## IN 14-8 THRILLER

# Hart Spoils Homecoming

They played two different football games at Chieftain Field at Friday night's homecoming. Hart clearly won the first half, and Friona took the second half.

The only problem was that Hart scored more during its half than Friona did in the second, and the visiting Longhorns made off with a 14-8 win to mar Homecoming festivities somewhat for the Chieftains and their fans.

In the end, it was Hart's ability to make the big play, both on offense and defense, that made the difference in the ball game. Fans were reminded of last year's battle between the two teams at Hart, won by the Chieftains by a near identical score of 14-8.

A big defensive play by the Longhorns in the final quarter that turned a sure Chieftain touchdown into a fumble recovery for Hart at their one-foot line was the big play of the game. Friona was driving in for the tying points, and then would have had the chance to take the lead.

Just as Hart had dominated the first half, the Chieftains were in the driver's seat for the second half. In fact, Friona had a bigger secondhalf edge, allowing them to dominate the game's statistics.

Hart made only two first downs in the second half, but they came at a critical time--late in the game after the Longhorns had turned back the Friona drive at their one, pushing the 'Horns out of the shadow of their goal-posts.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and gave the Homecoming crowd a little early excitement when Kelwin King, making his first varsity start, raced 48 yards up the middle on the game's first play, almost going all the way. King was finally brought down from behind at the Hart 15.

A holding penalty against the Chieftains thwarted this scoring threat, and on third down Hart recovered King's fumble at their 30.

The Longhorns, paced by the running of fullback Terry Hill, drove 70 yards upfield, and runningback Barry George went in to score from the eight with 3:40 left in the opening quarter. George was stopped on a running attempt for two points, and Hart led, 6-0.

Bobby Zetzsche raced 21 yards for a Friona first down at the Hart 36, and Kent Miller gave the team another first at the 30. However, quarterback Keith Martin fumbled on the next play, and Hart had it back.

Early in the second quarter, Hart set sail on an 80-yard drive, following a Friona punt. George picked up most of the yardage, but a couple of timely passes to end Pat Ritter (86) kept the drive going. Ritter made one especially good catch at the Friona five, in spite of being practically blanketed by the Friona defense.

A five-yard penalty against Hart after the Horns had moved to the Friona one threatened to blunt the scoring drive, but on fourth down, George raced it across for the score. He added the two points running, and the score was Hart 14, Friona 0 with 4:10 left in the half.

King picked up a pair of first downs into Hart territory, but the team lost the ball on downs at the Hart 36 with 46 seconds left in the half.

The third quarter was a defensive battle. Neither team could make a first down the first couple of times they had the ball. But the Chieftains forced a Hart punt and took over on the Longhorn 34 for good field position.

It looked like the visitors might ruin the good chance, when Friona faced fourth and six from the Hart 30. But Bobby Zetzsche took a pitchout around the right side, made a good cut, and outraced the defenders 30 yards into the end zone.

## Hospital Benefits From Trio Of Gifts

Parmer County Community Hospital has gained three needed pieces of equipment in recent weeks, thanks to gifts from the estate of a former patient, and from Progressive Study Club's Money Doll.

The hospital has received two gifts from the estate of Mrs. Bradley Crider Smith of Hereford, a longtime patient here.

Gifts from Mrs. Smith were a transport incubator and a ventilator for the hospital's cardiac room.

The transport incubator is used for transferring tiny babies by ambulance from one city to another.

"We have seen a need for this machine, and I'm sure it will prove useful. It's the type of thing you hope to never need, but when you do, you really need it," said hospital administrator Elda Hart.

The hospital was presented this week with a check from Progressive Study Club in the amount of \$307.80, the proceeds from the club's Money Doll drawing during Maize Days.

The Money Doll proceeds will go to purchase a photo therapy machine, which will be used to treat jaundiced infants born at the hospital.

The hospital has been assisted by the Money Doll project ever since its inception.

The hospital administrator ex-

pressed the appreciation of the local institution for these latest gifts, which will make it more equipped for the needs of area residents.

## Interest In Adult Education

The Friona Independent School District will sponsor an adult basic education class, if interest justifies, it has been announced by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The purpose of the class will be to assist any adult in achieving and improving academic skills and reaching a level of skills to receive high school certification.

