PRIOR TO 1962; if you had planned to go pheasant hunting, you'd have probably had to go to Colorado, Kansas, or one of the other areas where pheasants abound.

Oh, you could have held a pheasant season in Parmer County, but it would have done almost as much for the sportsmen to have held an elk season. They would have gotten a lot of exercise, but very little sport.

But today, thanks to the Parmer County Game Association and farmers throughout the area who have cooperated in stocking the birds, we have a good population of the colorful game birds, and as a result, pheasant season is swiftly becoming a gala affair in these

The game association, aided by county farmers, released around 2,000 pheasants in 1962 and 1963, and the birds quickly gained a toe-hold in the local area. Farmers cooperated by leaving some stubble and some unharvested corners for the birds to feed on, and to make their nests.

The birds seem to do well in our climate, particularly in years like this one, where the weather has been extremely mild. Also, our irrigated cropland and large grain base provides a good food base for this

It was stated by a regional publication regarding the present season that one of the top pheasant areas was expected to be the Parmer-Deaf Smith-Castro county

The first "open season" was held locally in 1964, with just a one-week affair held at first. The season remained a week long the first few years, and later was expanded to cover two weekends.

Some folks feared that the expanded season would cause the game birds to be exterminated, but this has not been the case.

Hunters need to remember to respect the landowners' wishers, and not abuse their privileges. They should always have permission to hunt before going onto a farmer's

If these rules are followed, our area should continue to have pheasant hunting as a winter sport for years to come.

WE NOTED THAT the Texas Farm Bureau discussed a number of timely, and some controversial items at its annual convention

earlier this month in San Antonio. The state farm organization, with 1,159 voting delegates, appeared to have a good indication of the majority of "country folks,"

according to the resolutions passed. The state Farm Bureau went on record as being opposed to a state constitutional revision. It also took a slap at the Longshoremen's Union for its recent action impeding export shipment of grain sold for export abroad, and went on record as opposing federal aid for "bailing

out" state or local government units. Concerning the Longshoremen's action delaying grain shipments, delegates said that "exporting of agriculture products should be subject only to pertinent existing laws and that appropriately severe penalties should be imposed on those who arbitrarily delay such exports.'

The Farm Bureau delegates further declared that "the judicial route should be followed to force labor to fulfill its contracts with shipping suppliers in loading ships with export items," and that legislation should be passed making organized labor subject to the same antitrust laws as industry.

Deadline Nears For Project Xmas Card

Tuesday, December 16, at 3 p.m. will be the deadline for Friona residents to be included in Project Christmas Card for 1975.

Melba Allen, chairman of Modern Study Club's community service committee, said this week that donations to the fund were coming in very slowly to date, but that she and her club hoped they would pick up prior to the deadline.

The last few days prior to deadline are always the biggest ones,

according to the history of the drive. The club has as its goal for 1975 raising \$4500.00, which would purchase a Coulter Counter for the lab at Parmer County Community Hospital. The machine has to do with measuring blood count, and would be a needed addition, according to hospital administrator Elda Hart.

Recent gifts to the hospital, made possible by Project Christmas Card, include an anesthetic machine valued at \$3,000 (1974), a fire alarm system valued at \$3,000 (1973), automati) beds valued at \$3,000 (1972), a heating and air conditioning unit, \$3,000 (1971) and a heart

monitoring unit \$3,600 (1970). Residents of the Friona area are asked to donate the amount they would ordinarily pay for Christmas cards and postage to the fund. All who donate will have their names listed on a full-page "Christmas Card" in the December 21 edition of the Friona Star.

Project Christmas Card has become a fine way for residents of the area to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends, and at the same time assist the local hospital. This is the 20th year for the project to have been conducted locally

Nursing Home Sets Follow-Up Campaign

A follow-up fund drive to attempt to raise the rest of the money needed for Friona's nursing home is being kicked off this week, it has been announced by H.H. Horton Jr. and Charles Allen.

Horton said that it was planned to mail letters to certain individuals and businesses who had indicated their interest in helping with the

fund. With the end of the calendar year approaching, cash donations for tax benefits are expected to help the drive.

