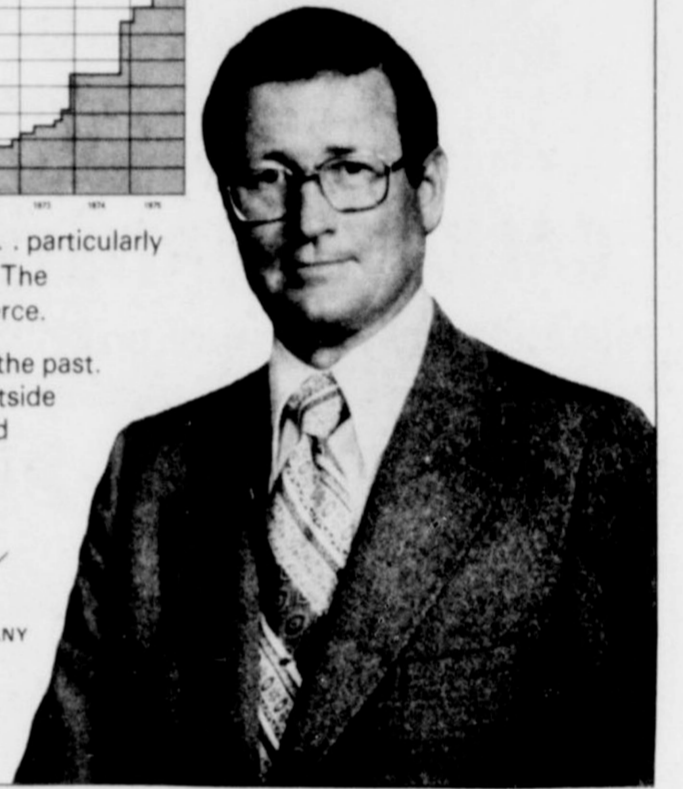

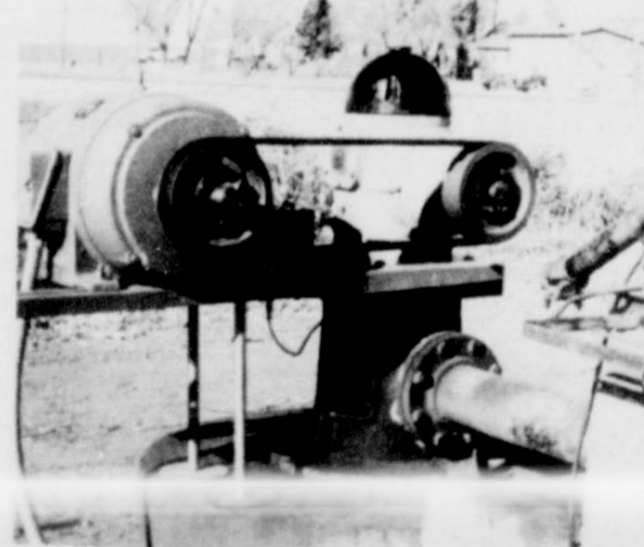

The Friona Chieftain basketball team lost its first game of the 1975-76 season after opening with four straight wins here Tuesday night, when the Vega Longhorns made off with a 53-43 win.

The Chieftains had scored a three-point win in overtime over the Longhorns a week earlier at Vega, but the Longhorns evened things up with a convincing win, as Friona had a cold night in the shooting department.

The Longhorns drew first blood early in the contest for a 2-0 lead. Mark Neill's basket tied the score at 2-all, and his basket with 4:41 left in the quarter gave Friona its first lead at 3-4.

Vega responded with a three-point lead, but Neill countered with another field goal, and after the Longhorns scored again, Roy Smith popped in two points to leave the score at the end of the quarter 10-9 in favor of the visitors.

Friona went scoreless for the first 4:12 of the second quarter, and Vega opened up a five point lead at 14-9. The Chiefs were lucky the visitors' lead wasn't increased even more.

Just past the midway point of the quarter, Friona began to hit the basket, and cut Vega's lead. Jim Murphree scored a goal, and Kent Miller made a pair. His last one, with 2:16 remaining before halftime, gave Friona its last lead at 17-16.

The Longhorns scored a pair of free throws after Neill's foul with 1:55 left in the half to take an 18-17 lead that was increased to 24-20 at the intermission.

Neill opened the second half scoring with a jump shot which pulled the Chiefs within two at 24-22. Barnett then missed a chance to tie the score when he missed a pair of

free shots 56 seconds into the third quarter.