The major emphasis of the class will be placed on reading and mathematics improvement.

The class will be specifically for persons with less than a high school education. There will be no charge for the program.

## Grimsley Takes First In Contest

Three entrants correctly picked 16 games in the Friona Star's weekly football contest, and they claimed the three weekly cash prizes.

## 45 YEARS AGO—OCT. 10, 1930

The concrete foundation was poured last week and material placed on the ground for the new Wicks Hatchery. As stated, the building will be 24 by 60 feet, frame and brick veneer. Furlong and

Dilger are doing the work. The building will house a 53,000-egg incubator, making it one of the largest in this territory.

## 40 YEARS AGO—OCT. 11, 1935

Misses Leila and Ella Staley of Springfield, Missouri, were business visitors here last Saturday for a few hours, looking after their property interest in and adjoining town. The Misses Staley own the tract of land immediately adjoining the west side of town which has been cultivated by W.H. Foster for several years.

## 35 YEARS AGO—OCT. 11, 1940

All the public schools of Parmer County have been ordered closed for one day on Wednesday, October 16, by County Judge Lee Thompson, as the first official action taken in this county to facilitate the registration of men within the draft-age limits. All men between the ages of 21 and 36 will be required to register on the above date. This registration is the first step in selecting able-bodied men who are qualified for military training in the United States Army.

## 30 YEARS AGO—OCT. 5, 1945

The filling station building on Main Street that was owned and formerly operated by Sheets Brothers has been sold to the Friona Consumers Company.

During the severe rainy and chilling spell of weather that hit suddenly down upon the Friona territory and all of Parmer County last week, quite a number of our farmers and cattlemen suffered losses through the death of their cattle.

## 25 YEARS AGO—OCT. 5, 1950

Crop prospects of Parmer County are now tending a fine balance, with distinct possibilities of either a record bumper crop or the other extreme—a meager one. Main factor in the outcome is unmistakably the danger of killing frost. With the cool, damp weather prevailing, all the

grain is slow in maturing, necessitating a late frost for productive harvests.

## 20 YEARS AGO—OCT. 7, 1955

First bales of cotton have been delivered in the last week to the L.&H. Gin and the North Plains Gin Company, both of Friona. First area bale went to the Mills-Fleming Gin at Hub at an earlier (Sept. 9) date. Delivering the first bale in the city was Glynn Hughes, grown on the irrigated land of Jake Lamb northwest of Friona. Gin owner Wright Williams paid a premium price of 50 cents per pound for the bale.

## 15 YEARS AGO—OCT. 6, 1960

Rev. W.G. (Bill) Burton of O'Donnell is the new pastor of the First Baptist Church in Friona. The Rev. Burton and his family moved to Friona last weekend and he brought his first message in the local church last Sunday.

Carroll Bennett and Tom Gee will represent the Friona chapter of the Future Farmers of America at the national convention in Kansas City next week.

## 10 YEARS AGO—OCT. 6, 1965

Two members of the Friona High School Future Farmers of America chapter, along with one sponsor, David T. McVey, will attend the national FFA Convention in Kansas City next week. Attending along with McVey will be Jimmy Taylor and Roger Nelson.

## 5 YEARS AGO—OCT. 8, 1970

The Friona City Council gave tentative approval for the annexation of a block and three lots of the Carson Estate property in the northern part of town. Building permit activity in the city of Friona during September spurred to the second largest total for the calendar year, and revived possibilities of establishing an all-time record for the year's total.

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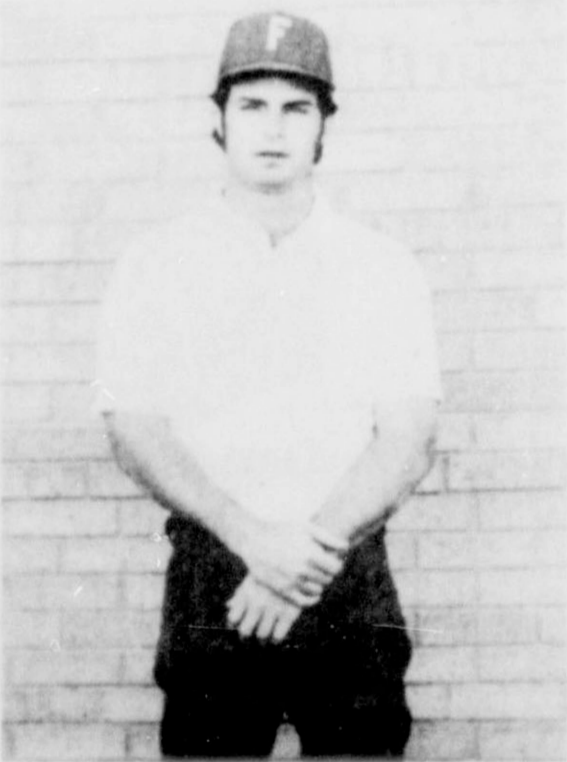

