Chiefs Impressive In Boys Ranch Workout

The Friona Chieftains hooked up with the Boys Ranch Roughriders in their first scrimmage test here Thursday night, and Coach Mike Garrison said he was well pleased with the team's showing.

"I felt the kids were real aggressive. They played with enthusiasm. I was even more optimistic after looking at the film," Coach Garrison said Friday morning.

Neither team was able to score from scrimmage, and this spoke pretty good for the Chieftain defense, since Boys Ranch returned three backfield men from last year's team that made it tough on state finalist Spearman before losing, 29-19.

"I was real impressed with the way the kids got after it. We made some mistakes, but that is what a scrimmage is for," Garrison said.

He said he was pleased with both the Chieftain offense and defense. "We hurt ourselves on offense about as much as their defense did. We would run two or three plays real well and then break down," the new Chieftain mentor said.

Garrison indicated, however, that he thought the team's execution was good, and that the team showed some flashes of what fans might expect.

Garrison said he was impressed with the running of Bobby Zetsche, Kent Miller, Glen London and Davy Carthel, and the play of end David Barnett.

On defense, he said Carthel played a good game, and likewise Ram Randolph.

Late in the scrimmage, Friona threatened to score, and sparked by the running of London got down inside the BR 10-yard line.

But the pre-arranged 10-play drive ended before the team could punch it across.

London ran the ball to the Rancher seven-yard line on the final play of the scrimmage.

"I thought we could have scored if we had had one more play. If it had been regular game conditions, we should have been able to have made it across on that drive," said Garrison, who added that he thought the late impressive drive also spoke well for his two-platoon system, which was employed throughout the scrimmage.

The Chieftain coach didn't know of any major injuries coming out of the scrimmage.

"I was real pleased with the turnout of fans, and we encourage the fans to come to Canyon next Friday. We'll need some support against Stinnett. They should be even tougher than Boys Ranch," Garrison indicated.

The Stinnett scrimmage will be held at the West Texas practice field at 5 p.m. next Friday. Fans coming from Friona will go to the first stop light on the north side of Canyon (U.S. 87) and turn east.

In a junior varsity scrimmage Thursday, teams from the two schools battled to a scoreless draw. Ernest Mills broke for a pair of long runs, one of about 50 yards, but the JV Chiefs couldn't punch the ball across.

A record 500 persons registered for the reunion, and a whopping 400 people were served during a basket luncheon on Saturday.

One of the highlights of the day was a parade, complete with 15 floats, three sheriff's posses, a band, individual horsemen, numerous bicycle riders and a few cars.

Parmer, Bailey, Cochran and Yoakum counties, which were originally a part of Crosby County, were honored during the festivities. Also held was an old fiddlers

contest, with Henry Lester of Idalou taking first place. A Muleshoe fiddler, Doyle Davis, placed fifth.

Also honored were the oldest persons attending the reunion, the pioneer couple, and the person travelling the farthest, who was Mrs. Irene Coffee of Redondo Beach, Calif.

City Receives \$5,212 Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock issued city sales tax rebates Friday worth \$19.9 million and announced a new plan to give cities their proportionate share of any partial collections from delinquents.

The City of Friona's share of the monthly rebate was \$5,212.50.

In the past, money from delinquents was applied first to the state's claim and only after that was totally paid off did the city get its money.

"It was wrong for the cities to be playing second fiddle," Bullock said. "In more than 800 cities the five per cent sales tax is a four-and-one split, so that's exactly how we are going to rebate it."



JOE DAN HANCOCK in the Plainview Reporter:

We thought Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz had his stuff all together last week when he chided those in government who didn't know "grain from chaff" for their criticism of recent sales of feed grains to the Soviets.

We guess he just couldn't lift it! Monday he asked U.S. grain dealers to "refrain from further negotiations" with the Soviet Union until the government is in a better position to project this year's corn harvest.

Butz' speech came after the USDA estimated this year's crop at a record 5.85 billion bushels, up 26 per cent from last year's harvest, but three per cent below last month's estimate.

His request also came after we were told the grain sales wouldn't be inflationary...and after George Meany blasted farmers and grain dealers for their export sales. Meany forgot to mention several

other things, but Leo Witkowski, president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association, didn't.

Said Witkowski: Butz' action served to "distort downward the true value of the crop now in producers' hands despite a growing world demand."