Vega then zipped out to an eight-point lead at 32-24, but three straight baskets by Friona kept the Chieftains close. Murphree scored a pair of goals in a minute's time, and Jeff Whiteside pumped one home with 2:50 left in the quarter to make the score 32-30.

But the Longhorns scored a field goal and free throw for a five-point lead at the buzzer, 35-30.

The visitors again built up a steady lead as the final quarter unraveled, and finally had a 10-point lead at 46-36 with 4:08 left in the game.

The Chiefs wouldn't overcome this advantage. Vega's longest lead was 12 points, but Friona trimmed it back to ten on Miller's shot with eight seconds left.

Olton Duo Places 1-2 In Statistics

Olton's Mustangs showed one reason they repeated as champions in District 3-AA, a glance at the ten-game district statistics reveals.

The Mustangs furnished not only the champion in the individual rushing department, but two members of Olton's backfield ranked first and second.

Speedy Glenn Johnson was the district's rushing champion with a total of 1,249 yards in 229 carries, a 5.4 average. Quarterback Jimmy Parker, a triple-threat back, was second with 953 yards on 144 attempts, 6.6 yards per try.

Olton was the leader in both team offense (averaging 382 yards per game) and team defense (184 yards per game).

Friona ranked third on total offense (256 yards) and third in defense (244 yards).

Of the five district teams, Friona gave up the least yardage against the pass, 523. No district stats were kept on pass interceptions, but Friona excelled in this category.