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## REMEMBERING...

### Calf Blabs, Cow Yokes, Bull Rings



Domestic cattle are important to man for food, clothing and many other things. Ranchers enjoy working with cattle for the most part but cattle are just like people, some of them don't follow instructions very well and sometimes do exactly the opposite of what is expected of them. Man has devised some clever apparatuses with which to educate cattle in proper social behavior.

The calf blab is used to wean a calf from its mother if the cow will not do it naturally. It is made of thin metal with two curved heavier pieces of metal on top. The curved pieces have rounded ends and one of them is movable. The round ends fit inside the calf's nose

and lock into place so they will not come out. The thin piece of metal forms a flap-like thing that covers the calf's muzzle. The flap has sharp spikes protruding outward from it. When the calf tries to get milk from the udder, the spikes prick her udder. Now, a cow is just not going to stand there and take that. She moves away or gives him a butt or kick. It doesn't take long for the weaning process to take place if the blab is used.

The cow yoke is for roguish cows that like to go through barbed wire fences. The sharp barbs on fences are enough to keep most cows on one side or the other, but often you find a cow that doesn't pay attention to the barbs. The yoke is a device that fits on the rogue cow's neck. It has a long straight piece that goes upward from the neck and one that goes downward. Each end has a kind of hook. The part that fits around the neck has gouges on its back side. When the cow attempts to go through a fence, the yoke catches on the wire strands and puts pressure on the cow's neck. The gouges

dig into her neck, causing (to say the least) an unpleasant sensation. The cow usually tries a couple of fences after she gets her yoke but soon learns it is not in her best interest to do so.

Bulls are not so easily stopped from going through fences. They are usually so going that a yoke doesn't do the trick. If this is the case, a nose ring is usually necessary. The ring is made of copper and is about three inches in diameter. It is made of two pieces, hinged together. When opened, the two ends are inserted, one into each nostril of the bull, brought together and pinned in place. Now, the center inside part of the nose is a very tender place, especially if you have a ring sticking through it and when pressure is applied to the ring it gets even more tender. A short length of chain is attached to the ring and if the bull tries to go through a fence the chain catches. The pain to his nose is more tremendous than his desire to go through the fence and he usually gives up and decides to stay in his own pasture.

blocks up front, made it look easy on the running attempt for PATs, going in standing up, and Friona was back in the ball game, having cut the lead to 14-8 with 40 seconds left in the third quarter.

Friona held Hart, and got the ball back at their own 45. King and Miller took turns making good gains as the Chieftains moved steadily downfield. Miller gave the team a first down at Hart's 33 and 22, with consecutive gains of eight yards.

Zetsche spurred nine yards for a first down for Friona just outside the Hart 10. Then came the play that almost tied it up.

Zetsche took the pitchout and headed right. Inside the five, he was caught by a defender and thrown to the ground. The ball spurted free, and a Hart player recovered at about the six-inch line. This came with 6:26 left in the game.

"He grabbed both of my arms and pulled, and when he did, I couldn't hold onto the ball," a dejected Zetsche explained in the sad Chieftain dressing room after the game.

Hart made their only first downs of the half—big ones—to push the ball out to their 23.

Friona got the ball back twice more.

The first time was near midfield. A personal foul penalty against Hart moved the ball to the 46. However, a faulty pitchout allowed Hart to recover their third fumble at their 47 with 1:09 left at their own 15. Zetsche picked up a first down to the 27 on a fourth down measurement. Then he broke for 17 yards to the Hart 40 with 31 ticks left on the clock.

However, the team opted for one more running play with 17 seconds left, and time expired with Friona trying desperately to throw a pass to arrest the clock.