The local drive to raise \$150,000 was kicked off last May, at the time the bond issue was passed for \$350,000 in municipal bonds. The fund drive stalled several thousand short of the goal, and the officials decided to wait until after the harvest was completed, when it might be more feasable to reach the

"We hope to raise another \$20,000 to \$30,000," Horton said this week. It was pointed out that it will be virtually impossible to get too much money, due to the rising construction costs, and also to the fact that several improvements were added to the structure after the contract was awarded.

One improvement was the addition of a basement. Also, several additional bathrooms, which had been deleted from the specifications in order that the bid total be trimmed, have been put back into the plans.

"The better the community supports the drive, the more likely the nursing home is to succeed," it was pointed out.

The nursing home leaders are attempting to pattern the new facility after Parmer County Community Hospital, which was built entirely from cash subscriptions, with no government assistance at all.

So far, all of the funds provided for construction of the nursing home facility have come from local



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On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEALD County Agent

I HAVE RECEIVED word that agricultural producers, landowners, city officials and others directing outdoor burning operations must soon comply with new regulations set forth by the Texas Air Control Board.

The new outdoor burning regulations which become effective December 5 outline conditions under which burning can be acceptably practiced.

Agricultural producers who in the past have burned crop residues and rangeland to enhance production will be particularly affected by the new regulations.

Outdoor burning in these instances will be allowed when no practical alternative exists. However, certain conditions must be met. The wind must be in a direction that will carry smoke away from urban areas, and wind speed must be between 6 and 23 miles per hour. Furthermore, open burning must take place at least 300 feet from residential, commercial or industrial areas. To allow dispersions, maximum burning should only be conducted between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. insofar as is

reasonably practical. Several other key items in the new regulations deal with burning of municipal solid waste. The population ceiling on cities and towns that can use outdoor burning to dispose of garbage and trash has been lowered to 3,000 people. And municipal solid waste disposal sites, that are burned must be located at least 300 yards from a public road and one mile from a residential or commercial area. Limits are also placed on the hours during which municipal solid waste may be burned.

THE PARTY OF THE P The new regulations also authorize outdoor burning to dispose of diseased animals to prevent disease transmission. And, garbage and trash can also be burned at private residences when regular collection services are not provided.

Two weed control meetings are scheduled for December 9, at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center in Bushland and December 11, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview. Both of these meetings start at 1:30 p.m. and should conclude by 4 p.m.

The topics of discussion include watergrass control in sorghum; solving weed problems in corn; using soil sterilants on bindweed; weed control in sunflowers.

'In 1975, well over a million acres of corn were grown on the Texas High Plains," says County Extension Agent Mack Heald.

"Next season we expect the acreage to climb even higher. Many farmers are debating whether to plant corn or sorghum and many others are deliberating the prospects of disease and insect problems and fertilizer and irrigation costs. "All of these subjects will be dealt

with in this program," he adds. The same information will be presented in each of the four meetings. Heald says that the program's

emphasis will be on production problems and cost. Producers will be able to discuss

their problems and needs with the Extension specialists who will be speaking.

They include Gene Latham, Hale County Extension entomologist; James H. Valentine, area soil chemist and head of the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock; Leon New, agricultural engineer-irrigation; Dr. Robert Berry, area plant pathologist; Dr. James Supak, area agronomist; and Marvin Sartin, area economist--all of Lubbock. Also, Dr. John E. Bremer, Extension Service agronomist from College Station.

A question and answer session will conclude the afternoon program. Producers and others interested in High Plains corn production are

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

Attendance Is Vital

By BOB OWEN

Your child's attendance in school is important in several ways, but I would like to look at it strictly from a financial point of view for a moment.

The figures used will be based on the 1974-75 school year, rather than the current year. Each school district is allotted money for operation on the basis of ADA (Average Daily Attendance).

In 1974-75 our ADA in Friona was 1347.28. Our membership for the same year was 1403 students. We were allotted one teacher per 25 ADA which gave us 54 teachers in 1974-75. If our ADA had been 1400 we

would have been allotted 56 teachers which would have meant a minimum of \$16,000 to the district.

We also receive per capita money at the rate of \$175 per ADA. We received in the neighborhood of \$235,774. Had our ADA been that same 1400 we would have received \$245,525. This increased ADA would have meant an additional \$10,000 for the district.

It can be seen from the figures above that our absences last year cost us around \$26,000, so you see, from a financial point of view, school attendance is important.

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



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
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