Witkowski also noted that wheat prices now stand at \$3.60 a bushel, \$1.27 below the price last October when the wheat was planted.

It's regrettable that the secretary of agriculture is yielding to the big labor bosses who are gulped as protectors of the consumer by stopping exports and holding the cost of food down.

"Longshoreman loading grain ships received a 40-cent per hour increase in base pay and another 40-cent per hour increase is scheduled to go into effect this October. These are the true inflationary inputs to the cost of living in this country and into the cost of agricultural products," Witkowski said.

HAROLD HUDSON in The Perryton Herald:

It appears that the State of Texas is going to come into a lot of money people didn't know it had because Comptroller Bob Bullock is harvesting plenty of dollars from retail establishments that have failed to remit state sales tax money as they should. Bullock and his "raiders" have swooped down upon stores in San Antonio and Houston and Fort Worth, enforcing collection of sales taxes due.

This has been accompanied by a lot of publicity and some people are trying to dismiss this as a mere publicity stunt on the part of Bob Bullock as he has his eye on greater things in Texas, probably the governor's office, if he can build a statewide reputation.

There may be something to this, but we are more inclined to go along with him as a public servant out to do the best job possible. It is odd that some Texans appear to be siding with those who are being locked up rather than with the official who is enforcing the law. After all, this sales tax money does not belong to the owners of the liquor store in San Antonio or the appliance store in Richardson or the appliance store in

Houston. This is money that has been collected from the customers of these stores and then, instead of being sent on to Austin, was conveniently placed in the pocket of the store owner.

Bob Bullock has announced that he sees at least \$12 million in sight in the form of delinquent sales taxes, and the total may be a whole lot more than that once the real audit and investigation gets under way.

Power to him. Those of us who make an honest effort to remit the taxes owed won't have much to worry about and we can't feel sorry for those who are trying to rathole money that doesn't belong to them.

Bob Bullock has in his employ three former Perryton men. Glen Castlebury is his administrative assistant and Lee Manross is on his staff. The office manager is Paul Loftin, who was the Herald advertising manager for a number of years before buying the Panhandle Herald and later moving to Austin to work for the state.

"Preach" quit a responsible job as a senior purchasing agent for the State Board of Control to take over the job with Bob Bullock and he is sold on the present Comptroller.

Texans went along for years proud of the fact that it didn't have a state sales tax or a state income tax. Once installed, the sales tax has proved to be the chief source of revenue for the state and on the state level far outstrips any type of property tax.

When the financial pinch gets tighter, we can look for some legislature to pass a state income tax law and we will join the rest of the states in this type of taxation.

Texas has been fortunate over the years to have received much of its income from taxes on the oil and gas being exported and this has kept the pressure off for sales and income taxes. The stage is being set for an income tax, however, and it will likely be passed on the issue of soaking the corporations. When that is done, of course, the individuals will have to pay an income tax, too.

The Southwest Associated Telephone Company has had men at work building the lines and installing the phones on the party lines between Friona and the Lakeview community and the Friona to Rhea. More than a dozen new patrons will be added to the Friona central list.

35 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 16, 1940

What might have easily been a serious affair happened at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Bragg, south of town Saturday, when their small son, Clyde Ray, fell from the tractor on which he was riding with his father. The little fellow fell from the tractor in front of the disc drill and before the tractor could stop the plow was upon him. Fortunately, a disc passed on either side of the little body and he escaped with only a bad cut on one foot and a few scratches and bruises on other parts of his

body.

Marital Status Change Needs To Be Reported

"According to the National Center for Health Statistics 2,241,000 couples were married and 940,000 couples were divorced during a recent 12-month period," Jose A. Martinez, social security field representative, stated today. "Most of these couples should have notified the Social Security Administration of this event."

"Those receiving social security benefits should report promptly in order to avoid an over payment. In many cases marriage or divorce will terminate a benefit or reduce the amount. In other instances the Social Security Administration needs to know the new name in order to change the name on future checks."

"Even if a new bride isn't receiving social security benefits she needs to notify the social security office of her new name so that the name on her social security card may be changed. This

can be done by contacting any social security office and completing a small green card--'Request for Change in Social Security Records.' If she will take her old card with her the change can be made immediately. If she is unable to visit the social security office in person, the matter may be handled by mail or telephone," Martinez concluded.