The 275 yards rushing were the team's best of the year. Junior Kelvin King stood out in his first varsity venture. Filling in for the injured Glen London and Davy Carthel, he responded with 107 yards.

In fact, the Chiefs had a rarity, having two players gain over 100 yards in the same game. Zetsche had 104 steps on only nine attempts—a fine 11.6 per-carry average.

Bobby, the team's leading scorer with four TDs and 26 points, also moved into the individual rushing leadership after four games. The little speedster has gained 284 yards on 35 attempts—a glittering eight yards per try.

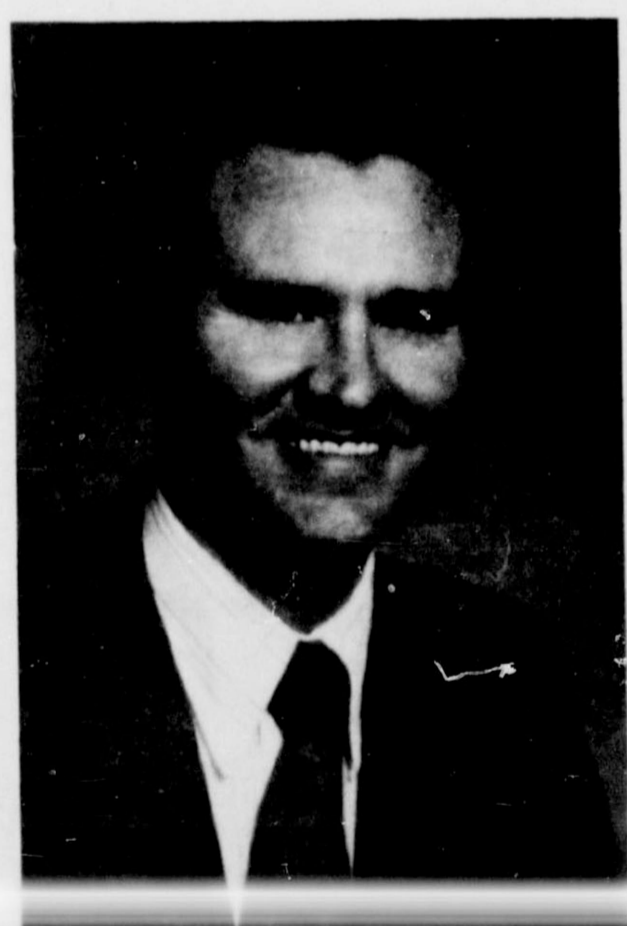

### City Gets Check

Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$34.4 million this week to Texas towns and cities for their monthly city sales tax payments.

The City of Friona received a check for \$6,063.68, according to Bullock's records. The City of Bovina received a check for \$1,236.78. Farwell recently voted to adopt the city sales tax and will be receiving a check from Bullock's office within two months after the tax goes into effect.

"We have now refined our system such that not a penny of city sales tax money can stay in this office longer than 45 days before being sent back to the city," Bullock said. "This is a far cry and a grand improvement from the old quarterly system with its 60 and 90-day delays."

## Texas Ranks Fourth In Production

According to figures recently released, Texas will rank fourth in the nation in production of summer Irish potatoes in 1975.

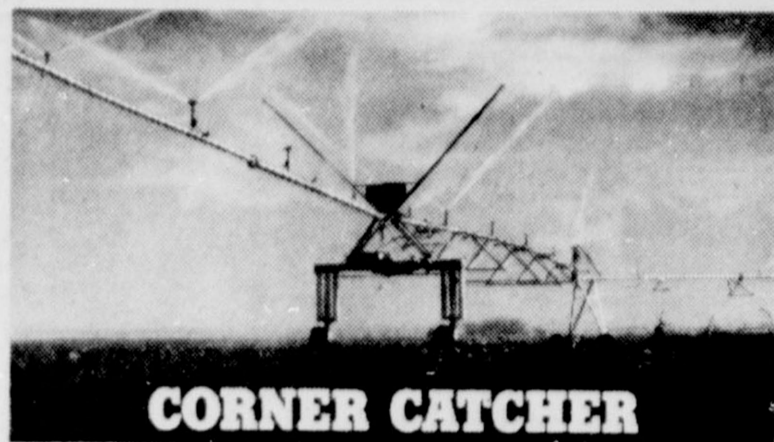
With summer potato harvest on the High Plains rapidly nearing completion, production is forecast at 1,785,000 pounds per hundredweight, 20 per cent below 1974 production, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

The 1975 production figure compares with 2,244,000 pounds per hundredweight in 1974.