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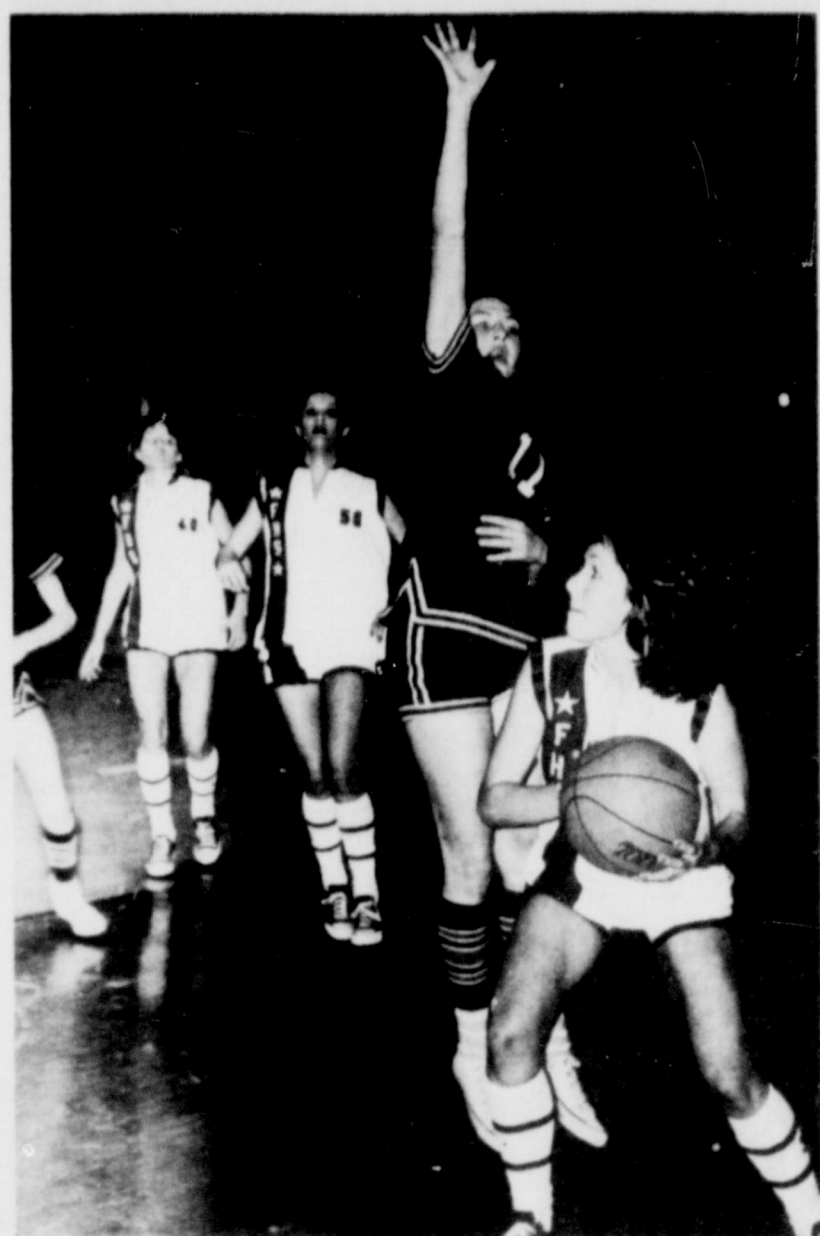
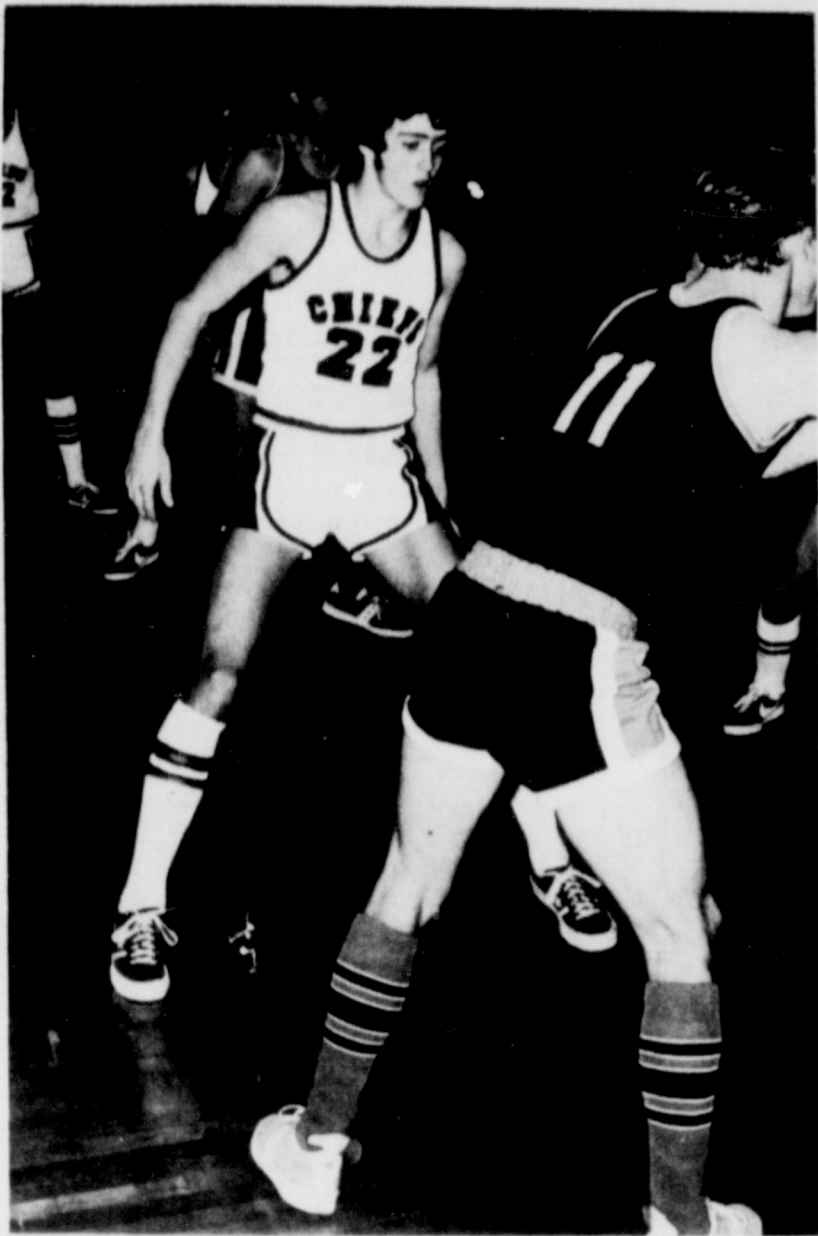

Lazbuddie Student Attends Science Lab

Is a new brand of soil activator as good as it claims? West Texas State University freshman Jack Smith of Lazbuddie has spent the last seven weeks of his plant science lab conducting an experiment to find out.

"I've been testing a new soil activator's effect on corn production against that of nitrogen," Smith said.

"And I found that the more soil activator we put on, the smaller the plants got. The control group was taller than the group we treated with soil activator," he continued.

Plant science greenhouse experiments are designed to make students more aware of plant production principles and the methods and procedures of carrying out a controlled experiment, according to Dr. Ron Thomas, professor of plant science and lab director.

"I know that nitrogen is better than the new stuff," Smith said.