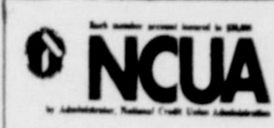

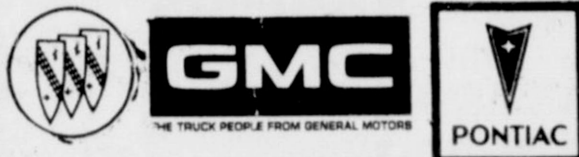
4-H's Compete

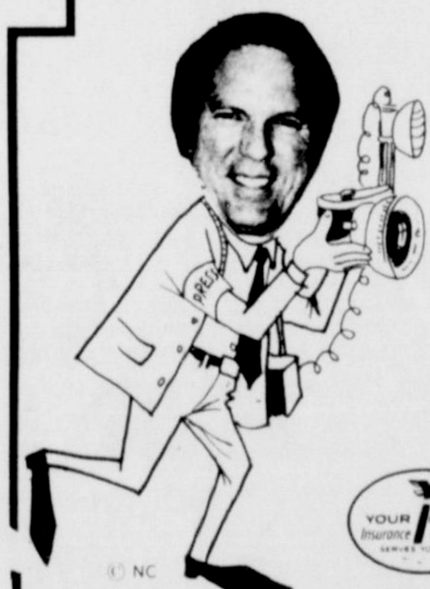

Another Federal Agency is moving closer to the farm. This time it's the Environmental Protection Agency. EPA officials are now sifting through the chemical analysis of nearly 35-thousand pesticides to decide which ones will require a government restriction. Those chemicals classed as restricted may be applied only by persons certified. Although the starting date for the certification requirement is more than a year away (October, 1976), many farm operators are all ready checking the requirements for certification. The establishment of two levels of certification will make things easier for most ag producers. To be certified as a private applicator (applying pesticides on your own land) boils down basically to being able to read and follow instructions. Commercial certification will involve passing a written test which will cover chemical formulas, equipment specifications and EPA rules and regulations.

I was told the premiums on an insurance policy could be deducted from my income tax. Is this true?

Fifty percent of the premiums on hospitalization insurance may be deducted from your income if you itemize deductions. A corporation may deduct the premiums for group insurance and are not taxable to the employee unless the amount of life insurance exceeds \$50,000 on any individual. For several years there have been plans such as "split dollar," "minimum deposit," and recently, the "IRS Section 79." These plans, when properly used, following specific IRS rules and regulations, will allow legitimate deductions of life insurance premiums. These plans, however, require the counsel of a qualified life underwriter and accountant and generally are applicable only to the few and not to the average taxpayer.

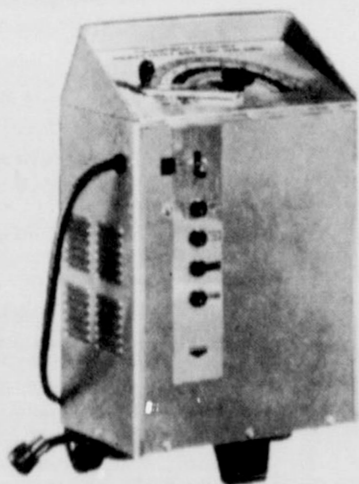

Women May Receive SS Benefits

1975 is International Women's Year and women are asking questions regarding their rights to social security benefits on their own work record. A popular theory has been that a working wife does not need social security coverage on her own work since she could qualify on her husband's work record.

Jose A. Martinez, Field Representative for the Clovis social security office, commented recently. "This is not necessarily true."

"Social Security furnishes additional security to the working wife. For example, she may receive retirement, Medicare, or disability benefits on her own record when she becomes of retirement age or is disabled, regardless of her husband's age or eligibility for benefits. The fact that her husband may still be employed full time will not affect the amount of her check."

"A working wife is building protection for her children, also. In case of her death her dependent children will receive monthly benefits to partially replace her lost earnings. The same thing is true if she becomes disabled. Also, father's monthly benefits are now available for her widower if he has her children under 18 or disabled in his care, and his earnings are low. If he earns more than \$2520 per year his benefit will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 he exceeds that amount. His earnings do not affect the children's check," Martinez concluded.