Harvested acreage is expected to be 8,500. Of that figure, 4,600 acres produced fresh market white potatoes and 2,600 acres produced fresh market red potatoes. Potatoes going to potato chip manufacturers were grown on 1,300 acres.

Yield per acre is estimated at 210 pounds per hundredweight, nearly the same as 1974 yields.

A few fields in the Hereford area suffered some wind and hail losses, but the majority of the crop escaped damage.

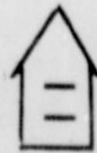

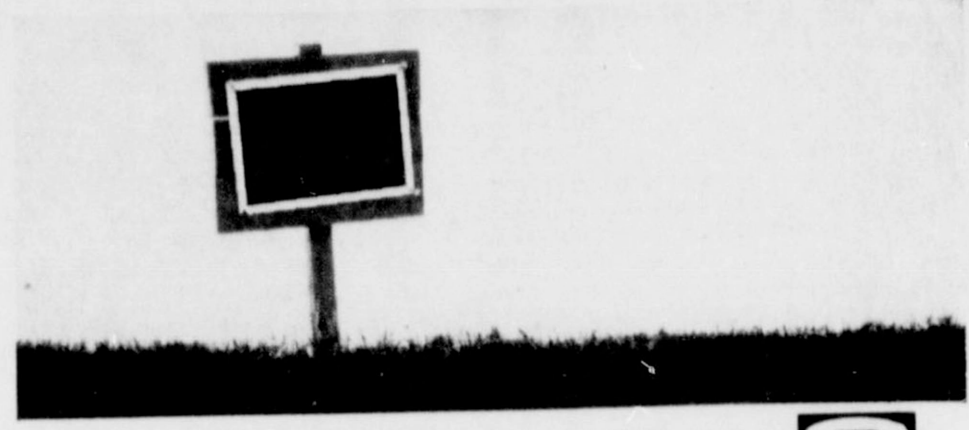


P. W. HUGHES

# J. V. Runs Wild; Tops LaPlata, 49-25

In a game marked by a wild fourth quarter which saw 48 points put on the scoreboard by both teams, the Friona Chieftain Junior Varsity outpointed Hereford LaPlata freshmen, 49-25 in a game here Thursday afternoon.

Friona was nursing a 20-6 lead going into the fourth quarter. The Hereford team pulled to within seven points at 20-13 before the fireworks started.

Strange as it sounds, there were seven touchdowns scored in the final 2:38 of the game, five by Friona and two by the Hereford team.

The local junior varsity jumped out to an 8-0 lead early in the game, when Todd Bandy ran seven yards for a touchdown. Edward Castillo ran for two points.

Before the quarter ended, Sammy Felder raced 73 yards from his own 27. A kick try failed, and Friona led, 14-0.

Felder recovered a LaPlata fumble midway in the second quarter, and with 3:34 left in the half, Clint Mears passed to Castillo on a nifty play that covered 50 yards for a Friona touchdown. The kick was blocked, but Friona led, 20-0.

LaPlata got on the scoreboard just before the half ended, to trail, 20-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, although LaPlata mounted a drive that started on their own 30. The quarter ended with the Hereford team at the Friona two, and on the second play of the final quarter, LaPlata pushed across a TD, to trail by only seven, 20-13.

Friona then mounted a 14-play drive, that was climaxed by Mark Lunday going over from the one yard line. Castillo passed to Raul Brailiff for two points and a 28-13 lead. The score came with 2:38 showing on the scoreboard.

Two plays following the kickoff, Lunday intercepted a LaPlata pass and returned it to the Hereford team's ten. On the next play, Castillo ran ten yards and the score became 35-13 when he added the point kicking. Clock showed 1:49 left.

Friona kicked off and after a good kickoff return, LaPlata sprung one of their backs loose on a 57-yard TD run. That brought the score to 35-19 with 1:33 left in the game.

The Chieftain JV covered the attempted onside kick at their 49, and three plays later, Bandy hit Castillo on a 25-yard pass and run play good for a TD. On a busted play, Bandy ran the ball over for two

points, and Friona's lead became 43-19.

LaPlata's first play following the kickoff was a pitchout that worked for 65 yards and—you guessed it—a touchdown. Now the score is 43-25 with 1:01 still to play!

Friona took over at midfield after the kickoff, and on the third play Castillo hit Brailiff on a 38-yard pass play for yet another TD. The kick failed, and Friona had a 49-25 lead with 30 seconds left.

Friona rolled up 281 yards rushing and 142 yards passing, or 423 total yards, in winning their third game of the season against a single loss.

Hart's only score came on the final play of the game.

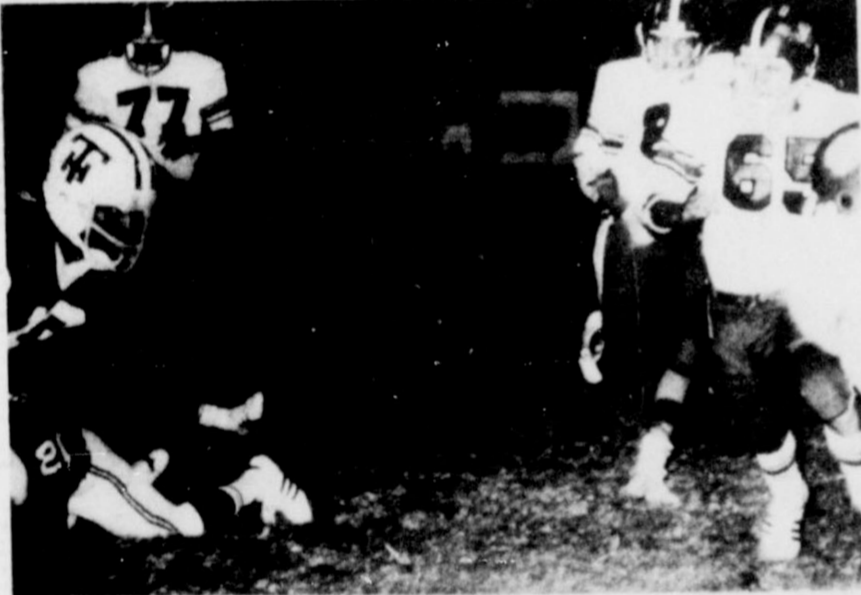
The seventh graders got off to a bad start, as Hart scored twice in the first quarter, and had a quick 12-0 lead.

The Wolves will be tough on their home field, as a check of the record will show. Apparently, Friona never has won a game on the road against Dalhart.

Friona's last appearance in Dalhart produced a dippy-doodle play that surprised the team for a touchdown and aided Dalhart's 19-13 win. That game was probably the best one in the 14 games ever played between football teams from the two schools. Most often, one team has won by a large margin. Friona scored a 19-2 win in the contest here last fall.

The Wolves have quarterback Mike Smith, a 6-0, 160-pound senior, with Scott Womble, a two-time district quarter-mile champ, at runningback.

Dalhart was hoping to better its mark of 5-5 posted in 1974, but being 0-5 at the midpoint, the best they can hope for is to equal that. And in order to do that, they'll be making an extra effort to start the season over when Friona visits on Friday. Game time is 8 p.m.

The game will mark a homecoming of sorts for Friona's new head coach Mike Garrison, who is a graduate of Dalhart High School and was all-district and honorable mention all-state center for the Wolves back in 1961.

Garrison was a starter for Dalhart in 1958, 1959 and 1960, and played on Dalhart teams that downed Friona, 50-32 at Dalhart and 61-0 here his senior year.

"For four years, I lived just four houses from the football field at Dalhart. We know about the pride and tradition at Dalhart, and we know what we're in for. They've never had a losing record, and they'll want to keep that tradition going," Garrison said.

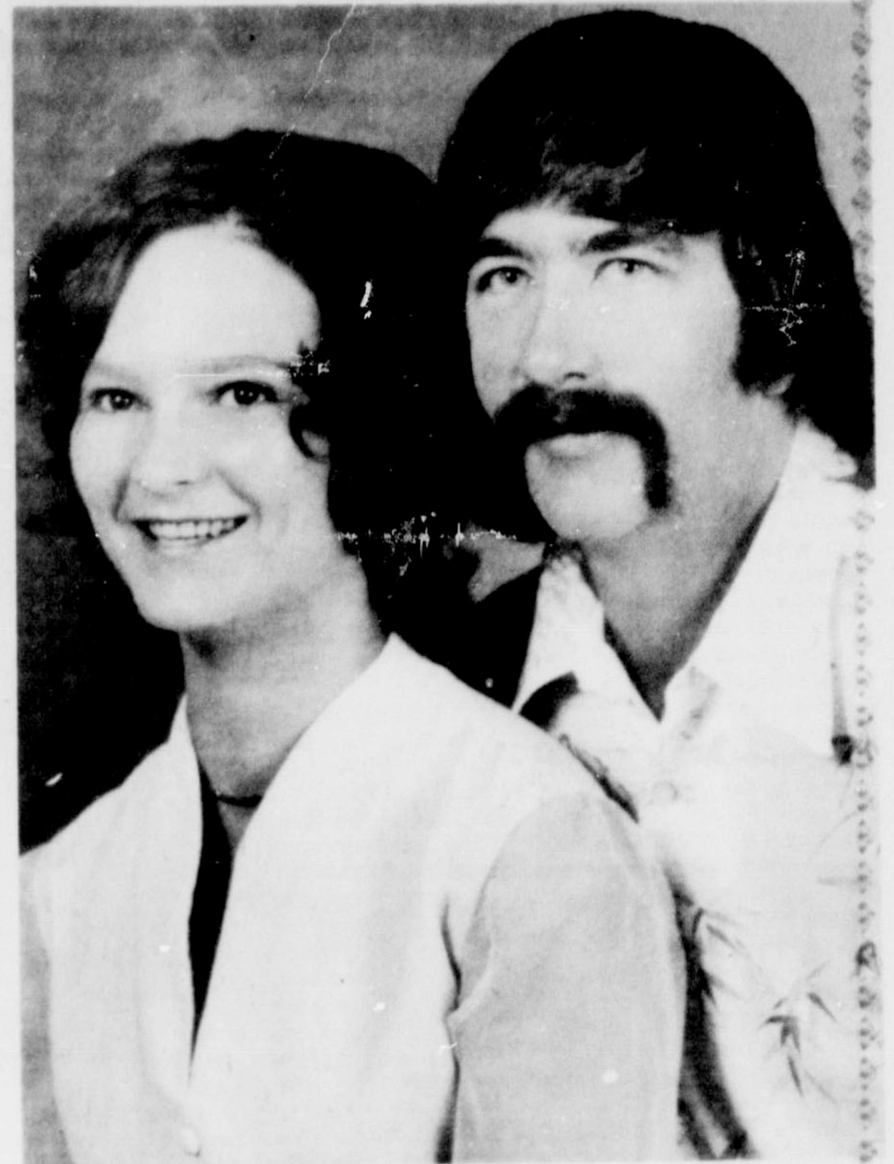

**McMillan Pens Santa Fe Book**

"Remember the old 100 class—Santa Fe's first freight diesels? How about those ungainly-looking Baldwin double-enders of the 2600 class? Were you ever the engineman of a passenger train headed up by the knife-nosed 50? As a shop employee, did you work on number 90—that Fairbanks-Morse, three-unit locomotive set that tried many a mechanic's skill and patience? Remember riding in the waycar of a freight over Raton or Glorieta with a string of 200's on the point with several 600, 602, or 2100 class diesel helper units leaning hard against you? If these scenes bring back memories or even if the oldest locomotive you've seen is a brand new 3600 class GP39-2 or an 8700 class U36C, then Joe McMillan's new book Santa Fe's Diesel Fleet is a must for you.

"Readers of this book will find over 250 photographs which include views of every diesel locomotive class ever owned by the Santa Fe. The least known Santa Fe locomotives were the narrow and standard gauge engines that served the tie and timber treating plants. Santa Fe's Diesel Fleet tells the whole story of these obscure engines and provides an all-time roster of them.

"Santa Fe's Diesel Fleet

is published by Chatham Publishing Company, P.O. Box 283, Burlingame, Calif. 94010, and can be obtained from them for \$16.95. The book is currently available only in hardbound form.

"Author Joe McMillan, Santa Fe's assistant manager of safety-system, Chicago, was born in Hosuton, Tex., and grew up in the south central Texas community of Yorktown. He developed his interest in Santa Fe motive power while attending Texas Tech University in Lubbock. After receiving his degree in civil engineering, he hired out for the Santa Fe as a draftsman in the chief engineer's office at Topeka. Following a three-year overseas army tour, he returned to the engineering department at Topeka for a short period before being promoted to safety supervisor at Fort Madison, Ia. In November 1969, he moved to Los Angeles as assistant trainmaster and later to Needles in the same capacity. He was promoted to his present position in July 1973."

**GSPA Issues Call For Strong Action**

A call for a curtailment of any further sales of grain by producers has been launched by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. This action came following an announcement by the U.S. State Department on September 22 that the embargo of grain sales to Russia would be extended to other eastern European countries such as Poland.

GSPA president A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, Texas, stated, "It is time for the American producers to start speaking the only language the White House apparently understands—this being a boycott."

Anthony asked that all grain producers join in this effort. It should be the decision of all farmers not to sell any more grain until the administration gives complete and unqualified assurance that the American farmer has free access to all markets including Russia for the 1975 crop or until farmers are able to sell their grain for full parity, according to the GSPA official. The current parity on grain sorghum is \$5.16 cwt. Corn parity is \$3.07 per bushel.

Anthony stated, "Producers were given assurance at planting and also at the time of the farm bill veto that we would have free access to all world markets. The current embargo on sales to Russia is a complete reversal of these assurances and farmers should react by stopping all sales of grain until these requirements are met. It is time the administration and American consumers alike be concerned about farmers' problems."

Anthony said, "It is time that American consumers see whether the labor unions or the U.S. farmers control the food supply of this country. We have 'cooled it' long enough. At present, this is our only chance of making the farmers' views known."

## Students Have Five Dates For ACT Tests

Students at Friona High School who are planning to go on to school after graduation will have five opportunities to take the Test Section of the ACT Assessment Program during the 1975-76 school year.

The first of five national test dates on which the ACT Assessment tests will be offered is Saturday morning, October 18. Students planning to take the exam on that date must have registered by Sept. 22, it was announced by Baker Duggins, counselor.



Announced also was the complete schedule of 1975-76 national test dates for the ACT Assessment Program. The dates (with registration periods in parenthesis) are:

Oct. 18, 1975 (Aug. 18-Sept. 22); Dec. 13, 1975 (Oct. 20-Nov. 17); Feb. 14, 1976 (Dec. 15-Jan. 19); April 10, 1976 (Feb. 16-March 15); June 12, 1976 (April 12-May 17).

On those national test dates it takes students about three hours to complete the four standardized exams that make up the Test Section. Another important section of the ACT Assessment Program is a two-part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process.

Information reports resulting from the test and questionnaire sections are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to colleges designated by the students.

Information reported from the Test Section (math, English, social studies, and natural sciences) provides an indication of the

respective students' general educational development. The Questionnaire Section (Student Profile and Interest Inventory) provides information about students' academic and nonacademic accomplishments, anticipated needs, and interests.

Nearly one million students last year used the ACT Assessment Program, which is required or recommended for applications at more than 2,400 colleges or other postsecondary schools and scholarship agencies.

It is recommended that students use the ACT Assessment Program late in their junior year or early senior year of high school in order that the resulting information can be of maximum value and assistance in the students' educational planning. The basic student fee for the program is \$7.50.

The ACT Assessment Program is one of several guidance-oriented services provided for students and educational institutions by ACT (American College Testing Program). The ACT National Office is located in Iowa City, Iowa.

Advisors of the local chapter are Benny Pryor and Paul J. Smith.

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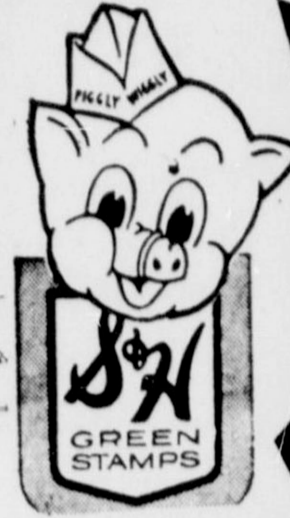
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
